




### PERFORMING ARTISTS





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### What's your ELEVATION?

Cocktail attire. Runway shows featuring multiple local designers. Artists: from photographers and filmoographers, to painters, even hairstylists and makeup artists! That was the atmosphere when you first walked into Bogart's for the ELEVATION showcase; of which, I had the privilege to represent with my twin. It had this (*clean*)grunge look with dim lighting, chain-link-fence-walled stalls (*where art hung on either side like gallery alcoves,*) and hard black floors, with selective red carpet here and there, complimenting the brick walls. The music was of a wide variety, from R&B to alternative rock and everything in-between. My father, who is quite picky about his music, loved the mixture of musical sound that pumped through the speakers from the live strumming of up-and-coming musicians, to the sound tracks selected as audio inspirational-representation for the fashion designer's designs as they strutted down the runway stage on the personalities of outstanding models.

There were two bar locations where gusts could buy their drinks and mingle through the center floor, which was sprinkled with sleek black and metal (*standing height*) tables, some tall chairs to go with them for those who wanted to rest their heels as well. *Oh the heels*. There was every-which variety you could conceive! On the models in the fashion shows and on the guests attending: spiked heels, black *Noir* heels, leopard print, neon colored, sneaker shaped, zippered, buckled, and strap-up-the-calve heels. *Art everywhere*. The showcases were much the same: from the abstract work of animal heads on human bodies drawn by Brian R. Williams, to the softer, but no less bold (*in color as much as design*), native inspired art by Carlos Roa. It was loud in the best ways; an explosion of artistic expression in a pool of civilized construct.

Four hours might seem like a long time but there wasn't a minute of it where something wasn't happening and conversations weren't taking place regarding the buffet of entertainment. Guests looked at the art of those they came to support, as well as walked the chain-link stalls of the other artists, admiring, awing and sometimes gawking at their work. While they saturated their eyes with fine lines, captivating curves and splashes of color to the monochromatic... there was music and even a Vocal Artist, Eleen Tull, who gave me chills more than once with her monologue. She poked fun out our society right down to how 141 characters is one too many (considering texts and tweets tend to only allow 140.)

The diversity was perhaps what made the event so captivating. You could be walking down the stalls on the right side of the main floor and look to your left to see a woman in four inch heels and a Mohawk walk by and not two feet from her might be an older gent in a tux complete with red bow-tie. The people, guest, artist and staff alike were either in great moods themselves or entranced by the vibe of the atmosphere. Business cards were exchanged, guestbooks signed and curiosities both quelled and peaked. For Mandy and I, we got to see it all from our end-cap space near the stage on the left side of the main floor (*if you consider the stage the 'front'*). Our half booth was near the stairs that led down to the restrooms which provided us a unique advantage to catching eyes as people passed—whether they intended to be distracted or not. It was likely about two hours in when such an occurrence happened in front of me. With an easel set up for me to paint a little something while we were there, and the paintings at my back and some on the wall to my left leading to the stairs, I stood in observation. People were passing and mingling near the stage, a few at our wall looking at the paintings and rocks laid out on the table; I was all but in the corner of our space for the best vantage when I watched a fellow get to the steps and *stop*. His eyes were caught by the "Watchers" painting, metallic copper background with ten variously red, orange and yellow painted snakes twisted around each other (see <u>part 2</u> for more), as it sat on the floor by the easel, just before the stairs descended. I watched him cant his head as he looked at it, then he looked up at me—yes, I was smirking at him because it was fun to watch that dead-stop of curiosity. He glanced back at the painting and then, back to me and asked if it was mine; when I said it was, he looked to the wall behind me where the rest of our showcase was on display. He held up a finger in that '*hold on* 'gesture and told me he'd be right back—he was, after all, probably on his way to the bathroom or to the backstage area. I, of course, agreed with a light, *amused* smile.

When he returned he was with a friend, I didn't notice them at first (*as they took to looking at the other art my Twin and I were featuring*), but when I did, introductions were passed around—though it was a bit hard to hear considering we were nearest the stage! Thank goodness for business cards right?! The man who had done the double take and retrieved his friend was another intricate artist who goes by *sLip*; he does some pretty kick-ass, detailed work of color in scenes of surreal fantasy I can get behind. His friend was Justin Tharpe, who's part (*if not the backbone*) of a group called <u>PeopleFlavored</u>. Gets your mind thinking doesn't it?

This little rendezvous was perhaps the highlight of the showcase for me because it was the heart of future opportunity and friendship. I'm an analytical person as much as I am creative and the name alone "PeopleFlavored" was like a green flag in my brain for *thinking* people; thinking people who (*metaphorically speaking*) don't know what boxes are and might actually enjoy twisting things as much as I do (*literal meanings with metaphoric meanings and the like.*) Justin and *sLip* both encouraged Twin and I to check out a party they are having that will demo this *PeopleFlavored* concept and open the avenue of future shows and events. Frankly, I was IN when the dude actually came back and brought a friend! Understandably we only spoke for a few minutes, if you could call half-shouting over the music speaking, but it was worth it and stayed on my mind for days to follow.

My Twin and I of course LOVE selling our artwork (*it's nice getting paid for what you love*) but that isn't why we do it, and those who know us best know we'd just as soon share it for free. Artwork, for us, isn't a livelihood it's a passion, an outlet, an expression. When someone buys our art we see them as supporters of our passion and financial sponsors for our creative expressions. The ELEVATION event at Bogart's gave us the opportunity to showcase our work, for those who back us, as well as those who didn't even know we existed. It gave us the avenue to meet *sLip* and Justin, who are on the ride of a stellar idea; one where we'll have a chance to do this again in a *new* way. None of it would have been possible without our sponsors and the RAW opportunity so, thanks! Sincerely! When all the designers had finished, including a *finale through the ages* (from 1920's flapper to present urban) that was a huge hit, and the stage was being cleared; the guests began to file out and back to their homes, or after parties as the case may have been. It was in this building quiet that our own guests stayed behind to help Twin and I pack up our things, how awesome was that?! It didn't matter that most of them had a drink or three or that two of the six had come from out of state to see us, they were there in **full** support chattering and laughing about the things they liked best as we put up our things and carried them out.

We had an after party, well more like an extended get-together back at our apartment where we all continued to laugh a little, drink a little and talk about the art, the fashion, the music featured in the apparently perfect venue. A few of us as smokers compared our likes of Bogart's smoking patio, which I think is fracking awesome! All of us, every one of us, had to confess it was a good night—more than that, it was a *surprisingly* great showcase. Everyone expected to have a good time, but no one had expected such a vast array of *AWESOME* from all the people involved.
