"Richest Man in the World"






Compass Connection What am I so angry about?


Well, I have some information about anger for you to ponder in the upcoming days, about whether this anger is IN you, or you see it in others around you. First, I need you to know ANGER is a secondary emotion. This means there are other emotions happening first, which lead you to get angry. These emotions are primarily HURT and FEAR. This hurt can be physical, amental, spiritual, or sexual. When another person hurts us in one of these ways, we get scared. Scared they will do it again. Scared the pain will be just as bad or worse than the first time. Scared others will know we have been 'damaged' or 'weakened' in some way. Confused why this person we trusted, hurt us in this way. We don't set boundaries. Fear of a never-ending cycle appears. We allow others actions upon us to fester and linger, causing us to think about the hurt . finally leading us to neina feelings controlling our happiness. Our protective instincts kick in and we fight back, With ANGER. Anger helps us feel in control and have the perception that we are no longer weak and will not be able to get hurt. Anger often assists us in feeling powerful and strong, however it is mostly just intimidation. Over time, if trying to find happiness and peace are unsuccessful, depression often sets in under the disguise of anger. Depression and hopelessness are often first identified as anger. Next time you encounter someone that is angry, instead of getting angry back at them, ask yourself..."How can I help them and not hurt them? Dr. Toshi Is In!

Dear Dr. Toshi

I know that the heart and the lungs along with trachea (the windpipe that goes to the lungs for breathing) and esophagus (the "pipe" that goes to the stomach for food and fluids) are in the chest, but what's in the abdomen?


Many people wonder what organs are in the abdomen (tummy) and aren't quite sure where they're located. So, I thought I'd give you a quick tour of your abdomen today.

When you look at yourself in the mirror, you know roughly where your chest is and your abdomen is. If you press on the center of your chest between your ribs, you can feel your breastbone (which is called the sternum), and if you follow it down to the bottom, that's about where the chest ends and the abdomen begins.

Doctors and other medical providers often talk about the anatomy of the abdomen using unfamiliar terminology, so let's talk about what you see in the mirror. Using your belly but-

ton (the medical term for this is the "umbilicus") as the center of your abdomen, you can draw imaginary lines horizontally and vertically through it to make a big plus sign. In medical terms, you just created four areas: your right upper quadrant, right lower quadrant, left upper quadrant, and left lower quadrant. In addition to those four "quadrants," doctors and providers also use the words, "epigastric" and "periumbilical." The epigastric area is the upper abdomen just under the bottom of your sternum, and periumbilical means the area around your belly button.

Your chest and your abdomen are divided by your diaphragm. You've probably heard of the diaphragm, but do you know what it actually is? Your diaphragm is simply a large domeshaped muscle that separates your chest and abdomen. In other words, it's the floor of your chest, and the roof of your abdomen. It's also the major muscle that helps you breathe. The diaphragm muscle also has three openings in it: one for the esoph-

agus, one for the aorta (the giant artery the size of a garden hose that comes from your heart), and one for a major vein going back up to the heart called the inferior vena cava. Those three "pipes" run through both your chest and abdomen, so they have to go through your diaphragm. As I mentioned above, the esophagus is the pipe for food and fluids and after right after going through your diaphragm, it connects to your stomach, which is right under your diaphragm. Sometimes people have a condition called a "hiatal hernia," where the opening in the diaphragm for the esophagus gets loose and larger, and the stomach protrudes up a little into the chest cavity where it doesn't be-

long Now let's look at the four areas in your abdomen. First, in your right upper quadrant (under the right side of your chest), you have your liver and gall bladder. In your right lower quadrant, you have your intestines and your appendix, which is a small offshoot from your intestine about the size of your little finger. Women also have their right ovary in that area (actually, ovaries are on both sides). Then, in your left upper quadrant, you have your spleen and a big part of your stomach. Your stomach extends over to the upper central area of your abdomen, the epigastric area. So, sometimes doctors call stomach pain "epigastric pain." (In Greek, "epi" means "on, near, or on top of," and gastric means the stomach. so, "epigastric" means "near the stomach.") In your left lower quadrant, you have the last part of your large intestine before it becomes your rectum. Your pancreas also sits in the upper middle part of your abdomen, but it's a little deeper inside. Your kidneys are in the middle of your back right under your ribs on both sides of your spine. So, doctors check for kidney infections by tapping the middle of your back. Kidneys can also give you "flank pain" in your sides if you ever get a kidney stone

The lowest area of the abdomen is called the pelvic area and that's where the reproductive organs are. I hope this little tour of your

abdomen helped you know where your internal organs are! Dr. Toshiko ("Toshi") Luckow, MD, is a Family Physician at the West River Health Services Hospital and Clinics.

Alive in Christ by Pastor Ed Kvaale Bowman Assembly of God Church, Bowman, ND

Resurrection Sunday (Easter) is just behind us but the importance of Jesus' resurrection to the life of a Christian continues. Jesus' death and resurrection and His call for us to take up our cross and follow Him remind us that we need to ask ourselves questions like "Are we willing to sin less"? "Are we willing to live life differently"? After all, Jesus has called us to "put off the old self" and "put on the new self" through the power of the Holy Spirit working in us to transform us through Jesus' resurrection power.

Paul challenges us in Romans 6:11 "So you also must consider yourselves dead to sin alive to God in Christ Jesus". Yes, we receive our salvation through grace alone and faith alone. Yet, we have been created to serve Jesus and others and do works of service for others. These works do not merit special grace to us, but like some in the early New Testament church we also need to be reminded that our salvation came at great cost to Jesus. His death and resurrection have given us the opportunity to live a new life alive in the Holy Spirit,

alive to Jesus, and dead to sin for His glory. Since Jesus died we too can become dead to sin, allow the freedom of Jesus to set us free from sinful habits, and alive to Jesus.

Lutheran theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer in his book Cost of Discipleship reminds us of one the dangers of what he calls "cheap grace". Bonhoeffer said "Grace alone does everything, they say, and so everything can remain as it was before" Paul agreed wholeheartedly with Bonhoeffer in Romans 6:1 when he says "What then? Are we to sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means"! Rather Bonhoeffer says this about costly grace: "Such grace is costly because it calls us to follow Jesus Christ. It is costly because it costs us our life, and it is grace because it gives us the only true life. It is costly because it condemns sin. and grace because it justifies the sinner. Above all, it is costly because it cost God the life of God's Son" 'you were bought at a price', and what has cost God much cannot be cheap for us". Let us continue to follow Jesus even if it means dying to self, because He has the power to resurrect us and make us fully alive in God!



trees are not the only thing looking brown during our ongoing drought, they might be something you want to keep an eye on. It is not all together uncommon to see our trees exhibiting signs of stress or "winter injury." During the past month, pines and spruce trees throughout much of North Dakota have shown symptoms of decline.

"The causes are varied, and treatment recommendations are equally diverse," North Dakota State University Extension forester Joe Zeleznik says.

In 2020, many ponderosa pine trees across the state died in shelterbelts or yards.

"We believe that the extremely wet fall of 2019 is to blame," Zeleznik says. "Soils were saturated in many areas. especially following the big snowstorm on Oct. 10-13, 2019. Even areas that were not necessarily low spots accumulated a large amount of moisture. The saturated soil either killed the pines' root systems directly or else kept the trees from developing full hardiness before the winter."

Symptoms on pines were dramatic. Entire trees died, showing symptoms throughout the whole tree, seemingly all at once. In most cases, the trees showed no progression of symptoms from bottom to top or interior to exterior. Instead, trees began to grow in the spring of 2020, then simply stopped, with the needles turning brown.

Additional deaths of ponder-

plish-brown as they die. This dieback often has no pattern. The needles that die may be on one side of the tree or on the bottoms of branches, but they also may be scattered throughout the tree crowns. Sometimes, only needle tips are dead, while in other cases, entire needles die outright.

Affected trees can be right next to trees that are showing no symptoms. On occasion, entire trees may turn brown and

"Wildly fluctuating temperatures in February and March are often to blame for winter injury," Zeleznik says. "This year, the drought of 2020 is likely a major factor in the damage. Additionally, pests such as spider mites or pine needle scale may play a part, especially in those trees where the damage doesn't follow a pattern."

Treating trees is difficult because most of the damage is due to environmental problems. "Where trees lost most of their needles, they likely will not recover no matter what we do." Zeleznik notes. "For those trees that retain most of their needles, we need to make sure that we keep the trees otherwise healthy.

"Specifically, water those trees that are suffering from drought," he adds. "A long, slow soaking is better than multiple, brief additions of water. Move the hose around because the tree's roots extend in all directions from the stem." The roots go out far beyond

the drip line of the tree crown, extending to as far as four or five times the height of the tree. The ground should be moist, not saturated, after watering,

Zeleznik also recommends scouting for pests such as insects and diseases, and being prepared to treat them appropriately. Scouting is important because treatment timing is critical to be effective. Spraying for a pest at the wrong time of year is ineffective and a waste of time and money.




Review Your Severe Weather Plan

"It has been quite busy and I wasn't expecting that," she said. "...It's been wonderful. I can't complain at all."

Roseland said the additional office has expanded the law firm's reach to encompass the southwest region of North Dakota and the northwest region of





South Dakota.

"It's quite regional," said Roseland. "...Between Belle Fourche, North and Dickinson, South is where our concentration lies."

Being a regional business, Melling said the law firm's areas of interest are what separates it from other law businesses in the region.

"...I do a lot of family law it's not something that's typically really high on a whole lot of attorneys' lists," said Melling. "We are licensed in North Dakota and South Dakota, and I am licensed in Montana as well and that sets us apart because a lot of attorneys are licensed in only one state."

Following the recent expansion into Belle Fouche, South Dakota, Roseland said the law firm isn't currently pursuing more expansion. Even still, he said broadening the law firm's reach is still a future possibility.

"We want to make sure we have our feet solidly underneath us with the two offices," he said. "Certainly, if the market demands, we are open to possible further expansion in the future, but as of right now there are no plans to do so," he said.

While the law firm has a regional presence, it has also been a longstanding local business in Adams County that has developed and changed over the years. Roseland said he joined the law firm in 2009, at which point the business was named Crane and Roseland Law, P.C.

"I got to town in August 8, 2009, and hit the ground run-

ning at that time as the State's Attorney and a partner of the law firm," he said.

The law firm continued to develop with the addition of Erin Melling, who joined in 2013 after graduating from the University of South Dakota School of Law. Eventually, the law firm evolved into Melling and Roseland Law P.C., in 2019.

Since the law firm's conception, Roseland said that he has

appreciated the opportunity to serve the community.

"We have been very fortunate that we have had the trust of the people in our community and that they have felt comfortable in coming to us to help them," he said. "...I just really appreciate the opportunities we've been given."





Douglas Peter Burtell was born April 16, 1924 to Peter and Lydia Burtell, in Casselton, North Dakota, the middle of five children. For unknown reasons. Doug was known as Bob to his family and friends growing up, causing some to speculate that his wife had been married before when she referenced these two men. He attended elementary school and started high school in Casselton, working as farm hand and other odd jobs. As many other young men during the late Depression years, Doug joined the North Dakota National Guard, although he was only 16.

When World War II began, the North Dakota guard was mobilized as the 164th Infantry and began service in the South Pacific Theater. Doug served on Guadalcanal. Bougainville and the Philippine Islands, being wounded in action and receiving the Purple Heart. He was very proud of his service, and was the last surviving member of the ND 164th Infantry. Doug was in Headquarters company and served in reconnaissance, primarily due to his artistic skill in map making. In keeping with his artistic bent, he made many sketches to be later turned into paintings chronicling the 164th's time in service. Many of his paintings are scattered around the state, including the 164th monument at the Veteran's Cemetery in Mandan, ND. After the war, like many other servicemen. Doug returned to North Dakota and began rebuilding America. He met Cecilia Michalski and they were married in August, 1946. He got his GED from NDAC (NDSU) and attended art school at the Minneapolis Art Institute. Decid-

ing that being tied to a drawing board as a commercial artist was not for him, Doug began working in the lumber industry. selling wholesale millwork for Dakota Sash and Door in Fargo. Upon retirement, he worked selling campers in Fargo before moving to Bowman to be nearer his daughter, Barb and her family. In Bowman, he continued his painting, giving many paintings to friends in the area, wildlife and western life being two of his favorite subjects. Cec used to say her walls were constantly changing, because if someone admired a painting, it often went home with them. Cec passed away in 2005 unexpectedly.




