HALL OF FAME, NIGHTS OF CHAMPIONS, and HOMECOMINGS: some photos are here and other photos will be added to as they come.


N.H.S. GROUPS and GRADUATIONS: Selected ones are shown with more to come.


VAN KIRK'S CORNER

Teaford's History

Ira Everhart, conductor on the interurban, about 1902 to 1910, stands beside one of the traction cars at **Van Kirk's Corner**. Looking south on Sweitzer Street where the tracks were located, and which extended to Dayton. Fort Jefferson Avenue is to the right side (west), and Pine Street to the left (east). The old grocery at the point (address 500 or 501 Sweitzer St.) became **Dave Niley's** Service Station in later years. The old house on the left still exists today behind today's Teaford's.

Traction car in 1908 >>>

The Traction line ran from 1901 to 1926 and ran under an electric line and on tracks. (post card)



The **Dayton and Western electric line traction** opened in 1898. The circuit line was built to Greenville in 1900-1901 and was the first in Ohio to operate over its own right of way, and the first to introduce freight and package service and maintain a regular schedule for this class of transportation. Construction of its extension to Union City took place in 1903-1904. There was a steam railroad nearly paralleling this electric line from Dayton to Greenville to Union City during this same time. This greatly increased the citizens' mobility.

The corner where Teaford's is now was not developed at time of this picture (top). The building lot is so small that about all that there was room for was a gas station parking pad which did not come until later. After 1936, it did become a Gulf gas station on property owned by **Jay**

F. Wright with a small building at the east end of the lot and pumps nearest the corner (west end). The street address here is 101 Pine St. or 501 Sweitzer St., on the southeast corner.

At Van Kirk's Corner's southeast corner, there was a gas station (from the late 1930s) where Teaford's would eventually be built during 1946-47. This Gulf station is pictured here with old pumps. Pictured at right. >>>>>

The lower picture looking east along Pine Street Shows newer gas pumps, and would have probably been pictured here in the 1940s.

500, or 501, Sweitzer Street, on the southwest corner, had been a restaurant in earlier years.

In 1931, **Deo Teaford** operated a grocery on this corner ("at the point").

In 1935, **City Service Grocery** was located here.

In 1939, the site was vacant.

In 1947, **Robert Lehman** ran a Sinclair filling station here.

In 1954, the Sinclair station was torn down.

In 1955, **James Lloyd** operated a Cities Service gas station here.

In 1960, **John Niley** owned the Cities Service gas station here.

About 1963, **David Niley** owned this station, eventually becoming a Citgo gas station.

In 1992, it was known as **Niley's Service Station**, and remained there for many years.

The northwest corner of Van Kirk's corner was and is 100 Fort Jefferson Ave. or 100 Jefferson Ave., and this road extended from this corner southwest to the city limits. Occupants included:

In 1923, **Hawes Cash Grocery** occupied this location.

The 1930s this was the **Oak View Grocery**.

In 1947, **Lambertson Grocery** was here.

In 1950, **Parkview Clover Farm Grocery and Meat Market** was the business here.

In 1955, **Oakview Upholstery** occupied this location.

In 1960, (vacant)

In 1962, **Virginia Dean** had an Interior Decorating business here.

In 1963, **Rhodehamel's Used Clothing** was short-lived here.

In 1965, **Vic's Soft Serve Water** business was here.

In 1966-68 **Culligan's Water Softener**

In 1971 (vacant)

From 1972 to 1979, **Brewer's Motor Mart** showroom was here.

In 1982 (vacant)

In 1984, **Phil Brooke's Medicine Shoppe** was here.

In more recent years, the drug store business was changed to **Medicine and More**.

The southeast corner at Van Kirk's corner is best known for **Teaford's Grocery**.

Teaford's Historical Timeline:

Everyone alive now who was raised in Greenville has memories of **Teaford's Dairy Store**, a staple on the city's southside. **Deo S. Teaford** (1889-1945) and **Mae Lane Teaford** (1890-1964) married May 17, 1910. They had two sons, **E.J. Lane Teaford** (1914-1959) GHS 1933, and **Milo Wayne Teaford** (1916-1997) GHS 1934. Their wives, **Betty Robbins Teaford** (1918-1999) GHS 1936 (Milo's), and **Ruth Riggs Teaford Mann** (1914-1996) GHS 1933 (EJ's) were always instrumental in the success of these business ventures.

In the 1920s, Deo owned the **Speedway Billiard Parlor** at 329 South Broadway until he decided to get into the already crowded grocery market that existed in Greenville. There were 23 groceries listed in the 1923 City Directory and in 1931 there were 21 grocery stores in town. Deo and his two sons, E.J. and Milo, ran two groceries in Greenville from 1930 to 1945. From 1932 to 1939, the **Teaford's I.G.A.** was operated by Deo and the boys and was located at 617 South Broadway. From 1939 to 1947, it moved into a larger room next door at 613-615, and offered a "complete line of fresh meats, groceries, and fresh fruits" (*from 1939 City Directory*).

Deo died in 1945 and E.J. and Milo ran their grocery at 613-615 Broadway until 1947, then **Lowell Vietor** and **Sherman Huston** started their grocery at this location, from 1948 to 1955. In the early 1950s, E.J. and Milo sold this property on Broadway to Vietor and Huston, and this became a very successful grocery/thrift store, named **Vietor-Huston's**, until they built a new, larger grocery south of the Fairgrounds in 1955 at 1120 Dayton Road. This is where **Eikenberry's** (South) location is at the present time.

In the 1920s the Van Dyke Grocery was owned and operated by Ed and Cora Van Dyke and was on the point at 500 Sweitzer St. across the street from where Teaford's is now. By 1935, this location on the point was a Cities Service Gas Station, which later became **Dave Niley's** service station. From 1936 to 1946, **Jay Franklin Wright**, owned the corner where Teaford's is now and leased it to Gulf Refining Company as a gas station. In 1946, he sold this southeast corner lot of Sweitzer and Pine Streets to **Versal Tobias "Toby" Seman**. In 1947, Toby Seman started a grocery on this site and sold it to E.J. Teaford (1947), who then sold it to Milo Teaford in 1950. The current location at 501 Sweitzer Street was the **Teaford's Grocery/Dairy Store** from 1947 to 1995, sometimes being called a grocery and sometimes called a dairy store. The neon sign on the corner said "T's Dairy Store". Many people might have wondered how such a small location which was packed with so many items for sale in tight quarters could have produced a good living for their family. A city noted historian, **Kay Tilden Brown** (1916-2014), went through grade school at East School and she always said the smartest person in her grade (class of 1934) at East was Milo Teaford. Eventually, **Mary Jane Allread** and **Edith Mote** were the Valedictorian and Salutatorian of this class in 1934, and **Dick Heine**, the eventual arranger for the Ohio State University Marching Band and "Hang on Sloopy" fame, were all in this class, and were all quite smart, but Milo was really "tops in the class". He knew how to make this grocery business work and, along with hard work, was quite successful at it.

In February, 1995, **John** and **Jodi Baumgardner** bought the Dairy Store property from Milo and Betty. They had taken over the property in September, 1994. The store featured 12 flavors of hand dipped ice cream, buns, bread, milk, beer, tobacco products, chips, penny candy, grocery items and T-shirts for sale.

In 1998, John sold half interest to his sister **Lisa Baumgardner Francis** GHS 1979, and husband **Craig Francis**. They added wine, Nascar racing collectibles, lottery tickets, and subs to sell. In January, 2000, Lisa sold property to Craig's brother, **Dale Francis** GHS 1973, after significant remodeling.

In December, 2003, Dale Francis sold the property to **Terry Keaser** GHS 1973, and wife **Marjorie Keaser**. It was still called Teaford's Dairy Store then, but this is when pizzas became the main focus of their store offerings. In addition to the goods sold by the Baumgardners and Francis, the Keasers added more soft drinks, some household and health items, newspapers and other publications, and Racecar and Nascar items for sale. Teaford's has been one of Greenville's best-known stops for locals for decades, possibly second only to the Maid-Rite Sandwich Shoppe.

On April 10, 2018, Terry and Marjorie sold the store to son and step-son, **Aaron Keaser** GHS 2010. Aaron had earned a business degree from Indiana University East in Richmond. He remembers coming into the store as a child and buying penny candy, as do many of the older patrons. In 2019, the name of the business was changed to **Teaford's Pizza and Subs**. Aaron now offers a variety of sandwiches, nachos, 8" subs, breadsticks, appetizer starters, chicken, cheese balls, fried foods, snacks and beverages, including beers and local wines. Pizza is America's favorite fan food and it rules the day at Teaford's. They most often create specialty

pizza pies from the personal sized 6” to 18”, blending different flavors and three or more ingredients, and including the newer concept of gluten-free cauliflower crust pizzas. The management is very aware of health-conscious choices that today’s customers demand. Customers’ favorites include the Teaford’s Super Deluxe Pizza and Teaford’s Sub Deluxe. Aaron now has ten employees on the payroll, with most being high school students and some adult managers. They have increased their delivery to a 10-mile radius. He spends about 80 hours a week at the shop working, ordering supplies and making crusts. New larger freezers have been installed along the front windows, expanding their refrigerated supplies. The address now is 101 Pine Street, which is the same as 501 Sweitzer Street, an address that was previously used.

The **Greenville Athletic Boosters** chose Teaford’s Pizza to be the ones sold at the concession stands for the boys and girls varsity and JV basketball games for the 2020-2021 school year, because they serve good quality pizza and the business is locally owned. The slices from an 18” pizza cut into 8 pieces give the fans at the games large sizes of cheese and pepperoni pizzas to enjoy at all the home games for basketball and next year for the football games in the fall. “We are always pleased to give back to the community,” said Keaser. “We believe it is important to support our youth. We are happy to be able to provide this support through our Teaford’s Pizza.” The COVID had shrunk all the attendances for the games for the 2020-2021 season but 2021-2022 was better attended. Suppliers change often for this service.

Teaford’s has always been owned and operated by Greenville entrepreneurs and has been a Greenville tradition in its current location for 74 years. They offer delivery within ten miles, and is now open six days a week, Tuesday through Sunday, and can be reached at 937-547-9383, or website: www.teafords.com , or online at facebook: www.facebook.com/teafordspizza .



Heart Attack Ends Life Of Greenville Grocer

Deo S. Teaford, 35, well known Greenville grocer and a member of the Darke County fair board for several years, died Saturday afternoon at Wayne hospital here from the effects of a heart attack he had suffered two weeks ago.

The body has been removed to his late home on the Ft. Jefferson road where friends may call. Services will be held there at 2:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon with the Rev. Frank Thomas and the Rev. J. E. Eiler officiating. Burial will be in Palestine cemetery.

A Darke county native, Mr. Teaford was very active in civic and fraternal affairs. He served as clerk of Special School District No. 14 in Greenville township and was a member of both the Elks and Moose lodges, this city, and the Knights of Pythias, at Palestine.

He was very well known among harness race enthusiasts throughout the state having at one time owned a stable of top-ranking horses.

His immediate survivors include his wife, Mae, two sons, Pfc. E. J. Teaford, who serves with the Marine Corps in the southwest Pacific, and Milo, of Greenville; four grandchildren; two brothers, Arno and Reno, both of this city, and a sister, Mrs. Noah Wenrick, of Dayton.

Both the Moose and Elks lodges will conduct services at the Teaford residence this evening, the former at 7:30 p. m. and the latter at 8:30 o'clock.

DEO S. TEAFORD, the son of Ephraim and Dona Teaford, was born November 19, 1889, near Palestine, Ohio, and died at Wayne hospital in Greenville, on February 17, 1945, aged 55 years, 2 months and 28 days. He lived practically all his life in Darke County except for 2 years residence at Celina, Ohio.

On May 17, 1910, he was united in marriage with Mae Lane of Nashville, O. To this union were born five, two sons both of whom survive their father.

Deo united with the Universalist Church of Palestine during his childhood, of which church he remained a member until his death.

He was also a member of the Loyal Order of Moose and the Elks Lodge of Greenville, and of the Anchor Grange and the K. of P. Lodge of Palestine.

He served as a member of the Darke County Fair Board for many years. He was also for many years clerk of the school board of District 14.

For the last 15 years, he and his two sons have operated two groceries in Greenville.

Deo loved his home, his family, and his friends. He enjoyed the friendship and the fellowship of many people, young and old. He will continue to live in the hearts and the affections of all who knew him.

There survive him, his wife, Mae, his two sons, E. J., now serving with the Marines in the Southwest Pacific, and Milo, of Greenville, 4 grandchildren, one sister, Mrs. Eco Wenrick of Dayton, 2 brothers, Arno and Reno of Greenville, besides many other relatives and friends.

Mae L. Teaford Dies; Rites Set

Mrs. Mae L. Teaford, 74, lifelong resident of the Greenville area, died at 8:20 a.m. yesterday at the Wynwood nursing home here, following an illness of 13 months.

Mrs. Teaford was a Darke county native and had lived for the past 46 years at her home on the Fort Jefferson road south of the fairgrounds. She was the widow of Deo Teaford, well-known Greenville grocer. Mrs. Teaford was a member of the First Christian church, Aituisa club, Past Chief's club, Rebekah lodge and Wayne chapter of Maibag, all of Greenville, and the Friendship Circle of Palestine. She was also a past officer of the grand chapter of Maibag.

Survivors are: one son, Milo, of Greenville; four grandchildren; three great-grandchildren, and one brother, Glen Lane, of R. R. 3, Greenville.

Services will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday at the Miller funeral home here, with the Rev. Frank Thomas officiating. Burial will be in Palestine cemetery. Friends may call at the funeral home from 2 to 5 and 7 to 9 p.m. today, and Tuesday until time of services.

E. J. TEAFORD DEAD; GREENVILLE GROCER, WORLD WAR 2 VET

E. J. Teaford, 45, well known Greenville grocer and Marine corps veteran of World War II, led at 5:25 a. m. today at Wayne hospital here from the effects of a heart attack he suffered eight days ago.

Mr. Teaford and a brother, Milo, had operated Teaford's Dairy Store, corner of Sweitzer and Pine streets, since 1946. His career in the grocery business, interrupted only by two years of service in the armed forces, extended back over nearly twenty preceding years.

He got his start when only 14 years old in a food market operated on South Broadway by his father, the late Deo S. Teaford. The father died in 1945.

A native of Greenville township, Mr. Teaford had spent his entire life in this area, graduating from Greenville high school with the Class of 1933.

He served in the Marine corps from April 11, 1944 to February 7, 1946 and spent several months in the Pacific zone of operations.

He was a member of Greenville posts of the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars and of the Congregational Christian church. His home was at Wayne Lakes Park, near Ft. Jefferson.

Surviving are his wife, Ruth; two sons, Larry, also of Wayne Lakes Park, and Tommy, at one; one grandson; his mother, Mrs. Mae E. L. Teaford of Greenville and the one brother, Milo Teaford, Greenville.

Full military funeral services and burial are planned Tuesday afternoon. The services will be held at 2 p. m. at the Oliver funeral home here with the Rev. Frank Thomas officiating. Burial will be in Greenville cemetery.

Friends may call at the funeral home after 3 p. m. Sunday.

Betty R. Teaford, 80, Greenville, died May 23 at Scott and White Hospital in Temple, Texas.

She was born Dec. 21, 1918, in Woodington, daughter of Russell and Grace (Detling) Robbins. Also deceased is her husband, Milo W. Teaford, who died Jan. 30, 1997.

In addition to her volunteer activities, she worked with her husband at T's Dairy Store for 25 years.



To place a carryout order, call 547-9383. Teaford's hours are 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. Saturday through Thursday and 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. on Friday. But their motto states "When you see us in the store...we are open!"

Teaford's *March 31, 2019* celebrating an anniversary

GREENVILLE – Monday marks the first anniversary of Aaron Keaser's ownership of Teaford's Pizza and Subs – a Greenville landmark also known as Teaford's Dairy Store – at 101 Pine St.

Keaser purchased the pizza and sub shop from his father and stepmom, Terry and Marge Keaser last spring and continues to offer award-winning subs, pizza and a variety of sandwiches, snacks and beverages including beers and local wines.

Teaford's has been a Greenville staple since at least the 1920s, Keaser said – in the same location.

"After something's been here that long, we don't want to change it," he said.

Keaser has made some upgrades to the kitchen area of the store, including adding air conditioning and a new freezer.

"We're upgrading and preparing for the future," Keaser said.

He's also in tune with changes in how customers are moving to making healthy choices, including adding a gluten-free cauliflower crust.

"We can make any of our pizzas on the cauliflower crust," Keaser said, adding one of the most popular pizzas is the super deluxe, which is featured on a billboard sign on State Route 121.

"It's got everything on it but the kitchen sink, People will call in and ask for the pizza on the sign," he said.

Keaser's father purchased the business in December 2003, adding pizzas to the menu. The

remembers stopping in Teaford's for penny candy as a kid and went on to work there for his dad before earning a business degree from Indiana University East in Richmond.

"It was meant to be and fell into place," he said of keeping the business in his family.

Currently Keaser has four employees and said he's looking to add a couple part-time positions in the near future.



Henry Ungericht owned a Blacksmith and Horseshoeing Shop on Ludlow Street between East Fourth and East Fifth Streets, in this photo from about 1910. This is compliments of Henry's great-grandson, **Phil Ungericht**, GHS 1964. The shop was located at the rear of Henry and wife **Jennie's** residence, a brick house at 507 East Fourth Street. This house still stands and is pictured today, at the upper right. This is about two blocks east and north of the former East Elementary School site. The shop was along the alley on Ludlow Street, about where the split rail fencing marks the property in the lower right photo from today. Around 1930, **William Ungericht** took over the blacksmith business. In 1939 William was a Member of City Council and still operated the blacksmith shop. He and wife **Inez** still lived at 507 East Fourth Street during those years. By 1947, William was a bookkeeper for the Ohio State Highway Department and the blacksmith shop was a part of history. There is a legend that Henry had a moonshine still in the back room of the blacksmith shop. When he sensed that the law was about to uncover his illegal activity, Henry buried the still under the ground in that back room of the shop.

G.H.S. Athletic Hall of Fame Inducts Two Classes

This school year's Athletic Hall of Fame was celebrated Saturday, December 18. It is usually held in January but there were no home Saturday games after Dec 18. Since COVID closed down most of the school activities a year ago, the inductees chosen last year were introduced to the fans a year later and they split the honors with this year's selections. Last year's honorees were long-time Lady Wave Softball Coach **Jerrod Newland**, **Jordyn Fisherback**, GHS 2010, and **Brian Matix**, GHS 1984. Their biographies were included in the Spring, 2021, AlumNewsletter, and can be revisited there.

This year's new members are **Krysten Blumenstock**, GHS 2008, **Selo Ramjattan**, GHS 2010, and **Aaron Shaffer**, GHS 1995. **Krysten** was the winner of seven varsity letters and participated in volleyball and softball. In volleyball, she was an all-around player on teams that compiled a three-year record of 54-16. They were state ranked and won the GWOC title in 2005. But it was softball where she was a true standout. As a three-year starting catcher who switched to shortstop her senior year, the Lady Wave amassed a 108-18 mark with a D-II State championship in 2007. A two-time All-Southwest Ohio selection, she accumulated over 125 career hits and RBIs. Following graduation she attended Wheaton College, and now lives in Clayton, Ohio, where she is a police officer at Cox International Airport in Vandalia. She had previously worked for the Darke County Sheriff's Office.

Selo Ramjattan was a letterman as a wingback in football. However, it was on the wrestling mat where he made his mark as a two-time state qualifier in D-I. One of the Wave's all-time best in many categories, he finished sixth in the state as a junior at 145 pounds. As a senior wrestling at 152 pounds, he was a sectional champion and compiled a record of 51-6 with a school record 251 takedowns, contributing to a total of 110 career wins. After GHS he attended Sinclair Community College and now operates a fitness gym and competes in CrossFit competitions. He

is also a personal trainer and currently resides in Greenville.

Aaron Shaffer was a letter winner in baseball but was an outstanding defensive lineman for the Wave football team. A second team GMVC choice as a junior, he was first team GMVC and Southwest Ohio and second team All-Ohio as a senior and still holds the school record with four sacks in a game. After graduation, Aaron attended Wittenberg University in Springfield and was a three-year starter on the offensive line for the Tigers. He played on three North Coast Athletic Conference champions, was a two-time All-NCAC selection, and was a two-time D-III NCAA All-American as well as team captain. After graduation, he coached at Wittenberg, was head coach at Springfield South High School, and then came home to serve as the Green Wave's head football coach for seven years. For the past three years, he's been the Athletic Director at GHS. He and his wife **Jessica** reside in Greenville with son **A.J.** and daughter **Lizzie**.

It was a great night to see six deserving new members enter the GHS Athletic Hall of Fame.



The beginning of our new **Fieldhouse** with the first turning of dirt on January 4, 2022 (above). The Board of Education approved moving ahead with Phase II construction on Dec. 22, 2021. This Fieldhouse will include a new concession stand, locker rooms, restrooms, and a training room facility. It should be ready for the Fall, 2022 season, weather permitting. This Phase has a maximum price of \$3,135,617, and will be covered by the School District.
