President's Message

Fall is a favorite time of the year and it is now here, with the beginning of the school year, and fall sports and activities. Homecoming will be October 8 and 9, with the Parade being Thursday evening at 6:30 pm. The route is the traditional one from the old Marsh's lot on Martin Street, along Broadway to Harmon Drive, then east to the football field and ending at the Band Shell. A Pep Rally and the crowning of Chief Green Wave get the students charged up for the game, which will start at 7:00 pm on Friday evening. This year's opponent is another traditional one, being the Piqua Indians. Please visit our table near the concession stand at the game. The largest attended GHS school dance of the year, the Homecoming Dance, on Saturday evening, brings a conclusion to the week-long festivities.

A very sad incident played out on national television in July involving our GHS alumni family. On July 1 Kathryn "Kate" Steinle, 32 years old and a graduate of Amador Valley HS (California) 2001, was killed tragically and senselessly by whom the Police say was an illegal immigrant and many-times convicted felon, on Pier 14 along San Francisco Bay. She was accompanied by her father, Jim Steinle, GHS 1965, and Kaye Williams, GHS 1964, at the time of the shooting. Her mother, Liz (Joan) Sullivan (Steinle), GHS 1964, was at the family home in Pleasanton (about 30 miles east of the SF Bay and Oakland), waiting for their return. This has sparked a discussion about the sanctuary city policy status in America. Fox News television show host Bill O'Reilly has initiated the process that he hopes will lead to "Kate's Law" with input from Jim and Liz. This law would force mandatory imprisonment of illegal immigrant felons who have been deported and return to the U.S., if passed by the U.S. Congress and signed into law. On July 13, The O'Reilly Factor aired the world exclusive interview with Jim and Liz outlining this Law and relating their memories of Kate. This highly watched show was followed by Megyn Kelly's interview with

Kate's 33-year-old brother **Brad Steinle**, on the Fox News show *The Kelly File*. 

Lady Wave Softball Success

The Lady Wave Softball Program has attracted national attention again. Beginning in 2003, Coach Jerrod Newland, Springfield Shawnee HS 1997, has built an impressive program that is one of the tops in the state, and has compiled a record of 343 wins and 63 losses in his 13 seasons. This year's team finished 28-4, and was the "Division 2 Poll Champion in Ohio" (ending the season ranked Number 1 in the State in D-2) for the second time in the past four years. Also, for the third time, the Lady Wave broke into the *USA Today* newspaper Super 25 weekly poll top ranked high school softball teams in the country.

Pitcher Ally Russell had a 28-4 record this year, a 0.97 ERA, 214 strike outs, 12 shut-outs, and became the winningest pitcher in Lady Wave history. She was three-time first team All-Ohio pitcher, and two-time All American by the National Fast pitch Coaches Association (see NFCA.org), making second team this year. She becomes the second Lady Wave softball player to be named All-American – Jordyn Fisherback also was a two-time All American. Ally competed for the Ohio All Stars against the Junior Women's National Team this summer. She was the only senior on this year's young Wave team.

"Good things happen to kids who work hard," Coach Newland said about Ally's success, "She'll go down as one of the greatest Greenville athletes in school history."

Dan Hawley, '01, Ohio and U.S.A. National Champion Powerlifter

Dan Hawley, GHS 2001, tells the AlumNews about his recent success in and dedication to the sport of Powerlifting:

In 2007, a group at the Darke County YMCA headed by Mark Ridgeway was searching for members to start a powerlifting competition team. I had never competed before but said that I would. I competed in the 114 pound junior class, benched 155 lbs., won my weight class and was shocked. In August, 2007, I competed in my first full meet in the U.S.A.P.L. (United States of America Powerlifting) and won the 114 pound junior division, with a squat of 200 lbs., bench of 175 lbs., a deadlift of 225 lbs., for a total of 600 pounds. I competed in the U.S.A.P.L. through 2010, winning my division in every meet I entered. I joined the N.A.S.A. (Natural Athletes Strength Assn.) in 2011 because the USAPL no longer held meets in Ohio.

I hold the state records for Ohio in the 132 pound open division, with a squat of 264 lbs., bench of 231 lbs., a deadlift of 302 lbs., for a total of 797 pounds. I also hold the state and national records in the unequipped division, 123 pound open division, with a squat of 282 lbs., bench of 248 lbs., a

deadlift of 330 lbs., for a total of 860 pounds (at a body weight of 121).

I don't believe I could have set these records if God had not put the right people in my life to motivate me on a daily basis. Other people who have contributed to my success besides Ridgeway, are Garrett Smith, Luke Thompson, Austin Littlepage, Rocky Pandey, Raygen Kramer, and the best liftoff person ever, Stephanie McNelly.

In the next two to three years, I want to break the 1,000 pound total club, and to be an inspiration to others. In the long term, I would like to see powerlifting in the Olympics. Not only does powerlifting help me in my day-to-day life, but it has blessed me with so many new friendships, and the ability to do things I never thought possible.

Jody Hole Harter, GHS 1995, has been named the new Principal of Woodland (Heights) Primary School (Greenville Schools grades K-2) with a two-year contract, after serving as Assistant Principal last year. Jody is from one of the best known "Big Families of GHS" and she is the fifth daughter of retired Judge Dick Hole, GHS 1955, and Barbara Davenport Hole, GHS 1959. At GHS Jody was a golf and basketball standout at GHS setting some team bests, and was Spanish Club President, Class Officer and Student Council member. She graduated from Ohio State University with a Bachelor's degree in Education, and then worked with autistic children at a Columbus Public school. She returned to Greenville to teach at Anthony Wayne preschool for nine years before moving on to Woodland. This may be the final year for the Woodland building since the new Kindergarten through eighth grade Greenville School building is expected to be operational in the Fall of 2016. Jody's Master's degree led to a Principal's Certificate from the University of Dayton paving the way for her upcoming job.

Jody is very excited about this coming year's first grade initiative in which each student will receive an iPad for his/her studies. Hopefully this plan will be effective and expand into other grades as funding allows. This is a far distance from the first grade days many of us remember reading books about Dick, Jane, Spot and Puff. She married **Todd Harter**, GHS 1994, who is the son of **J.L. Harter**, GHS 1964, and **Patty Harter**. Jody and Todd make their residence in the Greenville district and have three children in the Greenville schools: **Cali**, age 10, **Libby**, 8, and **Ellie**, 3.



A Girl Riding in the Moon in Spring Musicals

"Without a doubt this scene is one of the most spectacular acts ever performed on any stage," commented **Mr. Dwight Brown**, GHS Orchestra Director, in a newspaper article, March 9, 1957. He was referring to a young lady riding in a moon raised above the audience in the St. Clair Memorial Hall during various Spring Musicals. These Spring Musicals were a collaboration of music instructors **Miss Elizabeth Hill** and **Mr. Dwight Brown**.

The first time this moon scene was used was in the Spring Musical of 1937, and the "girl riding" was Martha Brown Baker, GHS '37. The second time this was used was in the Spring Musical of 1946, with the "girl riding" being Gloria Shiverdecker Hole, GHS '47. The third "girl riding" occurred in the Spring Musical of 1957, and was Jeannie Lehman Jones, GHS '57. The fourth "girl riding" took place in 1962 was Gail Wade Moeller, GHS '62. These were all pictured in the yearbooks, and other views are in print from the 1937 show. Miss Hill and Mr. Brown jointly led the music department from 1930 through 1964, and the moon scene was not known to be used in years other than the ones mentioned here.



G.H.S. Commencement 2015

This year's **Senior Class of 2015** was the 141st class to graduate from Greenville High School. There were 206 receiving diplomas, showing the continuing trend of smaller graduating classes than those of the past. For comparison of each previous 10 year period over the last 100 years: 2005-243 graduates, 1995-235 grads, 1985-253 grads, 1975-303 grads, 1965-266 grads, 1955-148 grads, 1945-128 grads, 1935-128 grads, 1925-108 grads, 1915-51 graduates. This year's class has earned over \$1,300,000 in academic scholarships awarded at school's end. Due to inclement weather, the graduation ceremony was held in the G.H.S. Gymnasium. The photo of the packed gymnasium shows Senior Class President Evan Kiser leading the Class in turning their tassels at the conclusion of the Commencement ceremony. The final Top Ten class rankings were: **1. Krutant Mehta, 2. Kelly Snyder, 3. Erica Jeffers, 4. Erin Scott, 5. Adam Null, 6. Ben Fitzgerald, 7. Cody Sutherland, 8. Evan Kiser, 9. Gunnar Fustos,** and **10. Mason Rich.**

This year's **Valedictorian** is **Krutant Mehta**, who had a weighted GPA of 5.1. He is the son of **Jiten** and **Shital Mehta**, and is a life-long resident of Greenville. Krutant follows many former GHS Valedictorians in attending Wright State University, and using the advantage that WSU offers of a near-full-ride scholarship for high school valedictorians. Krutant will be an Engineering major in college. His sister **Prital Mehta**, was the GHS 2011 Class Salutatorian, recently graduated from Wright State and will go to Optometry School next year.

His school activities and awards include: Key Club (4 years and President), National Honor Society (2 years and President), Student Council (4 years), SADD Club (2 years), Spanish Club (2 years), Cross Country (5 years), Big Brothers Big Sisters (2 years), Highest Honor Roll (4 years), Academician (4 years), Scholar-athlete (4 years), Honda- OSU Math Medal recipient, perfect score on the Math Ohio Graduation Test, member of the Prom Court, and Student of the Month. He participated in numerous school and related events, such as Teens 4 Jeans, Canned Food Drive, Senior Citizens Day, Box City, Student Aide, Make a Wish, Mandy's Sunshine 5K run, Yolo Race, and Tour de Donut. Krutant also volunteered 3 years at the Brethren Retirement Community and 2 years at the Greenville Public Library.

Senior **Kelly Snyder** is this year's **Salutatorian**, with a 5.0 weighted GPA. She is the daughter of **Chris** and **Gretchen Snyder**, and plans on attending Ohio State University and majoring in Math. Her siblings are GHS grads: **Rachel Belville**, GHS 2005, and **Jake Snyder**, GHS 2014.

Kelly has been in theatre since she was 11 years old. She took part in almost every production throughout high school and assumed several leadership roles. She has received several in-class awards for theatre and participated in several plays that made it to the state theatre conference. She is also taking part in a year-long Yoga Teacher Training program to become a certified yoga teacher. Her other service projects include judging the Power of the Pen writing contest, Box City, Senior Citizens Day, performing the Anti-bullying play for elementary schools, and mostly recently was an intern for Main Street Greenville.

Moving tributes were made by **Principal Ken Neff** for three classmates who did not graduate with their peers. **Corynna Strawser** and **Karamie Bush** both passed away before their graduation time and were sorely missed by all, and **Ivan Miller**, after spending most of his senior year recovering from a terrible auto accident, is progressing through a slow recovery at home.

Raudabaugh Winners for 2015 are Record Setters

The **Jack Raudabaugh Awards** are always presented at the underclass awards at GHS to inspire the younger boys and girls to reach for this honor. Mr. Raudabaugh served as teacher, coach, and principal in the Greenville schools from 1937 to 1973. Only students in the top third of the senior class, lettering in two sports, with high leadership qualities and good moral character, are considered for these elite honors.

The 43rd girl to win this award is **Ally Russell**. In the top-notch Lady Wave Softball program, Ally has become the first Wave player, and one of a very few in the history of Ohio high school sports, to be named **three-time First team All-State (Ohio softball pitcher)**. She is also a two-year National Honor Society member at G.H.S., along with being a

GWOC scholar and an NFCA scholar each year. Ally led the Lady Wave to a 107-20 softball record over the past four years, and is the winningest pitcher in Wave history. She had a 4.2 GPA and was Summa Cum Laude. She is attending Wright State University, majoring in Athletic Training, and has signed to play on the Raider softball team. Her parents are **Bill** and **Teri Russell**.

The 63rd boy winner of the Raudabaugh award is **Aaron Balsbaugh.** He was Captain and led the Wave basketball team to the most wins in GHS history (18-5 record), at 6' 8" playing forward, and setting school records of 22 rebounds in one game and 236 rebounds in a season. Aaron lettered three years in basketball and three years in track. He was one of the 4x800 relay team which set a school record, and was also a State Qualifier in the 800 meter run. 3.6 GPA, two-year member of National Technical Honor Society. He is enrolled at Taylor University (Indiana) and will play basketball and run track. A GHS Career Tech graduate in Engineering, he plans to major in Engineering in college. He is the son of **Phillip** and **Laura Balsbaugh**.

Green Wave Boys Basketball Team- GWOC North Champions!!

The 2014-15 boys' basketball season was one for the record books as the Green Wave, under leadership of third-year head coach Mike Bashore, GHS '92, won the GWOC North title, the first league basketball championship for a Wave boys' team since the 1954-55 season.

The final record of 18-5 (9-1 GWOC) eclipsed the 16 wins of the 1967-68 season. All 5 losses were to teams that won at least 15 games, including a loss to eventual State Division I Champions, Huber Heights Wayne. Sellout crowds were the rule rather than the exception as the Green and White generated fan enthusiasm not seen in the high school gym for many years.

Pacing the Wave was junior Clay Guillozet, who averaged 22.4 points per game and was the leading scorer in the entire Greater Western Ohio Conference. The 6'3" guard also became only the fourth player in GHS history to score over 1,000 career points, finishing with 1,086. Other Wave players in the exclusive club are Jake Cook, '93 with 1,203, Tom Holzapfel '78 with 1,171 and Craig Wohlgamuth, '98 with a total of 1,138. Clay was a first-team All-GWOC selection.

Other standouts were 6'7" senior center Aaron Balsbaugh, a first team GWOC North member; four year letter winner, senior point guard Alan Tabler; 6'5" senior Cody Preston; 6'5" sophomore Isaiah Gable; and sixth man, 6'3" sophomore Aaron Rich. This year's team was a tightly knit, cohesive unit who exemplified team basketball and was a pleasure to watch

Next year's Wave also looks to have a bright future, with three of this year's top six players returning along with an influx of underclassmen from last year's junior varsity and freshman teams

Cy Brown, GHS '44, Honored By His School District

Cyrus "Cy" Brown, GHS 1944, has been honored by the ABC Unified School District Federation of Teacher Retirees, in Southeast Los Angeles (Cerritos, California). Each year this organization awards a \$2,500 scholarship to a derserving senior student in the school district which is composed of several public schools. This year the retired teachers selected the scholarship to be awarded in honor of Cy Brown, who was a long-time music teacher who made great permanent impressions on many of his students.

Many teaching associates and former students wrote glowing comments about Cy's career. "He was kind and considerate...", "He always had a dance in his step, a twinkle in his eye, and a joke to tell.", "...many students were influenced by Cy's love of music.", from the Three Dog Night song, "Joy to the World", Cy brought "Joy to you and me." He was instrumental in starting bands for each of the schools in the district, and was noted for helping fledgling music teachers. He formed a Tijuana Taxi Band made up of his students, which played around in various cities and at differing functions. One person's comment on the huge proportion of drummers in the Ferguson Band, Cy responded, "Drumsticks are cheap, so you can involve more kids by adding drummers." He had a drum class so large that he had to place boards in rows across desks so that all students had something to "bang on." The students were so engrossed in what they were doing, in their new-found skills, that there were never any behavior problems. "Cy produced wonderful Christmas programs every year." "He was a terrific educator and cared about his students." "He wanted to give students experiences away from school, such as tickets to a symphony at the Dorothy Chandler Pavilion Music Hall in Los Angeles. He took all the kids in a bus, an experience they wouldn't have had if it had not been for Cy." "He was a gifted and dedicated educator....and was as dedicated to the Elementary Band students as he was to his High School Band-O-Rama programs."

Cy Brown, the ABC Unified School District's "Music Man" is the son of Greenville High School's "Mister Music Man", Dwight Brown, GHS 1916, and Esther Husted Brown, GHS 1916. Dwight taught music at GHS from 1927 to 1964. Cy studied music at the University of Cincinnati. Like his father, Cy also began his music teaching career at Bradford High School. Being married twice, Cy first married GHS classmate Betty Jo "B.J." Niederkorn, GHS 1944, and had five children. The family moved to Southern California (city of Artesia in the L.A. area) in the 1960s in search of better weather than Ohio had to offer. He retired to

his home at Lake Tahoe in northern California, and died on Jan. 7, 2000. Cy's sister, **Betty Brown Schmalenberger**, GHS 1947, still lives in Greenville with husband, **Dave Schmalenberger**, GHS 1946.

GREENVILLE HIGH SCHOOL MAJOR SENIOR AWARDS

History teacher Eugene Phelps initiated the Eugene Phelps Citizenship Award in 1967 acknowledging an outstanding senior. Beginning in 1970, the Phelps award went to a senior boy and the newly established Elizabeth Hill Citizenship Award was given to a deserving senior girl. Mr. Phelps taught at GHS 45 years (1924-1969) and Vocal Music teacher Miss Hill taught 38 years (1930-1968). Mrs. Kathryn Griner was the Dean of Girls, French and English teacher, and Guidance Counselor for 22 years (1948-1970), and developed a Kathryn Griner Academic Award for outstanding academic accomplishment at GHS. In 2005, the GHS Principal Jeffrey Hobbs started a Leadership Award, with many of the leadership winners being the President of Student Council.

Earlier memories of Girl Scout Days in Greenville

By Florence Hoblit Magoto, GHS 1939

We were the first Girl Scout troop in Greenville in 1936. We met in the basement of the Episcopal Church (Broadway at Water St.). Our leaders were Elizabeth Menke (GHS 1926, and GHS math and English teacher from 1934 to 1946) and Gladys (Jimmy) James. Our first camping trip was to Lake James, Indiana. The large building there was owned by Charlie Zirkle (a Greenville plumber), whose wife Marguerite Zirkle was a hair dresser at their home, 442 East Third Street. We lived at 338 East Third Street, and my Daddy drove me to the church where we all met before our first trip. When we got to Lake James, we stayed upstairs in the large two-story building, where each of us girls brought a cot. These cots were lined up in a large room and in an upstairs bedroom in two rows. One of the girls thought the was "too dull", so she entertained the rest of us with a fan dance, which was not approved of by the leaders. The only lights were our flashlights, which had to be turned off, thus ending the dance. We took a board walk to the lake where we swam in the water. One girl would not go into the water because she didn't want to get her bathing suit wet. In another year we had another campsite along a river but I can't remember exactly where that was. Some of us girls were standing along the river when a man rowing his boat came nearby, and the lady in the boat with him was one of our ex-school teachers, Miss Emma Holsapple (GHS Junior High English teacher from 1926 to 1937). We all yelled and waved at her. Some of the girls in our troop were Martha Jean Waggoner, Lois Pitsenbarger, Rosemary Hinders, Mary Taylor, Miriam Lecklider, Marilynne Minnich, Delight Morrison, Margy Newbauer, and myself. All were in the GHS Class of 1939, along with some others I can't remember now. Margy and I are the only ones left. We had 127 graduates, with only 14 left, and only 3 from that troop (as of April, 2015). But the good old memories linger on!!!

Editor's note: Thanks so much to Florence for "taking us back in our history" to times most of us didn't remember or live through. Photos here are of the 1942 Little House soon after it was built in the City Park by Fred Coppock. After infestation it was demolished and a new Little House structure was opened in 1993.

Attendance was down about 10% from last year, with 288 attendees from the Senior and Junior classes, and selected Sophomores and post graduates under 21 years of age who were asked by Seniors and Juniors. After pictures of each couple arriving, a dinner was served before many other pictures were taken and dancers filled the floor. An emotional special memorial tribute was given to honor **Corynna Strawser**, whose class was this year's 2015 Senior Class. The Junior Class under the leadership of President **Ripley Lewis** and Junior Class sponsor **Ms. Mollie Willman Mendoza**, GHS '89, decorated the venue to recreate the Roaring '20s feel. The Prom lasted from 6:00 PM to 11:00, with a three-hour "After Prom" party with dancing and prizes held at the GHS gymnasium until 2:00 AM. **Bruce Klepinger**, GHS '80, brought two of his antique cars which were used as background for all pictures of the Prom arrivals, and which perfectly complemented the Roaring '20s theme. 

Block "G" Pep Club -- 1963-1974

The first **Pep Club** was organized to boost Green Wave spirit in September, 1963, and became one of the most active clubs at GHS. It was first developed from interest expressed in the G.A.A. (Girls' Athletic Association.), with the group participating at all home football and basketball games and pep assemblies. The first officers were: **Kay Zerkle** (President, senior), **Linda Goubeaux** (Vice Pres., junior), **Susan Harless** (Secretary, soph.), **Kim Honeyman** (Treasurer, junior), and **Rosie Kennedy** (Reporter, soph.). Mrs. **Nancy Ankenman**, civics and geography teacher, was the first Advisor. The group would sit in a near square forming a green "G" on a white background. Each girl bought her own sweater and was loaned a felt green "G" to be sewn on the front of the white sweaters and a white felt "G" on the green sweaters. 130 members attended the organizational meeting with about 125 members attending the games. This was probably the high number of participants in Block G history. Dues were



set at 25 cents for the season and each girl had to find her own transportation to the games. The club ran the football concession stand and sponsored a Valentine Dance to raise funds to provide transportation to-out-of town games.

The second year, '64-'65, had a sharp drop-off of attendance, to 67 members. The activities were the same: cheer at the games, pep assemblies, concession stand operations, and sponsoring the Sweetheart Dance. Officers were: **Kim Meckes** (Pres., senior), **Kathy Meyer** (Vice Pres., senior), **Mary Plessinger** (Secy-Treas., senior), **Mrs. Jean Price**, Advisor. No organized Pep Club existed for the '65-'66 year, '66-'67 year, '67-'68 year, and '68-'69 year, although some groups of girls did cheer at the games.


A resurgence of the Block G came in the fall of 1969 when GHS alum and Wave Booster Club activist, John Spidel, GHS 1955, promoted the group's return. Senior Becky Pequignot Empie, GHS 1970, worked co-op at American Aggregates where John worked, and he encouraged her to help bring back the Block G. The Boosters bought the sweaters for the girls in white and dark green colors, and they remained plain with no lettering. The Block "G" formed that fall with 81 members, and had 8 officers: Becky Pequignot (Pres., senior), Gayle Light (V.P., junior), Sandy Klipstine (Secy., senior), Jan Dispennette (Treas., junior), Cindy Hess (Sergeant-at-Arms, soph.), Diane Willkens (Sergeant-at-Arms, soph.), Diane Holzapfel (Checker, soph.), and Joanne Fowble (Checker, soph.). Today Becky remembers, "The presence of the club energized the fans and raised the cheering noise levels at the games. This was good for Greenville and we sat with the cheerleaders right in front of us." Most of their appearances were at home games.

G G G G G

The '70-'71 Pep Club had 100 members: 50 sophomores, 32 juniors, and 18 seniors. The block appeared at each basketball game in full uniform, in addition to football games, pep assemblies and wrestling matches. The club held a garage sale, slave auction, and bake sales to raise money for their activities and uniforms. Greenie emblems and numerals were added to the sweater sleeves of girls who had been members for one year. Officers were: Jeanie Pequignot (Pres., senior), Carolyn Sharp (V.P., senior), Connie Coovert (Secy., senior), Jan Dispennette (Treas., senior), Jane Davidson (Sergeant-at-Arms, junior), Linda Townsend (Sergeant-at-Arms, junior), Susan Fiely (Checker, junior), Mary Jane Koontz (Checker, soph.), Mrs. Vanis Brumbaugh (Advisor).



Again 100 members made up the '71-'72 Block G, with 90 in the yearbook picture. They dressed in the green and white uniforms and attended all the football and basketball games. Two school buses would transport the cheer block members to all away football and basketball games. They wore solid white or green sweaters with embroidered Greenie emblems sewn on a sleeve, and numerals and service bars on the opposite sleeve. The girls also wore spirit buttons made by the Marketing class. Their fund-raising event was a combined garage and bake sale, making money to buy pom-poms. The girls painted the windows of the downtown businesses with words of congratulations to the undefeated football MVL-champs team. The most artistic talents earned cash awards for those girls. At each basketball game, one girl from the block was chosen to be the Block "G" girl of the week. She was judged on her spirit and sportsmanship during the game. For this honor, she received a charm from Van Bebber's Jewelry store. Officers were: Cindy Hess



(Pres., senior), Joyce Rismiller (V.P., senior), Anita Apgar-Riegle (Secy., senior), and Christine Drehs (Treas., junior), Mrs. Vanis Brumbaugh (Advisor).

Mrs. Vanis Lephart Brumbaugh, GHS 1948 and GHS marketing teacher, was a three-year advisor to the Block G and doubled as the Cheerleading advisor. She remembers having the Block G practice on Wednesday evenings with the cheerleaders to coordinate their yell efforts. Mrs. Nadine Cornett, business/commercial teacher, served as Block G assistant advisor.

The girls in green and white helped do their share to boost the Green Wave spirit in the '72-'73 school year. These girls traveled to all the football and basketball games. They also increased their support for other GHS sports. This year every girl received a new white outfit and each had a green or white flash card which could be held in front of her. A bake sale and a garage sale netted \$400 in fund raising. The Block "G" girls also participated in a basketball game with the women faculty members, and the experience of the faculty proved too much for the "G" girls. The only officer known was the President Kim Niswonger (senior), and the Advisor was Mrs. Vanis Brumbaugh.

For the final season in the 1973-'74 school year, the Block G purchased white T-shirts with green trim and green "BLOCK G" silk-screened lettering on the front. Membership dropped to about 30 girls for each game, so membership was opened to boys. A few boys had the courage to sign up, but none had the nerve to participate at a game. Their money-making projects were selling stationery and having a bake and garage sale, netting \$230 in profits. The only student members identified in yearbook pictures were Deanna Delong, Dawn Fourman, Ann Brumbaugh, and Lisa Rudy. Mrs. Vanis Brumbaugh served as head cheer section advisor, while Mrs. Beverly Vanover was in charge of Block G.

The reason so many girls lost interest in participating in Block G corresponded to the up-swing in girls' sports at the high school level. Earlier sports competitions at GHS were on the intramural level (mostly as part of the G.A.A.), but sports participation because of the equalization of girls sports and boys sports in all the high schools allowed girls

to play sports instead of just sitting in the bleachers. The YMCA also opened in the early 1970s in Greenville and featured swim teams and a travelling girls basketball teams. The Block G sweaters, white gloves, flash cards, buttons, and later T-shirts became a memory. Everyone remembered these few years of the "Block G" as being great times for the girls and a great spirit boost for the Green Wave sports teams. No wonder John Spidel wanted them to return.

Many of the obituaries published in the papers or by the funeral homes have biographies, relatives listed, and pictures of the decedent. We are listing the websites of the funeral homes which can provide this data to the public who asks. The sites listed have obituaries or archived obituaries on which you can click. Over 80% of the listed entries have website accessibility. Some of the older obits may be timed out or dropped, and may not still be there. If you cannot reach one of the ones by website, and would like a copy of a specific obituary we have listed, please let the Alumni Association know. We will send you a copy electronically or by mail of documentation that we have.

We have decided to go beyond the GHS graduates, and include those we can verify or remember attending GHS, even if that person did not graduate. He/she attended GHS in earlier years and is listed with the class with which that person would have graduated if he/she had stayed through commencement.

Our listings are arranged with oldest GHS alums listed first, his/her age at death, member of which class year, date of death, place of most recent residence, and the website where more information can be obtained. To find a deceased, you may use a search engine, like Google, and type in "person's name, the word > obituary, year, state, etc."

This is far from complete, using just the data we had access to, or could find.

Key to Funeral Home Website Codes

Many funeral homes have websites with the written obituaries and some have pictures of the decedent. If you go to these websites, click on obituaries and find your person of interest by name or by date. The Code Letter(s) next to person's name will tell you which websites to go to.


