Tips to Keep Your Pup Cool in the Upcoming August Heat

With how hot it has been this summer, and us leaping head-first into August, we wanted to share some tips and information on how to keep your dog cool, comfortable, and safe in the heat! While dogs are resilient, temperatures above 85° call for extra caution.

- **Time Your Workouts:** Save heavy exercise or intense training for early morning or late evening hours when temperatures drop below 85°F.
- **Hydrate from the Inside Out:** Dogs cool primarily from the inside out, so ensure they always have access to clean, cool drinking water.
- **Fun Frozen Treats:** Add ice cubes to their water bowl, or freeze dog-safe treats and Pup-sicles to provide both cooling relief and mental enrichment!
- **Cooling Tools:** Kiddie pools, cooling mats, and fans are fantastic options. If you'd rather avoid a wet dog, keep them relaxed in an air-conditioned room during peak heat hours.
- **Protect the Paws:** If you are out working with your Service Dog or taking a stroll, test the pavement with the back of your hand. If it's too hot for your hand, it's too hot for their paws—be sure to gear them up in protective booties!
- **Exercise Indoors with Mental Stimulation:** If it's simply too hot for you and your pup to be outside, move the workout indoors! Mental stimulation burns just as much energy and calories as a physical walk. You can give them a puzzle toy, set up a treat search, or practice simple obedience work right in your living room.

Signs of Heat Stroke

Heatstroke is a life-threatening emergency that can develop rapidly. Being aware of early warning signs allows you to act fast:

- **Early Warnings:** Excessive or frantic panting, heavy drooling/thick saliva, bright red gums or tongue, and warmth to the touch.
- **Advanced Danger Signs:** Lethargy or refusal to move, staggering or unsteadiness on their feet, vomiting/diarrhea, pale or bluish gums, and sudden collapse.

What to do if you suspect heatstroke: Move your dog to a shaded or air-conditioned area immediately. Apply cool (not freezing or ice-cold) water to their body, focusing on their neck, chest, and paw pads. Put a fan on them to help them cool down, and contact your veterinarian or local emergency vet clinic right away.

Group Class Requirements



- Bring a leash so we can be in accordance with all local leash laws. Make it a standard 6 foot leash and NOT a retractable.
- You must have a flat collar on your dog (standard one that goes around the neck).
- You must have an e-collar on your dog that is charged and ready to go. You must have the transmitter with you.
- Your dog must have had all three rounds of shots and be current on rabies (or proof of equivalent titers) to participate.
- We may ask you not to participate if these requirements are not met.
