The closest public library to Duette is 30 miles away in Palmetto. The library in Duette School, the only remaining one-teacher school in the state, has never had a librarian. Its shelves were full of old and damaged books.

The Mighty 4-H'ers of Duette decided to tackle the problem.

The 4-Hers enlisted the help of Nancy Kurina and Cecilla Becket, librarians from Blackburn and Palm View elementary schools, in their project.

Together, they removed almost 400 outdated and damaged books, cleaned and rearranged the shelves, and solicited donations of books to refurbish the library.

"We couldn't see just throwing the old books away," said Betty
