Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

a practical section of 1 Peter about how the believer is to live so as to please the Lord and have an impact for Christ. The section we come to today continues this emphasis by showing us how believers are to live in our close relationships. The first category Peter addresses are those who were servants. And while the exact situation is not likely descriptive of most Christians in modern America, this has a very important principle of application to all believers. We read in 1 Peter 2:18: "Servants, be submissive to your masters with all fear, not only to the good and gentle, but also to the harsh." The word "servants" refers to house servants. House servants at the time when Peter was writing were considered to be the part of the household in which they served. And yet, they had no freedom beyond that which their masters granted. They were to live on the premises of their masters and to do what their masters instructed. Many of them were well educated and given great responsibilities in the running of the home. In some cases, masters expected the house servants to see that their entire estates functioned smoothly. Though this type of arrangement does

not exist in our society today, it can be applied to the employee/employer relationship. Peter tells servants, and by application employees, how they are to serve. The key word here is "submissive." This word is not well received in our society. People do not want to be told to submit to anyone, but the Bible is filled with instructions for one category of people to submit to

There is nothing difficult in understanding what Peter means; it is just difficult to do what he says. To submit basically means to do whatever you are told. The only exception would be when one's master or employer tells the servant or employee to do something which God's Word prohibits. And that is why Peter adds the words "with all fear." He is not referring to fear of one's master or boss, but of the Lord. Paul similarly writes in Colossians 3:22, "Bondservants, obey in all things your masters according to the flesh, not with eyeservice, as men-pleasers, but in sincerity of heart, fearing God." The believer is to live in the fear of the Lord, and his or her most

important consideration should be, "What does God want me to do?" Here we see that God wants the Christian employee to submit to his or her employer unless the employer commands disobedience to God. Peter further states the con-

ditions under which a servant or employee is to submit: "not only to the good and gentle, but also to the harsh." I have worked for many different employers in my life. Some were very cordial and had a wonderful way of telling their employees what to do. Others were demanding and ungracious, and I didn't like the way I was told what to do. But how one is told what to do shouldn't affect the way the believer does his or her job. Peter originally gave this command to people in far worse conditions than we will probably ever face in a job. As much as it may go against the grain of our flesh, we should do the best job we can do, even if our boss is unpleasant and harsh. And the reason for this is very important: The believer is representing the Lord Jesus Christ. He is our ultimate

boss. And we ought never do anything to dishonor Him, but we should do all that we do heartily, as unto the Lord.

Friends, the instruction here is impossible for unaided human flesh to accomplish. We are all naturally averse to humbling ourselves and submitting to the will of another, especially one who is harsh and disagreeable. God's Word is filled with such commandments that can only be obeyed through the enabling power of the Holy Spirit. And only those who have been born again and are trusting in Christ alone to make them right with God have the Holy Spirit living inside them. Have you placed your trust in Christ?









Bravera encourages others to join in supporting local food pantries and nonprofits during this critical time. Together, we can help ensure that no North Dakotan faces hunger alone.

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

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
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Asset Retention Seminar Draws Nearly 40 Participants on October 29 in Hettinger

The West River Health Services Foundation hosted their second of its three financial planning seminars on Wednesday, October 29, at 6:00 p.m. at the NDSU Research & Extension Conference Center Room in west Hettinger.

This seminar began at 6:00 p.m. sharp with a free meal delivered by Kennedy's Fresh Foods. On the menu was white chicken chile with corn bread. And was it ever tasty! Thank you Kenne-

Following a warm welcome from Ted Uecker, Fund Development Officer at West River Health Services Foundation, guest speaker Andria Mueller of Legacy Design Strategies in Minot presented "Asset Protection for Long Term Care Planning." Nearly 40 attendees filled the room, eager to learn about strategies to safeguard their assets while preparing for potential long-term needs.

Mueller's presentation began with an introduction to the need, Medicaid in general and common terms. She then covered the four eligibility requirements,

proactive versus crisis planning, the Medicaid Asset Protection Trust and Compliant Annuity, institutionalized or community spouse, as well as crisis planning typical strategies and working as a team for you.

A few striking statistics shared during the seminar included:

- 1 in 2 people will need some type of long-
- 70% of all people over 65 will need some type of long-term care at some point.
- · The average annual cost of nursing home care in North Dakota is \$132,324, ranking among the top 10 nationally.
- · Alzheimer's continues to play a growing role, increasing by 46% as a cause of death between 2000 and 2006. Today, 1 in 8 people over 65 live with Alzheimer's.

Participants learned the long-term care payment options, including self-pay: purchasing long-term care insurance; implementing a legal plan to protect your home and savings; or a combination of all of the above. The goal is to avoid running out of money; leaving your assets unprotected; and risking the health of family or spousal caregivers.

Overall, this seminar provided the fundamentals and foundation for sound asset retention and Medicaid planning. Mueller also did an excellent job of fielding questions from the participants. The last thoughts were that everyone needs a "dream team"; buy long-term care insurance; and in a crisis, the Medicaid Compliant Annuity can still save roughly half your estate.

The evening concluded with door prize drawings: Curt Dahl and Sharon Edgar each won tickets for the Magical Medora Christmas Show and Brenda Dragoo took home a stuffed rhinocer-

Based on the strong turnout for the first two sessions, interest in financial planning education is clearly high in the area. 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Community **Turkey Luncheon** Serves 735 **Hungry Folk!**

What a day! West River Health Services Foundation's 47th Annual "Community Turkey Luncheon" on Thursday, November 6, was one for the all-time record books - 104 homemade pies, 24 turkeys, 25 gallons of homemade gravy, 15 pans of homemade stuffing, and over 100 volunteers!

On the Sunday afternoon and Monday evening prior, ten volunteers joined us each session to cut up a total of 24 turkeys, which Kennedy's so graciously cooked for us (12 per session). Then Kennedy's allowed us to utilize their kitchen for cutting and cleaning. We placed all of the turkey meat into 4" high tin pans and placed them into Kennedy's walk-in freezer. All of the turkey juices were saved into ice cream buckets and placed into their walk-in refrigerator for the gravy. All of the turkey bones were hauled to local gravy connoisseur Suzan Hanson, to be reduced down for the final gravy making Thursday at the Lutheran Church.

Other local businesses and entities also got involved in a number of ways - either by giving a goodwill donation and providing hot turkey lunches for all of their employees; the Hettinger School's eight Future Farmers of America students helped us with to-go orders, pouring water and coffee, and clearing tables; the National Honor Society Students (plus Dawson) helped eight adults deliver all of the 442 to-go meals to our area businesses and residents: or in the case of the Pastime Steakhouse, Legion Café and Rusty's - they provided funding for all of the meals for any Hettinger High School students who signed up (53) and showed up (42). Wow! Although the Freshmen were leading in percentage of signups, the Seniors overtook them by having more showups. All of the Juniors who signed up, showed up! Onward!

About 200 hungry people decided to come and eat their hot turkey meal at the Hettinger Lutheran Church "in person from" 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Once their goodwill donation was taken care of for our Western Horizons Living Centers, people were served via our Board of Director members (Lane Miller, Lynn Brown, Leonard Bjerklie, Dave Erickson, Connie Burwick), administrative staff (Alyson Kornele), and even a few high school students. Everyone wanted in on the act! Cranberries were available at the Church, plus white bread, turkey, stuffing, gravy and a slice of homemade pie. Water and coffee were available at each table. The delivered meals included the same, except no cranberries

Get this - another 77 folk picked up their meals to go! So, 442 + 200 + 77 + 16 via a few leftovers = 735!

This terrific two shift pie room team included DeNae Henderson, Leah Gunther-Marty, Cindy Vik, Cindy Olson, Eva Knutson, Jackie Muggerud, Dana Andress, Beth Erickson, Neva Scoular, Mark Zimmerman, Kory Vanwyk, Brian Olson and of course, Barb.

Eve Safratowich, Jennifer Seamands and Christi Schmitz whipped up their amazing homemade stuffing - for the gazillionth year too! It was tasty and good, as always. Also, thank you for coming in the morning of, to make sure the stuffing was warmed up and stirred correctly.

As mentioned earlier, Suzan Hanson worked her tail off to provide us with some of her famous homemade gravy. We appreciate your efforts Suzan. That's a lot of work - plus baking 4 pies!


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Mike Schatz Seeks **Re-Election**

Bowman Landing Undergoing Renovations

BOWMAN, N.D. Bowman Landing, a 24-unit apartment building in Bowman owned and operated by ABLE, Inc., is undergoing substantial renovation meant to improve accessibility, safety and long-term housing stability for residents. ABLE purchased the property in 2021 after Lutheran Social Services went bankrupt, and the overhaul is funded in part through a Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) administered by Roosevelt Custer Regional Council.

"This program serves low - to moderate - income or underserved populations," said Shannon, Project Administrator with Roosevelt Custer Regional Council. "Housing is an issue we see all across the state, and without grant dollars like these, it's hard for low-income housing in rural areas to address the need. This project really helps fill that gap." Shannon said Roosevelt Custer helped ABLE with the grant application and is administering the award to guide the project to completion.

ABLE leaders said the work was needed to preserve an important local housing resource and to protect tenants' quality of life. "ABLE, Inc. purchased this building in 2021 after the previous owner, Lutheran Social Services, went bankrupt," said Shelby Pauley, Director of Satellite Services for ABLE in


Bowman. "There was a chance the community could've lost an apartment building which offers low-income housing to those who qualify and housing in general to others. We have been able to stabilize rent prices and offer housing to our community." Pauley added, "The renovations will allow all tenants to live comfortably as we have made many improvements not only to the outside of the building but also internally. These renovations were needed due to the building having minimal upkeep from 2014-2021."

Architects from GT Architecture described a project that begins with the building enve-

lope and follows through with targeted accessibility upgrades. "When ABLE bought the building from the original developer, the materials that were used for the building exterior were developer-grade materials that don't have a long shelf life," said Jared Twogood. "There were complaints from the tenants throughout the building of extremely drafty windows, leaks through the roof, and the siding was very wavy and buck-

ling. So basically, they're getting an entire new exterior envelope.

The building from an exterior standpoint is basically like new. Commercial grade. Now the products here will be lasting. They have product warranties of mostly 20-year-plus product warranties for finish and performance."

Alongside exterior work, the team is making interior changes designed to improve daily life and reduce safety hazards. Several bathrooms and shower areas are being reconfigured to address water issues and improve accessibility. Flooring in vestibules that had slippery tile is being replaced. "Some of the vestibules had tile floors, which caused issues for residents with mobility challenges," said Alec Johnson of GT Architecture. "We're replacing those with a durable walk- off mat system that's safer to walk on and easier to maintain.'

The renovation also includes a change to the garage layout to allow wheelchair-accessible vans to load and unload indoors instead of in the elements. "Right now, clients have to be loaded and unloaded outside in all kinds of weather," Alec said. "By relocating the garage door, we'll be able to provide a protected area for those transfers, which will make a big difference in comfort and safety."

Working inside an occupied building added complexity to the schedule. "Probably the most challenging part is remodeling an existing building and having to work through the challenges of getting in the spaces and working around tenants," Alec said. "Once we got the system in place, the system worked just as we were hoping, which is actually pretty rare." Jared said the team set a higher standard for notices and coordination to

reduce disruption. "Each time a tenant space needed to be accessed, there was a minimum of a 72-hour notice by HUD that was required," he said. "So gathering those notices and approvals kept the project moving, but it did slow things down a bit. Still, it's actually been a pretty good process working with the contractor and the owner and the tenants to coordinate that and work through it all."

Builder David Parrill, who previously worked with ABLE on a separate project in Hettinger, said the collaboration between contractor, owner and staff helped keep the work moving while residents stayed in place. "We've gotten to know the clientele here, so we work closely with the staff," Parill said. "They've done a good job coordinating with their clients to make sure we can get our work done without causing disruption. It's been gratifying to see these individuals get a nice home to live in.'

Construction work moved forward in June 2025 and project leaders expect finishing touches in the coming months as crews complete exterior and interior systems. Project leaders say the work will extend the usable life of the building and reduce future maintenance costs. "It's looking to basically keep this building up and running for years and years to come instead of just the immediate five years, ten years," Jared said.

ABLE staff emphasized that the renovation is part of a broader legacy of local support. "The Little Missouri Arc started a program called the Opportunity Center in 1982 which then merged with ABLE, Inc. in 1984," Pauley said. "The continued support from our community means everything to us. We wouldn't be able to do what we do if our community wasn't welcoming and supportive of our mission all those years ago. Touay, we are proud to walk side by side with people and support them at their home, work, and with recreation and leisure

The Bowman Landing project underscores how coordinated effort among local nonprofits, architects, builders and regional grant administrators can preserve vital housing in small towns. Shannon said Roosevelt Custer will continue to help communities access similar funding across southwestern North Dakota. "It's one of our priorities, not just this project in Bowman, but all throughout our region, to help communities that qualify apply and get these dollars back into southwest North Dakota," she said.
