

Ruth Wolf-Rehfeldt

German, b. 1932

The work of artist/poet Ruth Wolf-Rehfeldt is aligned with both the concrete poetry and mail art movements. Her primary focus is geometric and poetic typewriter graphics which she refers to as "typewritings" and "Concretework". For the most part these works were produced between the 1970s - 1990 and distributed through the mail art network to like-minded artists and poets. More recently her work has been exhibited in Europe - including documenta 14, 2017 - and the United States.

A total of sixteen booklets were published between 1977 and 1983. Each is a bookwork by an artist(s) commissioned by Lapp Princess Press. The books were printed in editions of 2,000 for wide inexpensive distribution. Beginning in 1984, David Schmidlapp produced the earliest magazine focusing on graffiti a/k/a aerosol art and culture and the East Village visual art and literary scene. A chronicle of the subway writing of the 1980s and early 1990s. Fifteen issues were published between 1984-1994. Schmidlapp's collaboration with PHASE 2 began in 1986 with issue 8 and continued through issue 15.
