

Right Now Father Nicholas Vetter

Pastor of St. John the Baptist-Beach; St. Mary of the Assumption-Golva

During my short time as a Catholic priest, I have experienced many joys in my life and in the life of my people. Birth, baptisms, marriages, first communion, and anniversaries are beautiful times of rejoicing.

At the same time, a priest experiences many sorrows and suffering in the lives of all people. These experiences only come to mind because we are in this time of Easter. Easter is the time of rejoicing in the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. One great disconnect in the human heart is the lack of experiencing Jesus' resurrection as a real event, but more particularly, it is the seeming absence of the experience of the resurrection in the life of a Christian

The resurrection from the dead, the resurrection of Jesus Christ are not events of the past or in the future after death. The resurrection to life happens right now!

I remind you of the amazing and startling story from John 11, the Raising of Lazarus. As a brief recap of the story, Jesus shows up in Bethany after being called by Martha and Mary, his dear friends. At Jesus' arrival, he finds out that his friend Lazarus had died and had been in the grave for four days.

Martha, one of the most relatable characters in all the scriptures, comes to Jesus and enters into an intense dialogue with him. She is profoundly saddened by the death of her brother and tells Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Your brother will rise." Martha said to him, "I know he will rise, in the resurrection on the last day." Jesus told her, "I am the resurrection and the life; whoever believes in me, even if he dies, will live, and everyone who lives and believes in me will never die. Do you believe this?" Did you read that? Reread it again. Martha believes in the resurrection from the dead, but Jesus corrects her. I find the next line to be one of the most fascinating in all of scripture: "I am the resurrection and the life.' Jesus has just identified himself as THE RESURRECTION! He doesn't just say the resurrection will happen, or after you suffer and die, you will experience the resurrection, but if you have faith in Jesus as a real living person, you can start to experience the resurrection now! Not tomorrow, not later, now! In the very person of Jesus Christ, we will experience the resurrection. To say it another way, I will begin to experience the resurrection from the dead right now when I live in a true relationship with the living Jesus. This brings me back to the beginning of this short piece. Easter makes clearer to me the need for people to experience the resurrected person of Jesus Christ because Easter draws a deep contrast between joy and sorrow, beauty and suffering. You are not alone in your suffering. Turn to the real living person of Jesus Christ and start to experience the resurrection!







Happy beef month! by Olivia Waddington

I am Olivia Waddington and I am serving as the 2025 North Dakota Hereford Queen. Since May is beef month I wanted to help promote beef and support the Hereford breed, so I decided to write up a small article about the history of Hereford cattle. Hereford's originated in Herefordshire England.

In Herefordshire the farmers had to depend more on grass and Meadows for their cattle, so it was necessary for the cattle to get most of their nourishment from grass. This may have played a large part in adapting Hereford cattle to be a hardy breed. The first Hereford cattle were reported as large, solid red cattle with wide spread horns

and were used primarily as draft animals. Benjamin Tomkins began improving Hereford cattle in 1742 and is often regarded as the founder of the breed.


Benjamin Tomkins Junior improved the Hereford's of that time significantly. William and John Hewer helped to fix the color pattern of the Hereford's. Some of the first Herefords that came from England to the United States was during 1848 to 1886 during that time A total of 3,703 Hereford cattle were brought in and recorded in the American Hereford book.

In 1879 a Mr. C. M. Culbert-

son imported 13 Herefords from England among which was the bull Anxiety who added much fame to American Herefords. Anxiety cost \$1000 in England and developed into the thickest smoothest bull of any breed that had been seen in the United States. Anxiety was undefeated during 1879 and 1880 and matured to weigh 2,250 pounds. The most famous herd of Hereford cattle in the United States was founded by Charles Gudgell and T.A. Simpson in 1877. Many herds in the United States got their foundation cattle from Gudgel and Simpson.

I would encourage anyone who is interested in Herefords to join the North Dakota Hereford Association. As a junior member of the Association you would have the option of applying for the Hereford Grant, running for office, young ladies ages 14 to 21 can run for the North Dakota Hereford Princess and Queen. and you can attend and show Herefords at the North Dakota Junior Hereford field day.



Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

We arrive today at a new section in our study of Peter's first epistle. Beginning at verse 4 of chapter 2, Peter takes up the subject of God's spiritual house. It is a very rich picture of the relationship which believers have both to God and to this world.

The spiritual house of God is just another name for the church. And the church may be viewed as having two main parts. First, there is the Head of the church, who the New Testament repeatedly tells us is the Lord Jesus Christ. And the other part of the church is made up of those whom the Lord Jesus Christ saves by faith in His sacrifice for sin. They are called in the New Testament the body of

Christ.

Now in the passage before us, Peter is also giving us a definition of the church. But instead of calling it the church, he refers to it as a great building which the Lord is constructing. And Peter also describes two parts to this building, which correspond to the two parts of the church. He refers in this section to Jesus Christ as the main stone in God's building. And he refers to those who are saved by believing on the Lord Jesus Christ as living stones in God's building.

Let us look together at 1 Peter 2:4: "Coming to Him as to a living stone, rejected indeed by men, but chosen by God and precious." We see here that the Lord Jesus is not

just another stone in God's building. He is God's chosen and precious stone. Later we shall see him called the Chief Cornerstone. He is the living stone who was dead, but rose again and gives life to all the other stones in God's building. Even though He truly died on the cross, that death was only temporary. Let us realize that no one took Jesus' life from Him. He laid it down freely. This He clearly explained in John 10:17-18: "Therefore My Father loves Me, because I lay down My life that I may take it again. No one takes it from Me, but I lay it down of Myself. I have power to lav it down, and I have power to take it again. This command I have received from My Father."

Never think that wicked men who hated Jesus were somehow controlling the situation. Their hatred and crucifixion of Jesus were all part of God's plan. Jesus permitted men to crucify Him because this was the way He would give Himself as a sacrifice for our sins. Do you remember what He told His disciples in the Garden of Gethsemane when the mob came to arrest Him? We read in Matthew 26:53-54, "Or do you think that I cannot now pray to My Father, and He will provide Me with more than twelve legions of anaels? How then could the Scriptures be fulfilled, that it must happen thus?"


What Peter wants us to grasp is that because Jesus has

the power of resurrection life, He now gives that same life to all who believe in Him. If you are a believer in Jesus Christ, the life of Jesus is in you. And just as He rose again, so will you. Your death will be only temporary. In fact, you soul can never die. When your body dies, because you have the life of Jesus in you, your soul will go immediately into the presence of God. And one day, when the Lord Jesus returns, your body will also live again.

Friends, do you have this assurance that conquers fear of death? It is only for those who are trusting in Christ alone to make them right with God. Please be sure that you are one of those.

Jamie, 39, was seriously injured in a freak farm accident on March 22 while combining corn in a field plot southeast of Regent. He was flown to Bismarck and he had major surgery on the left side of his head that night. Doctors doubted he would ever be able to speak or walk again. Since that time he has shown gradual changes in his body and attitude. At first he was in an induced coma to keep him quiet and immobile. A month later he is able to nod yes or no, say yup and give an okay sign or thumbs up. He is awake for most of the day and will be receiving physical and speech therapy for more speech and mobility.


About 500 people came from a large area including Regent, Mott, New Leipzig, New England, Lefor, Dickinson, Lemmon, Hettinger and Bismarck for this benefit. Jess Kouba, father of Jamie, said he knew most of them. Many family members were present including Jamie's parents and younger siblings, Richard and Jenna and their families along with his three sons, Levi, Kody and Luke and their mother, Kayla.

There were containers for donations on a table near the door as people entered the former gymnasium of the Castle. As the morning progressed they were filled with \$20, \$50 and \$100 bills plus checks of various denominations. The generosity was tremendous and very much appreciated!

About mid-morning Jim Honeyman of Regent presented a check for \$10,000 to Jess Kouba and Karen Kouba on behalf of the Garrett Houghton GOOD Foundation. This Foundation was started in 2022 after Garrett Houghton of Killdeer lost his life to leukemia. During his battle with cancer, his community showed up for him in big ways. Because of that help he always wanted to be able to give back thus his

family created this foundation in his memory. The foundation gives to people who are enduring medical tragedies or other life altering events. He concluded with "Jamie is in our prayers!"

Immediate family members are the executive board of directors/trustees for the Garrett Houghton GOOD Foundation. It is up to this board to select recipients. Their responsibility also includes planning and running fundraising events in their community and beyond. Their hope is that they are GOOD stewards of the donations and can give gifts with integrity and love. There are no applications to fill out to be a recipient. 





Papa loved to see just how far he could take it and once there, they would generally end this duel with an aggressive tickle or a forced hug. Papa's life for the last decade was not only scheduled around the cattle, but also any free time the grandkids had to visit the ranch. On our way, Papa would call, asking where we were and why it was taking so long? Before we left for home, it was a process, hours of goodbyes and tears, mostly by John and sometimes by Charlie. On our back, Papa would call asking why we had to take off so soon and when we were planning our next trip?

John filled our lives with both heart and humor. He was a master at setting a boundary and if you were to a pick a fight, he taught us to pick a fair one, but it was always wise to never start one with Dixie. John loved a good road trip with no real plan or schedule. If you were getting into the vehicle with John, it was best to plan for an all-day event as you are stopping at each farmer's market (generally on the hunt for the next best pickle), in addition to every grocery store, restaurant, and a place for him to purchase and wear out a new outfit.

Following last week's accident, John was given two good days at the ranch. He would have it no other way. This incident is just another example of why rural health care is so very important to our community. The immediate emergency care that John received from both the Bison Ambulance and West River Health Services, prior to his arrival to Sanford Medical Center in Bismarck, gave John's family precious time. John passed away on Friday, May 2, 2025, at the Sanford Medical Center in Bismarck, North Dakota. John's final day was spent together as a family sharing laughs, tears, and stories.


The whole point of this is that you cannot abdigate your responsibility when you are raising children. It is your responsibility to decide what your children should read and hear in this world and if you are not
