### Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

We continue looking at 1 Peter 1:2 in our study today: "Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father, in sanctification of the Spirit, for obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ: Grace to you and peace be multiplied." We saw one meaning of the word sanctify (root word of sanctification)----"dedicated or set apart to God." But there is another meaning of the word, and that is "to make pure." When God chose His people, He also determined that they would one day be perfectly pure. In other words, they would be completely free from sin in every way. As soon as a person places his or her trust in Jesus Christ, he or she is free from the auilt of sin.

There is nothing that God holds against the believer. Why? Because Jesus paid the price for that person's sin in full. But that is just the beginning of the sanctification process, which lasts throughout the life of the believer. In the process of sanctification, God deals with the presence of sin that remains in the believer's life. Though completely forgiven, the believer still has what the Bible calls the "old man." The old man is that part of the believer which still wants to sin and which still does sin.

In the sanctification process. God is gradually eradicating the old man with its sinful desires and is feeding the new man, which desires to please God. This results in the believer's becoming more and more like Jesus Christ, and this process is going to be perfectly accomplished in each and every believer. The apostle Paul brings together the same two doctrines of election and sanctification when he tells the Ephesians in Ephesians 1:4, "Just as He chose us in Him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and without blame before Him in love."

By the time the believer reaches heaven. God will see to it that there is no sin left in him. He will be completely pure and ready to dwell in God's presence forever. But in the meantime, believers are going through a process which is often painful. It is not a pleasant thing to be shown how sinful we are. God must humble us to the point that we agree with Him against ourselves that we are doing what is not right. We can be thankful that God the Holy Spirit is the One who carries on the work of sanctification, and He will never stop. If it were left up to us, we would fail completely. But the Spirit who lives in every believer will not fail. In His perfect wisdom, He knows everything about us. He knows where to work and how to proceed. He is all-powerful and can overcome even the most ingrained habits of sin. Because the believer's sanctification is in the Spirit's hands, the apostle Paul can write to the Philippians in Philippians 1:6, "Being confident of this very thing, that He who has begun a good work in you will complete it until the day of Jesus Christ." Nothing can stop the omnipotent sanctifying work of God the Holy Spirit.







"Chloe, a Rancher's Wife", makes the following suggestions to other rancher wives who are just beginning this wonderful, occasionally demanding, special lifestyle:

...Make an effort to prepare a delicious supper meal every night, but don't count on your rancher husband to be there when it's done and ready to come off the stove. After a few days or weeks have

passed, ask your husband for a 'Date Night' in town, but realize that that could also end up being a fleeting possibility because of the weather or his workload.

'Decision

...Your rancher husband will be pleased to have a full supper meal as soon as he settles things out with the livestock. Calves can find holes through fences, and bulls are sometimes stubborn.

### Death Notice for LaRee Udris LaRee Udris was born July

3, 1954, in Baker, Montana, and



died April 19, 2024, in Denver, Colorado. She grew up on a cattle ranch, the SL. The ranch was four miles north of Rhame, North Dakota in Slope County, one of the least populated counties in the US. She loved everything nature. She gazed at starlight western night skies and ran through windblown prairies. In the spring she looked forward to crocus peeking through the snow-covered hills, watching the newborn calves nurse and holding the recent batch of kittens hiding in the hay bales. She could ride horse bareback and milk a cow, spent her childhood days searching for Indian arrowheads in the gulches and box canyons. A favorite activity was singing with her dad while riding together in the truck, both had great voices. Always adventurous, she spent ten days portaging the Minnesota Boundary Waters. She thought nothing of hitchhiking 400 miles (more than result in a car at Christmas. She learned how to water ski on the lakes of Minnesota and snow ski in Colorado. In her 60's she learned golf well enough to get two holes in one.

She always wanted to do for others. If someone was sick or needed help, she was there. At 16 she spent her summer volunteering at the Grafton State School working with disabled children. At 17 and 18, she did the same in Minneapolis at the St David's Center. She graduated from the University of North Dakota with honors in three years. Upon graduation, she married Jake, and they began their new life together in Jamestown, ND.

She was the first one up and the last one to bed. Always quick to laugh, she had an infectious sense of humor and a positive outlook on life. When times got tough, she could dig deep both mentally and physically. She exercised 6 days a week and kept those around her equally active. She loved to dance, and sometimes quit when the sun came up. 

Corie is survived by her husband Terry Lien; children Megan and Beth Lien; father







A cease fire is called and then you get ready to scramble some eggs. At the commence fire signal you get 5 minutes to shoot 10 rounds. The shooter that hits the most eggs with the least rounds wins. Therefore 5 out of 5 would be a perfect round. And 15 for 15 would be a perfect score for the 3 relays. During the coarse of fire you may take a sighter shot but these sighter shots count towards your 10 shot limit. Any ties are broken with a sudden death shoot off.
