Legislators Meet In Regent By Marlene Kouba

Rep. Karen Rohr of Mandan represented District #31 and Rep. Keith Kempenich of Bowman for District #39 met with the Hettinger County Farm Bureau and guests on "Meet your Legislator" night on September 28. Hettinger County is divided between the two districts.

The newly opened Black Butte Café in Regent was the site of the event with a meal provided by the Café.

The two representatives spoke of some of their interests and stressed that their areas are mostly rural. They are open to questions and concerns at any time. Energy and agriculture are two of the top issues. With the reorganization, both are up for re-election and are unopposed at this time.

Haley Robison from Amidon is Southwest field representative. She reported there will be a District #9 Fall Roundup at Fluffy Fields and Winery in Dickinson on October 22, a gun raffle with 20 winners selected in January, Route 1000 where high school students may earn \$500 cash for driving safely and member benefits that include discounts with John Deere, Ford, Case, several hotels and more.

State director Weston Dvorak of Manning discussed the proposed CO2 pipeline, Land Trust and medical add-ons, such as telemedicine with counseling.

Pete Hanebutt, state policy director said Farm Bureau has

members in all 50 states and Puerto Rico with over six million member families. They represent all crops and livestock. Term limits is a bad idea for the state and should not pass.

A new set of bylaws was passed and six resolutions will move on to the District meeting in Dickinson. They included activists in schools, voter ID, ag careers, school lunches, Clean Water Act and Global Diversity Framework which involves converting farmland to save fish and less meat consumption. All resolutions that are passed in Dickinson will be discussed during the state convention on November 18-19 in Bismarck before they become state policy. Trey Fischbach of Dickinson was added to the board.

There were numerous prizes but the winners of the top two were Larry Anderson with free dues for a year and Perry Kirschemann won meals for two anywhere in Hettinger County.

Ground Preparation

Clumpy soil creates air pockets which will cause the roots to dry out and kill the trees.

The best time to start working your ground is the spring, one year before the planting will happen

Till it again in the spring before we come out to plant the trees. DO NOT plant a crop where the trees are going to be planted. It will compete with the trees for moisture .

The ground should be worked 4" to 8" in depth.

Weeds need to be dealt with before we come out to plant and also before we lay the fabric down.

You need to work the ground around the trees to keep the soil loose and weed free for fabric installation.

The better that the site is worked up, the better the chance of the trees surviving.

Planting into sod is not recommended. It is more difficult to do and leaves the trees fighting with the grass for valuable moisture.

Winter and Wind Burn

Wind Burn - also known as wind desiccation. This occurs when trees are exposed to dry, cold, sweeping winds. Moisture from stems and leaves are drawn out of the led and the stem tissue, causing cells in the leaves and the stems to break down, resulting in a brown cast on the whole leaf or on certain sections of the leaf. Wind Burn may be worst in exposed areas on the windward side of the plant. In the spring you can cut out the scorched foliage from the broadleaved evergreen trees and shrubs as the growth resumes. Conifers will often regrow from badly damaged shoots and should not be pruned. You might think that they are dead but be patient : many trees and shrubs are actually alive and will bounce back. Many plants that have wind or winter burn need to have their first flush of growth.





Pastor Ray Sherwood Bowman Methodist Church

This month we celebrate Pastor Appreciation and just so you know as I am sharing this, I have family who are in full time ministry...so it is something that is very near and dear to my heart. I do not share this to make you feel sorry for myself or any person in ministry...I share this so you can understand most pastor's hearts when it comes to ministering to your family, church family and community.

This comes from a pastor as he posted on FB these words:

It's Sunday morning, three minutes before the service. You hear the sound of the congregation talking, and the worship team begins to play.

People begin to sing and lift their hands encountering God. It's a beautiful scene.

Then there's you, the pastor. And you are not feeling it today. You're still thinking about the fight you had with your spouse on the way to church ABOUT church!

Not to mention 5 minutes before service, someone came

person to leave the church or the newest church political dra-

All of this is on top of your own personal issues with your health, family, spirituality, finances, and unanswered prayers.

The last thing you feel like you should be doing is stepping on a stage to preach. In fact, about the only time you have spent with God was praying in your office that you don't bomb this sermon.

After service, you rush to a meeting you don't want to attend because you don't feel like being "church you" anymore.

Then at the end of the day, after faithfully serving God through all the stress and drama, you sit down and ask yourself questions like ... " Should I even be a pastor? I feel like such an imposter."

We begin to water down the path of "I don't feel equipped, gifted, or holy enough to be doing what I am doing. I don't even know if I want to do this anymore.

But it's understandable to feel that way because, honestly, it's exhausting always showing up as "the pastor" and always having to be "on.'

"Choice

I used to feel this way so often. Like there was a church me and an authentic me. Not that they weren't congruent, but I couldn't be my entire true self and show my weakness to the people I led.

People put us on a pedestal and hold us to impossible and unbiblical standards. People who don't pastor don't understand how that feels! It feels like pressure. It feels like a fraud, and most of all, it's confusing.

Then one day, God showed me I had been making a critical mistake that was causing me to feel this way. I had allowed people and society to impose an identity based on what I do, not who I am.

Being a pastor is not who I am. And it's not who you are, either. It's what you do. It's a calling and assignment.

We have to take ourselves off the pedestal. We do that by being genuine and authentic and admitting our shortcomings, and not trying to be perfect for church people. You either climb down off the pedestal for yourself...or, eventually, you'll fall off.

That's the scariest and most disturbing question pastors ask themselves ... " What would they think if they knew ???? We all have something to write in the blank we feel disqualifies us. If we don't think we do, we may need to write pride.

Many pastors live in constant fear of people's judgments about them. Maintaining people's opinions of you is not worth your emotional and mental health. It's also not worth

It's God's opinion we should be most concerned with. If you haven't noticed, His opinions and the people He uses are far different than what we as humans would think.

Yes, when you begin to be authentic, some people will act offended. It will make them feel uncomfortable. But it's not who you are that's making them uncomfortable it's your utter freedom in being vulnerable that makes them uncomfortable ... because it is calling them to a deeper place of authenticity, they aren't ready to give.

And when you still feel like an imposter at times, I want to know the surefire way to remind yourself you are not an imposter:

Imposters don't show up when they feel defeated.

Imposters don't encourage people while their own heart is breaking.

Imposters don't sacrifice what they have to pastor. Imposters don't pray for the

sick while in declining health.

Imposters don't fund the mission when they can hardly pay their bills. You are the real deal! You show up and you serve God.

Most importantly is you haven't given up yet. Despite all the setbacks, burnout, discouragement, and heartbreak, you still are preaching the gospel and serving people.

Rewrite the story you are telling yourself. You are not an imposter. You are a human being who has gone through hell to be faithful to a God-given calling.

The imposters leave when it's hard and don't even know they are fakes until trial by fire

else. You may not be perfect: you may struggle with sin issues. But you are here reading this anyway.

You have had to pastor in person, on zoom, vou've been told that the thing you gave your life to was nonessential and had to close and have no services.

You have watched the church dwindle but keep giving it your all and best. You uncomfortably stood and preached to a camera with zero training.

That's why God called you and used you even with your flaws...because He knew He could trust you in this season we have been living in.

So, what makes you different? What qualifies you to lead even though you're messed up? You're after His heart...that is the difference!

Don't give up yet. You are doing better than you think you are!

He is preceded in death by his beloved grandson, Tate; his parents, Jake and Olga; his uncles, Bill, Emil, and Ed; and numerous pets.



Even though the community came together a year ago and fixed up the inside to make it usable for the children, there are several other things that need to be done to the building. The







roof is bad and need to be reshingled. After a furnace is secured and the roof is replaced, the next item on the wish list for the daycare building is new siding.

Reflections on the Words of Life

By Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzia

We arrive today at the response of King Darius after learning that God had rescued Daniel from the mouth of the lions. We read in Daniel 6:23, "Then the king was exceedingly glad for him, and commanded that they should take Daniel up out of the den. So Daniel was taken up out of the den, and no injury whatever was found on him, because he believed in his God.

King Darius makes a series of decisions, the first one being to deliver Daniel. The law, unjust as it was, had been satisfied. Daniel had received the punishment, and there was now no reason to detain him. So Darius immediately gave the order to remove him from the lions' den. As the king and his servants carefully checked Daniel over, they did not find so much as a scratch on him. And what is given as the reason for this? Our verse tells us: "because he believed in his God." Oh, the power of Biblical faith! The writer of Hebrews, speaking of Old Testament men and women of faith, says that there were some, "who through faith subdued kingdoms, worked righteousness, obtained promises, stopped the mouths of lions" (Hebrews 11:33).

Many people claim, "I am a person of faith." But faith in and of itself is not the important thing. In fact, it would be next

to impossible to function in life without some type of faith. Even

something so mundane as sitting in a chair requires faith. A person who sits in the chair believes that the chair will hold his or her weight. It requires faith to believe that George Washington was the first President of our country. But those examples are different from the kind of faith that Daniel displayed. The important thing about faith is the OBJECT of that faith. It is crucial that faith be placed in the right object. Eve placed her faith in the lie that Satan told her: If you eat this fruit, you will become like God. The result was disastrous. In order to become a Christian, a person must place his or her faith in what the Lord Jesus Christ accomplished on the cross to pay the penalty for his or her sins. From that point on, the Christian grows in faith by learning and believing God's Word (Romans 10:17). Faith is powerful when it is placed in God's Word because it links the believer with God and taps into His power. May God grant us this kind of faith. Like his three friends Shadrach, Meshach, and Abednego had done so many years before, Daniel simply committed himself to God, fully trusting that He would do what was best, and God sent an angel to shut the lions' mouths.

For centuries, many have viewed this deliverance of Daniel as a picture of the resurrection of the Lord Jesus Christ. For Daniel's deliverance from the lions' den wonderfully foreshadows the victory Christ would accomplish over death

by rising from the dead. The apostle John writes of Jesus' crucifixion, "Then the soldiers came and broke the legs of the first and of the other who was crucified with Him. But when they came to Jesus and saw that He was already dead, they did not break His legs For these things were done that the Scripture should be fulfilled, 'Not one of His bones shall be broken'" (John 19:32, 33, 36). After spending a night in the lions' den, Daniel also emerged with-

out one broken bone "because he believed in his God.'

Lord willing, next time we shall consider more of King Darius's decisions. But I close with some beautiful lyrics written by Louisa Stead in 1882: "Tis so sweet to trust in Jesus, Just to take Him at His word; Just to rest upon His promise, Just to know, 'Thus saith the Lord.' Jesus, Jesus, how I trust Him! How I've proved Him o'er and o'er! Jesus, Jesus, precious Jesus! O for grace to trust Him more!"
