The discount deadline when ordering is August 15th!



This years' recipient was born and raised in Providence RI, the second of three children.








Lakehurst Naval Air Station Tour - July 26

On Wednesday, July 26, approximately 28 members and guests toured the Join Base McGuire(aka Lakehurst Navel Air Station). Kevin, Marty, and Pete were our tour guides. We began with a tour of the Cathedral of the Air. a Norman-Gothic military chapel in <u>Lakehurst</u>, New Jersey, United States. It was conceived by Reverend Gill Robb Wilson, one-time national chaplain of the <u>American Legion</u>, and is intended to serve the military personnel serving at the <u>Joint Base McGuire–Dix–Lakehurst</u>. The chapel features stained glass windows memorializing the loss of naval airships <u>USS Akron</u> and <u>USS Shenandoah</u>. Both airships had been based at the nearby Lakehurst Naval Air Station. Originally used primarily as a Roman Catholic church, it no longer holds regular services and is used as a non-denominational location for weddings, baptisms and funerals.

The Hindenburg Disaster

We drove in a caravan to the spot where the Hindenburg burned. Our guides stressed how important cross Atlantic travel in the giant airships was at the time. This was the perceived way of the future. Airships could cross the Atlantic in just two and a half days compared to five or six in ocean liners. The disaster occurred on May 6, 1937: in 1936 the Hindenburg made ten successful trips between Germany and the United States. In March of 1937 the Hindenburg made a successful trip between Germany and Brazil. The *Hindenburg* class were built entirely from <u>duralumin</u>. The leader of the design team was <u>Ludwig Dürr</u>, who had overseen the design of all Zeppelins except LZ-1 (on which he was a crew member), under the overall direction of Hugo Eckener, the head of the company. They were 245 m (804 ft) long and 41 m (135 ft) in diameter. The previous largest civilian airship, with a length of 237 m (777 ft) and a width of 40 m (130 ft), was the British R101, which was completed in 1929. The U.S. Navy's Akron and Macon were 239 m (785 ft) long and 44 m (144 ft) wide.



Adventures in Maine and Canada with Robin and Al Zager

Being landlubbers now did deter Robin and me from sailing to Maine and beyond this summer. We just did it by car. We spent a good deal of time visiting family and friends along the Maine coast before crossing into Canada. And of course, I wore my Root Beer and Checker hat all along the journey to spread club good will.

One of the highlights was a stop along Route 1 in Wiscasset for a lobster roll at "Red's Eats". The one-hour wait in line (hey we were tourists!) did not disappoint. We followed the company of many famous people who have stopped here. The \$34 price was not too high. Robin and I shared what was

probably at least 1.5 pounds of perfectly prepared pure lobster meat and did not leave hungry.

Sailing friends who have retired to Maine from their careers in NYC took us to Popham Beach, a state park where there is about a mile walk at low tide to

the rocks that become an island at high tide. Campobello Island, Franklin and Eleanor

Roosevelt's summer home, is across a bridge from Lubec, Maine, just over the border into

Canada. Although it is a bit of a drive to get there, the trip is well worth it. This national park is jointly owned and managed by both the United States and Canada, the only such arrangement for a national park in the world, they say. Extremely friendly and knowledgeable guides took us back to the time when Franklin and Eleanor relaxed there with their family.

St. John, New Brunswick, Canada, was our next stop. The shortest way to get there was by ferry from Campobello Island to Deer Island, then another ferry (note the tidal range) to the mainland.

St. John is a cruise ship stop with many good eateries within walking distance of the ship terminal. An interesting market place for visitors was created at the terminal using shipping containers fashioned into

the many shops and colorfully painted with eye-catching artwork.

We toured the Saint John Jewish Historical

Museum and home to Shaarei Zedek Synagogue. As is a common story, the synagogue community once thrived with members who were the merchants in the city. As their children went off to college, they settled elsewhere. So, the Jewish house of worship with a much smaller membership today is connected to the museum which tells the community's story. On our walk to dinner, we passed by the very impressive Anglican Church. After dinner we stopped into






rainy, we did not go all the way down to the "beach," but we got a good look at the eroded rock formations that evidence the 20'-30' tidal range at this northern end of the Bay of Fundy.

toll on our return trip with our debit card.


