
Valentine's Day is now very commercialized, and heaven forbid a husband should forget! My Parents were married for 73 years; I don't think my Dad ev-




of love that bring happiness, works of love that clean, make beds, laundry, ears and mouths of love that visit.







What is it really like living in a small town. Well first of all, small is relative to what you know. To someone who is or was born into a city of a million people, small is 30 or maybe 50 thousand people. When someone says small town to me, Mott is not the first thought that comes to mind. I was raised in a town of about 50 - 70 people, give or take the summer arrivals and coming and going of students, so I don't think Mott is small. Smaller than a lot, but there are a lot of smaller towns out there as well. Take for example, Marshall, ND which is the home of Brad Gjermunson, who if you are into Rodeo at all, you know as a 4 times saddle bronc World Champion that boasts a current population of 60,

Part of the charm of a small town is that there is a lot of peace and quiet. We don't have a lot of traffic and except for the occasional jake brake coming into town, it is pretty restful and sleeping is easier. There are not a lot of horns and honking from car alarms unless somebody accidentally hits an alarm instead of the car starter and there are still people who don't lock their cars in the first place. We don't see many thefts, but I can remember one in the last 30 years when someone came thru town hitchhiking and found an unlocked car at the school, keys included, drove it north of town and rolled it. As in many small towns, these kind of things get remembered by someone, whether the owner wants to have it known or not.





Leah Benz and Katie Noreen acquired Morland Financial





Reflections on the Words of Life


Last time in our study of the book of Daniel, we saw that after Daniel explained the meaning of King Nebuchadnezzar's dream to him, the king made a remarkable confession: "Truly your God is the God of gods, the Lord of kings" (Daniel 2:47). As we look now at the first verse of chapter three, we ask, "Was Nebuchadnezzar's confession a reflection of a true change of heart?" Sadly, the answer is a resounding NO. Instead of turning to God, the king hardens into



deeper pride. We read in Daniel 3:1, "Nebuchadnezzar the king made an image of gold, whose height was sixty cubits and its width six cubits. He set it up in the plain of Dura, in the province of Babylon."

Now consider that Nebuchadnezzar saw in his dream a statue with a head of gold. As Daniel explained, this represented the king and the Babvlonian Empire. And while his kingdom was perhaps the greatest of all, it would be replaced by future kingdoms which were represented by other materials in the statue. By having a statue of gold built, measuring about ninety feet tall by nine feet wide, Nebuchadnezzar seems to be saying that he would not be just the head of gold; he will be the entire statue. And as we shall see next time, Lord willing, he is determined have the whole empire bow down to him. He has gone from what appeared to be a humble worshiper of God to a bold, defiant competitor with God.

Friends, it is possible to have religious experiences without undergoing a deep, lasting change of heart in conversion. The Puritan John Owen has described this as people who are taking a journey to a specific destination. Along the way, a severe storm forces them to leave the road and take~shelter. But the storm has only brought them a brief scare. When it passes and the sun shines again, they are back on the road headed for their destination. So it is with the one who has a religious experi-



ence but is not converted. The Word of God may create a temporary turbulence in a person's life, which may cause him or her to turn aside from the sinful course he or she was pursuing. This person has been shaken up, but not changed. And so, when the period of fear or conviction has passed, he or she goes right back to pursuing a life of sin.

It is also possible for people to praise the Word of God or even the messenger of God's Word without having a true love for God Himself. Nebuchadnezzar admired Daniel and praised Daniel's God but had no personal love for God. Furthermore, those who have some sort of positive response to God's Word and then turn away from it, sometimes go deeper into sin and hardness of heart, as did Nebuchadnezzar.

Friends, we must beware of being deceived about the most

important issue in life-are we right with God? How can we know whether we have truly been converted and reconciled to God? First, we must realize that we all come into this world as sinners who are under God's holy wrath (Romans 3:10-19). We must be given eyes to see that we need a Savior to restore us to a right relationship with God. And then we must rely fully and exclusively on what the Lord Jesus Christ did on the cross in taking the punishment for our sins upon Himself as our Substitute. Salvation is a free gift of our gracious God. No one can earn or deserve it. It must be received by faith alone. John 3:36: "He who believes in the Son has everlasting life; and he who does not believe the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abides on him." Please be sure you have placed your trust in the Son.






