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



For the third time since 2020, professional musician **Mark Wood** has returned to Greenville High School for a concert on his **Evolution Tour** which included our Orchestras and Choirs. This year's event Saturday, March 9, 2024, was a sellout in the GHS gymnasium, having sold all 900 tickets that were available. GHS Instrumental music Director **JR Price**, GHS 1980, has been the driving force making this happen each time, and this year the GHS choirs were included in the production. The Vocal music Director is **Chelsea Martin Whirledge**, GHS 2007, and this year's program was expanded by adding vocals to and alongside the orchestra performances. This packed the gym more than the previous performances did and gave a new dimension to this complete musical presentation.



Mark Wood was one of the founders of the **Trans-Siberian Orchestra**, and was their original string master. Now he visits up to 75+ high schools across the country per year teaching their orchestras and blending his electric violin with the school musicians' experience. His programs bring together classical music with contemporary styles such as rock, jazz, and blues in order to provide a custom, hands-on learning experience for high school musicians. In 2010, NBC's *"The Today Show"* featured the Electrify Your Strings program filmed at Oak Hills High School in Cincinnati. In 2019 he had a three-day school teaching program at Wyoming High School in Cincinnati before ever appearing in Greenville, and he has been to many other schools across the country.

Mark's wife **Laura Kaye** was added to the performances on this trip and she has been a seasoned singer, songwriter, performer, and vocal coach for over two decades. Laura established **Electrify Your Choir** to empower young singers, and in the past, has provided background vocals for **James Brown, Aretha Franklin, Lenny Kravitz, and Sean Lennon**, along with countless television shows and advertisements. Utilizing techniques developed during her own

extensive career in the music industry, Laura coaches students on how to tap into their individual creative potential through self-expression and performance techniques. Laura is an Artist Mentor which involves working with choir students in their all-inclusive workshops that she and Mark teach, and informing so many high school students. Laura and Mark have been married since 1994 and have been professionally working together since 1988.



One time when Mark brought his music education program to GHS in the past was the last performance before the country shut down with COVID Pandemic in the spring of 2020. He was going to go from GHS to a school in Arizona but everything was cancelled due to the country's health crisis. When he returned to teaching about 18 months later, his first performance was back at GHS in November, 2021, resuming his touring with an excellent Christmas program. This was very reminiscent of the Trans-Siberian Orchestra's holiday performances.



Mark's professional music training began with a full scholarship to the Juilliard School of Music, a private performing arts conservatory in New York City. His music education program, **Electrify Your Strings**, has been featured on news programs nationwide and he is an Emmy Award winning composer. He has played with **Celine Dion**, **Billy Joel**, **Steve Vai**, **Westworld**, and **Lenny Kravitz**. His **Mark Wood Music Productions** creates music for use in film and television.

He grew up working in his father's woodworking shop in Port Washington, NY, and built his first violin at age ten. In the 1970s, he built his first solid-body electric Violin and this has evolved into the seven-string, aesthetically appealing model called the **Viper**, which has a tone

quality between acoustic and electric. His company, **Wood Violins**, makes custom-made electric four-, five-, six- and seven-string violins and cellos. He has been referred to as the Stradivarius of electric violins. For the past 15 years, he has held a **Mark Wood Rock Orchestra Camp** in Kansas for one week in July, where students can advance their skills to the next level and beyond. *Promotional poster:*



The equipment included an elaborate sound system with 4 crew members, lights, and staging frames. They conducted practices with the orchestra and choirs from 9:00 to 3:00 during the school day and again from 2:00 to 5:30 PM on Saturday. The program was from 7:00 to 8:30 that night. 

The Greenville High School Prom for this year took place Saturday night, May 4, at Romer's Catering and banquet hall, just off the traffic circle on East Main Street. This was the 17th year having it at this location which combines the dinner with the dancing and Prom events of the evening for the attendees and administration. This year 305 tickets were sold. All Juniors and Seniors were offered the chance to buy tickets and attend. Sophomores or others a year out of school could come with a current Junior or Senior. This year's lasted from 6:00 pm to 11:00 pm with an After Prom event held at the High School from 11:00 pm to 2:00 am. The theme this year was "New York".

Proms have been mentioned in the Chief yearbooks periodically since 1927. The first known (named) theme of a Prom was "Greenville H S Line", referring to a ship-theme in 1931. Before 1939 it was known as the Junior-Senior Reception. Most were held in the old High School gymnasium from 1932 to 1962. After moving to the new High School building in 1962, Proms continued at the High School from 1963 to 2006. Proms since 2007 have been held at Romer's Catering facility in downtown Greenville. Prom Courts were not recognized until 2003, and have continued to present. These were students not previously on the Homecoming Court last October.



Greenville Played a Significant Part in TWO Total Solar Eclipses

It might sound far-fetched, but there is an interesting connection between the first **total solar eclipse** in the United States and the one we experienced this year. The first eclipse that passed over Ohio was June 16, 1806, and this year's was April 8, 2024. Hundreds of visitors descended on Greenville this past April, which included many out-of-towners who lived in parts of the country that were not going to see the total eclipse. Greenville was along the line of the longest duration for the total eclipse, which was about four minutes of darkness. The path across the U.S.A. shows the route of the eclipse and the parts which had a total eclipse being between the outside lines. Greenville's location is represented by the red dot on this 2024 path route map. >>>>




Many families had friends present to have “watch parties” at their homes, and others gathered at the Greenville Public Library, Garst Museum, Darke County Parks Shawnee Prairie, City Park, downtown Greenville, the Fairgrounds, and many other smaller groups and public areas. Families with the Airstream trailers club were meeting at the Fairgrounds with hundreds of campers enjoying the festivities.

Those who witnessed the event noticed that at totality, the four minutes of darkness was darker than expected, it got cooler more quickly than expected, and the sun's rays could be seen shining along the horizon on areas outside of the totality. It was a sunny, beautiful day, not what weather predictors said it would be. This was the only sunny day of that week.

Now, to explain the connection with Greenville's far past in 1806. That was two years before Greenville was established as a city in 1808. The fort had been dismantled after the **Treaty of Greene Ville** was signed in 1795, and smaller homes existed where the soldiers' cabins were located inside the original fort lines. There was an Indian encampment west of Mud Creek along the west border of Greenville, south of the Greenville Creek.


This was called **Prophetstown** and was inhabited by 300 to 500 Shawnee Indians from 1805 to 1808. Indians would come and go and sometimes stay for weeks at a time. A central meeting house served the whole community for group meetings and ceremonies, and can be seen in this **Hal Sherman** painting of “**Prophetstown**”,

which was commissioned for the Garst Museum by **Kay Brown** in 2005. Some of the Indian tribes represented at Prophetstown were the Potawatomi, Sauk, Fox, Delaware, Miami, Iroquois, Seneca, Wyandot and Ottawa at different times. This artist's depiction is dated 1807.

The highly revered Chief of the Shawnee Indians was **Tecumseh** (1768-1813), and he was attempting to create a federation of Native American tribes across the continent. He was a war chief and a political leader. He did not attend the Treaty of Greene Ville, where the Indian tribes ceded most of Ohio to the U.S. Government. Tecumseh hoped to resist continued losses of land to the ever-expanding settlers coming into "his" land.

Tecumseh's brother, **The Prophet** (1775-1837), was named **Lalawethika** ("The Rattle" or "Noisemaker") and lived at the village. He was abandoned by his mother when he was four years old, and was a homely child who was lacking many physical abilities. As an adult, he was an alcoholic and was dependent on fellow tribesmen to feed and care for him. In 1805 he fell into a deep trance and his body was prepared for a funeral. He regained consciousness and claimed that the primary Shawnee God, **The Master of Life**, told him that the Indians must give up all white customs and products, such as guns, alcohol, iron cookware, and glass beads. He said that they must revert to their traditional ways and stop fighting with each other. He changed his name to **Tenskwatawa** ("The Open Door"). Many Indians were first skeptical of The Prophet, remembering the drunken ways of Lalawethika. His following grew throughout 1805 and he, along with his brother, formed this village across the creek from Greenville for his followers and naming it for himself. He became a spiritual leader of the Indians and he met with various tribes who were living in Ohio and Indiana.

General William Henry Harrison (1773-1841), was the Governor of the Indiana territory then and would eventually become the ninth President of the U.S. He saw Tecumseh and his followers as being a threat to the white settlement expansion. Harrison was one of a few men who were at the first Treaty of Greene Ville in 1795 which opened up the Northwest Territories for white settlement, and the second Treaty of Greene Ville in 1814 which was a friendship accord with the Indians. Earlier he had been the General in charge of the Northwest Territories.

Harrison tried to discredit Tecumseh and The Prophet by sending a letter April 12, 1806 (two months before the eclipse), demanding that their followers ask The Prophet to "cause the sun

to stand still, the moon to alter its course, the rivers cease to flow, or the dead to rise from their graves. If he does these things, you may then believe he has been sent by God.”


The Prophet immediately replied that within 50 days that “the Great Spirit would take the sun in her hands and hide it from us, and day would turn into night.” At 11:00 AM on June 16, 1806, this part of his promise came true as the sun was eclipsed for those in Ohio.

The Prophet’s fame grew even more when he predicted this 1806 total eclipse of the sun. Many scholars believed his brother Tecumseh had learned about the eclipse from some American scientist(s). Tecumseh could have learned of the upcoming eclipse from settlers on one of his travels. There were many “eclipse chasers” crossed the country looking for this phenomenon to occur. Knowledge of an eclipse could have been known across the country, and astronomy had been studied for many years before 1806. This could have been predicted in an almanac or could have been a topic of conversation between customers at various trading posts. Tecumseh told his brother to predict the eclipse. All of a sudden, The Prophet had great credibility after his prediction came true, and the word spread. There was no widespread knowledge of this eclipse known to the public. Harrison probably wished that he had not made his earlier statement.

To put into perspective the time of this eclipse, in 1806, **Thomas Jefferson** was the third President of the United States. **Merriweather Lewis** and **William Clark**, who met each other at Fort Greene Ville in 1795, were returning from the west coast completing their **Lewis and Clark Expedition**. Ohio’s population was rapidly growing from 46,000 in 1800 to 230,000 in 1810.

Tecumseh and The Prophet moved their increasing number of followers to another **Prophetstown** in 1808, which was located near present day Lafayette, Indiana, along the Tippecanoe River. The Prophet had become a true spiritual leader of the Indians. This new settlement grew so large that the white settlers became fearful and demanded the U.S. Government do something to protect them. General William Henry Harrison led the U.S. troops against the Indians at the **Battle of Tippecanoe**, Nov. 7, 1811. The American army won the battle, drove the Indians off, and burned Prophetstown, Indiana, to the ground. Harrison’s popularity grew and he successfully ran for President of the United States in 1840, using the slogan, “Tippecanoe and Tyler, too!”. Harrison was “Tippecanoe” and “Tyler” was **John Tyler**, his V.P. who became President one month into Harrison’s presidency after his sickness and death.



Sun flares can be seen shooting off the sun and this would not be visible to the naked eye or even through a filter, but did show up in conditions like this when the sun's view was actually blocked. This is most obvious in the two photos below.





These three pictures were taken just east of Greenville during the totality of the eclipse. Stars were seen in the sky at 3:10 in the afternoon, and this never happens on a sunny day (one is visible below and to the right of the sun in the left photo when enlarged). The other two photos show the sun shining outside of the area of the total eclipse about 60 miles away from Greenville, and sunlit areas are visible outside the total eclipse path. These pictures are looking to the west and to the north of Greenville.

The Prophet's prediction happened in Greenville in 1806 announcing that first total solar eclipse, and Greenville was strategically located near the middle of the path of totality for the 2024 eclipse. Many visitors descended on the Treaty City to see this event. One difference is that The Prophet was not here to offer his prediction this year.

Not many of us will be around in 2099 when the next total solar eclipse occurs. Only time will tell if Greenville plays an important part in the next similar eclipse. This year, it did happen and it was a real "crowd pleaser".

2024 Major School Awards

This year’s major Senior Awards were presented May 23, 2024, at the Senior Send-Off Assembly and video slide show in the gym of the Seniors and their baby pictures. The entire school was present for this event.

The highest awards given at GHS include the Citizenship Award, which was started by teacher **Mr. Eugene Phelps** in 1967 for outstanding citizenship and high moral character. The winner was Senior Class and FFA President **Jayden Hicks**, who will be attending Ohio State University to study Agriscience Education. Mr. Phelps taught Social Studies, History and Spanish at GHS from 1924 to 1969. (see right >>>>)



The Citizenship Award was separated into a boy’s award and a girl’s award in 1970 and the girl’s award became sponsored by **Miss Elizabeth Hill**, who taught music at GHS from 1930 to 1968. This year’s winner was **Lily Mowery**. (see right >>>>)



The **Paul Warner** Principal’s Leadership Award was presented by Mr. Warner’s grandson, **Dr. Alex Warner**, GHS 1967, to Jayden Hicks. This award also recognizes outstanding extra-curricular activities in the community, an outstanding role model for younger students and has earned the respect of the GHS staff. (<<<< see left)

The **Kathryn Griner** Academic Excellence Award was first given out in 1970 by the former teacher of English, French and was a Guidance Counselor and Dean of Girls, Kathryn Griner. This is given for outstanding test scores, scholastic achievement, is courteous, cooperative, and attentive. It usually goes to the Valedictorian or the number one grade point average in the Senior Class, and this year that is **Erin Leensvaart**. (see above right)



The **Jason Barker** Spirit Award went deservedly to **Carson Henry**, son of **Lauren Garrison Henry**, GHS 1998, and **Chad Henry**, GHS 1996. Carson is attending the University of Findlay and intends to study Animal Science, extending his genuine interest in animals. (See right >>>>)



The School **Courage** Award winner was **Ethan Sundahl**. (far right >>>>)



The **Jack Raudabaugh** Award is considered the pinnacle of awards at Greenville High School for athletic excellence. The winners were impactful, outstanding athletes in at least two sports, in the top one third of the class academically, are willing to make needed sacrifices in order to be a good athlete, are someone that other team members can “look up to”, and are a leader, not only in athletics, but other school activities as well. Mt. Raudabaugh was a teacher of math from 1937 to 1959, was a basketball coach, and became an Elementary Principal from 1959 to 1973. He established this award for athletic excellence in 1942 and the first winner was one of GHS’s all-time great athletes and former professional basketball player, **Bob Brown**, GHS 1942.

This year boy’s winner was **Jack Chick**, lettered two years in soccer, two years in basketball, one year in track, was a Captain, a scholar-athlete, an MVL scholar-athlete, Vocational Skills USA-VICA, and member of the National Technical Honor Society. He was MVP Offensive player in soccer, second team all-MVL in soccer, and was the Glass Cleaner (leading rebounder in basketball). He is the son of **Rick Curry** and **Stacy Chick**. He wants to become a lineman and work in Florida.

The Raudabaugh winner for girls went to **Josie Madden**, who lettered four years in soccer, one year swimming, played basketball two years, was a Captain, a scholar-athlete, an MVL scholar-athlete, and a member of Science Club, Student Council, Art Club, National Honor Society two years, National Technical Honor Society two years and President Senior year, member of the Careers With Children (CWC) program in Career Tech, was an FCCLA gold medalist, and the Business Professionals of America. She is the daughter of **David Madden** and **Kristina Hoyt Madden**, GHS 1995. She will attend Wright State University and study Nursing.

A special award was presented to the **David Ernst** family because of his contribution to the youth of our school, was a role model exhibiting outstanding ethics, soccer coach, and Board of Education member. Dave passed away this past year and his wife **Stacy Ernst** accepted the **OHSAA State Award** for contribution and service, along with their three sons, **Jordan**, **Addison** and **Avery**.

Editor’s note: The Ohio High School Athletic Association started this State Award in 2015 to honor someone outside the school who has contributed much service to the school and Athletic Department. The first two winners were **Dick Brown**, GHS 1964, in 2015, and **Kyle Kagey**, GHS 1969, in 2016.

Help keep us informed about recent events

Many of the obituaries published in the papers or by the funeral homes have biographies, relatives listed, and pictures of the decedent. We are listing the websites of the funeral homes which can provide this data to the public who asks. The sites listed have obituaries or archived obituaries on which you can click. Over 90% of the listed entries have website accessibility. Some of the older obits may be timed out or dropped, and may not still be there. If you cannot reach one of the ones by website, and would like a copy of a specific obituary we have listed, please let the Alumni Association know. We will send you a copy electronically or by mail of documentation that we have.

We have decided to go beyond the GHS graduates, and include those we can verify or remember attending GHS, even if that person did not graduate with his/her class. If he/she attended GHS in earlier years, then he/she is listed with the class with which that person would have graduated if he/she had stayed through commencement.

Our listings are arranged with oldest GHS alums listed first by class, his/her age at death, date of death, place of most recent residence, and the website where more information can be obtained. To find a deceased, you may use a search engine, like Google, and type in "person's name, the word > obituary, year, state, etc." This list is far from complete, using just the data we had access to, or could find. Many deaths are not listed anywhere.

Many funeral homes have websites with the written obituaries and some have pictures of the decedent. If you go to these websites, click on obituaries and find your person of interest by name or by date. The .com address next to each person's name will tell you which websites to go to, such as, for example, (*DignityMemorial*) after the name would mean to look at: www.dignitymemorial.com

Greenville Had Both High Points and Low Points in 2024


The city of Greenville suffered through two tornadoes early in 2024. The one the evening of March 14 traveled from Winchester, Indiana, through Union City and basically along Horatio-Harris Creek Road across Darke County and affecting areas within the Greenville City Schools district. The one at 8:15 pm May 7 devastated the Greenville Union Cemetery and the City Park went through the area at the High School from North Broadway through the Park to Wagner Avenue. It affected other areas at the edge of town and in the rural areas as it traveled towards Gettysburg. Many areas of the Park were closed to the public until the cleanup of broken trees was finished. 


The Greenville City Schools had a lot of damage from the May tornadoes, and it was about all on the buildings' exteriors. Both school buildings, the High School and the K-8 Building, were both in the direct path of the tornado that came through town that evening. Some trees were knocked down at the schools and the Memorial Hall, and the tennis courts were hit hard. The buildings' interiors were not hit but school was closed for the remaining three days of that week. The biggest problems were restoring electricity at the schools and re-opening the roads in the Park area so cars and buses could come through. Much of the Park was closed for weeks later. The use of the football field still is uncertain and some alternate plans are considered. It was not sure that the light poles were safe to climb. Damage to the bleachers had to be evaluated. Liability insurance and property insurance were addressed before a master plan can be made in determining the future of the 87-year-old concrete Harmon Field stadium. The astroturf was gouged, ripped, and moved and insurance concerns will determine its future.

The School Board must determine if they are going to proceed with making repairs to the current stadium or begin Phase 3 of the stadium renovation project which includes new metal bleachers, press box and new lighting, or whether to do short-term temporary fixes.
