- All exhibits must have been grown by the Exhibitor except in Floral arrangement Classes. Pot plants must have been in the possession of the Exhibitor for at least 3 months prior to the Show.
- 2 Entries will only be accepted from fully paid up members of the ASH PARISH GARDEN CLUB provided they do not cultivate their gardens for the purposes of profit.
- 3 The Committee must be given the right to visit the gardens before or after the shows.
- 4 No Exhibitor may enter more than 1 entry in any 1 class.
- Two or more Exhibitors from the same family may exhibit produce from the same plot of land, providing their combined entries in any 1 class does not exceed 2.
- The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry and in such an event is not required to give any reason or explanation.
- All entries must reach the Show Secretary by the date shown on the schedule. All entries received after that date will only be accepted at the Show Secretary's discretion.
- 8 All Exhibits <u>MUST</u> be staged between the times shown on the schedule.
- Bowls, dishes or vases etc. are provided for staging except where the schedule states otherwise. They **MUST** be used.
- No unauthorised person will be allowed in the Hall during Judging.
- Judges shall be empowered to withhold awards or prizes if they consider exhibits are below the required standard. The judge's decision will be final.
- 12 After being staged, no exhibitor may remove or tamper with any exhibit before the award presentation is complete.
- All exhibits, personal property etc. shall be at the owners risk and the Committee will not hold itself liable for damage or loss from any cause.
- 14 Floral exhibits will be judged in accordance with the NAFAS 2015 Competitions Manual



Ingredients:-

175g SR Flour Pinch of Salt

1 level tsp baking powder 2 eggs

100g softened butter 100g soft brown sugar

½ tsp vanilla extract2 tbsp milk550g mincemeatIcing sugar

Topping:-

100g SR Flour75g caster sugar75g chilled butter, diced25g flaked almonds

Method:-

- 1 Preheat the oven to 180C/Gas mk 4. Grease a 9" spring release tin.
- **2 Topping:** Place flour, butter and sugar in a food processor and mix to a coarse crumb (if no food processor make by hand as for pastry) Stir in the almonds
- **3 Cake:** Sift the flour, salt and baking powder into a bowl. Add the softened butter, brown sugar, eggs vanilla and milk. Beat to a soft cake mixture. Spoon into the tin and spread mixture level.
- **4** Fork the mincemeat over the batter. Sprinkle with the topping. Bake for 45-50 mins. Cool in the tin before removing the sides and sprinkle with icing sugar

- 4. The vase shall be viewed from all directions.
- 5. The collection shall be judged out of 20 points apportioned as follows.

Condition of flowers and stems 6pts Shape and texture of flowers & foliage 6pts Colour 4pts Uniformity 4pts

- 6. Stems in the collection shall not show seed heads or berries.

 Stems may show foliage which is growing naturally and still attached.

 Saturated "Oasis" or stem positioning material may be used.
- 7. Accessories such as bows, other foliage, string or wire etc. are not allowed.
- 8. The vase used may be any shape and size but see note iii below. The vase may be made from any suitable material and should be proportionate to the collection on show. No marks are awarded for the vase itself.

Failure to abide by these rules will lead to disqualification.

- i) Flowering stems may be taken from any home-grown plants.
- ii) Only fresh flowers are to be used. Dried flowers, silk or artificial flowers are not allowed.
- iii) A vase, by definition, is a vessel which can be used to contain flowers and which is taller than it is wide.
- iv) The points awarded shall be marked clearly by the Judge on the Exhibitors' score cards.

- 1. TOP TRAY is class 192 in the annual Autumn Show.
- 2. Prizes will be Garden Centre tokens of value as follows, (typically)

 1^{st} prize £15 2^{nd} prize £10 3^{rd} prize £5

3. TOP TRAY is a collection of three types of vegetables from the eight types listed below. The quantity of each vegetable needed for the collection is given in brackets.

Beetroot (3)Carrots (3) Courgettes (2)Onions (3)**Parsnips** (3)Potatoes (3)Runner beans (3 pods) Tomatoes (3)

4. Each vegetable type will be marked out of 30 points apportioned as follows.

A maximum of 10 points in each of the following 3 categories. Size. Condition. Uniformity.

The total points available for the collection are therefore, a maximum of 60.

5. All vegetables shall be displayed for effect, without bending any part of them, within an area measuring 45cms x 60cms.

A tray or board may be used for the display or the area may be marked on the show table.

If a tray used has a raised lip or bead at its edges, the internal boundary dimensions shall not exceed 45cms x 60cms.

A black backing cloth is permitted. A tray may be painted.

6. Parsley is allowed for garnishing. No other foliage or accessories such as plates, sand or rings are allowed.

Failure to abide by these rules will lead to disqualification.

NOTES:-

- i) Beetroot Carrots and Parsnips must have foliage trimmed to 7.5 cms
- ii) Onion tops may be tied or whipped with raffia or string.
- iii) Beans must be displayed with some stalk attached.
- iv) Tomatoes must be displayed with calyces attached.
- v) The Judge may handle exhibits and open pods etc. to assess quality.
- vi) The points awarded shall be marked clearly by the Judge on the Exhibitors' score cards.
