





Why me?

My grandmother and I frequently talk about what our purpose is on this Earth. I have struggled with this question for as long as I can remember. But, I've always known I wanted to help others. So, I had the strong feeling to call my grandmother after my therapy appointment the other day. She told me she knew why I had called her, at 6:45pm on a random Thursday as I was on my way home. She said, "I really think you were meant to do this." This- as in share part of my story to help others. After I hung up the call with her, I asked God to give me a sign- anything- if I was meant to write a simple blurb about my tiny story amongst millions, just to see if I could help at least one person. I burst into tears.

God has strange timing, and even stranger plans. After visiting Mott and learning about the tragedy that occurred not too long ago, my grandmother and I, as well as God, knew I had a resource that could help many people heal from what happened. Whether you knew the people that were involved, or had just heard of them from other people around town, you might still be having trouble processing things and moving on from them. Everything affects every individual differently, and no matter what you're feelingit matters. Personally, I did not know anyone closely involved in the situation. But I do know the feeling of being confused, scared, angry, sad. You might be thinking- why me? Why us? Why such a small town? This is where my story comes in to help. I was once scared, confused, sad and angry and wondered., why me?

May 17th of last year, I thought was just a normal night in my own place, until my home was broken into in the middle of the night. You never think it could happen to you until it does. And when it does, you stop sleeping, eating, being comfortable in your own home. You become angry, frightened, constantly confused. Nobody understands the things you see in your head, the things you begin to see in everyone around you, how hard it was to live in that house and stand in the very place that scares you the most. Many people might relate to these feelings.

This event on top of the anxiety and depression I had been suffering from was enough to

knock me off my feet. It took me eight months to build up the courage to ask for help. Eight months of arguing with myself. These things can happen to anyone. I've grown up blessed with an amazing family and group of friends, and that's why I wondered so often why God chose me to suffer from this. As I'm writing this now, I've come to realize that He doesn't want us to suffer. He wants us to be brave and overcome these struggles so we come out of it stronger than before with a more positive outlook on life. Anything challenging God throws your way is His way of saying, "You are strong enough to get through this, so here ya

I finally reached out to a professional in the beginning of February and started my healing process with her. It is not weak to reach out to someone else for help- it is brave. I knew that if I didn't talk to someone, tell someone what I was going through, it would eat me up and I would feel worse as the days went by. But I also knew I couldn't fix myself in a day. Healing is a journey, and for you, it might take weeks. For some, it may take months or even years. But you will never heal if you don't start now.

My first time going to therapy (or as you might comfortably call it- counseling) I had no idea what to expect. All I knew was that I was constantly in a state of unhappiness with myself and every one around me. But man, it was so mu than I made it out to be. We just talked, laughed, cried, and got to the bottom of things. It's amazing how much stress is relieved just by talking. Even after feeling a little embarrassed after that first session, I went to every single one after that. Because,

after I spilled out all my thoughts and spent time sorting through them, I began to notice how it was changing things about my every day life. I've learned to understand the traumatic experience I had and deal with it in a healthy way. I've learned to heal the parts of myself that were once so difficult to understand. She's helped me rediscover my purpose and my happiness. Only 6 sessions later, she tells me there is a light inside of me that was not there when we

I am not here to say that my story is similar to the story of Mott. I just hope that if you are struggling in any way, whether it's because of recent events or something else entirely, that you will build up the courage to talk to someone. If not a professional, a parent, a friend, a sibling, anyone that will listen. Therapy might have a negative stigma, but I will never deny to anyone that it is the best thing I have ever done for myself.

YES, we celebrated Easter three weeks ago, and "YES" Easter has moved on, it has moved on as we continue to celebrate the seven weeks of the Easter season. Alleluia! Christ is risen! As we continue to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord and Savior Jesus the Christ, I want to share a poem that speaks to the celebration of Easter written by Annie Johnson Flint titled "The Way of the Cross", but before I do let me share a little information about the author.

Suffering from the ravages of cancer, not to mention the rheumatoid arthritis that left her totally crippled, Annie Johnson Flint came all too soon in her young life to a bend in the road. Her physical challenges had cut short a teaching career, but around the bend, the road went on. And so did Annie. Despite her difficulties, she wrote, with a pen held by bent and gnarled fingers, well over a thousand poems, many of which have been set to music that bless, uplift, and bring comfort and joy to a weeping world.

Here is a poem she wrote that has an enduring principle we can apply in our lives. You see, no matter how difficult our

station is, no matter how insurmountable the hurdles are, we must not stop. Stopping is defeat. Life must go on. The road goes on; we have only come to a bend in the road.

"The Way of the Cross"

Some of us bide at the Passover

With Pentecost all unknown: The triumphs of grace in the heavenly place

That our Lord has made our own.

The Hettinger County Weed Control Board will be dispersing Tordon, Curtail, and Milestone at the STORAGE BUILDING LOCATED NORTH OF THE COURTHOUSE IN MOTT at 336 Pacific Avenue in Mott, from 9 AM to Noon, or until all chemicals on hand is dispersed, on Wednesday, May 18, 2022. We will be having a "DRIVE-THROUGH" operation again this year, so you will not have to get out of your vehicle. Bringing your own pens will be helpful.

All landowners / operators must supply a land / FSA map of the area that is to be treated. <u>The Weed Board will need to</u> <u>keep the map.</u>

The cost for chemical will be \$35.00 per gallon of Tordon, \$75.00 per 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ gallon for Curtail, and \$40.00 for a quart of Milestone, with a limit 10 gallons of Curtail, 4 quarts of Milestone, and 5 gallons of Tordon, per producer.

EACH PERSON WILL BE ALLOWED TO PICK UP CHEMICAL AT THE LIMIT ESTABLISHED BY THE WEED BOARD. YOU WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO PICK UP CHEMICAL FOR ANYONE ELSE, ALTHOUGH A WIFE MAY PICK UP CHEMICAL FOR HER HUSBAND.

LANDOWNER SIGNATURE IS REQUIRED WITH PAYMENT ALONG WITH THE MAPS AT TIME OF DISTRIBUTION. CONTACT THE COUNTY EXTENSION OFFICE OR COUNTY AUDITOR'S OFFICE TO PICK UP THE FORM PRIOR TO DISTRIBUTION DAY IF NEEDED.

THIS WILL BE A FIRST COME FIRST SERVED DISPERSAL AND WILL BE HELD IN THE ABOVE STATED LOCATION ONLY. IF THE ENTIRE CHEMICAL SUPPLY IS GIVEN OUT THE DISPERSAL WILL BE OVER. <u>SOME ITEMS ARE LIMITED SUPPLY ON HAND.</u>

IF CHEMICAL IS LEFT AFTER THIS DISPERSAL DATE, PRODUCERS THAT HAVE NOT PICKED UP THEIR MAXIMUM OF CHEMICAL, WILL HAVE ONE (1) WEEK ONLY AFTER THIS DISPERSAL DAY TO PICK UP AT THESE LIMITS. Note: If you have picked up your maximum allotment of chemical, you are NOT allowed to get more.

A Little Birdie Told Me: "The History of Mother's Day." The original celebration of Mothering Sunday took place on the fourth Sunday of Lent. Faithful would return to their mother church, the church they grew up in for special services. Children would pick flowers on their way to Mothering Sunday services and give the flowers to their Mothers. During the Medieval times, apprentices and servants were given the day off to return home to spend time with their mothers. A rich cake known as a Simnel cake was given to their Mothers: A rich fruit mixture with layers of almond paste in the middle and on top. The cake was decorated with 11 marzipan balls representing the 11 faithful apostles and Jesus.

The celebrations of Mother's Day decline until the 20th Century: when Anna Jarvis and American woman rejuvenated it. Jarvis lobbied President

Woodrow Wilson and in 1914 Mother's Day was declared an official American holiday. A red or pink carnation was worn to honor a living mother and a white carnation to remember a deceased mother. Eventually the holiday became too commercialized for its founder, Anna Jarvis and she spent the last years of her life trying to abolish the holiday.

Giving chocolates, cards, flowers and attending buffets, now mark Mother's Day. More phone calls are made on Mother's Day than any other day of the year, some 122 million! In 2021 the florist industry took in a whopping \$1.9 billion, cards a staggering \$671 million! Is it any wonder Anna Jarvis was saddened by the commercialization of Mother's Day?

I've been a mother for over 33 years now, I appreciate the cards, flowers, chocolates (especially the chocolates) but spending time with my family would rank much higher on the list. Being a grandmother or Lita as my grandsons call me is the greatest gift my children have ever given me.

Reflections on the Words of Life

In our previous study we saw that King Nebuchadnezzar was once again troubled by a dream. And once again he consulted his magicians, astrologers, Chaldeans, and soothsayers; but none could interpret his dream. This was no doubt a devastating admission for them to have to make. For you remember back in chapter two, Nebuchadnezzar would not reveal the content of his dream, as he did on this occasion. Previously these so-called wise men had promised that they would give the interpretation if only he would tell them the content. But now, even with the content of the dream, they cannot give him the interpretation.

We should not be surprised that men who know nothing about the God who sent this dream could not understand it. The world does not have the answers to man's most basic needs because man's most basic needs are spiritual in nature. The answers can be found in the Word of God, but the unbeliever is actively rebelling against that Word. The apostle Paul explains in Romans 8:7, "The carnal mind is enmity against God; for it is not subject to the law of God, nor indeed can be." As high as the heavens are above the earth, so high are God's ways and thoughts above those of man (Isaiah 55:9). God must reveal His truth, or man will remain in the dark about

As a last resort, Nebuchadnezzar finally turns to Daniel. He knows that Daniel will tell him the truth, even though it might not be pleasant. He says to Daniel, "Because I know that the Spirit of the Holy God is in you, and no secret troubles you, explain to me the visions of my dream that I have seen, and

this life because we all continue to have a sinful nature, but we can ask the Lord to grant us more and more grace to trust Him and cling to the promises of His Word no matter what might be going on around us. Such soul stability is expressed by the Psalmist in Psalm 46:1-2: "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble. 





SEEING INSIDE YOUR EYES LIKE NEVER BEFORE WEST RIVER EYE CENTER In Hettinger

West River Health Services Eye Center sees improved healthcare with new technology

The West River Health Services Eye Center in Hettinger added a new, world-class medical diagnostic imaging machine, called an Optical Coherence Tomographer with Angiography, to its arsenal of optometry equipment in Oct. of 2021; already it has made a major impact on local healthcare.

The new machine allows optometrists like West River Health Services Optometry Doctor John Kludt to see the eye in a new way through Optical Coherence Tomography (OCT) and OCT Angiography technologies. According to

Kludt, the new equipment is a major step forward in imaging technology compared to traditional imaging technologies.

"This is state-of-the-art technology," said Kludt. "We have so many people in our service area that can benefit from this technology. Whether it's diabetes, retinal vascular disease or macular degeneration, we can just take care of them better."

So how does the machine work? Instead of taking imagery from the outside-in, the new machine captures a cross-section view of the eye by taking thousands of measurements per second. Using this data, the computer generates a highly detailed picture of the eye, allowing a whole new perspective for the healthcare provider.

"Using OCT, we are able to look at the individual layers of tissue in the eye, and it is awesome," said Kludt. "We can see changes occurring before they start to impact vision because we can see what is going on at a much finer and detailed level than traditional technology would allow."

OCT Angiography takes the technology a step further, capturing the light reflected off of individual red blood cells moving through the vessels within the eye. Taking between 70,000 to 100,000 pictures per second, the technology is not only more accurate, but it is also less invasive than previous methods of imaging.

"We used to inject the patient with dye to record the movement of red blood cells, but we don't have to do that anymore because of this technology," said Kludt. "It really is quite amazing what this new technology can do."

Ultimately Kludt said the machine improves his ability to evaluate diseases within the eye, leading to earlier diagnoses of eye diseases such as diabetes, retinal vascular

disease, glaucoma, and macular degeneration. For some diseases, such as macular degeneration, Kludt said the machine can identify the need for preventative care and ultimately reduce potential vision loss.

"With this technology, we are able to make adjustments to treatments as they are needed," said Kludt. "We

can identify issues like capillary drop-out before the eyes start to bleed and reduce the potential for vision loss."

In less than a year of using the new machine, Kludt said the new technology has already greatly improved the local diagnostic capabilities of optometry in Adams County and paved the way toward better healthcare at the clinic

"We have been able to detect problematic macular degeneration in multiple patients at our clinic and point them to the right sub-specialist before it impacted their vision," said Kludt. "This technology is just one more step in providing world-class healthcare to rural citizens in small-town America; in many ways, this machine is the pinnacle of my





Controlled Burn Procedure

While the county is under a FIRE EMERGENCY and BURN BAN Declaration, the Controlled Burn Procedure is in place.

Being under the FIRE EMRGENCY and BURN BAN Declaration means, that burning is allowed ${\tt ONLY}$ when the Fire Danger Index Rating is in LOW or MODERATE. There is no burning of any kind when the State Fire Danger Rating Index is in HIGH, VERY HIGH, EXTREME or a RED FLAG WARNING. Be aware, that conditions can change and anytime someone starts a fire, precautions need to be in place to ensure it does not get out of control. You must remain on location of the fire at all times, while the fire is burning. Willful violation of this declaration can be considered guilty of a Class B $\,$ Misdemeanor, up to 30 days in jail and a \$1500 Fine. Restitution for damages and Fire Suppression costs may be sought by the court as well.

The Burn Ban Restrictions & Fire Danger Rating Map are both found on https://ndresponse.gov. The site is updated every morning.

Hettinger County's procedure for those who want to have a controlled burn on their property is as follows:

Contact State Radio (911 Dispatch) at 1-800-472-2121 or 1-701-328-9921 before you begin to burn. Provide them with the following information:

1. Name

2. The location where the burning is taking place

3. What is being burned: field, garbage pit, tree piles, etc. 4. What time you plan to burn 5. How long you expect it will take to burn.


6. A contact number where you can be reached.

The Sheriff's Office is then notified of the location of the burn. Sheriff's Office will contact the fire chief of that district to let them know where the burn is located.

This allows State Radio to know there is a controlled burn and if someone calls stating that they see a large fire or smoke, State Radio already knows the area of the controlled burn and will not call the fire departments out unnecessarily. This procedure ensures our volunteer fire departments are not called unless there is a real emergency.

Once the fire is out, contact State Radio again to inform them the fire is completely out. Contact the Hettinger County Emergency Manager at 701-824-2935 or 701-209-0810 for more information.

Father Charles "Charlie" Albinus Heidt, 90, Bismarck,



passed away on March 30, 2022, at the Baptist Home in Bismarck. Hacker, Bishop of Bismarck, on May 30, 1959, at St. Mary's Church in New England, ND.

He then became Pastor of the Churches of St. John, New Leipzig, Sacred Heart, Bentley, and Mary Immaculate, Miner. On June 28, 1967, he was assigned as Pastor to the Churches of St. Anthony, Donnybrook and Sts. Peter and Paul, Tolley, where he spent two years. He then became Pastor at the Churches of Sts. Peter and Paul, Amidon, and Our Lady of Lourdes, Gaylord until 1974.

He served as Pastor at the

Churches of Immaculate Conception, Max, Holy Spirit, Butte and Holy Cross, Douglas, until being named chaplain and director of religious life and religious education at Bishop Ryan High School, Minot, for one year. His next assignment was Pastor of Our Lady of Grace, Minot, where he served until 1987. He took a temporary assignment for two months as Associate Pastor at St. Martin, Center, and St. Edwin, Washburn. Father Charlie attended Jesuit School of Theology at Berkeley for the Institute in Spirituality and Workshop for a one-year program. Upon his return, he was appointed Pastor of the Church of St. Mary, Bismarck, serving there until his retirement on July 1, 2003. In his retirement, Father Charlie continued to substitute in parishes throughout the diocese. He received the Native American name Ma-ishu Xubash Sacred Eagle by the late Gail Baker, Sr. Father Charlie was widely known for proclaiming the Gospel by memory.

Father Charlie also was an educator in the Catholic schools of the diocese, Bishop Ryan High School, Minot, 1967-1969

and 1974-1987; St. Mary's High School, New England, 1969-1971; and Trinity High School, Dickinson, 1971-1974.

Father Charlie is survived by his siblings, James (Rosemary) Heidt, Mt. Angel, OR, Sister Dolores Heidt, OSB, Richardton, Sister Lucille (Viola) Heidt, OSB, Dickinson, Donald (Donna) Heidt, Eugene, OR; sisterin-law, Arvilla (dec. Philip) Eugene, OR; along with numerous nieces and nephews and their families.

He was preceded in death by his parents, Albinus and Eugenia; brothers, Adam, John, Cyriak, Kasper, Philip, Frank, Edward, and Richard Heidt; and sister, Leontine Gabel.

Vernon Hansen Rites to be Held

When Edward and Mabel Hansen decided that their third child should be delivered in Battle Creek, MI, she traveled from



ND to Michigan a few weeks before her due date to stay with family there. The baby boy was born on February 1, 1930. Because they hadn't yet agreed on a name he came back to ND with "No Name Hansen" printed on his birth certificate. It wasn't until a bit later that he was named Vernon Leroy. Even then, Edward wasn't totally sold on the name, and so he called him "the young one" until he could adjust to the idea.

Vernon grew up on the family farm south of Bowman with his two older brothers, Maurice and Eugene. During the Depression years, the family relocated temporarily to Minnesota, where Edward was able to find work and be close to family. Vernon recalled his father working in the fields with a team of horses until they were able to buy a tractor. He also spoke about the years they would harvest ice and pack the ice blocks away in straw. It would later be used for the icebox and the homemade ice cream that would be churned and enjoyed during the summer

Vernon attended high school at Maplewood Academy in Hutchinson, MN, and graduated from there in 1947. It was during his high school years that he met a red-haired girl named Darlene who was destined to be his wife. They rode their bicycles to meet, they talked across the

fence, and letters traveled back and forth while they were away at school. Although they were quite sure they were meant for each other, Vernon wanted to be sure that Darlene had considered all of her options. He paid her tuition to attend Union College in Lincoln, NE her freshman year, hoping she would date around and be certain he was "the one." He was!

Vernon and Darlene were actually married twice in 1953. The first wedding was in early spring in Beach, ND, while Darlene recovered from polio, as her doctor felt it would be therapeutic for her. The second one was in June in Bowman. They teased each other frequently about which day they should celebrate. Vernon would say, "Our anniversary is in a couple of months" or "We celebrated that already!"

After they married, they farmed north of Rhame, ND for a time. While there, their firstborn son, Rocky, died after a short battle with leukemia just a few days before his 2nd birthday. It was difficult to stay there after that, so they moved south of Bowman with their infant daughter, Pam. They farmed land in Minnehaha Township and also near Ladner, SD. Scott was the next addition to the family, followed by Brad a few years

Vernon was a farmer through and through. He loved working the land: not only in the wheat fields, but the garden. He and Darlene also raised sheep to help them through the lean years when drought or hail ruined the crops.

Farm life was busy, but he took the time to learn to fly a single engine airplane and earn his private pilot's license. He enjoyed flying his Cessna 172 and became very adept at landing his plane on the gravel road that ran by the farm. He also delighted in a good game of Rook. He and Darlene were the team to beat! Many Saturday nights were spent playing Rook, drink-

ing Dr. Pepper, and eating popcorn. Simple pleasures!

Vernon was an active member of the Bowman Seventh-day Adventist Church, serving in several capacities as a leader and a teacher. He also worked on the Minnehaha Township board. But the biggest service that he provided was a labor of love for his wife. As Darlene became more and more disabled with post-polio syndrome, Vernon was her caregiver. Much of his time was spent helping her with daily medical needs and he was very skilled in his assis-

He loved God and looked forward to being in heaven. He often said, "Jesus is coming soon!" His faith was strong and was a large part of his life. Because of wonderful helpers, he was able to stay in his own home despite the toll of Parkinson's. He passed away April 20, 2022, at the age of 92, in the Bismarck Sanford Hospital after a brief illness. Vernon is survived by his three children: Brad Hansen, Harwood, ND; Scott (Becky) Hansen, Bowman, ND; and Pam (Tim) Taylor, Brighton Colorado. He enjoyed three grandsons: Brock (Ashley) Hansen, Harwood, ND; Wyatt Hansen and Truxton Hansen, Bozeman, MT. He had one great grandchild, Elsie Hansen. The family is planning private graveside service to lay Vernon to rest. A memorial will be planned later this spring.

Mott Native Recommended for **North Dakota** Hall of Fame

The late Virgil Banning, who was born and raised in Mott, ND has been recommended to Gov. Doug Burgum as a candidate for the Rough Rider Award, the state's highest honor.

Banning was an acclaimed war hero, winning the military's second highest award for bravery, the Navy Cross. It ranks second only to the Medal of

The nomination comes from Mott's Taylor-Skartvedt American Legion Post, an organization of veterans. It was suggested by Richard Roberts of West Fargo, a former resident and longtime member of the Mott Legion.

Banning was brought up in West Mott and was an outstanding student, athlete, and leader in high school where he graduated in 1936. At the University of North Dakota, he was selected for the prestigious Blue Key honorary fraternity, served as president of both the Interfraternity Council and Scabbard and Blade (an organization of military-orientated students) and was radio station program manager all four years.

During his 30 years in the Marines, including combat in World War II and Korea, he was awarded a number of medals. In addition of the illustrious Navy Cross and other minor awards. he was honored with many important commendations: the Distinguished Service Medal, three Legion of Merit Medals, the Air Medal, and two Bronze Medals. Wounded twice, he was awarded two Purple Hearts. He was present at the famous flag raising after the terrible battle conquering the Japanese-held island of Iwo Jima.

Among other posts during his career, he was an instructor in the Senior Military Academy at Quantico, VA.; served in the Pentagon as an advisor to President Lyndon Johnson; and was commanding officer of the 3rd Marine Division and commanding general at the Marine base at Twentynine Palms, CA.

Banning rose to the rank of brigadier general, retiring in 1969 whereupon he embarked on a successful business career in California in property management and development. He

- 1 tablespoon fresh lemon peel 1 tablespoon fresh lemon juice
- LEMON GLAZE:
- 1 1/2 cups powdered sugar
- 1 teaspoon fresh lemon peel 1 tablespoon melted butter
- 2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons milk

Spray mini muffin pans with nonstick spray. Set aside. Whisk flour, sugar, salt and baking soda in a mixing bowl. Set aside. Dissolve butter in saucepan on medium heat. Add water and bring to a boil. Pour the hot mixture over the dry ingredients and beat with a hand mixer until just combined. Beat sour cream, egg, zest and lemon juice until smooth. Scoop the mixture into muffin tins. Bake at 325° F. for 12 minutes. Let cool for 5 minutes, then flip onto cooling racks. Cool completely before glazing. Dip the lemon drop side down into the glaze. Allow excess glaze to drop into bowl, then flip top side down onto cooling racks. (Put wax paper under the cooling racks for easier cleanup.) Allow the glaze to set.
