25 Years of Showing Up for Animals

As we celebrate 25 years of service in Southern Nevada, we're reminded that prevention is not only possible—it's powerful. At Heaven Can Wait Animal Society, we focus on stopping the flow of animals into an already overwhelmed system by addressing the root causes of overpopulation: lack of access to basic care, unplanned litters, and unchecked community cat reproduction.

Through our high-volume, low-cost spay and neuter clinic, we serve an average of 14,000 animals each year—including family pets, displaced animals in need of preadoption care, and free-roaming community cats. Since 2020, we've delivered over 50,000 vaccinations and nearly 7,000 microchips, helping protect thousands of animals from preventable illness, separation, and suffering.

Our work doesn't replace the urgent need for rescue and sheltering, but it helps reduce the pressure on those systems—especially as most pets entering shelters are not spayed or neutered. Every animal we spay or neuter helps prevent an average of 10 additional animals from being born into uncertainty. For every one animal spayed or neutered, three fewer animals enter the shelter system, where they risk illness, stress, or euthanasia. And with each shelter intake costing communities up to \$1,000, the economic impact is just as significant.

Our approach is collaborative. We partner with shelters, rescue groups, community organizations, and local jurisdictions to expand services and reach the animals and caregivers who need us most.


We know we can't solve this alone. And thanks to our donors, volunteers, and partners, we don't have to. Together we're building a more compassionate, sustainable future for our entire community.

A System at Its Breaking Point

Across Southern Nevada, numerous factors contribute to an uncontrollable cycle of animal overpopulation that can't be solved without preventative action.



Care is Out of Reach for Pet Families

Pet families in underserved communities lack access to affordable spay and neuter, which contributes to animal overpopulation and preventable health issues.



Shelters and Rescues are Stretched Beyond Capacity

Shelters and rescues are overwhelmed by the number of animals entering the system. Space, time, and resources to meet the demand are limited, which leads to excessive euthanasia rates.



Community Cat Populations are Rapidly Rising

Free-roaming cat colonies are growing exponentially, perpetuating a cycle of uncontrolled breeding, disease, and suffering.



Prevention Is the Missing Piece

While immediate intervention and rescuing animals is essential, there is a pressing need to "stop the flow" of animals entering overwhelmed systems. This is where Heaven Can Wait steps in.






The Cascading Impact of Foundational Care

Animals enter Nevada's overcrowded animal welfare system for many reasons, such as family hardships like job loss or the inability to find pet-friendly housing, which can lead to surrender or abandonment. They may also be confiscated in cases of illegal breeding, neglect, or abuse. Factors like these cannot be changed overnight.

However, other causes like unplanned litters, unintentional separation from families, preventable spread of disease, and uncontrolled community cat populations can be managed with foundational care (spay and neuter, vaccination, and microchipping).



Service Providers

Heaven Can Wait slows the flow of animals entering the welfare system through spay/neuter, vaccinations, and microchipping. While all shelter and rescue efforts are vital, they treat the symptoms of a bigger issue: animal overpopulation.

Originally centered on rescue and adoption, Heaven Can Wait shifted its focus in response to the growing issue of animal overpopulation.

Overpopulated Shelters, Rescues, and Sanctuaries **Shelters** temporarily house lost, abandoned, or surrendered animals.

Shelter environments are not suitable for long-term animal well-being, and many face the risk of euthanasia if they can't find a permanent home quickly enough.

Rescues and sanctuaries provide relief to overcrowded shelters, rehabilitate abused or neglected animals, and recruit permanent homes.

These organizations are stretched beyond capacity, with long waitlists and limited resources. "How many buckets do we have to fill before we fix the faucet?"

Spay and Neuter Clinic

By addressing the root cause of overpopulation, we conserve critical resources, improve animal health and quality of life, and relieve pressure on shelters and rescue organizations.

We offer high volume, high-quality, and low-cost spaying and neutering to:


- Pet families who need affordable access to foundational care
- Displaced, surrendered, or neglected pets in need of foundational care before being placed in foster homes or adopted
- Community Cats cared for through Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR)

The clinic also provides vaccinations and microchipping to ensure

animals are easily identifiable and protected from illness.

Our foundational care services have many benefits:

- Keeps pets in their homes
- Prevents medical and behavioral issues
- **Prevents unwanted litters**
- Improves overall health of cats and dogs
- Reduces shelter intake
- **Controls community cat populations**

Every animal spayed or neutered helps prevent an average of 10 puppies or kittens from being born into uncertain or potentially unsafe conditions.



For every animal spayed or neutered, 3 fewer animals end up in the shelter system, where they might face stress, illness, or euthanasia.

Community Cat Program

Community cats are cats that live outdoors, can be either socialized or unsocialized, and can live in colonies with designated caregivers or be entirely independent. Some have lived without human contact for generations, while others were pets that were lost or abandoned.

These cats face significant risks perpetuated by uncontrolled population growth, including hunger, disease, and injury.

Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR)

One of the most effective methods for managing community cat populations is Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR).

TNR stabilizes cat colonies by stopping further reproduction and improving behavioral and medical health.

Heaven Can Wait works closely with a network of humane trappers, including the Community Cat Coalition of Clark County (C5) and independent service providers. "The Community Cat program is a real life saver.
Fewer cats and kittens have to fight and suffer on the street looking for food, water, and shelter. TNR works."

How TNR works:

- 1 TNR partners humanely catch community cats.
- Our clinic provides spay and neuter surgeries, vaccinations, and lifesaving medical care.
- TNR partners return the cats to their original location to live their lives without overpopulating.

To help community members who are caring for free-roaming cats, our **Community Cat Action Fund** provides subsidies for Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) services.

Helping Pet Families Access Care When No Other Help Is Available


For pet families who don't qualify for neighborhood-based financial assistance programs, the Romeo Fund helps fill the gap. This fund was created to improve pet parent access to foundational care for those in need, regardless of their zip code.

With an average annual budget of \$2.2M, donations to Heaven Can Wait are also allocated towards special medical care, clinic operations, transport vehicles, medical supplies, team training, and more.

Strengthening the Animal Welfare System from the Start

Preventive care doesn't just benefit animals—it saves communities money. By reducing shelter intake through spay/neuter and TNR efforts, we free up resources and alleviate pressure on an overwhelmed system.







A Life Saved by Collaboration

Gummy Bear (or Gummy) is a blind community cat who found himself stranded on a rooftop—hungry, disoriented, and in need of urgent care. Our Community Cat Coordinator came to the rescue and brought him into our clinic. After a thorough exam, it was determined that neither of Gummy's eyes could be saved. The best option for his long-term comfort and health was a double enucleation (eye removal surgery). Thanks to the skilled hands of our veterinary team, Gummy's surgery went smoothly.

True to his name, Gummy Bear is irresistibly sweet. Though he can't see who's offering affection, he soaks up every cuddle with joy and gratitude. Our rescue partners at Amor Peludo helped match him with a forever family. Now, this former free-roaming cat is safe, healing, and thriving in a loving home.
