COMMON VERB-NOUN COLLOCATIONS



What is a 'verb-noun collocation'? A 'verb-noun collocation' is when we use specific verbs with specific nouns.

For example:

I do housework all the time. - CORRECT
I make housework all the time. - INCORRECT

Sometimes we can use multiple verbs with the same noun.

For example:

I like to **drink coffee** in the morning.
I am **having coffee** right now.
I **made coffee** for everyone.
