## HAPPY HOLIDAYS TO OUR GHS ALUMNI FAMILY!!

Getting ready for Christmas.

Greenville High School's **145**<sup>th</sup> **Commencement** was held at Harmon Field on Sat. June 1 in front of about 3,000 friends and family members. There were 194 graduates this year, with the numbers trending down through the years. In the late 1970s and early 1980s there were over 300 graduates each year, and as recent as 2003 there were 271 receiving diplomas. Three graduates also received their Associates Degree from Edison State College at the same time: **Micah Light, Noah Walker,** and **Macy Denlinger.** 54% plan to attend two- or four-year colleges, with a predominance of two-year term length. 32% plan to enter the work force and 6% plan on going to the military. \$672,438 worth of scholarships went to the graduating Seniors and this amount has shrunk up partly due to the fact that many of the college-bound students continue to live at home. Their scholarship needs are different than times in the past.

This year six Valedictorians shared the honors. They all have a 4.0 GPA with "A" averages in all their high school classes. Weighted classes are taken out unlike many other recent years when GPAs were broken down into thousandths of a point. Lauren Dull plans to enter the University of Cincinnati and major in Film and Media Studies. Tessa Garber won the Elizabeth Hill Citizenship Award and plans to enter the workforce and not attend college at the present time. Jada Garland was the Senior Class Secretary and Student Council President, and plans to attend Miami University and major in Marketing/Business. Kaitlyn Hackett will attend Sinclair Community College and major in Dental Hygiene. Lauren Hartzell won the Kathryn Griner Academic Award and plans on entering the University of Findlay and major in Pre-Veterinary Medicine. The sixth Valedictorian was Ashley Jolley was the Senior Class Reporter who will attend the University of Cincinnati and major in Nursing.

Only one time in GHS history was their more than six Valedictorians the same year and that was 1988, when there were eight: **Lori Blanchard, Diane Rank, Andrew Rivetti, Luke Rosenberger, Brooke Schooley, Krista Schultz, Mark Smearsoll,** and **Richard Wright II.** The Classes of 1983, 1986 and 1989 had five-way ties for the top spot. 1990 had a four-way tie, and last year's 2018 class had a three-way dead-lock.

The Senior Send-Off Assembly ended with the passing of the School Key from this past year's Senior Class President **Dylan Snyder** (2019) to next year's President **Ethan Flanery** (2020).



## 1951 Greenville Girl Scouts

In 1951 over 300 local Greenville girls were part of the Girl Scout troops, including Brownies and Girl Scout members. They posed for a picture at the Health Camp in the City Park which at that time was near the swimming pool, and this picture shows most of those over six years old who were members at that time. The photo was enlarged and mounted on plywood, then varnished to be preserved. Some faces of some of the individuals have faded but many can still be identified. Water damage and 60+ years of wear have made the picture weaker. When the original Girl Scout Little House that was built in 1942 was torn down, a new Little House was built in 1993. This picture is an invaluable piece of local history and was rescued from a trash dumpster by our former GHS Alumni Association President Nancy Arens Parker, GHS 1962. Before her death she passed this on to her classmate Georgia Swab Young, GHS 1962, and now it belongs to Shirley Cohee Hughes, GHS 1955.




## 1916 Class Song Sheet Music

Common to many of the older classes at G.H.S. and at other high schools of that era, was a "Class Song" written for that class by one of its classmates. This "1916 Class Song" was written by **Agnes Trainor**, GHS 1916, and this copy was donated to our Alumni Association by **Martha Grim Warvel**, a Palestine H.S. grad. Martha's husband, **Devon Warvel**, GHS 1940, was a cousin of **Elizabeth McCabe**, GHS 1916, who originally owned this sheet music copy. Elizabeth was an English teacher at GHS from 1921 to 1926 and later taught in Chillicothe and Columbus. Elizabeth and her sister **Mary McCabe**, GHS 1923, never married. The Warvel family has been a longtime GHS family, with three children: **Joyce Warvel Travis**, GHS 1966, and her late husband **Jerry Travis**, GHS 1971, **Debbie Warvel Begoon**, GHS 1972, and Debbie's daughter **Charlene Begoon Wright**, GHS 1991, and **Tim Warvel**, GHS 1977, and wife **Kathy Young Warvel**, GHS 1977, and their children, **Whitney Warvel Cole**, GHS 2006, and **Chad Warvel**, GHS 2003, and wife **Deven Rademachir Warvel**, GHS 2003. Thank you, Martha, for making us aware of an art lost in history.

Over a hundred years ago, the city of Greenville had a distinctively different look. Classes chose colors and songs to be unique to their class. The "purple banner 'gainst the gray smoke of the sky" mentioned in the song was either the class colors or the school colors at that time. These colors were present on the cover of the first GHS Yearbook in 1911 and possibly represented the school colors then. This music ended with, "Old G.H.S. Your walls with praise will ring". The building which housed GHS at that time (1916) was the old red-brick West School building (1868-1923) before the Central Avenue yellow brick building was built in 1923 at the same location. The city was not spread out as much as it is today and with commercial activity focused around the central business district. The author of this class song, Agnes Trainor, lived about three blocks northwest of the school on Vine Street. Here is a 1912 postcard of that school and the cover of the first GHS Yearbook. It is hard to imagine anyone or any class writing their own "class song" in today's world.





A program from one of **Agnes Trainor Keehan's** music recitals dated June 6, 1967, was loaned to us by **Jeanette Funk Patton** GHS 1954. The Master of Ceremonies was **Clarence "Clancy" Plessinger**, GHS 1936. Clancy's daughter **Helen Plessinger Miller**, GHS 1966, sang two of the performances at this recital. **Clarrissa Westerman**, GHS 1969, was a current G.H.S. student at that time and also sang two songs. **Karen Hoover Henninger**, GHS 1959, recalls taking voice lessons from Mrs. Keehan for a couple years when she was in junior high school (mid 1950s), and **Cathy Buell Cornell**, GHS 1966, took voice lessons for a year while in high school (mid 1960s).
