#### **Theology Ancient and Modern: Luther’s Small Catechism for the 21<sup>st</sup> Century**

*One of the most influential pamphlets from Luther, the Small Catechism is a way of teaching and discussing the basic tenets of the Faith. Written in 1529, the Small Catechism has been taught in homes and congregations ever since. We will be re-engaging this seminal work of Luther with an eye to its application in 21<sup>st</sup> Century North America—hundreds of years and thousands of miles away from its origins.*
