

Greenville High School's Building Turns 60 Years Old

On September 10, 2022, 60 years will have passed since the opening of our current High School building. This happened two weeks after expectation due to unfinished new construction at that time. Here are some of the events that led up to this memorable time for the City of Greenville.

School Bond Issue Proposed in 1958

A \$1,975,000 School Bond Issue would have been financed by a tax assessment of 3.20 mills averaged over a period of 22 years. This would be \$3.20 per \$1,000 of real estate valuation. This was proposed by the School Board.

The school bond issue of 3.2 mills voted on November 4, 1958, was not the best proposal, but was presented due to crowded conditions in the Greenville Schools. The existing High School on Central Avenue was to remain as the high school but with the ninth grade taken out, and two new junior high buildings were proposed to be built with this school bond. The buildings would be located in the north and south parts of town. Each building would have 12 classrooms for general instruction, two general science rooms, a home economics department, industrial arts shops, combined vocal and instrumental music rooms, library, audio-visual room, lunchroom, kitchen, conference room, and gymnasium.

There were reportedly 870 students in the 1958 East School picture taken (and shown here) towards Ballinger's Lumber Yard for the levy brochure, including Kindergarten through 8th Grade. The next year the 8th grade was moved to the High School because East School was short on space, easing some of the pressure temporarily. If this levy had passed and been implemented, the older High School would have continued in use, but would have become severely deficient in coming years. The Superintendent at that time was **Robert Duncan**, who served in this capacity from 1951 to 1958, but who failed in delivering this new school building proposal.

Crowded conditions will exist in the present school facilities by the 1959-1960 term. Predicted elementary school enrollments will be 2362, with a capacity in present buildings of 2310. Grades 9-12 enrollments will be 781 with the capacity of the present high school center 800. There will be a gradual predicted increase in enrollments until by the 1965-66 term, an overall rise of 805 students is expected.

Construction of junior high plants would relieve crowded conditions in both high school (by taking out the 9th grade) and elementary (by taking out the 7th and 8th grades) facilities and leave them adequate for many years.

what?

The proposed facilities for each building include:

- 12 classrooms for general instruction
- 2 general science demonstration classrooms with an adjoining preparation and storage room
- Home economics department which would be a combination foods, clothing, and home economics laboratory.
- Industrial arts department including 2 general shops, and auxilliary facilities.
- Combination vocal and instrumental room with 3 small practice rooms.
- Library including small conference and storage rooms.
- Audio-visual room.
- Lunchroom including a combination dining room and study hall, kitchen, storage, and serving area.
- Office suite including a conference room.
- Gymnasium 60 X 100 which can be divided into 2 classrooms for physical education.

In addition to the two new junior high buildings, the bond issue would cover the cost of equipping the two buildings, the cost of one new school site in the south end of the city, and a total of \$100,000 repairs in the high school building of which a major portion will be used to install new boilers.

The Bond Issue received a resounding defeat on November 4, 1958. Not one precinct voted "Yes" in the majority. The losing vote totals were 3,729 No and 2,168 Yes. This was Mr. Duncan's final year as Superintendent. If this levy had passed and been implemented, the older High School would have continued in use, but would have become severely deficient in coming years.

GREENVILLE SCHOOL BOND ISSUE SNOWED UNDER BY VOTERS

Party lines had little meaning for Darke county voters at the polls Tuesday as they backed Republican candidates in all but two state and district races and then turned an abrupt about face to give Democratic standard bearers big majorities in all county contests.

The vote turnout was very heavy for a non-presidential year but the 17,206 ballots cast were under the 1950 record total of 17,252.

The only Democratic to carry the county on state and district slates were Joseph T. Ferguson for treasurer of state and Joseph D. Kerns for district court of appeals.

Republican winners on the state ticket were led by Gov. C. William O'Neill and U. S. Senator John Bricker while U.S. Congressman William M. McCulloch paced the district GOP district office victors.

On the county ticket, however, it was an entirely different story with Democratic candidates sweeping four contests, state representative, auditor, commissioner and county court judge.

One of the Republicans topped was Howard G. Kester, in-

Incumbent county commissioner. He was defeated by Roland J. Byers, 8,877 to 7,276.

The other Democrat winners were Charles Fowble, present auditor; Wayne Maloon, candidate for state representative, and two incumbent county court judges, Marion Perry and Herbert W. Cox.

Fowble defeated Charles D. Cunningham, 10,917 to 5,010, while Maloon polled 8,959 votes to 6,751 for S. C. Gnagey.

Judge Perry was the high man in a three-way race for the two judgeships. His vote total was 10,395. Judge Cox received 8,378 while third man, Walter F. Rhynard, got 3,976.

In voting on a fifth county office, common pleas judge, Republican Howard G. Eley, now serving by appointment, was elected to his first full term on the bench without opposition. He polled a heavy complimentary vote of 12,086.

The controversial right-to-work issue was defeated in the county but by a very slim margin. The vote was 7,849 yes and 7,917 no.

Greenville Issue Beaten

Darke county's biggest local issue, moneywise, the \$1,975,000 Greenville school bond proposal was snowed under.

The unofficial totals on the bond issue were 3,729 no, 2,168 yes. An election board tabulation shows that the issue failed to carry a single precinct in the city school district.



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
1960 School Bond Issue led to our Current High School Building

In May, 1960, there was a new Superintendent, **Beryl Hensel** (served 1958-1968), and a different approach was proposed and presented to the voters. The artist's rendering for this new high school building is shown in this drawing. Many aspects look like our current building, with the main difference being the orientation of the gymnasium going east-west. It was built in a north-south direction. This became the new High School building presently in use, and included only the 10th, 11th, and 12th grades. The vote on May 3 was very close, but passed. The first students began using this building on September 10, 1962, two weeks after school should have started. The ninth grade was left behind at the old high school building which then became the Junior High School. The seventh and eighth grades from all the elementary schools were moved to this Junior High, making more space in the elementary buildings. The Greenville City Schools elementary buildings at that time were North, South, East, Greenville Township (Woodland Heights), and Washington Township. The first graduating class at the new G.H.S. was 1963, and the first class to attend all three years was the class of 1965.

The artist's rendering (pictured below) shows the Proposed High School building if the voters passed this 1960 bond levy. Visible changes from this original rendering to how the school building was completed were: The building setback from the street was increased, the front drive/parking area was widened, classroom windows were made smaller, the cafeteria was enlarged pushing the whole building farther back from the street, and the gymnasium orientation became front-to-back (north-south).




The present Greenville Senior High School, begun in 1961, is situated on seventeen acres in the city park area. The building covers 99,070 square feet and has a pupil capacity of 850. The architect was Ralph Harman of Springfield, Ohio, and the main contractors were Shappie Construction Company, Tibbets Plumbing and Heating, and Heckler Electric Corporation.



New construction of High School opening, September, 1962


Special features of the building include a combination gymnasium and auditorium which can seat 3,500; a special room for the staffs of the G.H.S. Advocate, the "Chief," and other school publications, and a library containing a reading room, office, and audio visual room.

Special class work areas include four science laboratories, with a greenhouse in the biology department, an electronic foreign language laboratory, a mathematics laboratory, and a portable stage for speech classes.



Besides these there are nineteen regular classrooms, three business education rooms, cooking, sewing, and home planning section in home economics, metal and wood shops, an art room, and a mechanical drawing room. The music department has a band and orchestra room, vocal music, ensemble, and practice rooms, and an office. Administrative offices include a reception room, work room, principal's office, Dean of Boys' and Dean of Girls' offices, and a guidance office.



GREENVILLE SCHOOLS NOW IN SEVEN BUILDINGS —

New Senior High Opening Near

A record number of students in the Greenville Public School district will begin the 1962-63 year with an estimated 735 of them attending classes in a new senior high school building and operating under a major academic change in the system.

School officials predict total enrollment will pass 3,500 in the district's seven buildings.

The new enrollment record will surpass by about 150 the 3,368 of last year, highest in the history of the system. The growth has been fast in the past eight years from the 2,181 who attended in 1954.

Students will register on Monday, Sept. 10 — a half-day session — to begin the school year. The first day will be from 8:30 to 11 a.m. while the regular hours for the rest of the year are from 8:15 a.m. to 3:15 p.m.

Teachers will get an early start on the year when they attend the annual teacher orientation sessions on Thursday and Friday, Aug. 30 and 31.

Register Week Late

Registration is coming a week late and was delayed according to officials, to allow additional time to complete the final details on the estimated \$1,500,000 senior high school building.

Because of the delayed start, the school year will extend to June 7 instead of June 4, the school office has announced. Commencement exercises also have been changed from June 4 to June 7.

The senior high opens its doors for the first time after construction on the 17-acre plot on the north side of the Greenville City Park began about a year and a half ago.

First Since 1924

It is the first new high school building for the city system since 1924 when the building at the corner of West Fourth street and Central avenue was built.

Greatly improved teaching conditions will prevail in the new building, according to Beryl D. Hensel, superintendent of schools. More space plus modern equipment are the key factors, Hensel said.

The new building will have at least 34 teaching areas for subjects which will provide a complete curriculum. Facilities have been included for academic studies such as foreign language, mathematics, English, history and general social studies.

Both manual training and the agricultural course have complete shops at their disposal while the home economics, commercial, science, music and physical education

departments have rooms and equipment for their special needs.

System Changes

The senior high has made it possible to change the Greenville system from the "eight-four" to the "six-three-three" by moving grades seven, eight and nine into the former high school building.

Elementary grades, from kindergarten through the sixth, will be taught in the five grade school buildings, North, South, East, Washington Elementary and Woodland Heights.

Prior to the 1962-63 year, the lower grades through the eighth were taught in the grade school buildings while the ninth through 12th attended classes in the high school structure.

The change to the six-three-three introduces the junior high school and provides students at those grade levels a much better curriculum, Hensel said.

More studies will be offered the estimated 340 which will be in the seventh and eighth grades the superintendent pointed out. The ninth

grade will follow the high school curriculum.

Advantages

The advantages are primarily at the seventh and eighth grade levels, Hensel pointed out.

He listed the changes as providing science, home economics, shop and art for the students in the two grades. In addition, the students will be mixed with those which more nearly are in their age level, Hensel added.

Changes in the old building to make ready for the junior high have included enlarging the cafeteria, revamping the heating system and rearranging interiors of some of the rooms.

136 Instructors

The entire system will have 136 instruction personnel including special teachers and principals,

six central office personnel, seven secretaries in the buildings, 16 custodians, 18 bus drivers, a bus manager-mechanic, a cafeteria supervisor and 23 cafeteria employees.

In addition to the seven buildings, the district operates a total of 18 school buses.

Members of the school board are Dr. Robert O. Wilson, president; James Mannix, vice-president; Adrien Aten, John Fourman and Earl Scholl, members. Robert Kolp serves as the clerk of the board.

The assistant superintendent of schools is W. T. Maxwell.

The architect on the new building was Ralph Harman. The general contractor was J. C. Shappie of Versailles, the heating and plumbing by Tibbets Heating and Plumbing, Union City and Dayton, and electrical work by Heckler of Celina.




TYPICAL CLASSROOM — includes chalk boards, tack board, unit heater, accessory storage cabinets, and storage closet. Ceilings have acoustical plaster. Block walls are painted with pastel colors.



THE LANGUAGE LAB is equipped with a modern functional electronic system to correlate the necessary functions of teaching modern foreign languages. There are 30 student booths equipped with headphones and microphones that in turn are connected with the teacher's master console. The system can transmit simultaneously as many as 5 different programs from the instructor's console to the student booths.



INDUSTRIAL ARTS — two complete shops provide training in wood, metal, electricity, auto mechanics, welding, foundry, etc. There is also a fully equipped mechanical drawing room.



SCIENCE DEPARTMENT — includes four laboratories — two biology, and two for chemistry and physics. The labs have modern type furniture equipped with gas, water, electricity, and demonstration areas. Lecture areas are incorporated in the labs. The biology rooms share a greenhouse.



HOME ECONOMICS — separate cooking and sewing laboratories with adjacent room for home planning and living activities. The cooking laboratory provides 6 kitchen units. Each unit will accommodate 4 girls. The laboratory is equipped with sinks, cupboards, ranges, refrigerator, freezer, laundry and drying service. The sewing laboratory is equipped with cutting tables and sewing machines.



COMMERCIAL DEPARTMENT — equipped for typing, shorthand, bookkeeping, office practice, and related subjects. There are two typing rooms, a business machines room, and a bookkeeping room.



LIBRARY — located adjacent to the classroom wing. It consists of a large reading room, work-room, audio-visual room, conference room, and a stack room.




MAIN LOBBY — provides main entrance to the school and facilitates student traffic flow from all areas of the building.



CAFETERIA — large, light and attractively decorated and seats 275. It is served by a modern kitchen equipped with two serving lines, automatic dishwasher, disposal, gas ranges, steam kettle, pressure cooker, baking ovens, pass through refrigerators, mixers, etc. Adjacent rooms contain a walk-in cooler and storage.



MUSIC DEPARTMENT — the band and orchestra room and the vocal music room are equipped with built in risers. The rooms are acoustically treated. Between these two areas are small practice rooms, a music library and a music office.



ART — provided with electricity and water, and equipped with furniture and equipment for instruction in arts and crafts.



SPEECH DEPARTMENT — consists of a classroom with a portable stage for speech activities. There are two small adjoining rooms to be used as a speech clinic.

M. Byron Morton, Assistant Superintendent of Public Instruction for the State of Ohio, gave the Dedicatory Address.







YOUR GREENVILLE HIGH SCHOOL RING (Keep this for permanent reference)

1. **QUALITY OF CONSTRUCTION:** The craftsmanship and materials that went into the creation of your ring are the finest. The dies were hand cut (to our design); the stone is the finest quality synthetic gem (spinel) and is 8/10 as hard as a diamond. The design is such that the lettering and other detail work are protected from wear. With reasonable care your ring should last a lifetime.
2. **SYMBOLS ON THE RING:**
 - (a) The rope of friendship surrounding the stone, symbolic of the unending friendships formed while in school.
 - (b) The founding date, 1868; ours is one of the oldest public high schools in Ohio.
 - (c) The school crest, designed in 1914 by Miss Anna Bier, long the distinguished teacher of art here. The crest includes: the motto "to train for good citizenship"; the arrowhead, symbolic of Greenville's pioneer tradition, with "Treaty City-1793-1814" for the two historic treaties signed here with the Indian Nations; two buckeye trees rooted in 5 opening buckeyes which represent the 5 curricula (liberal arts, industrial arts, home economics, commercial and agriculture); low hills and rising sun, representing opportunity, taken from the state seal; the towering wave, representing the spirit of competition at our school both in academics and athletics.

3. MODIFICATIONS AND REPLACEMENT:

- (a) Your manufacturer is Josten's, Inc., Owatonna, Minnesota. If at any time in the future you should want to have your stone encrusted with masonic symbol, fraternity letters, initials, etc., you can send it to the manufacturer and have it done.
- (b) The ring is traditional and the design belongs to us; if you ever need to replace it all you need to do is order another one, specifying the year of graduation. They may be ordered at any time of the year.
- (c) It is desirable for your ring to be slightly loose—your finger will be slightly larger in warm weather, when working with your hands, etc.
- (d) A run-of-the-mill, stock classring (such as most highschools have) can be stretched; your ring is too well-made to stretch and must be cut and a piece added to make it larger. Think long before having your ring sized.

4. **WEARING THE RING:** It is customary to wear a classring on the third finger of the right hand with the name of the school in a position to be read by others (in our case, with the founding date away from the wearer). Be careful with the stone—even diamonds break when struck against another hard object.

5. Your ring is widely known and recognized; wear it with pride and add to its reputation.





Help keep us informed about recent events

Many of the obituaries published in the papers or by the funeral homes have biographies, relatives listed, and pictures of the decedent. We are listing the websites of the funeral homes which can provide this data to the public who asks. The sites listed have obituaries or archived obituaries on which you can click. Over 90% of the listed entries have website accessibility. Some of the older obits may be timed out or dropped, and may not still be there. If you cannot reach one of the ones by website, and would like a copy of a specific obituary we have listed, please let the Alumni Association know. We will send you a copy electronically or by mail of documentation that we have.

We have decided to go beyond the GHS graduates, and include those we can verify or remember attending GHS, even if that person did not graduate with his/her class. If he/she attended GHS in earlier years, then he/she is listed with the class with which that person would have graduated if he/she had stayed through commencement.

Our listings are arranged with oldest GHS alums listed first by class, his/her age at death, date of death, place of most recent residence, and the website where more information can be obtained. To find a deceased, you may use a search engine, like Google, and type in "person's name, the word > obituary, year, state, etc." This list is far from complete, using just the data we had access to, or could find. Many deaths are not listed anywhere.

Many funeral homes have websites with the written obituaries and some have pictures of the decedent. If you go to these websites, click on obituaries and find your person of interest by name or by date. The .com address next to each person's name will tell you which websites to go to, such as, for example, (*DignityMemorial*) after the name would mean to look at: www.dignitymemorial.com
