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ENAMELLING

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ERIC WALKER

Eric was one of the founding members of our club, being involved right from the very beginning back in 1929. He was not only popular but had the knack of making things happen, cajoling others into various tasks that helped the club grow.

Eric filled many of the club's appointments over the years but his service to the club was especially impressive during the war years when he coordinated the sending of parcels and letters to our club members on active service all over the world. By then the club had established the Hobo Run, the Annual Dinner, Club Magazine and regular club runs and despite all the adversity of the war years, Eric was one of the key members that made sure the club survived and prospered.

Eric farmed in Catherine de Barnes and Walker's Farm became a key part of club life for many years, especially where Bicycle Polo was concerned as this was an incredibly popular aspect of club life back then.

Eric, and his colleagues in the club at the time, went through so many hardships to develop and maintain the ethos of the club and all its varied activities during the most desperate war years; it is well worth our while nowadays ensuring we don't let these club traditions slip into disuse. We all owe a lot to Eric.

TOMMY GODWIN

Tommy was one of the most-loved characters in the history of our club. A phenomenal athlete on the track he led a disciplined life and inspired friendship and loyalty by all who came into contact with him.

Despite his friendly demeanour Tom was a ferocious athlete on the track and, at the time he raced, grass-track racing was also tremendously popular. He regularly mopped up national titles on both hard track and grass and even though he won over many longer distances he had great speed so a sprint finish (with a bit of physical intimidation) was always his favourite hunting ground. Handicap races were tremendously popular in the 1940's so Tom regularly had to work his way through other riders to get to the finish line as he invariably started off in scratch position at the back.

His greatest racing achievements were undoubtedly his two medals in the 1948 London Olympic Games in the kilo and team pursuit.

After his racing career ended Tom not only set up his own successful bike shop in King's Heath but also became Team Manager of the Great Britain team. He worked closely with Hugh Porter who won 4 World Championships at the time and of course a young Mick Bennett was coached, nurtured and developed on to Olympic success by Tom.

Tom went on to become President of our club and perhaps his greatest pleasure in life, other than his close-knit family, was being a Guest of Honour at the 2012 London Olympics and carrying the Olympic torch when it passed through Solihull that year. Tom lived and breathed the Olympic ideals and everyone in the club sorely misses him.

GRAHAM WEBB

Our own Graham Webb was viewed as one of the most naturally gifted riders the country has ever produced. When he joined the club in the 1960's his reputation quickly grew and there are numerous amusing anecdotes.

Graham started off with club time trials but soon added the track to his interests and of course the road. He was a superb time triallist and pursuiter and in 1965 broke the British One Hour Record held by the world-class rider Les West.

Selected for the World Championships in The Netherlands in 1967, Graham first rode the track in Amsterdam but was disappointed by his performance. He still wanted the chance of a rainbow jersey and so rode over 200 kilometres to where the World Road Race Championships were being held in South Limburg. The rest is history. Riding against such international stars as Roger de Vlaeminck he rode away to win on his own and became the Amateur World Road Race Champion.

Graham turned professional shortly afterwards but unfortunately was not well treated by his team and he quickly became disillusioned and finished racing. He went on to live in Belgium, adopting Belgian nationality. He was something of an enigma but just ask our older members about his racing exploits and you will appreciate what a talent this man had. Sadly Graham passed away in Belgium just a few years ago after a long illness but not before he had added several Masters World titles to his victories.

BOB MAITLAND

Bob was one of the club's trailblazers, having joined in the 1940's. He was an incredibly successful road cyclist winning numerous national and international honours at a time when going abroad to race was a major undertaking when there was no support or funding from our national federation.

Successes included winning the National Hill Climb Championship in 1945, winning the National Team Time Trial with clubmates Bowes and Moreton, winning the National Road Race Championships in 1948 and leading the Solihull CC to a team victory in the same race with Dick Bowes and Tom Buckley. Bob won the highly prestigious Beacon Mountain Time Trial – the time trial that everyone wanted to win – in 1948, 1949 and 1950. He raced extensively abroad including the Peace Race in Eastern Europe.

Bob came 7th in the London Olympic Road Race in 1948 and led Great Britain to a Silver medal in the team competition.

In 1955 he rode superbly in the Tour de France and it was his presence at this race that inspired our own Harry Reynolds to replicate that achievement just a few years later.

Bob was not just a fast rider. He was immensely popular and one of those people that made things happen and, at a time of change in cycling, he left the Solihull CC on friendly terms and established the Concorde Road Club whose club colours closely mirror those of the Solihull. There was a friendly rivalry between both clubs but no bad feeling and it is a measure of Bob just how popular he was right across the country.

Sadly Bob passed away a few years ago but his achievements won't be forgotten for many years.

DICK BOWES

Dick's name might not be known to our younger members but after joining the club in the 1940's he developed into being a top international racing man in the 1950's and inspiring many other club members, such as Harry Reynolds, to set their sights high. Indeed Dick became a great mentor to young Harry who quickly stepped up to the mark. Dick contributed to club life in many ways, always playing his part by helping at events and indeed filling numerous club appointments. He won the first Manx International Road Race in 1952, represented Great Britain at numerous World Championships and was an Olympian in both the London and Helsinki Olympics in 1948 and 1952. The night before the Olympic Road Race in London, several members of the club rode down to London through the night to support the two riders (Bob Maitland and Dick himself) we had in the race (not forgetting Tommy Godwin riding the track elsewhere) and because of a shortage of equipment for the British team, they laid out their spare tubs and spanners in the pits to help the British riders. Our members were disappointed that on the day Dick was listed as a reserve but he went on to make up for this disappointment with further international honours and of course the next Olympics.

Dick's racing achievements are too numerous to count but in addition to his success in the Isle of Man he was 7th in the World Amateur Road Race Championships and won the first ever open road race organised by the National Cycling Union when he won in spectacular style, catching the race winning break on the final run in and outsprinting them for victory.

What makes Dick special was not only his superb international racing career but also how he stayed loyal to the club during a period of tremendous change in competitive cycling. He was the racing man that everyone looked up to and because of him we had many members coming through in the 1950s and 1960s who wanted to, and did, emulate him in international events.

HARRY AND KEITH REYNOLDS

Harry and Keith are both well known to all of our current members, as they are still active cyclists. Harry was at the peak of his career in the late 1950's achieving numerous successes on the road at a time when Great Britain had a particularly strong set of riders. He led the Solihull CC squad of Pete Janes and Dick Bowes to team victory in the Manx International in 1956 and represented Great Britain at the Olympic Games on the road where he won a Silver medal. Turning professional Harry spent much time racing abroad and he rode the Tour de France in 1960 where he unfortunately crashed out with a broken collarbone. Harry won the National Junior Road Race Championships in 1953, was 3rd in the senior event in 1956 and won the veterans event in 1979!

Keith emulated Harry in many ways enjoying a superb career on the road. Having won the Peter Buckley National Junior Series in 1981 he went on to ride with distinction as an amateur where he won a Commonwealth Games Gold Medal in the team time trial in Edinburgh in 1986 along with several national championships along the way. Keith enjoyed a successful professional career lasting ten years, at a time when the sport's distinction between amateur and professional classes was changing and went into the 1989 Milk Race on the last day holding the yellow jersey, having won two stages, but was cruelly robbed of overall victory by riders from Raleigh working at any cost to prevent a win by Keith's rival Falcon team. Keith also won the highly prestigious Lincoln GP in 1993.

Keith now works as part of the Great Britain Cycling Team being responsible for their logistics operations.

In their spare time, Harry rides an electric bike, beating our top riders going uphill and Keith wins club time trials whenever he feels like it to keep himself active!

DAN GORDON

Dan is a member of the legendary Gordon family – all of whom have made their indelible mark on the history of the Solihull Cycling Club!

Despite suffering from visual impairment, Dan has achieved success in both sporting and academic terms. As a track and field athlete he represented Great Britain on many occasions between 1995 and 2003 in the 400 metres, High Jump and Long Jump and medalled in the European Championships. He was approached by British Cycling in 2003 who wanted to test his athletic ability and suitability for cycling and in his test ride, without any preparation whatsoever, he beat the British record for a flying 200 metres on the track. Riding tandem events he went on to win three National Championships, become double European Champion and win the World Cup. He was, highly controversially, robbed of an almost certain Paralympic Gold in Athens when he was disqualified for a mechanical issue in the kilometre time trial, having broken the world record just two weeks before the Games.

Dan then focussed on his academic career and has since become Principal Lecturer in Exercise Physiology at the Anglia Ruskin University.

The entire Gordon family have been much-loved and indeed inspirational members of our club. Roy Gordon achieved considerable sporting success as one of the Midland's top time triallists having already represented Warwickshire at cricket. And of course he led the A Run for many years. Margaret has been one of the longest ever serving club secretaries (perhaps even the longest?) and both Roy and Margaret were awarded life membership in recognition of their numerous contributions to club life. Tim Gordon is following in the footsteps of Roy, contributing to many club promotions and organising the club cyclo cross. Tim's children, Alex, James and Steph also take part in many club events.

The Gordon Family are a hard act to beat and epitomise everything we stand for as a club.

TREVOR BULL

Trevor Bull was a highly successful rider, having joined the club in the late 1960's. Whilst he was best known for being a top track sprinter, he was also a highly accomplished road rider and enjoyed a long professional career both on road and track.

In the late 1960's the club had a rich seam of talent with many of our riders taking part in all disciplines. Mick Bennett and Steve Tonry were both rivals of Trevor and of a similar age but Trevor also came up against club rivals Roy Cromack, Graham Webb, Barry Moss, Richard Travis and many more. A young Trevor became National Team Pursuit Champion with Webb, Cromack and Moss in 1966 and also won the 1 mile national track record in the same year. He won numerous national track medals and was selected to represent Great Britain in the Tokyo Olympics where he memorably climbed a very high flagpole to successfully "borrow" the Olympic flag that was flying over the stadium. He also won a Bronze medal in the Commonwealth Games and claimed victory in the highly regarded Muratti Cup.

Trevor went on to enjoy a superb professional career on the road from 1968 to 1981, which is an achievement in itself in terms of career span, and won many races with his ferocious sprint.

In his later years off the bike, Trevor remained in close contact with the sport and spent many hours working with riders with visual impairment.

ROY CROMACK

Roy Cromack was, along with our own Paul Carbutt, one of the most incredible all rounders the sport has ever seen. Roy won medals in every distance and discipline from 4000 metres on the track to the National 24 Hours Championships on the road.

Roy joined the club in the mid 1960's and was part of our "golden crop" of riders at that time who were all riding and winning at national and international level. Roy's victories and achievements are too numerous to mention in this short summary but include winning the National 10 mile scratch race on the track in 1966, winning the team pursuit championship with fellow clubmates from the Solihull, always achieving highly in the British Best All Rounder Competition and even riding the Peace Race – one of the hardest amateur stages in the World behind what was then the Iron Curtain.

It seems incredible that Roy could ride club runs, even the Hobo Run, then turn up to race and win over 4000 metres at a national level on the track, ride road races and then go on to ride the National 24 Hour Time Trial Championships in 1969 where he smashed the record to become the first ever rider to beat 500 miles – 507 miles to be exact – beating his nearest rival by over 15 miles. His record stood for many years.

Roy was an Olympian, representing Great Britain at the 1968 Olympics where he performed with distinction. His career as a schoolteacher took him all over the UK and into the RAF where he travelled widely but he always kept a special bond with the club and his team mates of that time.

T C (Tommy) GODWIN

He started racing on the track as a member of the Rover R C C.

In 1939 he started racing in open events and won a gold medal in a 1000 metre sprint and a bronze in 5 miles grass.

Won the BSA Gold Column outright with wins in 1945, 46 and 47.

At Fallowfield in 1949 he took the Muratti Gold Cup outright watched by 15000 spectators after previously winning in 1946 and 47 and taking 2nd place in 1948. This was for the 5 miles event run by Manchester Wheelers Club. When he refused to sell the trophy back he was told he could not race at Manchester again and Tommy told them what he thought in plain words.

In 1948 he won two bronze medals medals at the Olympic Games.

In 1951 he won the BSA Vase outright at the Bournville meeting.


He was British Team Manager at the Tokyo Olympics in 1964.
