Reflections on the Words of Life

In our study together, we have spent some time considering 1 Peter 2:2-3: "As newborn babes, desire the pure milk of the word, that you may grow thereby, if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is gracious." It shouldn't surprise us that there is much more we could glean from these verses. God's Word is so rich and so deep that when we have studied it as thoroughly as we know how, we have but scratched the surface of its wealth. So we continue today by looking again at the incomparable love of Jesus. The words of Charles Wesley's hymn, "Amazing love, how can it be, that Thou my God should die for me?" should be the response of every bornagain child of God. Jesus' sacrificial death frees the believer from all the guilt of our sins. The punishment we deserve has been laid upon Christ, and He has paid sin's full debt. His perfect righteousness given to the believer as a free gift makes us acceptable to God. Because of what Christ has done, believers are made members of God's family and can look forward to

spending eternity in heaven. But even up to now, Peter says that we have only TAST-ED the goodness and grace of God. In other words, there is so much more to follow. We read in 1 Corinthians 2:9, "Eye has not seen, nor ear heard, nor have entered into the heart of man the things which God has prepared for those who love Him." Brothers and sisters in the Lord, what blessings the Lord has in store for us! And best of all, we



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will be with Him and love Him without the tarnish of sin that lingers in us in this life.

But, dear ones, we don't have to wait for heaven to taste more of Christ's love. The apostle Paul prayed this for believers in Ephesians 3:17-19: "That Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all the saints what is the width and length and depth and height-to know the love of Christ which passes knowledge; that you may be filled with all the fullness of God." The more we grow and learn God's Word, the more we will taste His goodness and grace.

Friends, have you personally tasted this goodness and grace of God? Have you seen that salvation is a free gift? Have you abandoned all attempts at trying to be good enough to earn God's favor? Have you seen that the only way to become right with God is by trusting only in what Christ accomplished on the cross as payment for your sins? If not, please ask Him for the gift of saving faith so that you might begin to taste His goodness and grace.

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








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'1920s Dakota Farm Market Prices"

Substantial variations in "1920s Dakota Farm Market Prices" were mostly brought on by post-World War I overproduction by farmers and dwindling markets for their harvested crops and livestock. Agricultural depression resulted in many farmers dealing with low incomes and declining prices, even though it has to be noted that some 1920s years saw relatively high farm production prices within drastic comparisons.

The 1st World War, sometimes referred to as the Great War, started in Europe in 1914 and lasted until 1918. Most of the main powers in the world were involved, and it caused unheard-of amounts of destruction and casualties. Following World War 1, there was an excess of agricultural products due to a combination of increased production during the conflict and a subsequent drop in demand, which resulted in farm overproduction and falling market prices. America's farmers invested in more land and equipment because they were urged to increase production to satisfy wartime demands. America's new crop types, improved farming techniques, advances in equipment design, and the Wheat Price Guarantee Act in 1919 made it simpler to cultivate more land and generate higher yields, which was 'POSITIVE'. But then, postwar demand both here and in Europe declined, which led to a sharp decline in prices.

The aftermath of World War I and the government's encouragement of higher output were the main causes of the comparatively high prices for America's crop and livestock production in some years during the 1920s. In particular, the need for agricultural goods increased as war-torn European nations found it difficult to produce their own food supplies. So U.S. farm commodities saw price increases as a result of this spike in demand.

The farmers of America, respectfully patriotic, took on debt in order to grow their farm businesses, anticipating a sustained demand for their agricultural products. Both the U.S. military and the allied forces countries' need for food drastically decreased post-World War I. European countries that had depended on American agriculture started to recover and boost their own food production. During the postwar period, fewer people were consuming significant amounts of food as they had during World War I.

A necessary excess of agricultural products was produced as a result of World War I, but later a postwar drop in demand resulted in overproduction, and farm product prices fell sharply.

...For example, from 1919 to 1920, CORN) prices tumbled from \$1.30 per bushel to 47 cents, a drop of more than 63 percent.

...WHEAT) prices plummeted from \$2.35 per bushel in 1919 to \$1.01 per bu. in 1921 and further to 60 cents per bu. in 1930.

...BEEF Cattle) prices also fluctuated, reaching \$8.10 per hundred pounds in 1919, \$4.45 per hundredweight in 1921, and \$8.30 per 100 lbs. in 1929.

...PORK/HOG) prices also varied significantly. In 1919, prices peaked at \$19.30 per hundred pounds, then dropped to 12.90 per hundredweight, and ended 1920 at \$12.66 per 100 lbs.

....1921-1922: Prices remained relatively stable, with a gradual decline.

.....1923: Prices continued to decline, being lower than 1922 due to increased hog supply and a large corn crop

.....1924: Prices began to rise, reaching \$8.54 in August, the highest since the summer of 1922.

......Late 1920s: Prices generally showed a slight upward trend compared to the early years of the "Roaring Twenties" decade.

...SHEEP) prices in the U.S. changed widely in the 1920s. The average price of lambs was \$10.38 per hundred pounds in 1923, while the average price of sheep was \$6.65 per hundredweight. Prices for lamb and sheep increased steadily in 1922 and 1923 as a result of rising demand for both meat and wool. Following this, the price of wool fell quickly, which caused the sheep livestock sector as a whole to fall and never fully recover. In 1929, wool prices momentarily hit a record high of about \$1.00 per pound, although this was only temporary. The sheep livestock sector suffered greatly as a result of the collapse of the wool market; prices dropped sharply to as low as \$0.05 a pound, regardless of quality.

...Dairy Cattle) An average milk cow in the 1920s was priced at \$16 to \$25 each. During that time, milk itself cost about 35 cents per gallon. This price stayed the same until 1929, when the Great Depression got started; then milk prices fell to 26 cents per gallon.

As prices fell, the Dakota farmers who had taken out loans to grow their businesses faced increased financial difficulties. As a result of the numerous farm foreclosures, many agricultural towns experienced financial ruin. Agriculture was powerlessly affected by 'The Great Depression', a












devastating global economic downturn that started in 1929 and continued into the 1930s. A decrease in family living standards, excessive unemployment, poverty, and numerous bank, business, and farm bankruptcies were all experienced by Americans, both young and old alike

Americans have repeatedly shown that they are capable of surviving nearly anything as long as they maintain their faith and can envision a brighter future ahead. But depression—both personal and financial—can be so sneaky since it worsens every day, making it seem difficult to ever see the bright side. The mind's haze suggests a locked box that a person is physically inside of.



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

Just visiting some of those areas in a guided tour can give you some idea of why they have problems as it is not necessarily inviting. Lower income areas are often poorly taken care of and you see a lot of bars and grillwork. This is unusual for our state as we are much more welcoming. We often wave to

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
