Then I noticed the lady in front of me handing out her credit card. As I drove up to the window to pay myself, the cashier simply stated "that lady just paid for your breakfast". I cannot explain the feeling I got inside when she told me that. Wow, what a blessing, to think I had done something so small for her, and yet, it was appreciated. It could have been any of the two or three other cars that were ahead of me, each with a car load of kids, who could have been on the receiving end of her generosity. But because neither took the small amount of time to let her back out, they missed out on the blessing.

This reminds me of my own story in giving to others. I had stopped by a busy produce stand, and purchased a bag with six tomatoes for \$3.00, knowing I would not eat them all. Then I saw a very poor man on a bicycle as he passed by and slowly looked over at all the new fruits and vegetables, staring as he passed by. And as I left, I felt like I needed to do something for him. So I pulled up beside him, let down my passenger side window and said, "Here, take this." And as he reached in the window to take the single tomato from my hand, he looked me straight in the eyes and softly said,

"Thank you". A fifty cent tomato, given out of pure love for a stranger, and then to see the appreciation in his eyes. And at that moment as I stared deeply into his eyes, I could tell he was filled with the Holy Ghost, and it was almost as if I was looking into the eyes of Jesus Christ himself. It was so powerful of a moment that I couldn't say a single word back to him, but slowly drive off.
