



# RB&CC visits Saratoga Springs, NY in 2024? Bruce Rodman

Hello everyone I've done some preliminary research about an RB&CC trip next summer to Saratoga Springs, NY & here are some thoughts.

**Dates:** Wednesday and Thursday nights, July 31 to August 1, 2024 (there is no racing on Mondays or Tuesdays, and weekends are challenging for dining and track reservations).

**Accommodations:** Several options, which would probably be left up to the individual members to make their own reservations. Several of the newer properties downtown are already sold out, but the Saratoga Hilton (downtown) is available for about \$400 per night. About 20 minutes south of Saratoga is the Hampton Inn of Clifton Park, NY for about \$215 per night. There are other options but probably not much else downtown.

Activities: Arrive **Wednesday** July 31 by noon, lunch downtown, which I could reserve. After lunch, a visit to the National Museum of Racing and Hall of Fame on Union Avenue, Saratoga Springs. Walking tour of downtown or catch the late races across the street. Dinner, which I would arrange.

**Thursday**: Arrive at Saratoga Racecourse around 7:30am for backstretch tour hosted by me as your tourguide, followed by breakfast on your own. 1PM -- attend the races at the oldest thoroughbred racetrack in the Americas, seating about \$50 per person to be arranged by me. Dinner, which I would arrange.

Friday: Depart

Arranging accommodations is the trickiest part -- my thinking is that each member would make his own reservations. I could try to get group rates and, if successful, communicate that info to interested members. The only thing that would be a "group" expense would be seating at the track, which I could front, and members reimburse me. Everyone could pay their own Museum fee, and the backstretch tour is free. Nonmembers are welcome, too.

# Four Geniuses of Little Silver-John Barrows-November 14

On November 14<sup>th</sup> John Barrows, founder and editor of Monmouth Timeline Inc. presented with us with some exceptional and innovative people who lived and worked in Monmouth county.

John Thompson Lovett was born in 1852 in Bucks County, Pennsylvania. At age 25 he started working for A. Hance & Sons of Rumson. Six years later he started his own business. Lovett's became very popular – he developed a method of shipping and packaging that used sphagnum moss that prevented drying during shipping. He started a catalogue to sell by mail. That grew into a magazine called Orchard and Gardens. He teamed up with **Dr. Walter Van Fleet** who developed many



hybrid roses. More detailed information can be found on the Monmouth Timeline website.



Russell S. Ohl invented the solar cell. He was born in Macungie, Pennsylvania in 1898. After graduating from Pennsylvania State College in 1918, he entered the Army and wound up in Camp Vail, (now Fort Monmouth). After being discharged he worked in a variety of jobs finally ending up in Bell Labs facility in Cliffwood, NJ. "On June 25, 1946, the U.S. patent office approved an application from Bell Labs for a silicon solar cell invented by Russell S. Ohl, which became U.S. Patent No. US2,402,662A, "Light sensitive device." It was one of more than 130 inventions patented by Ohl in the U.S. and elsewhere over the years, and it helped turn solar energy from a theory into a reality". Karl G. Jansky, the father of radio astronomy, was another genius who lived in Little Silver. Jansky worked for AT&T Bell Labs and was given the task of identifying why the transatlantic calls were getting interference. In 1932 he discovered the radio waves causing the interference were coming from the Milky Way Galaxy. This was an impactful discovery leading to the world of radio astronomy. **Marilyn Levy** was a chemist in the Photo-Optics Technical Area, Electronics Command Surveillance and Target Acquisition Laboratory at The Hexagon at Fort Monmouth. Her work involved research in high-speed

photographic processing, both black and white and color; dry photographic techniques; and photography for aerial surveillance. Over her lifetime she was awarded 35 patents, primarily in areas involving light-sensitive materials, photographic chemistry, and image microstructure.. Her work was essential for the quick turnaround of surveillance films. More detailed information can be found on the website
















#### Member News

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
