Exciting news!!! The addition is almost finished. As of the 12th, all that was left to be completed was the trim work around the ceiling. This extra space is going to be so useful for more storage, and for parking and unloading the van.

The new shelving is partly here, the metal frames have been delivered, but we are waiting on the wood shelves.

As far as other pantry news, there has been an increase in the number of people coming for assistance. We are still not where we were pre-covid, but seeing more people.

Todd has submitted a grant request to the Regional Office of Education for funding they have received from the federal government for provisions to help homeless children remain in school. The one area of this grant that the money can not be used for is food. So, why did we apply? Well, we can use funding to purchase any type of non food expenses that will help homeless children remain in school.

So, Todd asked for funding to purchase more of the hygiene items we distribute, including tooth brushes, tooth paste, soap, toilet paper, deodorant, and feminine hygiene products. The ROE plans to have an answer to the pantry sometime in January or February, and the money must be spent by August 31, 2022. The pantry is working in cooperation with Eastern Illinois University to help them set up an on-campus food pantry. Crystal Brown, assistant director of EIU Civic Engagement and Volunteerism, is the manager of this new pantry. In October and November the pantry helped with the ordering of food through the Eastern Illinois Foodbank in Urbana. EIU volunteers picked the delivered food up at the pantry for transport to campus.

The plan is for EIU to get their own foodbank account for ordering and delivery directly to the campus. This pantry will be very useful for students experiencing food insecurity.
