Brother Llewellyn collects and processes local clays, which is time consuming, and labor intensive. It can take up to two months to create enough pottery to fill the 45 cubic foot down/draught kiln. Items in the gift shop are not sold on line or

the only way to enjoy the beauty of these handcrafted gems.

Now onto the wine cellar one of my favorite places to visit. The Abbey first starting selling wine in the early 1960's: in an effort to support the Abbey Schools. The Abbey has never made the wine sold contrary to popular belief. The Abbey allowed the Brookside Winery of Guasti, of California to sell wine under the "Assumption Abbey' label. Labels were printed in Germany and the Abbey received royalties for the use of their name. The Brookside Winerv was sold in the mid 1980's the vinevard was replaced with a housing development. The monks came to an agreement with San Antonio Winery of Los Angeles, the labels are printed in the Abbev Press, Labels are sent to California and come back with wine bottles glued to them. As luck would have it Cabernet and Meriot were out of stock (my wines of choice) re-stocking can take up to two months, just in time for Christmas.



#### "In a One-Room Schoolhouse"

by, Don Taskila - Regent, ND One-Room Schoolhouses (the kind of schoolhouse that Laura Ingalis Wilder, Author of the Little House on the Prairie series- studied and taught in herself) were commonplace throughout rural portions of North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, and Wyoming. Yes, in fact, in All of America before 1861 when primary education became compulsory, a lot of people in the United States received their education in a oneroom schoolhouse. One-Room Schoolhouses thrived in both the 19th & 20th centuries serving many rural or isolated regions, several of these schools had a bell at the ridge of the roof. The ringing of the school bell announced important times to the school's students, such as marking both the start of the school day and its ending, as well as recess breaks. America's One-Room Schools still exist although they've dwindled from 190.000 in 1919, to fewer than 400 sprinkled across the United States today.

We have come a long way from the simplicity of the wellknown little One-Room 'White' Schoolhouse, though it needs to be noted that some One-Room Schoolhouses were painted 'Red'. "The Little Red Schoolhouse ... Why was it 'Red'?" There are countless references to the Little Red Schoolhouse in history and literature. The references are vivid, conjuring our image of the typical oneroom school, although country schools were often built of logs or brick, or of clapboard siding painted red, white, yellow, or even blue. The question may be asked again....why red? The original pioneer One-Room Schoolhouses were built of hewn wood logs, whereas the see-through cracks were plastered with clay or mud to hold back the wind and weathering COLD. These buildings were

not painted- 'Until about, after the Civil War Time' houses, barns, and schoolhouses were covered with sawmilled boards (lumber). Buildings then started being painted to give them paletted color and protect the wood from the ravages of seasonable weather. In the early days of the northeastern United States, little 'Red' Schoolhouses were as common as red barns. Why? Because in the early days there was no scarcity of iron ore. When iron ore- or iron oxide- was ground fine, it could be used as an inexpensive paint pigment generally called 'Venetian Red'. In those early days of making color paints, one liquid with which iron oxide 'Red' pigment was mixed was none other than "Hello, Buttermilk". Eventualiy, 'White' Schoolhouses came into being when the United States started mining its own lead supply (rather than expensively importing it), and the price of lead oxide, first used to make 'White' paint- dropped, making it cheaper and more popularly accepted. Today ... Paint manufacturers have replaced (health and environmentally hazardous) white lead with a less toxic substitute, titanium white (based on the pigment titanium dioxide), which was first used in paints in the 19th century. Titanium dioxide is often coated with silicon or



aluminum oxides for durability.

Now that I can tell you that 'Red' and 'White' paint mixed properly can make "PINK", let's continue our history walk "In a One-Room Schoolhouse". Let's revisit what going to school was like in the late 1800s? To start with, imagine everyone in school sharing only one teacher (male or female) in one classroom. Usually, only one teacher would typically have students in the first through eighth grades and taught them all. The number of students varied from six to 40 or more. Sometimes the youngest children sat in the front, while the older students sat in the back, but really seating was left to the teacher's discretion. The teacher usually taught reading, writing, arithmetic, history, and geography. Students memorized and recited their lessons. Their computer was a set of encyclopedias. The teacher's desk may have been on a raised platform at the front of the room, and there was a wood/coal-burning stove. The bathroom was outside in an outhouse.

There are volumes that can written about One-Room Schoolhouses, but I'm going to close by mentioning 'Lunchtime'. Moms would make the

school lunches for their children. She would typically pack thick slices of homemade bread around layers of jelly and peanut butter, wrapped in wax paper. Sometimes those two slices of bread held a slab of Spam. An apple, an orange, or a brownie might have come with the sandwich. There were nine children in my dad's family, he and his two brothers each shared six sisters. His mother made six loaves of bread at a time. She had the old-fashioned bread box filled with flour, purchased in 50-pound or 100-pound cloth bags. In that flour bin sat a hand-operated sifter. My dad had vivid memories of his mother kneading the dough, rolling it over and over in flour, placing the dough in bread pans, opening the big door of the wood-burning oven, and placing six bread pans inside, then closing the door with a hot pad. Some kids brought their lunch in syrup cans or lard cans that had nice carrying handles. Maybe about half the kids had a rectangular lunch box.

#### Reflections on the Words of Life

by Pastor Paul Ferrie, Grace Reformed Church of the Lord Jesus, New Leipzig

I'd like for us to begin looking together at a very exciting and encouraging book in the Bible which sets forth the great sovereignty and power of God in the affairs of men and nations. It is also one of the most attacked books in the Bible-the book of Daniel. Why is this book so opposed by critics? Because it is so full of the miraculous. In a day when probably a majority of those on our planet are denying the existence of God and desirous of eradicating all thoughts of God from our thoughts, the book of Daniel is a nuisance. There is hardly a page you can turn to in the book where the sovereignty and supernatural power of God are not made manifest. Another thing that bothers

the critics about this book is the fact that Daniel is full of the most amazing prophecies, many of which have already been fulfilled to the letter. Some of the prophecies focus on the rise and fall of four major kingdoms. These kingdoms began with the Babylonian Empire, followed by the Medo-Persians, Greeks, and finally Rome. In these prophecies are revealed--sometimes in remarkable detail-what would occur over the next four hundred years of history. Now we can only marvel at the omniscience of God who revealed such things to His servant Daniel

The late Dr. R.C. Sproul spoke about the view of many in our day that the universe is a "closed system." This means that the universe is closed to outside influence and is basically the product of what goes on inside of it.

But the teaching of Scripture, and particularly the book of Daniel, is that the universe is not only an open system, but it is God's system. He created it, and He governs it after the counsel of His will and for His good pleasure. He is the God who is both able, and, at times, finds it within His good pleasure to reveal His secrets to His people as He did to Daniel. He is also the God who is able and finds great pleasure in intervening in the affairs of men on behalf of His people, even if it sometimes means overruling His own natural laws. Daniel is full of encouragement for the people of God through all generations. As a young man Daniel was taken captive by the Babylonians, separated from his family, and brought to live in a pagan nation, far from his beloved homeland of Judah. Yet he lived through the seventy- year captivity to see God fulfill His promise given

by the prophet Jeremiah that He would restore His people to their own land after seventy years. The book of Daniel shows us that God is able to make His people stand in an environment which is opposed to God and His Word. It's one thing to live for God when the government is supportive and the spiritual climate of the country is one of revival. But it is quite another to live for God when the government is oppressive and hostile and when there are only a handful of those seeking to walk with the Lord. Yet, these are the very conditions under which Daniel not only lived, but thrived and remained faithful to the Lord. The book of Daniel ought to be an encouragement to us in showing us that real spirituality and personal integrity often grow best, not when conditions are such that Christians are pampered and protected like plants in a greenhouse, but rather when they are exposed to every kind of adversity. This book is a testimony to the faithfulness of God to His people.

Lord willing, next time we shall consider more about this wonderful book, but I want to close by asking an important question: Is the God of Daniel your God? We are living in a country that is becoming more and more like Babylon in its hostility to Christianity. Do you have the comfort of knowing that God is your loving Heavenly Father who will take care of you and see you through whatever might come your way in this life? Do you know that when you die, you will be ushered immediately into the presence of the Lord Jesus to spend a happy eternity with Him? If not, you can. Simply go to God with a sincere heart, telling Him that you realize you are a sinner who needs His forgiveness and salvation and that you are relying only on the payment which the Lord Jesus Christ accomplished on the cross to restore you to a right relationship with Him, God never refuses anyone who truly comes to Him in this way.



- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda

Preheat oven to 350° F and lightly grease a 9-inch round cake pan. In a medium bowl, mix together the eggs and oil. Add the cinnamon, white and brown sugars, and vanilla extract and mix until combined. Add the flour, salt, baking soda, and baking powder, and mix until thoroughly incorporated. Fold in the apples and the nuts and pour batter into prepared pan. Bake until a toothpick nserted into the center comes out clean, about 45 minutes. Let cool for 15 minutes before slicing and serving. Enjoy!


