



GRANT COUNTY, ND CONTROLLED BURN PROCEDURE

Any person planning a controlled burn in Grant County must follow this procedure.

- Note: Small fires such as campfires, burning barrels, etc. do not fall under this procedure.
- Residents wishing to burn should start by checking if what they intend on burning is legal and does not need a variance permit with the North Dakota Department of Environmental Quality: https://deg.nd.gov/AQ/permitting/openburning.aspx (also linked at grantcountynd.com)
- Next residents need to check the North Dakota Fire Danger Rating Map, and Grant County Fire Emergency Declaration & Burn Restrictions. This information can be found at www.grantcountynd.com.
- Before a controlled burn begins, the person(s) conducting the burn must contact State Emergency Communications Center (State Radio) at 701-328-9921 or 1-800-472-2121 to request a controlled burn, so that emergency responders are not dispatched for reports of fire. Be prepared to give your name, contact number, what is being burned (i.e. a field, garbage pit, tree piles, etc.), location of the controlled burn and anticipated duration of the burn. State Radio will notify the Grant County Sheriff's Office of the location of the burn. The Sheriff's Office will contact the fire chief of the fire district where the burn is located.
- After the burning is completed and the fire is out, again contact (State Emergency Communications Center) State Radio at 701-328-9921 or 1-800-472-2121 to inform them of the
- A controlled burn needs to be physically monitored at all times. Once the fire is started, do not leave the site unattended until the fire is completely out.
- Be prepared if the fire gets out of hand. Call 911 immediately and have resources available on site to mitigate the effects (water, extinguisher, tractor, shovels).

Following this procedure ensures that the State Emergency Communications Center, fire departments, and the Grant County Sheriff's Office are aware of the controlled burn and not unnecessarily called out unless there is a real emergency.

2025 FIRE EMERGENCY DECLARATION & BURN RESTRICTIONS Grant County, North Dakota

Date: October 1, 2025

WHEREAS, Grant County, North Dakota has experienced and has forecasted dry weather conditions, combined with significant

WHEREAS, all available resources remain committed to protecting life and property; and

WHEREAS, Grant County has either sustained or been threatened with rural fires in the past and the local Emergency Management Office has been in consultation with local fire departments; and

WHEREAS, the impact of fires could threaten the health, well-being, and safety of the citizens in Grant County: and

WHEREAS, the cost of response, inordinate equipment wear/tear and fire damages may be beyond available Grant County resources:

WHEREAS, the Grant County Commission wishes to regulate activities within Grant County which pose a potential hazard for such

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Grant County Commissioners declare a Fire Emergency and Burn Restrictions effective when the North Dakota Rangeland Fire Danger Rating is in the High, Very High or Extreme Rating and/or Red Flag Warning for Grant County, North Dakota, effective immediately until rescinded or through December 31, 2025.

What's Included: No Burning When Activity Matches Below

Burning is Prohibited if the Fire Index is in Extreme Category as Issued by NWS (ND Administrative Code – Title 33.1 Article 15 Chapter 4)	
Low	No restrictions. Controlled burns (i.e., pits, wood piles, tumbleweeds, tree piles, pits, etc.) and cropland/ag burning must follow Grant County's Controlled Burn Procedure.
Moderate	No restrictions. Controlled burns (i.e., pits, wood piles, tumbleweeds, tree piles, pits, etc.) and cropland/ag burning must follow Grant County's Controlled Burn Procedure.
High	Campfires, controlled burns (i.e. wood piles, tumbleweeds, tree piles, pits, etc.), cropland/agricultural burning, outdoor wood fireplaces and chimineas, fireworks aerial, fireworks ground, garbage/pit burning, charcoal grills/smokers, and outdoor welding/hot work.
Very High	Campfires, controlled burns (i.e. wood piles, tumbleweeds, tree piles, pits, etc.), cropland/agricultural burning, outdoor wood fireplaces and chimineas, fireworks aerial, fireworks ground, garbage/pit burning, charcoal grills/smokers, and outdoor welding/hot work.
Extreme	Campfires, controlled burns (i.e. wood piles, tumbleweeds, tree piles, pits, etc.), cropland/agricultural burning, outdoor wood fireplaces and chimineas, fireworks aerial, fireworks ground, garbage/pit burning, charcoal grills/smokers, and outdoor welding/hot work.
Red Flug Warning	Campfires, controlled burns (i.e. wood piles, tumbleweeds, tree piles, pits, etc.), cropland/agricultural burning, outdoor wood fireplaces and chimineas, fireworks aerial, fireworks ground, garbage/pit burning, charcoal grills/smokers, and outdoor welding/hot work.

THE PENALTY FOR VIOLATION OF THIS BURN RESTRICTION IS A CLASS B MISDEMEANOR (NDCC 37.17.1-10.1: MAXIMUM SENTENCE OF 30 DAYS IN JAIL AND A \$1,500.00 FINE).



Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

For several weeks we have been considering 1 Peter 2:16: "As free, yet not using liberty as a cloak for vice, but as bondservants of God." We've seen several principles of Christian liberty and how it should be used. At least one more principle needs to be mentioned because it is addressed at length in the New Testament---namely, that the believer must always be considerate of other believers in the exercise of Christian liberty. This concept often requires careful balance because there is a danger of falling off one side or the other.

One of the errors into which Christian may fall regarding liberty is succumbing to legalism. Legalism means living by man-made rules. Some Christians forfeit their liberty by letting others put them under legalistic standards which are not found in God's Word. Take, for instance, the drinking of alcoholic beverage. The Bible strongly forbids drunkenness and abuse of alcohol, but it does not forbid its use altogether. Jesus' first miracle in Cana of Galilee was turning water into wine at a wedding feast (John 2:1-11). And the apostle Paul instructed his ministry partner Timothy to take a little wine for his stomach's sake and for his many infirmities (1 Timothy 5:23). Yet, there are many who have taught that all consumption of alcohol is sin. Now please do not think I am in any way advocating drinking alcohol. Doing so requires much discernment and maturity and self-discipline, and it has brought disastrous results to many people. But the claim that a Christian is forbidden by God's Word to drink is erroneous.

That being said, there is another side into which the believer must be careful not to fall. No one should exercise Christian liberty in a way that might encourage another Christian to do something he or she is not

comfortable with. Take again our example of drinking alcoholic beverage. Let us say that there is a new brother in Christ who struggled with abuse of alcohol before his conversion. Perhaps he refrains from using alcohol because he does not want to expose himself to unnecessary temptation. That is a good and wise decision. But if another believer who does not have such a problem flaunts his liberty in a way which encourages that brother to drink alcohol too, then that believer's exercise of liberty has done harm to his brother. We should never assist any believer to violate his or her conscience

The apostle Paul faced a similar issue in his day. At the pagan temples, many cuts of meat were offered to idols and later sold in the marketplace. Paul knew that those false gods were nothing and that the meat was acceptable for a believer to eat, for the believer had nothing to do with the idolatrous worship in which it was offered. Yet, some believers had not resolved this conflict and were uncomfortable eating meat that had been offered to idols. What was Paul's conclusion? He wrote in

1 Corinthians 8:13, "Therefore, if food makes my brother stumble, I will never again eat meat, lest I make my brother stumble." A Christian's well-being is much more important than enjoying a juicy steak. Christians' love for the Savior and for one another should keep us from ever using liberty in a selfish way.

Of course, the Lord Jesus is our supreme example. He never let the legalistic Pharisees bring Him under the bondage of their foolish man-made regulations. But neither would He exercise His freedom in a harmful way. When the Pharisees accused Him of wrong by associating with those they considered the scum of society, Jesus made it plain that nothing would deter Him from seeking to reach sinners with His love. That love led Him to willingly bear the excruciating death of the cross in order to pay the penalty for all the sins of all who would ever place their trust in Him. Have you trusted in Him, Friend? May we all know the great freedom of which Jesus spoke in John 8:31-32: "If you abide in My word, you are truly My disciples, and you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free.'





The driver ultimately hit multiple vehicles in a fatal crash killing four and injuring others. In January this year, a fatal collision in West Virginia involved a driver fleeing another accident who required an interpreter for the post crash investigation, USDOT said. So it took until this year and more deaths that made the news for the government to sit up and take notice, but not one state that was issuing the permits/licenses objected at the time. Go Figure. So as we are still in harvest

season, we know the majority of the drivers in our area are familiar with the rigs they drive, they can speak english and are aware of the rules of the road. But as we all know, the interstate highway system runs across the state and there are drivers from every state in the union and some from Canada that operate on these roads. For your own protection, be a defensive driver and watch out for the other drivers, don't take unnecessary chances and just because the speed limit is 80, make sure you can handle not only your vehicle but the off

The Fall Season" By Don Taskila Hettinger County, ND **Feature Writer**

This year's autumn equinox marked the start of "The Fall Season", when the day and night were approximately equal in length and 'The Sun' rose and set perfectly in the east and west, accordingly. The calendar stated that the 2025 Fall Season officially began on Monday, September 22. "Equi," which means equal, and "nox," which means night, together are the Latin roots of the word "equinox." Since ancient times, the equinox of Autumn/Fall has been a major astronomical event that signals the arrival of colder, darker days.

In Old English, 'Harvest' is the earlier title for "The Fall Season", which was formed from the action of harvesting crops. The British call the period between Summer and Winter 'Autumn', while Americans call it 'Fall'. The word 'Fall' originated from the phrase "fall of the leaf" in the 16th century, while the word 'Autumn' is Latin in origin.

The expression "fall of the leaf" was used to describe the 'Autumn' season in 16th-century England, when deciduous trees begin to lose their vibrant leaves, a phenomenon that is now evident throughout the countryside, towns, and cities included. The name 'Fall', which was later made popular in America, was derived from this poetic method of describing the changing of the seasons.

Prior to the extensive use of artificial lighting, 'America's Farmers' relied on the 'Harvest Moon', which is the 'Full Moon' closest to the 'Fall' equinox, to provide vital light for crop harvesting. This 'Harvest Moon' occurrence is well known because it takes place during a crucial period of the year for gathering crop production. The Moon's early evening light usually allows harvesting to continue well into the night.

"The Fall Season" is when a person around these parts of America should take their sweaters out of hibernation, a time to get out the warmer clothing from storage because it's becoming colder, and observe how the leaves beautifully change from yellow to orange, and red to purple colors. Unlike at the equator, where it's typically 73 degrees F at 'Sunrise'. 88 degrees F in the 'Afternoon', and and rarely exceeds 95°F due to its regular high humidity. cloud cover, and rainfall.

"The Fall Season" is when the mosquitoes are dressed in flannel shirts and lovable grandparents go to sleep in their comfortable, overstuffed reclining chairs shortly after 6 p.m. when it's dark.

Yellow and orange colors are always present in leaves. but they are hidden by the huge quantities of chlorophyll, or green coloring, that are created throughout the growth season. Trees stop generating chlorophyll in the 'Fall' when temperatures drop and daylight becomes less. As the chlorophyll breaks down, the green color disappears, exposing the underlying pigments that were always present-yellow and orange. When sugars become stuck in the leaves, new colors known as antioxidants are produced, giving the leaves their red and purple coloring. However, it's known that these sugars are not used for energy during the wintertime.

Changes in metalbolic biology help pine trees to endure the Winter and keep their green needles. When the ground freezes and there is a shortage of water, these adaptations help pine trees to avoid dehydration and freezing-induced cellular damage.

"The Fall Season" is when many birds prepare for their lengthy winter migration to warmer places. Thousands of miles are frequently flown from here to southern Mexico by our Northern 'Morning Dove' population. The migratory routes of 'American Robins' are varied; they may travel more than 3,000 miles to reach Mississippi or only a few hundred miles.

It comes as no surprise that "The Fall Season" pumpkins are the most sought-after Fall food, according to 'The Widespread Media', because of the increasing number of fall-themed food items like pumpkin pie, pumpkin spice bread, pumpkin spice lattes, and numerous other appealing food product selections at grocery stores, specialty shops, and dining establishments across America.

"The Fall Season" is when a person needs a hat and neck scarf in the 'Shade' and shorts and sandals in the 'Sun' and it's also when the kitchen's cook can throw all their leftovers in a pot, add some water, then boil it,

and call it 'Soup'.
Historically, "The Fall Season" includes the Thanksgiving Day Family Celebration, which is a get-together to give 'Thanks' for the year's blessings, particularly family, friends, and fortunate health, usually over a meal of hearty traditional food dishes. It is a time to share a 'Wonderfully GOOD Meal' with loved ones, develop better relations, and think back on 'Life's POSI-TIVES' while also giving back to others around *You.
