Boston, MA — Company One Theatre (C1) announces the New England premiere of *The Boy Who Kissed The Sky* by Idris Goodwin, with music by Divinity Roxx and Eugene H. Russell IV, directed by C1 Associate Artistic Director and Co-Founder Summer L. Williams, music directed by David Freeman Coleman, and produced in partnership with the City Of Boston's Office of Arts and Culture. Press opening will be Saturday, July 15, 2022 with a preview performance on Friday, July 14. Performances continue through August 12 at Dorchester's historic Strand Theatre. Tickets are available now at companyone.org. As part of C1's ongoing commitment to uplifting Theatre As Public Art, **all tickets are Pay-What-You-Want with \$0 minimum**.

Goodwin says, "I'm very excited, chuffed, and over the moon that Company One is bringing my show *The Boy Who Kissed The Sky* to Boston. The show first premiered at Seattle Children's Theatre, where I serve as artistic director, last fall. It was also in Atlanta recently, and multigenerational audiences are loving it. And I'm really excited to see it with multigenerational Company One audiences because Company One audiences are the best, period."

"Every time we get to work with Idris, something magical happens," adds Williams. "The Boy Who Kissed The Sky in particular has been such a wonderful experience. He's poured so much love and affection into this play, and his care for music history really shines through. The story is something we all can relate to; it sparks your imagination with one hand and plucks at your

heartstrings with the other. And working with Divinity Roxx, who played bass with Beyoncé, is just the cherry on top of it all."

Goodwin's artistic collaboration with Company One began with the 2013 production of his play *How We Got On*. Since then, C1 produced the world premiere of Goodwin's Elliot Norton award-winning *HYPE MAN:* a break beat play in 2018, as well as its limited return engagement in 2020 and film adaptation in 2021. Goodwin is currently a member of the C1 Season 24 PlayLab Circuit Flux Lab, where he's developing *Quotables*, a new break beat play.

The Boy Who Kissed The Sky draws inspiration from the upbringing of rock music icon Jimi Hendrix. It follows The Boy, an aspiring musician and dreamer, as he conjures the spirit of a bandleader named J Sonic. The two go on a journey through time and space as The Boy learns to ignite the creativity and confidence within him and chase a dream that has been passed down from generation to generation.

By producing *The Boy Who Kissed The Sky*, C1 hopes to amplify how young people can harness their creativity to develop and actualize their personal goals, the vital role of community care and mutual aid in our neighborhoods, and the importance of cultivating a practice of experimentation and persistence.

"The play started with an investigation of Jimi's story," notes Goodwin. But as I dug further and further and began to write it, it took on a more mythical, almost fable-like quality. Really, it's my ode to all young dreamers and artists who always find a way to 'play through it."

As with Company One's previous residencies at the Strand during their world premiere productions of Francisca Da Silveira's *can i touch it?* and Josh Wilder's *Leftovers*, C1 hopes to bring professional, boundary-breaking theatrical programming to the Upham's Corner community while amplifying the work of local artists and community organizations through partnerships with ZUMIX, Upham's Corner Main Street, Boston Music Project, Vital CxN, Leela Yoga & Wellness, Wee the People, and more. C1 will also collaborate with partners on the event series Branch Out With C1, featuring local community gatherings across the city.

"I am so excited to be back in Uphams Corner this summer to continue deepening our connection to that neighborhood with *The Boy Who Kissed the Sky*," says C1 Artistic Director and Co-Founder Shawn LaCount. "This play celebrates the power of imagination, creativity, and human connection as forces for individual and communal change. And it's an Idris play, so you know that while the obstacles these characters encounter are deep, like poverty, addiction, and systemic racism, these heavy topics are met with unbridled hope for the future and a beat that won't quit."

>> About the Production

With just a broom, a pencil, and a dream for a better life, a budding guitarist — unsure of his place in the cosmos — invokes the past, present & future of rhythm 'n' blues as his guide. Rocking and rolling with the hippest ancestral spirit, our young hero must set aside his fears and dig deep to discover his own voice.

This Summer, Idris Goodwin returns to Company One with *The Boy Who Kissed The Sky*, a groovy ride through space, time, and imagination for dreamers of all ages. Inspired by the early life of Jimi Hendrix, this intergenerational hero's journey is a celebration of reaching for the stars, finding community, and embracing the creative legacy that lives inside us all.

Titles such as *And In This Corner Cassius Clay, How We Got On, Hype Man: A Break Beat Play*, and the ground breaking *Free Play: open source scripts for an antiracist tomorrow*, are widely produced across the country by a diverse mix of professional and academic venues.
