Shaking from fear and excitement MeMe held the box - sat in the old rocker - - “here goes” and opened the lid - -.

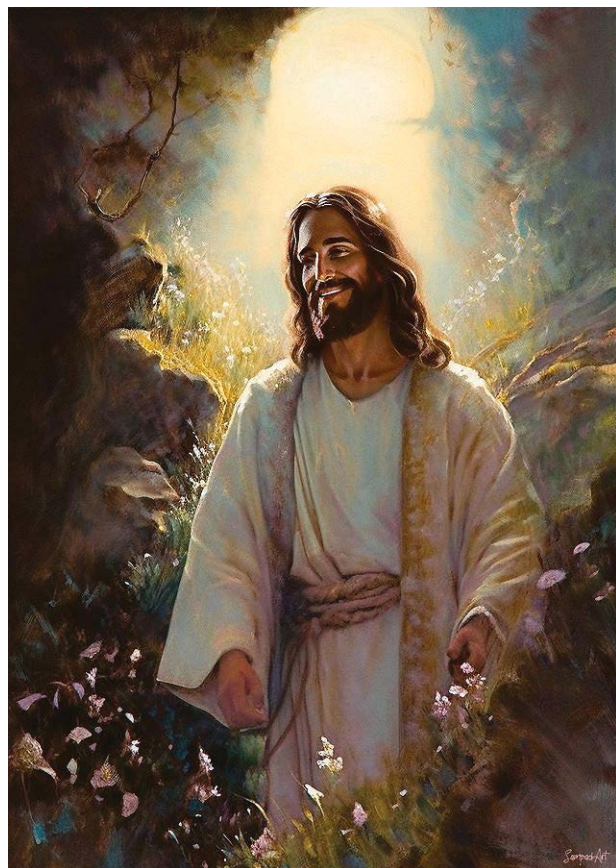

Marine Awarded for Superior Financial Management within the Marine Corps

Alexandria, VA Mar 25, 2024: On 22 March 2024, Gunnery Sergeant Bradley J. Schwartz of Bowman, North Dakota was awarded the Financial Management Resource Analyst Staff Non-Commissioned Officer of the year at a ceremony hosted by the Marine Corps Association for the United States Marine Corps Deputy Commandant for Programs and Resources during an award luncheon at the Doubletree Hotel, Alexandria Virginia. Schwartz was one of nine Marines and Civilians recognized for their contributions within the financial management community.

The Marine Corps is leading the audit effort for the Department of Defense in several metrics. Substantial progress was made toward remediating material weaknesses, financial modernization, and resource allocations that accelerated the path to an unmodified audit opinion. This effort required significant contributions from individuals within the Financial Management community that are deserving of recognition. GySgt Schwartz was one such individual.

Schwartz, currently assigned to the 23rd Marine Regiment, demonstrated superior

performance by dedicating thirty off-duty hours to attain a professional license in Power BI. His initiative resulted in the development of data analytic tools that significantly increased the efficiency of the Marine Forces Reserve accounting team, reducing unmatched transactions from sixty thousand to twelve thousand per week. Schwartz's strategic use of queries and artificial intelligence realigned accounting priorities, allowing for a focus on higher-level issues and providing accurate guidance through budget execution dashboards. His significant contributions, technical proficiency, and wide-reaching impact reflected great credit on him and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the Marine Corps and the United States Naval Service. The Marine Corps Financial Management Awards Program was established in 2023 and is sponsored by the Marine Corps Association to recognize the outstanding achievements and innovation of individual Marines and Civilians who made significant contributions to the financial management community and exemplified superior excellence and dedication to the mission and audit readiness.

I've been applauded from time to time for re-inventing myself once widowed.

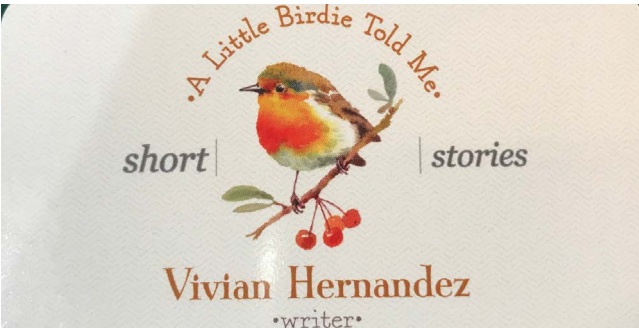
I deserve no credit. Without the help of God and a whole bevy of people my regrouping of life just would not have happened.

A Little Birdie Told Me: "Easter Blessings to All!

With Easter this Sunday we've been planning our meal, which got me thinking about Easter traditions, and foods our family has shared.

Easter bread was something my Mom took great pride in making. The recipe called for lots and lots of egg yolks 14 to be exact! The egg yolks gave the bread a beautiful yellow color; brandy and saffron gave it the traditional flavor. Saffron is one of the most expensive spices on the market and we found out it's kept under lock and key.

Mom used empty tin cans to bake her bread in and also tied the dough in knots to create a nest. The nest was then filled with jellybeans to look like bird eggs; she also made large wreaths with jellybeans spread around. Later on Mom started dying bits of dough with food coloring and making the loaves of bread with the multi-colored

dough. My Husband claims he couldn't stand to look at the bread but he loved to eat it!

My niece also enjoyed making Easter bread except for one time. She placed the dough in a warm oven to rise and promptly forgot about it. When she went to check on the progress the dough had risen and filled the oven, poor girl could do nothing but sit in front of the oven and cry!

An Easter breakfast tradition was a German dish called something I can't even begin to spell. Mom would sauté onions in butter, add sliced boiled eggs with salt and pepper then a generous amount of cream. This was served with fresh Easter bread, delicious!

Our menu this year will be a ham smoked by our son-in-law, Mitch, corn casserole, deviled eggs, peach and poppy seed kuchen, sadly no Easter Bread: Gluten free bread is just not the same!

A Little Birdie Told Me: "Like My Niece's Bread, HE IS RISEN INDEED!"

EASTER BREAD

2 cups of milk, scalded or 2 cups of potato water
and 1 cup of sweet cream

1 1/2 cups of sugar

14 egg yolks

1 cup of fresh butter

2 packages of yeast

8 cups of flour

Preheat oven at 350 to 375 degrees. Mix to soft dough. Put in anise and food coloring or 1/4 cup of brandy and saffron juice. Fill cans 1/3 full. Put in oven when it reaches top of the can.

(Another version of Easter Bread)

Preheat oven to 325 degrees. 1 pint of boiling water, cooled. Make a sponge of 2 packages of yeast and flour. Beat up good and put in fridge overnight. In the morning, take out and add 3 whole eggs and five egg yolks, beat real well. Add 1 1/2 cups of sugar (beat with eggs), 1 cup of warm cream, 1/2 cup of butter, 1/2 teaspoon of anise, 1/2 teaspoon of lemon, some saffron, 1 teaspoon of salt and 1/2 cup of raisins.

Reflections on the Words of Life

First Peter is a very important letter in the Bible, and I believe we shall see that it is intensely practical. The letter is designed to be an encouragement to believers who are living with the pressures, trials, and challenges of everyday life in this world. Peter was writing to believers scattered throughout the provinces of Asia who were confronted with many difficulties that resulted from the simple fact that they had become Christians. When one becomes a believer, he or she can no longer go along with the unbelieving world's outlook and way of living, and this brings believers into conflict with the popular way of thinking and living. This has been the story of Christianity from its very beginning and will continue until the Lord Jesus returns in His glory.

The epistle of 1 Peter gives us a much-needed perspective. The world, while very different technologically today than it was in Peter's day, is no different in the sense that it rejects and opposes the Lord Jesus Christ, His Word, and His people. Peter does not deceive his readers by telling them to expect life to get better. He does not tell them that becoming a believer means that problems will disappear. Rather, Peter tells them to expect difficulties for the very reason that they are Christians.

Let us begin our study by looking at 1 Peter 1:1-2: "Peter, an apostle of Jesus Christ, To the pilgrims of the Dispersion in Pontus, Galatia, Cappadocia, Asia, and Bithynia, elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, in sanctification of the Spirit, for obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ: Grace to you and peace

be multiplied."

The believers to whom Peter wrote were ordinary people. Yet, since they had become Christians, their lives were much more difficult than they had previously been. They were now disliked, even hated by people around them who were unbelievers. And what do you suppose the apostle Peter is going to say to these suffering brethren? We might think he would start with some words of sympathy. Or we might think that he would tell them to hang in there, that things would get better. But that is not how Peter begins his letter to these suffering brethren whom he deeply loves. Instead, he tells them that they were "elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, in sanctification of the Spirit, for obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ." He gives doctrine! He tells them what is true of them as believers in Jesus Christ. And the teachings he starts with are, by anyone's definition, "heavy." He jumps right in talking about election, foreknowledge, sanctification, obedience, and the blood of Jesus Christ.

What does that teach us here in the 21st century? It teaches us that the greatest need of the believer in Christ is to be grounded in the truth. Peter, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, cannot think of anything more important, more comforting, more necessary for his dearly loved brethren who are going through tough times than to tell them what it means for them to be Christians.

Lord willing, we will delve into this in more detail next time. But in closing, let us realize that it is not just believers who need truth. ALL people need truth, though truth may at times be unpleasant. Mankind's greatest need is to be restored to a right relationship with God. But be-

fore that will happen, a person must see that he or she is born in a sinful condition, separated from God and under His wrath. The only way to reverse this is to believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, who on the cross paid

the penalty of sin for all His people. Through faith in Christ alone, a person receives forgiveness of sin and becomes a child of God. Friend, are you trusting in Christ alone to make you right with God?

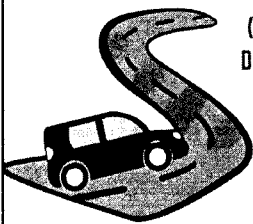

Easter celebrates new life

New life. Signs of it begin to pop up everywhere this time of year. For us Christians, Easter is an unmistakable sign of new life, too. It is a reminder of our

new life in Christ, who lived and died and rose from the dead for our sake. As we celebrate the Sunday of Easter with festive worship and jubilation, we are aware that every time we come together in our Sunday worship throughout the year we are, in reality, celebrating Easter; we are celebrating the wonder of God's love, revealed to us in the death and resurrection of God's Son. Each Sunday is, in effect, a "little Easter."

Since the early second century, Christians have been setting aside Easter Sunday as a special and distinct festival in the church. Easter, sometimes called the "queen of festivals," was actually the first festival included in the church year. Scholars think the earliest observance of Easter or Resurrection of Our Lord Sunday began in connection with the Easter Vigil—a service of waiting through the darkness of Jesus being laid in the tomb after his crucifixion to the dawn of Easter morning when the women returning to the tomb were told, "He is not here, he is risen."

Several history and worship resources note that Easter celebrates an event so great that it cannot be limited to one day. Thus, Easter consists of fifty days, a "week of weeks" (a period originally known as the Pentecost, from the Greek word meaning "fifty"). Since the time of the early Church, several practices have marked these fifty days including: kneeling prohibited on Sundays of Easter (because standing is the posture of resurrection); fasting prohibited (fasting is for Lent and Holy Week, but Easter is

From old English, a cipher is the equivalent of 'nothing'. Zero, nil, none, "0" was a symbol of nothing, the value of naught. A person of no importance was labeled a cipher, sort of like today's nerd. He was a nonentity. Writing in code is as old as, well, as old as writing. Ancient kings, knowing that the letter he was writing might fall into the hands of his enemies, devised codes.

Without the code breaker, the instructions therein, were useless to whoever managed to steal it. It didn't matter that the messenger might lose his head while bearing the message, the message was more important than the life of the messenger. (Don't blame me. I'm just the messenger.) The Jews, while in captivity in Babylon, were adept at writing in code. Some

of the sacred scriptures were written in code. The Jews were forbidden by Babylonian law from copying the ancient scriptures so the 'scribes' (ciphers) wrote in codes. To the onlooker he appeared to be 'scribbling'. Hence, we get the title Scribe. The writing was done on velum (thin leather or parchment) and came to be called a scroll. God intended his word to be preserved for all time for all people. Clay jars (pottery) have been in use since the first drought. When the clay is baked, it is solid and stays that way forever. The Dead Sea Scrolls were preserved in such jars 100 years before Christ came until they were found in 1947. What was written on them then, is the same as what you will read in Isaiah today. The scriptures are

called a codex.

Before the advent of the computer, business men (and women) kept a codex of cards on an axel that allowed the CEO to keep track of often used names, addressed, telephone numbers (and mistresses). When a crime was being investigating. The first place the detective looked was in the codex which were often in code. Before the detective could make heads or tails of what was in the codex, he had to decipher the code.

The prefix, de, spoken with slight stress, comes from the French, to separate. The cipher is the writer of the codex, so the detective has to separate the code from what the message really says. Parents do that with their teenage kids all the time.

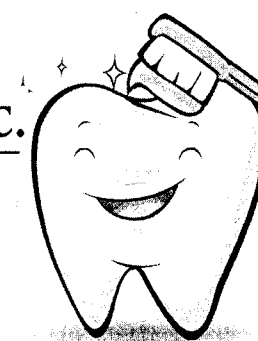

Thoughts for the Week

As I sit here contemplating an article, I am listening to the wind as it blows the snow around. I can remember other spring storms around this time of Easter and am hoping that it does blow over before then as it is predicted to.

There are many words to describe the sound of the wind, depending on the one that sounds like what you are hearing at the time. The wind can roar, howl, scream, thunder, whisper, sigh, murmur, suseate or tinkle. Wind can be soothing and there are sound machines that mimic the sound of wind so that people can sleep since it can cover other sounds that are occurring in the vicinity. Wind can also cause some people anxiety since it seems never ending at certain times and can cause buildings to creak and depending on the season can make rooms feel colder.

Hippocrates was convinced that west winds were worse, and that people exposed to them became pale and sickly with digestive organs that were "frequently deranged from the phlegm that runs down into them from the head." Theophrastus noted that it was in southerly winds that "men find themselves more weary and incapable" due to thinning of the lubricant in their joints. While the north wind was described by Spenser as "bitter, black and blustering," by Shakespeare as "wrathful and tyrannous," and held responsible for "gout, the falling evil, itch and the ague."

The direction, it seems, is unimportant. But there is general agreement amongst Byron, Columbus, Dante, Darwin, Humboldt, Luther, Michelangelo, Milton, Mozart, Napoleon, Nietzsche, Rousseau, Schiller and Wagner that wind does make a difference, turning both body and mind. Goethe thought it "a pity that just the excellent personalities suffer most." But the winds are nothing if not democratic. Roughly 30 percent of all people everywhere are sensitive in some way to their touch. There is something about wind, quite apart from its cooling in-

fluence, that directly affects our well-being.

One study of performance in physical fitness tests at a variety of temperatures, found an efficiency peak with wind blowing at 25 kilometers per hour (force 4), with energy falling off at both lower and higher wind speeds. Observation of the behavior of children in the playground of an American school, revealed that the average number of fights per day doubled when wind speeds crossed the biological threshold above force 6.

As a species, we seem to have a high awareness and a surprisingly low tolerance of wind. There are individual differences of course, some of which are apparently sex-linked.

Most women, very sensibly, seek shelter from the wind. But there is something about an approaching gale that makes men very restless. Almost as though the sight of swiftly-driven cloud or the sound of air rushing through the trees were stimuli that triggered some deep-seated response. A fisherman on the Dalmatian coast of Yugoslavia described the shrill scream that warns of an approaching storm as "a desperate sound that causes a man's heart to tremble."

There is no doubt that days with a lot of wind were once dangerous ones, destroying shelters, dispersing warning scents, and masking the sound of an approaching predator. And it may well be that, even in our modern microclimates, men in particular are still excited and disturbed by the old signals.

In any case, wind can be a blessing to some and a bother to others, but since it doesn't ask our opinion when it comes and we have no choice in the matter how long it stays, the best thing that we can do is to understand that it is part of Nature, cannot be avoided and to learn to live with it. If it does bother you to excess, find a program to watch, other than the weather channel, turn on a music station or if you are so inclined grab a good book, a warm blanket and a comfortable chair. A good beverage would not go amiss either. God Bless you All.







Women’s Lenten Retreat “For the Good”

On Saturday, March 23, with an impending winter storm looming over their heads, but “probably not until evening”, 50+ women gathered to renew their faith and share their love for Jesus during this Lenten season. Chad and Amanda Njos, owners of Cow Chip Creations (9 miles south of the abandoned town of Griffin, between Bowman and Rhame, ND) once again hosted this third annual retreat. It proved to be the perfect haven in the winter weather. The renovated barn, with its nostalgic charm and expansive gathering space, quickly invited the guests to settle in for a beautiful day of sharing.

Katie Dilse and Jackie Freitag, facilitators of the retreat, shared the theme song “For the Good”, by Riley Clemmons, taken from Romans 8:28 “For we know that all things work together for the good of those who love God and are called according to His purpose.” Each guest chose a piece of pottery from a wide variety of choices upon their arrival. They shared how these pieces of art, however humble or ornate, reminded them of themselves. Several ladies saw beauty, functionality, uniqueness. Some pointed out flaws or chips, some saw strength and sturdiness. All were aware of how fragile each piece was.

The first morning speaker was Terry Walter. As Terry shared the story of her battle with cancer and the loss of her husband, she referenced Romans 8:28, which carried her through some very difficult times. In and through it all, she could see God’s hand at work, and she looks back with much gratitude at all the ways God has brought forth good from her suffering.

The activity that followed required each woman to break their piece of pottery. There were gasps of disbelief as the Japanese art of Kintsugi was explained to them. The name Kintsugi comes from the Japanese Kin (gold) and Tsugi (join). Literally, golden joinery or “mending with gold”. Each piece of pottery was first wrapped in a cloth, symbolizing those things which hold us in our lives. Then each woman took a hammer to

their piece of pottery. They explored the brokenness beneath the cloth before opening it up to reveal the broken pieces. This is a strong metaphor for life, as we all experience difficulties and traumatic events in our lives. After sitting a moment with the broken pieces, each woman began to strategize how to put the pieces together. The beauty of kintsugi is that gold is added to the adhesive. When the pieces are rejoined, gold squeezes out from the cracks. The beautiful golden scars give a new perspective and remind us of our uniqueness, our inner strength and resilience. We are able to discover meaning in the most challenging life events.

Following the activity, Yolanda Martian shared her story with the group. Yolanda’s story of losing their daughter in a car accident and her subsequent journey of faith was a beautiful testament to Romans 8:28. Their family has established Squirt’s Bridle and Bible Camp in memory and honor of their daughter, who loved Jesus and horses. Beauty out of ashes... Yolanda has also gone on to teach religion classes and to teach and share the mysteries of the rosary. “For we know that all things work together for the good...”

A delicious lunch of meatballs and salads and dessert was provided by our hostess, Amanda Njos and Amy Burke. After lunch Maretta and Aftin Hendrickson and Jackie Freitag shared stories and pictures of their mission trip to the God’s Child Project in Guatemala in January, which was a life changing experience for all of them. They were part of a group of 21 who were able to build 3 houses and pool resources to provide much needed stoves, beds, and water filters for families in need.

Fr. Greg Hilzendeger brought the retreat to a close as he challenged the group to look for Jesus in the present moment, when we are so often tempted to look behind us or ahead of us. Jesus provides what is sufficient for the present moment. Even if we have not yet seen the “good” that is promised from our situation, we can always know that He is with us as all things work together For the Good.
