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

The planters are refreshed three times during the year with seasonal plantings. New spring plantings are due to arrive in late March.

Around five years ago, I volunteered to join the Paddock Hills Assembly board as a trustee. At the time, I was concerned with one (and only one) issue — addressing the cut-through traffic that passed by my house at all hours of the day. I was welcomed aboard by the other trustees, and quickly discovered that I could help in other aspects of improving our community too; social engagement, crime and safety, and process improvement. I helped the board execute projects like the spring Block 'n Rock party, install the speed humps and neighborhood cameras, as well as modernize our membership communication systems. I'm proud of what we accomplished together, and to this day, I enjoy pitching in to help the cause.

It's been a wonderful experience over the past two years as President of PHA. But as with all endeavors, it's time for me to pass the baton to the next President, and give my seat to another interested party. As of December 31, of 2017, I am officially "retired" from the PHA board, although I hope to stay on, participating in a committee (or two). We have two trustees joining (one to replace me and another filling an empty seat) and we will hold elections in April to affirm two other seats on the board. From here forward, PHA will hold annual elections to make sure that we keep our neighborhood leadership representative of our entire community.

Change, so long as it respectful, is good. Without regular turn-over in our neighborhood council, we run the risk of becoming stale and complacent. I firmly believe that complacency is the kiss of death to a vibrant community. You cannot hold on to what you love by simply maintaining. 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Saying Yes

Shortly before retiring in 2008, one of the best things I did was to accept a position as trustee on the Paddock Hills Assembly board. In so doing, I ignored the sage wisdom of neighbor, Martha Highsmith.

Shortly before retiring in 2008, Martha warned me not to say yes to anything for a year. Ignoring her advice, when Lina Orr asked me to be a Paddock Hills trustee, I said yes.

I couldn't ignore the chance to follow in the footsteps of both my parents, who were active in the neighborhood from the time we moved here in 1964 until they left in 2007. Saying yes has given me the opportunity to work with long time residents as dedicated to the neighborhood as my parents were - folks like Luekicious Brown, Donald & Liz Swain, Lina Orr, Janice Lambert, Pat Jones, Joyce Coleman Ellie Johnson, and Lynne Stone. I cannot imagine how many years of service are represented by that list.

In recent years, the Board has added a few new, younger board members – Jake Weyand, Joe Galvin, and Karl Daniels. It's always good to get an infusion of young blood. They bring fresh ideas and energy to the discussion, but I never underestimate what our long-tenured members bring to the table. The relationships Mrs. Brown has established and her tenacity in dealing with the city are legendary. "It takes the wisdom of the elders, the young people's energy," as Common rapped in the song Glory.

Following in my father's footsteps, I took on the role of Neighborhood Support Program (NSP) manager, when Bill Williams stepped down several years ago. In that capacity, I have met people from most of Cincinnati's neighborhoods, learned about their challenges, gained inspiration from their accomplishments, and brought some of their ideas back to Paddock Hills.

I've met people at NSP meetings who have served their communities for 30-40 years, people who could stop volunteering and "let somebody else do it." I've also met young people, barely in their twenties, who step up and take on the responsibilities of community council president, treasurer, or NSP project manager, sometimes all at once, while juggling first jobs, living in first houses, and raising young children. It's impressive.

We're all busy. Young or old, life doesn't slow down. It's great to see everyone come out for social events, but we need folks on the planning side of things, people willing to serve on the board, help plan events, and volunteer for committees. We need fresh ideas, and we need people to turn ideas into reality. It doesn't matter how long you've lived here or whose house you live in. We need you to get involved, to maintain what we love about Paddock Hills and make it even better.

There are many ways to do it; one of them is bound to fit your schedule. Become a trustee. Join a committee. Chair a committee. Contribute to the newsletter. Suggest a new idea. Tell us you're available for one-time projects.

Come to community council meetings to meet neighbors and city representatives, share your ideas, and volunteer. Say yes to something.

You'll be glad you did.

Community Gardening Anyone?

Have you had enough snow?

Have the plant catalogues gotten you dreaming of spring?

Now's the time to start thinking about spring gardening, and if you don't have sunny, level land in your own yard, Xavier University's NEXUS (for Norwood, Evanston, & Xavier) Garden has a plot for you.

These are small plots, about 4 x 8 feet, in which you can plant whatever vegetables and flowers you like. We also provide free seeds and seedlings, compost, soil & water testing kits, water, and tools, as well as plenty of good advice and help getting started.

The goals of the community gardening movement are multiple, but they include building community, helping people learn to grow food organically, encouraging us to eat more fresh and raw vegetables and try new ones, educating a new generation of gardeners about old and new methods of growing foods, and providing fresh vegetables to local food pantries in Norwood and Evanston.

March is a good time to get a little tour of the garden, choose your plot, and perhaps get in some early crops like lettuce and peas. We order in bulk early, so you can start seedlings indoors if you like.

Whether you've never gardened or are an old hand, this is the perfect time to start preparing the soil, choosing the right crops and varieties for the local climate and soil, and timing your planting for a three season harvest.
