### Yard Tip

Ivy on your trees could be very harmful, adding weight and taking nutrients that trees need to stay healthy and vibrant. Many trees in our neighborhood have large wintercreeper or English ivy vines growing up them. Not only can this harm your trees, making them more susceptible to limb breakage during storms, it also greatly promotes the spread of wintercreeper and English ivy, two very invasive non-native species that have invaded large parts of Avon Woods and many other wooded areas in Cincinnati. Now is a great time to free your trees from these plants. This can be done by simply cutting out a 2-inch segment of the vine near the base of the tree. Don't try to pull the vine off, as that will damage the bark of your tree. The vine will fall out naturally after it dies. # Neighborhood Garden Plots and Pots

Did you know that Paddock Hills neighborhood tends to 4 garden plots that enhance the beauty of our neighborhood? These plots are at the entrance to PH from Reading Rd on Avon Drive cared for by Mary and Joseph Ayers, east side of Paddock Rd near the golf course cared for by Denise O'Neal and John Rushing, east side of Paddock Road across from Clearbrook cared for by Robin Bratt and Bruce Bowden, and Reading Rd. at the ballfields cared for by Susan Glas.

The commitment to Paddock Hills from Ayers, O'Neal/Rushing, Bratt/Bowden and Glas shines in these gardens! They are clean of litter, colorful in bloom and maintained with care.

In addition, the city maintains and replants seasonally the large pots at the entrances to the neighborhood which Assembly funds underwrite. Kathy Grant (pot at Paddock Hills Ave & Paddock Rd) along with Nancy & Suresh Nirody (pot at Paddock & Sunnyslope) generously sponsor a pot every year.

#### Beautification Chair

Cathi Lowry, resident since 1992, has worn many hats in her PH tenure. Cathi was recruited immediately as the Youth Coordinator. This hat involved walking the neighborhood and talking to young people who would participate in the cleanups and attend the yearly events of bicycle safety day and the Halloween party. Back then the youth was paid \$10 for attending the cleanups. Sugar and Spice would provide drinks then the crew would take a break at the Donte Evans Brown and Darrel Lane Ballfields while the kids got to know each other. A very memorable time was when a refugee from Liberia moved on to Sunny Slope, the kids asked many questions of his African home, wondering if lions, elephants, and zebra were in sight.

Next was the Environmental Chair which fit perfectly with Cathi's dedication to Avon Woods, planting trees and litter cleanup. During this time PH planted over 40 trees to help replace the stately street trees that had to be removed. Cathi and Erin Morris, Cincinnati Park naturalist continued the Halloween parties to include a Halloween hike through the woods educating the kids on conservation and walking lightly. Currently, as the Beautification Chair, the work continues with Keep Cincinnati Beautiful, writing a grant and communicating to neighbors about Adopt-A-Spot.

"I couldn't imagine living in PH and not doing something to maintain and improve our community, Lowry said. "I enjoy walking our beautiful streets, talking with neighbors, and picking up litter!

# Doug Smith

"I love working in Paddock Hills. It's one of my favorite neighborhoods. It's the greenery, man. Paddock hills is so lush."

So says landscaper Doug Smith who is plenty familiar with the neighborhood. For several years, Smith has had at least four regular clients in Paddock Hills (a couple more on an ad hoc basis) that use his landscaping and mowing services through his D&A Landscaping, which has clients throughout Greater Cincinnati as far north as Mason and West Chester.

But he always looks forward to coming to this urban-locked oasis.

"One thing I love about Paddock Hills is all the foliage," Smith says. "It's so refreshing. I like it better than most any other neighborhood because of that. You take a place like Mason— it's always hot. There aren't any trees out there."

Smith got started in the business in 2004 when he was clerking at a law firm and doing yard work on the side. Attorneys at the firm helped him start an LLC so he could take his landscaping business full time. (He still has lawyers from the firm as clients). Smith followed up with an agriculture/horticulture degree from Cincinnati State and now offers four-seasons services including yard cleanup, installations, weed control and commercial snow removal.

Smith did the neighborhood a favor last summer during the pandemic. Doug, who does mowing and mulching in the neighborhood gardens, donated his services when the Assembly was forced to temporarily cancel his contract because of a Covid-related shortage of funds. "I'm a firm believer that it is better to give than to receive. I like helping people if there is a a problem. It doesn't hurt us to do a few minutes of free work a week. I've been blessed."
