# Greenville's Tenth Annual 2013 Horse Parade

The Grand Marshal of this year's spectacular Horse Parade was Dave Marshall, GHS 1976, which was held November 23 from the old Marsh's on Martin St., down Broadway, and returning along Sycamore Street. A longtime downtown businessman. Dave has volunteered to help with the Horse Parade since its inception. He orders parade bells and makes leather straps to attach the bells to the horse equipment, in addition to other helpful services making the parade the success that it has become. Dave began working with and training horses when he was in high school and is a member of the Darke County Harness Horseman's Association.






Tenth Annual Hometown Holiday Horse Parade, November 23, 2013

The Bootery is the second longest continually running retail establishment on Broadway. It was started in 1916 by Herman Brown, GHS 1906, and his wife Louanna Meeker Brown, GHS 1907, and the business was known then as Brown's Bootery. Wieland Jewelers is over 100 years in business and is the only continuous Broadway business older than the Bootery. After more than 20 years working at the Second National Bank, Claude Marshall and wife Kathryn Dohme Marshall, GHS 1922, bought Brown's Bootery in 1954. Son Howard Marshall, GHS 1948, and wife Dolly Faulkner Marshall, GHS 1951, began in the 1950's and worked at the business for about 50 years. Howard's son Dave joined the business after his graduation, and they moved locations in 1977 from the 400 block to its present location at 521 South Broadway across from the Court House. Howard and Dave did the remodeling for this unique self-designed shoe store and shoe repair shop, and it is still very attractive today. From the times one hundred years ago there were ten shoe stores on Broadway, the number has shrunk but the Bootery still has a thriving business near the city center. A fourth generation of Marshalls in the Bootery business, Jason Marshall, GHS 2003, started working at the store in 2009. His wife Jennifer Brotherwood Marshall, GHS 2002, is mother of a potential fifth generation of Marshalls for the shoe business. The Marshalls do qualify for four generations of GHS graduates: Kathryn '22, Howard '48 and Dolly '51, Dave '76, and Jason '03 and Jennifer '02.

The evening Holiday Horse Parade had 170 equestrian entries sporting lights on the horses, riders, carriages, buggies, and wagons, from three states. This event has been entertaining over 8,000 spectators in downtown Greenville annually since 2004, and this year more entertainment and activities took place before and after the parade. Also, this year's parade was as cold as any in memory, with snow, wind and 20 degree weather. The accompanying photo shows Dave with his chosen guest, friend and coworker Theresa Sarver. This replaces Greenville's Christmas Parade of the past and is sponsored by Main Street Greenville. Dave Marshall was a unanimous choice for Grand Marshal this past year, as selected by the Hometown Holiday Horse Parade Committee. Dave has been instrumental to the success of this parade and has donated much of his time, talents, and service to our community. Congratulations, Dave!

It is sad to see old school buildings go under the wrecking ball in the name of progress.




I just hope that someone will want the Junior High building and restore it to the proud building it once was. Probably, more students attended this building than any other school building in Darke County. That's HISTORIC!









Laying the Corner Stone of the High School Building, June 12, 1923.





Editor's note: Carolyn's letter to the GHS Alumni Association prompted us to look more into the history of the Junior High building, which was at one time the High School building(1924-1962), and in continuous use since the fall of 1923. In the first place, there is no determination what will become of this building in the future. In the fall of 2016, the new Kindergarten through 8th grade building should be opened, making obsolete the Junior High building, East School building, South School building, and Woodland Heights building. At that time the Board of Education will have to make the determination as to the best disposition for these buildings. Within the past five years or so, the B.O.E. has auctioned off the North School building and the Gettysburg School building for prices in the low \$40,000's each. We believe this warrants closer scrutiny since every GHS alum alive today who had attended school from the eighth grade until graduation, has attended one or more of these buildings.

The first two postcard photos, (at bottom on previous page), show the old West building moving from the present location of the Memorial Hall to its new foundation, near where the present Junior High building is now. These were originally colorized photos with the building highlighted. Other pictures, (below), are older postcards, one after the dedication and printed in 1925, and an original statuesque linen postcard from about 1935.









# Harmon Field Renamed Good Samaritan Stadium

In 2012 the Greenville City Schools entered into an agreement with Good Samaritan Hospital, in Dayton, and Wayne HealthCare, in Greenville, involving the sponsorship, marketing rights, and naming rights of the high school athletic facility. This five-year program has a renewal option in 2017

for five more years, if so desired by the two hospitals. Funds from the agreement can be used to upgrade the facility, and building, repairing, enlarging and/or improving of high school sports facilities in the future. Two-thirds of the funding will come from Good Samaritan, and one-third from Wayne. In exchange, the Greenville City Schools will grant certain sponsorship and marketing rights to the hospitals, including naming rights for the stadium, as well as promotional opportunities to the hospitals. These include providing an Athletic Trainer to GHS.

## 28th ANNUAL GHS ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES

The 28th annual induction ceremony and banquet of the GHS Athletic Hall of Fame took place at the Greenville Lodge of Elks January 4. Hall of Fame committee chairman Ty House, '74, presided over the occasion while Hall of Fame member Bill Booker, '53, presented three individuals for enshrinement. Membership in the select group now stands at 95, consisting of 75 males and 20 females who have, through their endeavors and talents, contributed to Green Wave success over the years.

## GHS Most Valuable Football Players from the 1930s

This trophy was recently discovered and was originally presented from the G.H.S. Alumni to Greenville High School for three years back in the 1930s, identifying the (most) valuable players from the Green Wave football teams. The outstanding football players recognized and names engraved on this trophy are Rodney Winterrowd (1934), Dorin Holzapfel (1935), and Dan Hawley and Gene Shields (two from the class of 1936).

#### Greenville vs. Sidney Football - Little Brown Jug trophy

Sports of a hundred years ago were not as we know them today. In 1902 a "field day" was held in Greenville with Piqua, Troy, Urbana, Sidney and Bellefontaine traveling to Greenville by wagon to participate in competitive events. These included a five mile bike race, hammer throw, running, and hop, step and jump. The Miami Valley League (MVL) was formed in the 1920's and Greenville and Sidney were original members of the MVL. The Greenville-Sidney football rivalry dates back to 1925, with varying regularity and has included 71 contests. This may have signified the beginning of the M.V.L. In 1935 a survey found that Greenville had won the most championships (in all sports) in MVL competition, with Sidney winning the second most championships during the first decade of the league. In 1956 the Little Brown Jug was introduced into the Greenville-Sidney football match up by Sidney alumnus Frank Schlagetter. The original Little Brown Jug trophy dates back to 1903 and is modeled after the traveling Little Brown Jug trophy created for the winner of the annual Michigan-Minnesota football game.

The Jug should have changed hands to Greenville after the 1971 game, but it didn't

(according to present Sidney High football program assistant Dave Ross, a senior Sidney player on that 1971 team and a Sidney football historian today). Sidney had one of the best teams in the state during three years of the late 1960's to 1970, winning over 30 games consecutively. The Sidney coaches were very disappointed with that 1971 loss to the Wave after five straight wins, and probably accidentally left it in a room at the old Sidney High School. A

guess is that a janitor probably put it in a third floor room cabinet, where the Yellow Jackets coaches would sit to watch the games. With the new high school being built in Sidney in the early 2000's, a 2004 auction of the items left behind in the Bridgeview Middle School (the former Sidney High School beside Julia Lamb field that we remember for football games in the 1900's) included the Jug, which sold to a Sidney citizen for \$12.00. Dave Ross was responsible for convincing that the trophy should be returned to Sidney HS for its intended use. The person who bought the trophy at auction was afraid it would be lost again.




Greenville didn't play Sidney because the Wave moved to the Southwestern Buckeye League (SWBL) from the fall of 1972 through the fall of 1981, and Sidney is believed to have gone to the Western Ohio League (WOL). In the fall of 1982, Greenville and Sidney resumed play when both were in the Greater Miami Valley Conference (GMVC), but the Jug was not located.

The Jug was returned to Sidney HS after 2004, but the football teams did not resume play until 2012. In the fall of 2005, Greenville joined the Mid-Miami League (MML), and Sidney stayed in the GWOC.

In 2012 the Little Brown Jug was once again ready to be a traveling trophy, and Greenville joined the GWOC where Sidney continued to be a member. The football scheduling was behind the original time when Greenville again joined the GWOC.

Sidney G-Wave Greenville has possessed the Little Brown Jug only 7 of the 58 years it has existed. Greenville should have held the Trophy from 1971 to at least 1986, if the traveling trophy had been found. The Wave <u>should</u> have been entitled to hold the trophy for 37 of the 58 years, if the last team to win before the scheduling gaps got to hold the trophy for the interim. Dave Ross was very apologetic about the fact that the trophy was supposed to be transferred to Greenville in 1971, but it never happened.

Sidney had defeated the Wave five straight years (1966-70) when they had a "Super Team". After Greenville had a 2-8 record in the fall of 1970, a coaching change was made with **Dan O'Brien** being replaced by **Tom Hollman**. Coach Hollman was the defensive coach at Sidney during their powerhouse years in the late '60s to 1970, and he was one of the main reasons that the Sidney teams were so successful. He turned around the Wave program in one sweep, producing a 10-0 perfect record, and winning the MVL in that fall of 1971. The tough game against the Yellow Jackets ended in a Wave win, 22-14, over a still very good Sidney team. In looking at reasons that the Little Brown Jug didn't come back to the Wave on that fall evening in 1971, nobody will ever know for sure why the trophy exchange was not made. Greenville and Sidney went to different leagues and the jug was temporarily forgotten.

In last year's season finale, the Wave lost 38-0 (Oct. 28, 2012), and a Wave football program spokesman stated to the *Advocate* that "the Wave will be back next year to take it (the trophy) back".

In the 2013 match up, after two quick fumbles and a shaky first half, the Wave stormed back from a 33-21 halftime deficit to fulfill last year's prophecy and post a 50-33 victory, bringing the Little Brown Jug back to Greenville's possession for the first time since the fall of 1965. This year's team leaders were Senior Ryan Eldridge (RB/DB, Capt.), Senior Zach Comer (WR/DB, Capt.), Senior Kyle Bruner (C, DL, Capt.), Senior Ryan Drew (RB/LB, Capt.), Junior Bryce Jenkinson (RB/LB, Capt.), and Sophomore Clay Guillozet (QB). This final contest of the year was the Wave's best performance of the year, finishing with a 2-8 record. Sidney finished 5-5. Since 1956, Greenville has won 18 games, Sidney 21, with one resulting in a tie. Over the 71 contests beginning in 1925, The Wave has won 32, Yellow Jackets 33, with 4 ties and 2 games with no known results. Hopefully, Greenville can make up for some "lost" years and hold on to the trophy for a while.


## Sean Marchal, GHS '85, Makes Running History

On October 13, 2013, **Sean Marchal**, GHS 1985, made American running history when he finished the 2013 Bank of America Chicago Marathon. He joined the special club of runners who have completed full marathons (26.2 miles) in all 50 states. He is estimated to be the 815<sup>th</sup> person to ever run a marathon in all 50 states. Making this feat most impressive is that Sean has completed all of these marathons in less than four hours. Only 44 runners have run marathons in the 50 states all in sub-4 hour races.

His first marathon was in Oklahoma City in 2003 when he was 35 years old. Among his favorites are the New York Marathon because of the huge fan support, Phoenix where he first qualified for Boston, and Twin Cities in Minneapolis where he set his personal record of 3:09:58. Green River, Wyoming, was particularly difficult, starting at approx. 6,000 feet elevation and climbing to 8,000 feet at its highest point. He has run four doubles, which are the difficult task of back to back marathons in two days, and finishing both segments in under four hours.

Ultimately, Boston is the top marathon in the country, which Sean has run in three times. While running there in 2010, he proposed marriage to his then running partner (and now his wife **Chauntai**). This was a special moment because running is what brought them together. Sean has already qualified for Boston in 2014 and he is planning on making that his last full marathon. Beyond that he would like to enter 5K's, 10K's and half marathons, and coach runners.

#### Dr. Doris Shields Charles, GHS '46

In 1934, **Doris Shields** started her school education from grades 1 through 8 in the one-room rural schoolhouse called Concord, located just east of Greenville at the corner of Rt. 571 and Culbertson Rd. In 1942, she attended Greenville High School and graduated in 1946.

After graduation, Doris enrolled in the Miami Valley Hospital School of Nursing in 1947. She graduated with a nursing degree in 1950 and was ranked second in her class academically. Her healthcare career for life had begun.



In 1950, she continued her pursuit of a healthcare career by studying at the University of Dayton. She received a Bachelor of Science in Nursing Education and became a Clinical Instructor of Nursing Arts at Miami Valley Hospital.

In 1953, with her new degree from U.D. and her husband to be encouragement, she was able to perform her nursing abilities at various supervisory roles. She attended college again moving her closer to her ultimate dream. It wasn't until 1989 that U.D. fully appreciated one of its most remarkable students, and honored Dr. Doris Shields Charles as a Distinguished Alumna of the University of Dayton.

In 1955, she married **James Charles** and entered the University of Cincinnati and earned her Medical Doctor degree. She took her internship program and residency in Anesthesiology at Christ Hospital in Cincinnati. Doris practiced some Anesthesia but decided to go into private practice with Kent Martin, M.D., in Cincinnati from 1961 to 1968.

In 1968, she left private practice and returned to her alma mater, The University of Cincinnati, to take on the role of Staff Physician in Student Health Services at U.C. In 1970, she was promoted to the Associate Vice Provost of Student Affairs, Head Team Physician, and Director of the Student and Employee Health Service. She practiced in all these roles until 1981. It was during this time that Dr. Charles developed many long-term philanthropic relationships.

During her time at U.C., she became a member of the Board of Directors of the Ohio College Health Association and finally became the President, 1973-74. She also became a delegate to the American College Health Association.

In addition, she took on the role of consultant for the development of the Employee Health Clinic at Ohio University in 1974. There are many other areas for which she volunteered and poured her expertise into; however, there are too many to detail each and every one at this time.

Obviously, it is apparent that no grass grew under Dr. Charles' feet. In 1981, her career took another turn because her path split into two very different roles. The first was an Ambulatory Health Care Surveyor for the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals and her primary role. The other was her primary role as the Director of University Health Service and Team Physician of the Athletic Department of The Ohio State University. During her tenure with Ohio State, she was awarded 15 research grants covering topics from treatments of the common cold to AIDS research, totaling \$354,731. in funding. She was a member or chairperson of 21 University Committees while she worked at O.S.U.

Dr. Doris Shields Charles retired from O.S.U. in 1990, but her pace and exuberance for life are still very intense in her commitment to literacy at all levels. However, the story of her retirement will have to come at another time.

Doris Shields' accomplishments are really astonishing considering her hopes of becoming an actress in 1946. In the Fall 2013 publication of the *AlumNews*, Buzz Blanchard's article on the Greenville Art Guild Players mentioned that Doris' "acting career" plans were thwarted by her mother who said, "There hasn't been an actress in our family and there won't be one now". Dr. Doris Shields Charles has become a real and innovative actress on the medical stage of life.
