
Contents of the 1923 Time Capsule from the old Junior High School building

The High School building on Central Avenue was recently demolished, but its Time Capsule was recovered and its contents examined. The Dedication was June 12, 1923, with the cornerstone being laid in a ceremony which featured our local Girl Scouts. The address was given by the president of the Greenville Historical Society, Frazer Wilson, GHS 1890. He was a noted author of Darke County Families history, Darke County history, author of the "Peace of Mad Anthony" which was an original book included in the time capsule, and was former Mayor of Greenville (1925-27 and 1936-39). The laying of the cornerstone is pictured in the 1924 Chief and was performed by the local Girl Scout troop(s).


The cornerstone was removed July 12, 2017, by Richard Barton, Gettysburg HS '71, who purchased the rights for \$1,000 to tear out the stone. He had additional help, an air gun, and a concrete cutter to free the contents, and plans on keeping the findings.

The Time Capsule must have been assembled by local attorney George A. Katzenberger. It was stored in a copper box, which is highly oxidized now, with no protection around the outside, and is about 12" long by 6" wide and 4" deep. The lid was loose, just lying on top of the box. The contents were not protected, were exposed to air, and most of the contents were not sealed and have deteriorated to a condition that it cannot be restored or displayed.


There was a deteriorated 1923 Greenville City Directory *(an original copy can be found at the Garst Museum)*. There was a copy of "The American's Creed" which was written by **William Tyler Page** in 1917, as an entry into a patriotic contest about the political faith of America during World War I. The U.S. House of Representatives passed this resolution in 1918.

This is **The American's Creed**: "I believe in the United States of America as a government of the people, by the people, for the people, whose just powers are derived from the consent of the governed, a democracy in a republic; a sovereign Nation of many sovereign States; a perfect union, one and inseparable; established upon those principles of freedom, equality, justice and humanity for which American patriots sacrificed their lives and fortunes. I therefore believe it is my duty to my country to love it; to support its Constitution; to obey its laws; to respect its flag; and to defend it against all enemies."

There were two thick letters with contents which have turned to powder and are not legible. There was a Annual Statement of the **Greenville Building Company** (which is now Greenville Federal) from 1922, with their statement of assets (resources) and liabilities.

There was a **Historical Society and the Museum** informational sheet from the early 1920s (one sheet), and a discussion column about the Subject of Interest sponsored by Greenville Building Company. Two newspapers of the day June 11, 1923, the *Greenville Daily News-Tribune* and the *Greenville Daily Advocate* (both folded but very legible). A letter from the Police Department is not legible and a deteriorated postcard from 1920 showing the Anthony Wayne marker boulder which is in front of the City Building today, along with two Boy Scouts, one being George Katzenberger.

Pictured here are the Historical Society and Museum information sheet and on the next page are page 1 of the Advocate paper, and the Anthony Wayne boulder post card.





Two important historical books were also included but not in good enough condition to be usable. Both were identifiable and reprinted copies can be found at either the **Garst Museum** in Greenville or from **Amazon.com**:

The Peace of Mad Anthony, by Frazer E. Wilson, originally printed in 1907, is an account of the subjugation (forced control by the US government) of the Northwestern Indian Tribes and the Treaty of Greene Ville. This opened the territory beyond the Ohio River for Anglo-Saxon settlement. The book is separated into four segments:




 The old Northwest—the Indian tribes, origins nature and distribution, Colonial expansion, French and Indian War, the Ordinance of 1787.
The tribes protest Arthur St. Clair appointed Governor, Army camps,

Little Turtle.

3. Anthony Wayne is victorious after St. Clair's defeat, military establishment, many forts built. 4. The Great Peace, tribes assemble at Green Ville to sign the Treaty of Greenville.

Little Turtle, the Great Chief of the Miami Indian Nation, by Calvin M. Young (who was a Little Turtle historian from Franklin Township, Darke County), originally printed in 1917 is a sketch of his life together with that of Captain William Wells and other noted descendants. This covers the Miami Tribe, Arthur St. Clair's expedition, Anthony Wayne's Campaign, the Great Council Fire, The Treaty of Greene Ville, his birthplace and character sketch, and other descendants.

Pictured here are the <u>reprinted covers</u> of these two books, available at the Garst Museum or at Amazon.com . The original books were quite deteriorated.



Although most items found in this Time capsule were unusable in their current condition, the items were able to be identified using the local historical connections. The true treasure is knowing what was included in the capsule and what items the citizens of that time deemed to be important enough to keep for the future. The Garst Museum is invaluable for its research possibilities and resources, especially in today's world.

"Delayed Pilgrims"

Transcription of an audio tape spoken by Miss Ethel Hathaway and deciphered by Mara Cox

Miss Ethel Hathaway, GHS 1915, was a long-time English teacher at G.H.S. (1928 to 1960, mostly teaching Sophomore English), and this is from her thesis for a Master's Degree in Education from Miami University. She had helped with English language classes for immigrants in the early 1950s. Some high school students also helped with these classes.

A male voice introduces the radio program at Miami University (*with accompanying music introduction*). He says, "Do you like to meet new people, to make new friends? This afternoon Ethel Hathaway, from the high school staff of Greenville, Ohio, is going to tell you of her new friends from foreign shores. Perhaps to you the space of oceans will become as nothing as you hear memories and reflections of friendships that overcome the barriers of language, for her friends are the Delayed Pilgrims" (*music plays…*).

Then Miss Hathaway speaks: "It almost seems incredible now after several months experience of teaching English to foreign friends, for not long ago, the term "D.P.", recently seen in magazines and newspapers, was just one of those alphabetized names that referred to some foreign groups called displaced persons. People who have lost their homes or people who have been displaced from them by the war, a thousand miles away. Of course, one felt sorry for them, but the feeling had a vagueness about them, a generality, because one was thinking in terms of a group, not of intelligent, interesting individuals we now know. But perhaps I should go back to the beginning.

"The first time I ever saw a group of displaced persons, Estonians, Lithuanians, and Latvians, was when I was invited to attend a YWCA International Friendship Program. It was inspiring to see them gathered at a large table, from which they rose to speak in accents that suggested countries so far away that we'll never have the opportunity, even if we wished, to touch their shores. Then when we heard them sing their Christmas Hymns, for it was a short while before Christmas, sometimes in different times, but with fervent sincerity. Somehow there is a harmony there that seems to suggest time for which man has dreamed for many ages when swords shall be beaten into plowshares and one world shall abide in peace. This ideal, though not attained, and in the last few tragic years, apparently obscured by clouds of war, did that night seem attainable. Perhaps as a nation we must say what Browning rather than Ezra said as an individual, 'but I aspire to be and was not, comforts me or a man's reach must exceed his grasp.' We should like to think if we could pierce the solemn myth that the present obscure the future, we could see a world more like that of which we have dreamed.

"Sometime after the YW meeting, someone said, 'I wonder whether these people should have English classes.' The thought was soon translated into action and the classes were formed. Although I was not teaching the first night, I was privileged to be present. I was so much impressed that day, that two days afterwards, I could not refrain from jotting down my thoughts. May I tell you about it by quoting my notes practically as I wrote them.

"That day after the first session of evening school, first meeting at the Presbyterian Church, sang "Silent Night" in various languages. When I wakened the next morning, I could see nothing but the light in their faces. Close the door to America, you mean to eight-year-old Lauma with flaxen braids, to Gurgen (?-*spelling*) who sits on the edge of the seat as though afraid he'll miss some new American words, you mean Alex, the chemist, who speaks five languages, _____(un-intelligible name), the pharmacist, Mrs. Wicheck (?-spelling), the Ukrainian mother who only knows two expressions, "Danke" and "sitzen sie", but whose mobile face expresses graciousness, friendship, gratitude, yes, and pride for her brilliant son Joseph, is now part of an American school studying in peace and freedom. Joseph who manifests for Science, Latin, Mathematics, the same devotion boys lavish upon football and other sports. Shall America close the doors to Doctor Dzenis, the talented sculptor whose sensitive fingers give beauty that is a joy forever? Mr. Murdichs (?-spelling), who, among his possessions, who brought his violin and copies of Grieg, Handel, Chopin, and ______(unintelligible). He plays now with stiffened fingers hardened by physical toil, brings forth deep tones of harmony that suggests best of old world's culture, the hush of some great music hall. Shall we not let them enter? Remember, Liberty holds the torch of light and the broken chains of tyranny lie at her feet --- *(short pause*)

of music) ---

"The passing days finally brought us to the time of the Christmas party. It was an evening to be remembered. The beauty of a present at Christmas, trees with the soft glow of Christmas lights, some native costumes, a quaint little girl with braids and old world beauty, intelligent faces, a few sad ones, a fair boy of ten, Ints, here for his first Christmas in America and attracted by the nativity scene, his mother's softspoken words. Ints would show me the Christ I go see. The words seem to have almost _____(?) a double meaning with the play of suggestion deeper than the litteral.

"Somehow one could only wish that the spirit prevailing there that evening in that narrow room, amongst those of different lands might know no boundaries. When one realizes what Delayed Pilgrims had experienced, their resiliency, their tendency to come back, their poise is astounding. One displaced person who fled the Russians four times, the last 1,000 miles by wagon, yet says because his family is with him, because he is now unshattered by fear. 'I have been lucky, too lucky.' No longer do they fear the arrival of the long, black, official car, the ominous knock upon the door, the forced departure of a loved one, whom they shall see no more.

"To us they have come, Latvians, Ukrainians, Estonians, Lithuanians, with their talents, their dreams, their love for freedom. But that is not all, having emerged from the curtain of tyranny, they bring an impassioned plea that we be alert in the affairs of government now, that we keep our freedom and democracy, and drop not the torch of light.

A "Delayed Pilgrims" Family

Many of the Eastern European countries fell under German control in the early 1940s during the Nazi expansion, and this included the Baltic countries of Latvia, Estonia and Lithuania. When the Soviet military advanced into Latvia in 1944 pushing the Germans out, the Latvian territory fell under Soviet control. Most sources counted that 200,000 to 250,000 refugees escaped Latvia and fled to Germany or Sweden. The Jekabsons family was placed in a displaced persons camp in Sengwarden, Germany, in the British zone about 1949. They arrived in the United States in December, 1950, and eventually lived at **Joe Menke's** farm on State Route 502 west of Greenville. The oldest sister **Maija Jekabsons** went to work for Joe Menke's brother in Dayton and she graduated from Dayton Fairview High School. The other four Jekabsons sisters all graduated from Greenville High School: **Ilze**, GHS 1958, **Mara**, GHS 1959, **Ilona**, GHS 1962, and **Selga**, GHS 1965.

The Latvian citizens confirmed their strong support for independence, and the Republic of Latvia gained its full independence from Soviet domination on Aug. 21, 1991. In 1992, Mother **Anna, Ilze** and her husband **Jan**, and **Mara**, went back to visit their old country. In 1994, **Anna, Ilze**, and **Maija** went to visit uncles and cousins who were living there at that time.

The Trainor Family

Previously we brought Agnes Trainor's Class Song 1916 Sheet Music to you and this is the follow-up history of her family.

The Honorable Martin Bryant Trainor became an orphan child with the death of both parents before he was ten years old and was raised by his uncle, Morgan Johnson, on a farm near Tyner in northern Indiana. He worked as a clerk in his uncle's store and attended country and public schools in Tyner before attending Plymouth High School. The Superintendent there was Professor Chase and he ranked Martin as first in his class. His uncle sent Martin to the University of Michigan where he made a brilliant showing and graduated a half year early. At the U. of M., he met Katherine "Kitty" Lecklider, the daughter of a prominent physician in Greenville. Returning to Greenville, he established himself in business in partnership with his uncle, owning a small elevator and buying grain on the Pan Handle Railroad in Greenville under the company name of the Johnson and Trainor Company. He spent his evenings diligently studying law and eventually was admitted to the Bar in 1886. He became a very influential, popular and a respected citizen of Greenville, and was an attorney by trade before becoming a Judge. He sat on the bench countless times throughout the Midwest. He also operated other businesses in town which included The Greenville Democrat newspaper, the Trainor Opera House on West Third Street, and the Banner Lumber yard. He owned several farms and many houses and lots in town. No man in Darke County excelled so well in so many different vocations in life (from History of Darke County, 1914). He died late in 1927 after putting in a full day of legal work. His funeral in 1927 remains the largest one ever held in Greenville (according to the late historian Bill Booker GHS 1953, who wrote in

recent years).

The **Opera House** on West Third Street was purchased by Frank McWhinney in 1875 and was used to showcase traveling road shows that presented dramas, musicals and comedies. It was also used for high school graduations and other functions. Martin Trainor bought the building and it became the Trainor Opera House. In November, 1926, the interior of the building was completely gutted by fire. It was rebuilt and served as the State movie theater until it was demolished in 1981 for a public parking lot, for which it is used today.

Martin married Kitty and they had four children. They bought an unfinished Victorian mansion on Vine Street just north of West Main Street from Greenville citizen **John Devor** who started building the house in 1863. The house reportedly cost \$50,000 to build and this was an enormous price for this era. This plush Civil War home was said to have represented American architecture opulence at its best. The three-story house had fifteen rooms. The main and second floors both had iron and wood fireplaces in each room. The house had deep relief sculptured ceilings, ornamented window frames, overhanging bay windows, brass chandeliers and fixtures used for lighting. Above the front entrance was a dark blue skylight which cast light and dark shadows on the winding staircase. Martin bricked up the incomplete rear wall, or the west side of the house, placing only one round window on that wall. They owned two houses next to their main house. One of these, 212 Vine Street, had been built about the 1880s and was later occupied by Agnes and John throughout their lives.

Morgan Trainor was their first child and was a brilliant young man who became an attorney at law before entering medical school. He became a Medical Doctor and, at one time, served as the Coroner of Cook County, Illinois (Chicago). Martin made his son study law but Morgan "jumped the rails" and went to medical school. Morgan, named for his great uncle, married **Clara Fritsche**.

Little is known about a second son, John, who died the year of his birth (1890).

Mabel Trainor, a GHS graduate 1912, was the manager of the Banner Lumber Company, which her father owned. She married **William James "Jay" Johnson**, who was a chemical engineer *(from City Directory)*. She lived about all of her life at the family home at 200 Vine Street, and even after her marriage. In Mabel's older years, she lived in the house by herself and the once-grand Victorian home had fallen into disarray. Shortly after she died in December, 1961, the house was destroyed out of necessity, just before the house's 100th birthday.

A 1916 GHS graduate, **Agnes Trainor's** extraordinary music talents allowed her to enter the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music and study voice and piano. She majored in both disciplines. She studied voice with the

in the 1920s *(from City Directories)*. After she graduated, she studied in Italy since her parents had the money to send her there. When she returned to the United States, Agnes set up a studio in New York City, where she taught voice and elocution. She had some famous students, including Edgar Bergen and Vaughn Monroe. She was the vocal soloist at the largest Jewish synagogue in Brooklyn. She was dark complexioned and the synagogue members didn't know that she was not Jewish. Her beautiful voice was enhanced in part by her singing in the Hebrew language. Agnes married John Keehan. Agnes had an audition at The Metropolitan Opera (The "Met") in New York City, but according to her husband, her nerves got the best of her and she was not chosen.

She later was a voice teacher in Greenville, during the 1940s to 1960s, which included many vocal music recitals. Agnes played the piano for these recitals and one of the programs is included here. Agnes and John lived in the house next door to the mansion at 212 Vine Street. She had many autographed pictures on the walls of her house that were signed by many of the opera stars of New York City. In the 1960s, she was the Junior Choir Director at the First Presbyterian Church on East Fourth Street. This choir practiced in a large room with a high ceiling, and Agnes had a grand piano in the corner. A lot of music was created here at a time when there were a lot of student participants in the choir. **Helen Plessinger** Miller, GHS 1966, can recall one such memorable time when Agnes sang "The Lord's Prayer", and those privileged to witness this said that her strong vocal performance at that time was enough to "make the rafters shake".

When Agnes died in 1983, the Trainor family's colorful history in Greenville ended. They are all buried in the Greenville Union Cemetery.

All Trainor family gravesites are located just south of the Union City Road in Section 24 of the Greenville Union Cemetery and are situated in a semi-circle around a tall granite, ornately crafted, obelisk monument, and representing their elevated stature in the community: **Martin B. Trainor**, husband/father, (1860-1927), died at age 67 **Katherine M. "Kitty" Lecklider Trainor**, wife/mother, (1861-1929), age 68 **Morgan X.L. Trainor**, M.D., first child, (1885-1951), age 66 **Clara Fritsch Trainor**, wife of Morgan, (1891-1965), age 74 **John R. Trainor**, second child, (1890-1890), age under one **Mabel Trainor Johnson**, third child, (1894-1961), age 67, GHS graduate 1912 **William James "Jay" Johnson**, husband of Mabel, (1891-1947), age 56 **Agnes Trainor Keehan**, fourth child, (1897-1983), age 80


