





Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

We resume our study today where we left off last time. Naomi was trying to persuade her daughters-in-law, Orpah and Ruth, to remain in Moab and not return to Israel with her. In Ruth 1:14 we read, "Then they lifted up their voices and wept again; and Orpah kissed her mother-in-law, but Ruth clung to her." Orpah decided to stay in Moab, but Ruth refused to leave her mother-in-law. And so Naomi has one last argument to try to convince Buth, in verse 15: "And she said, 'Look, your sister-in-law has gone back to her people and to her gods; return after your sister-in-law."

In Naomi's view, Orpah seems to have made the sensible choice, using the same logic which brought Naomi's family to Moab in the first place: The grass looked greener in Moab. And so Naomi urges Ruth to follow her sister-in-law's example.

Lord willing, we shall look later at Ruth's decision, but I'd like to back up a bit and address Naomi's statement which we mentioned last time in verse 13 as Naomi's most basic argument to persuade her daughters not to go with her: "The hand of God has gone out against me." Naomi was at a low point, and we often say things we later

regret at times like that. But we need to put Naomi's statement in perspective. As we saw earlier, she was right about the fact that the circumstances of her life had to be traced back to God, who is in control of all lives and all circumstances. But if Naomi was a true believer in the Lord and one of His own people, then there is a serious flaw in what she has said. You see, the Lord's hand is never against those who are His redeemed children. While it is true that God brings loving discipline into the lives of His children to correct them and keep them on the narrow way, that discipline is never done with hatred or enmity. We find repeated in the New Testament what is said in Proverbs 3:12: "For whom the LORD loves He corrects, just as a father the son in whom he delights." Notice that this correction comes as a father to the son in whom he delights. Yes, the circumstances in Naomi's life were God's hand upon her,

If you are trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ alone for your salvation, you are one of God's children. He loves His children too much to let them stray far from Him. If they fall into sin, He will so work in their lives to bring them to repentance. As the writer of Hebrews says in Hebrews 12:9-10, "Furthermore, we have had human fathers who corrected us, and we paid them respect. Shall we not much more readily be in subjection to the Father of spirits and live? For they indeed for a few days chastened us as seemed best to them, but He for our profit, that we may be partakers of His holiness." We can see this in the life of Naomi. God in grace was bringing her back. She was miserable, but she was heading home, where God would bless her once again.

but not God's hand against her.

It is vital that we make a distinction between punishment for sin and discipline which is designed to keep believers from sin. The punishment for the believer's sin has all been put on the Lord Jesus Christ and paid for in full. That is not true for unbelievers, and that is why unbelievers will go to hell when they die. God will punish them for their sins because there has been no payment for them as there has for the believer's sin. Friends, please don't leave this vital matter undecided. Make sure that you are relying on Christ's payment for sin alone to make you right with God. The consequences for failing to do so are dreadful and eternal.

Well, I'm in Kansas City, Missouri, right now and, either very, very happy or depressed depending on how the Detroit Lions did at Arrowhead Stadium last night. And, let me tell you, last minute prep. revealed some really flabbergasting details that have emerged since I went to my last game back in the 1990's. First, parking at Arrowhead. I now know HOW NFL teams pay these multi-million-dollar compensations. If you haven't driven to a game and actually tried to park THREE HOURS before kick-off, the sticker shock will let you in on how part of those salaries are being paid. Suffice it to say, I'm bringing 2 credit cards and some cash just to be on the safe side.

Second, I planned to pay a ridiculous amount to have a car-service drop me off and pick me back up to avoid the parking hassle. 





By the time you all read this, I will be packing for my annual pilgrimage to Medora. Every September, I join my Lutheran colleagues for a time of learning and worship put on by the Synod. This time has become a beloved ritual in my busy Fall Schedule because it guarantees myself time in the sacred North Dakota badlands at the end of Summer before Fall really gets full.

In our lives, we all hunt for scared places. And these are not necessarily just places of natural wonders or places in

which we find God, but we are on the hunt for personal sanctuaries where we feel like we can belong. A place where we feel safe and welcome. A place as comforting as a child in a parent's arms. We long for a place to belong where we are loved. accepted as we are, and that we have a place to safety lament. 

"A program like this on Labor Day was a great way to remember the hundreds of men and women who labored long and hard in and around the many coal mines in the area," said one committee member.

Special speakers for the event at the museum were Michael Howe, Environmental Engineer Abandoned Mine Land Division, ND Public Service Commission; Duane Wamre, retired Registered Land Surveyor, ret., Kadrmas, Lee & Jackson; and Isabelle (Deavy) Howe, local lifetime resident who grew up on a mine site. Participants then gathered on the buses for a drive-by tour of some mines and the stop at a third.

The two-bus tour ended near the site of the original Ihle Coal Mine northeast of Hettinger with a complimentary supper and historical information provided by Glenn and Jan (Ihle) Nelson. "Great to see so many people and to hear stories they remembered of family members who worked in the mines," said one participant.

This program and bus tour was the sixth such event organized and promoted by Dakota Buttes Historical Society/Museum, the official historical society of Adams County. "Two Separate Dakotas"

Separate Dakotas", back on Saturday, March 2, 1861, shortly before the outbreak of the American Civil War, the Dakota Territory was created by an Act of Congress, which was ratified by the departing 36th Congressbeing the U.S. Senate, and the House of Representatives, and signed by James Buchanan, the 15th President of the United States. The Dakota Territory's borders were often altered. Originally, the territory comprised an area that included the present states of North Dakota. South Dakota, and much of Montana and Wyoming.

While not taking part directly in the American Civil War, which was also called the War Between the States, a four-year war (beginning April 12, 1861, and lasting until April 9, 1865) between the United States and 11 Southern U.S. States that seceded from the Union and formed the Confederate States of America. Notably, the Dakota Territory did organize some troops to guard the farming settlements created as a result of the 1862 U.S. Federal Homestead Law, which developed gradually after the first claim west of the Red River was made in 1868. According to history, the expansion of the railroad network further into the West gave the new Homestead Act farmers access to markets for their crops and livestock production. The commerce lines supplied by these railroads provided access to various commercial hubs from both the northern and southern halves of the Dakota Territory. The northern region of the Dakota Territory through Fargo and Bismarck was more personally connected to Minneapolis-St. Paul. The Southern region, on the other hand, was more closely connected through trade to Sioux City, Iowa, and from there to Omaha and Chicago. Residents of various regions of the territory became less connected to one another as a result of these divergent economic ties.

Politics, trade differences, and personality conflicts brought about the idea of creating "Two Separate Dakotas" because it was thought that taking such action would generate more Washington, D.C. government support and thus facilitate more opportunities for both the North and South regions of the Dakota Territory


The two regions of the Dakota Territory had diverse populations from the start. The Southern half of the Dakota Territory increased from around 10,000 inhabitants in 1870 to nearly 100,000 in 1880. Only about 40,000 people were liv






ing in the Northern half of the Dakota Territory at that time, according to the US census. But overall the Dakota Territory had a significant "boom" in settlements. Then, a U.S. Territory was typically expected to become a state after reaching the threshold of 60,000 inhabitants and also after they completed their proposed state constitution draft, which defined the supreme law as well as the fundamental citizens' rights that would be put forth to govern the state. However, there were some exceptions, as the U.S. Constitution did not exclude Congress from establishing unique requirements for specific territories that wanted to become U.S. States- population totals being one of them that often got adjusted.

On Saturday, November 2, 1889, America's 23rd President Benjamin Harrison signed the Act of Admission papers declaring North Dakota as the 39th U.S. State and South Dakota as the 40th U.S. State of the United States of America, respectively. North Dakota and South Dakota, were both admitted to the Union as American States on the same day. With President Harrison's signature, the Dakota Territory was split into a North and South half, resulting in the creation of "Two Separate Dakotas" that then largely mirrored the boundaries of today's states. On Friday, November 8, 1889, Montana became the 41st state to be admitted into the Union. The finding of gold in the area led to the creation of the Montana Territory in 1864. On Sunday, July 10, 1890, Wyoming officially joined the union as the 44th state. In 1869, when Wyoming was still known as the Wyoming Territory, it became the first state to offer women the right to vote. Let me reiterate: All four (4) of the United States States named in this sentence were 1st part of the Dakota Ter-







Thoughts for the Week

It's really amazing to look at all the things on social media and see all the opinions on what you should eat, what you should wear, and in the last few years, what you should think in this Where is the chutzpah (definition for those that have never heard this word: extreme self-confidence or audacity) to believe that you can tell people what is right and what is wrong for them. But what is worse is that there are those that read these things and believe what they say. I am not sure where some

people lost their self-confidence, but I think the start of us having self confidence in the first place is when we are For many children, they have more self-confidence then they should have. I am sure that many mothers can relate when they see their children playing with things that they should not have, and then saying: See Mommy, what I did? This can involve makeup, scissors, making breakfast for Mommy and helping Mommy clean the house. It may depend upon Mommies reaction whether they try it again, but the more audacious the child, the more times the Mommy has to 'fix' whatever it is that their child has gotten into. It also may not just be Mommy who has to face the results of a child and their desire to do something good, as Daddies also have probably faced this situation and if they were smart Daddies, they took a deep breath and counted to five before explaining just why this should not happen again and how to do it better the next time.

Some children are naturally recessive in temperament and need more than usual encouragement to become confident in what they do or what they want to do. Even if a child is gifted with a talent of some kind, without parental approval or encouragement by someone

that they look up to, which could be a teacher or an older person that they respect, they could lose their confidence in their ability. This results in an introverted child that is afraid to risk criticism from peers and adults and this can erode whatever confidence they have. Sometimes they grow out of this over time when they become adults, but sometimes it never happens for them. They can become unhappy and depressed and pessimistic over their future. They may not be able to learn in the same manner as another child, and become lost in the system. adding further to their unhappiness. Not all children will be affected, as some become determined to succeed just to be able to prove to everyone that they can do what they choose to do. Children from confident parents are more likely to be confident as well, while children from recessive or domineering parents tend to be more introverted.

The hardest thing to combat is the public opinions that children are bombarded with on social media. It has always been hard to fight popular ideas, and children that do not have self-confidence can be forced to follow with the crowd rather than blaze their own trails in life. It is difficult to be the person that disagrees with the majority of the population regardless whether it is familial, childhood friends or social media, but at no time prior to the advent of technology is it so prevalent. Before social media appeared, our opinions were based on family information or friends conversations. It was not always correct, but generally it was confined to our area of the world. Now we are bombarded with opinions from the entire world and it is not just our parents who have the last word. Children are being told that they should disregard parental, or 'rents' opinions as old fashioned and out of touch. Not that this a new thought as each generation has thought that they knew more than their parents

What to do now? My Sister lived in Greeley, Colorado and was going back to school in Denver to earn her Geriatric Nurse Practitioner Degree: I flew south to help out with her two children. I became a CNA at the Good Samaritan Nursing Home in Greeley and soon changed positions and worked as secretary in the Maintenance Department.

Colorado introduced me to authentic Mexican and Italian

food and The Fawn Brook Inn just outside of Estes Park, Colorado: The food at the Fawn Brook Inn was like nothing I'd every tasted before, at the time North Dakota was a "food desert!" I also tried skiing, but were not gonna talk about that!!

My Sister completed her degree and after 2 years I decided to head back to North Dakota. I moved back to the farm and worked in Mott at the Good Samaritan Center, before moving to Bismarck. I worked at the former Bismarck Hospital, Med-Center One now Sanford. I worked as a CNA and Ward Clerk, home health was a new thing and I liked the idea of taking care of people in their homes so I gave it a try.

In the Fall of 1984 I went on a blind date to the Lakota Fireman's Ball and met my Husband Dave. I moved to Lakota, North Dakota and we were married in August of 1985.

transferred to Bowbells, North Dakota where our two oldest children were born. While in Bowbells I did Daycare, worked at the Kenmare Hospital and Home Health for Ward County.

So now where has the Little Birdie landed? Hazen Bay, North Dakota! We have a lovely view of Lake Sakakawea from our deck and the dock is just 2 minutes away! I'll be helping out at our Daughters' Store, The Dash and loving-up our Grandsons!

Change isn't always easy, but it was better to make the decision for ourselves than to have it made for us later. The move is certainly bitter sweet for The Little Birdie, the memories will stay with me and by the Grace of God we'll make many, many more.
