## President's Message



Happy Summer! We finally experienced the light at the end of the COVID tunnel and then the Brood X Cicada swam occurred! I want to share a positive light on these red eyed creatures because cicadas have their beneficial place in our environment.

They prune "mature" trees, aerate the soil, and once they die, their bodies serve as an important source of nitrogen for growing trees. Trees in Paddock Hills are very important to us so we protect our young trees. As trees go through their seasonal cycles, shedding and growing leaves, the composition of their sap changes. And when cicada nymphs feed on that sap, they likely pick up clues about the passage of time. The 17th iteration of the trees' seasonal cycle gives the nymphs their final cue: it's time to emerge.

Now if you're like me, you've noticed a pattern with these loud Brood X Cicadas. I find they are least active at nighttime when they are most likely up in the trees, and early in the morning when the temperature is cooler. The cicada's group chorus also repels birds that hunt by day, so when these insects stop singing, there's a good chance the birds have gone to bed. Interesting trivia, male cicadas in the same brood will stick together when calling in order to increase the total volume of noise!

The good news for those who find cicadas irritating, they should start to die off by late June. Just in time for our Community Gathering up at Avon Woods Nature Center and Paddock Hill's Ball Park Wednesday play dates!

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## **Speed Patrol Progress**

Paddock Hills Trustees have spent months repeatedly expressing concern to the city about speeding on Paddock Road. Finally the city has taken some steps to alleviate the problem.

"We are going to install pedestrian triggered flashing lights at the golf course crossing," says Melissa McVay, senior city planner with the Department of Transportation and Engineering. "Construction should start any day now."

Also, thanks to the efforts of neighborhood police officer Anthony Hill, an empty police car has been routinely parked near the crossing. Hill says the decoy car's presence has sharply reduced speeding down the Paddock Road hill.
