25th Annual Coal Springs Threshing Bee Wrap Up



Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

We continue today with the speech that Naomi delivered upon her return to Bethlehem. Last time we focused for her attitude of bitterness, and she goes on in the same vein in the next verse: "I went out full, and the LORD has brought me home again empty. Why do you call me Naomi, since the LORD has testified against me, and the Almighty has afflicted me?" (Ruth 1:21). Here Naomi uses legal language to indicate that the Lord Himself had tried her case and found her guilty. Then He went on to administer the sentence of affliction. In her bitterness, Naomi failed to see that she had in fact not come back empty. With her was the daughter-in-law, who was to be one of God's best blessings in her life.

Naomi displays the same attitude exhibited by Job after the Lord removed his prosperity and health. Though Job was a very godly man, he temporarily lost perspective when the circumstances of his life became excruciating. Note his similar complaints: "For the arrows of the Almighty are within me; my spirit drinks in their poison; the terrors of God are arrayed against me" (Job 6:4). "For You write bitter things against me, and make me inherit the iniguities of my youth" (Job 13:26). Hymnwriter William Cowper penned some helpful lyrics that believers would do well to remember: "Judge not the Lord by feeble sense, but trust Him for His grace; Behind a frowning providence, He hides a smiling face." That smiling face would become evident to both Job and to Naomi in due time.

verse 22: "So Naomi returned and Ruth the Moabitess her daughter-in-law with her, who returned from the country of Moab. Now they came to Bethlehem at the beginning of barley harvest." Here we learn that the ladies arrive at the beginning of barley harvest, which was the first of the crops harvested. Though the chapter ends with a dismal view of Naomi and her life and circumstances, we see here a reason for optimism: The Lord had provided Israel with crops which would feed them once again. Unknown to both Naomi and Ruth, there were blessings around the corner.

Christians, let us not become like Naomi. Though she knew that God is sovereign, she had stopped trusting Him. When one sees only the unpleasant occurrences and forgets that God is working them together for some good purpose, he or she loses perspective. It is so easy for us to get caught up in the things of this world and think that they will bring fulfillment and happiness in our lives. But the Lord knows that He is the only One who can fulfill us and make us truly happy. And so, He will often strip away other things to help us get our perspective back, as He did with Naomi. If she had not hit bottom, she probably would have never gone back to Israel. But now, unknown to her, the smiling face of God was about to be encountered in her life.

Friends, are you in a right relationship with God? Are you trusting in Jesus' perfect payment for sin alone to make you right with Him? Acts 4:12 tells us, "Nor is there salvation in any other, for there is no other name under heaven given among men by which we must be saved." Please be sure. It is only through Christ that we can hope to experience the smiles of God's blessings.




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
