Sometimes we need that special someone to turn on the lights for us - - you may be that person in someone elses life - -.







Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

We have been studying the repentance of the king of Assyria and his call to all in the city of Nineveh to repent likewise. Today we arrive at Jonah 3:8: "But let man and beast be covered with sackcloth, and cry mightily to God; yes, let everyone turn from his evil way and from the violence that is in his hands."

It seems strange to us that animals were included in this call to repentance, but in ancient times, rituals such as this often included animals. Though the Ninevites were almost surely polytheists, they are ready now to acknowledge the God whom Jonah proclaimed as the only true God-and to humble themselves before Him. Such crying to God as the king is commanding must come from the heart. God is the omnipresent, prayer-hearing God. To pray to Him is to acknowledge that He is in control and has the power to change things. How awesome it is when a whole community of people cry out together for God's mercy. Our nation needs much of this today.

Besides telling his people to cry out to God, the king instructs everyone to turn from evil and violence. Friends, when we look around at the conditions in our country, we see an abundance of evil and violence everywhere. Our nation has turned its back on God, on His design, on His commandments. Our children are taught in public school that the universe came into being by a massive explosion and that human beings are the result of random chance. People are being told that they are free to choose whatever gender they prefer to be, and babies by the thousands are being slaughtered in the wombs of those who should be the most tender and loving mothers to them. But friends, let us not be like the Pharisee in Jesus' parable who compares himself with the obviously wicked tax collector and boasts before God about his own righteousness (Luke 18:9-14). It is easy to look around

and find someone more sinful than ourselves and to conclude that we are "good people." But God's Word doesn't allow for that. The Bible clearly states, "There is none righteous, no, not one" (Romans 3:10). We can give ourselves a little test. Do we love God with all our hearts, souls, and minds and our neighbors as ourselves? In the Sermon on the Mount (Matthew 5-7), Jesus says that if we look upon someone with lust, we have committed adultery in our hearts. If we hate, we have committed murder in our hearts. So how do we really measure up? The truth is that no one measures up to God's absolutely holy standard. That is why we all need the same thing-the Savior who paid the penalty of sin for all His people and who gives His perfect righteousness as a free gift to all who put their trust in Him to make them right with God. Please be sure you are relying only on what Christ accomplished on the cross for salvation. "For the wages of sin is death, but the gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord" (Romans 6:23)



We've certainly received moisture here in March! Soon your gardening beds will be soft and ready - for transplanting out your overgrown perennials, and then possibly planting a few new varieties. We have just the answer for you.

1) Around May 17th or so, thin out your perennials; put 'em in a pot or something.

2) Bring them to West River Ambulance Garage in Hettinger prior to noon on Friday, 5/19.

3) Come back to the Garage at 2:00 pm that same day to purchase some new, unique perennials and give a goodwill donation toward our Auxiliary Legacy Scholarship. A gardener's paradise!

That's right, on Friday, May 19th, from 2:00-4:00 pm, the "46th Annual West River Perennial Plant Sale" will be held at the West River Ambulance Garage (307 Adams Avenue, Highway 12). You might want to be there right at 2:00 pm, as last year most all of the perennials were gone by 3:15! For a goodwill donation, you can purchase perennial plants, and the good feeling that 100% of your gift is going toward a local area student pursuing a healthcare degree, via our "Auxiliary Legacy Scholarship." And remember, vou can deliver vour overgrown perennials to the Ambulance Garage before the sale (Thursday night or Friday morning prior to the sale at 2pm) -- to pay them forward! Not only will you be allowing someone else to replant them, but also the WRHS Foundation will receive goodwill donations for the perennials, which will then be paid forward for local student's academic scholarships The West River Health Services Auxiliary, which began seventy-three years ago in 1950 with the new Community Memorial Hospital in Hettinger, started with a group of local volunteers, who helped raise funds for needed healthcare amenities, as well as sewing sheets, curtains, towels and baby bonnets for patients. Eventually the WRHS Auxiliary raised more funds for improvements to the hospital/

clinics, plus scholarships for local area students. One of their annual fundraisers, for 46 years now, was the Annual "Perennial Plant Sale.³

Since the WRHS Auxiliary disbanded four years ago, it was hoped that the WRHS Foundation would take on the Auxiliary's "Perennial Plant Sale." With the help of longtime volunteers and employees, and former Auxiliary Members, Barb West and Jennifer Seamands, (with one year off due to Covid in May 2020), we held our 45th Perennial Plant Sale last year, raising \$1,770 for our Auxiliary Legacy Academic Scholarship for a local area student (Naomi Salazar from Hettinger), who is pursuing a Pre-Dental degree at the University of Alabama.

Therefore, we need local gardeners to consider thinning out their perennial flower beds and gifting them to our WRHS Perennial Plant Sale. Barb West (701-567-2736) and Jennifer Seamands (701-567-4650) are available via telephone if you have any questions about the sale. Just bring your perennials Thursday evening or Friday morning to the West River Ambulance Garage and whatever you'd like to offer for a freewill donation (some years, we've received small trees, annuals and vegetables. NORTH OF COURTHOUSE -336 PACIFIC AVENUE IN MOTT

The Hettinger County Weed Control Board will be dispersing Tordon, Curtail, and Milestone at the STORAGE BUILDING LOCATED NORTH OF THE COURTHOUSE IN MOTT at 336 Pacific Avenue in Mott, from 8 AM to Noon, or until all chemicals on hand is dispersed, on Wednesday, May 24, 2023. Bringing your own pens will be helpful.

All landowners / operators must supply a land / FSA map of the area that is to be treated. The Weed Board will need to keep the map.

The cost for chemical will be \$35.00 per gallon of Tordon, \$80.00 per 2 1/2 gallon for Curtail, and \$42.00 for a guart of Milestone, with a limit 10 gallons of Curtail, 4 guarts of Milestone, and 5 gallons of Tordon, per producer.

EACH PERSON WILL BE ALLOWED TO PICK UP CHEMICAL AT THE LIMIT ESTAB-LISHED BY THE WEED BOARD. YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO PICK UP CHEMI-CAL FOR ANYONE ELSE, ALTHOUGH A WIFE MAY PICK UP CHEMICAL FOR HER HUSBAND IF NOT RESTRICTED USE.

LANDOWNER SIGNATURE IS REQUIRED WITH PAYMENT ALONG WITH THE MAPS AT TIME OF DISTRIBUTION. CONTACT THE COUNTY EXTENSION OFFICE OR COUNTY AUDITOR'S OFFICE TO PICK UP THE FORM PRIOR TO DISTRIBUTION

I heard for years how my parents would travel in retirement. They put it off and then it was too late. They weren't healthy enough to do it.



He enjoyed playing cards, gardening, going to the casino and loved animals.


