## A Thanksgiving from Father Richard



Dear Friends,

There are many ways of praying. Pray as you can, and do not try to pray as you can't, was the pithy advice given by Abbot John Chapman (1865–1933) to the laypeople, monks, nuns, and priests who wrote to him seeking guidance in a life of prayer. It is good advice.

Some people think that praying 'ad hoc' or extemporary praying without preparation is better than reading aloud a prayer from a book. Sometimes that might be true; but sometimes the opposite can be true: we are given a prayer to read and it challenges us and speaks to us in a way that would not have happened otherwise.

There is particular prayer that I use before Council meetings – it was written by John Bell and is a good prayer:

Lord, give us wisdom before we speak, understanding while we listen, sensitivity towards those we meet and the perspective of your kingdom.

There can be no better guidance for those attending a Council meeting and no better advice for a parish priest – and I hope that I have tried to live up to that prayer in my time here.

We all know that at the end of some joint endeavour it is best not to go through a great list of those to thank: there will always be somebody you will miss out. It is still good to be thankful for all that has been achieved, but save those individual thanks for individual people when you can manage to speak with them. We know that those who are part of the great mission of the Church do not do it for the thanks they might (or might not) receive, but to the glory of God and in thanksgiving for God's love shown to us. It is God who loves us first.

So this last message is written in thanksgiving for all that has been achieved here in this year: in this great endeavour to somehow be a little outpost of the Kingdom of God in this place, with our particular - and peculiar - identity: part of the Church of England, but in (of all places) Switzerland. So it is that I can say this:

"It is good that we have celebrated the sacraments Sunday by Sunday - and usually Wednesday by Wednesday too.

It is good that the Sunday School has given guidance to our young and kept them faithful, culminating in what I might see as the high point of the year: the visit of Bishop Michael and the Confirmation in June. It is good that we have continued social events specially (but not exclusively) aimed at the young – including bowling!

It is good that we have had people – young and old – participate in readings and leading prayers and in carol services and nativity plays and participating in the Liturgy of Holy Week. It is good that we have had people participate in Advent and Lent Prayer Groups, the latter being a much appreciated engagement with the concept of Lectio Divina.

It is good that pastoral care has been offered in many situations and not least after bereavement, with a moving memorial Service for our long-standing member of the congregation, Ernest Jaeger.

It is good that we have been able to offer hospitality and fellowship and that we have participated in ecumenical events, sometimes even leading them, both in our own church and in other churches and even being featured on local TV and Radio.

It is good that I have also struck up a friendly relationship with the Diocese of Lugano Seminary here and improved our participation in the life of the Chaplaincy in Milan, joining in on-line Morning Prayer and Bible study. It is interesting to note that this is so much easier in Italy than with our own Archdeaconry here in Switzerland.

This is all quite a lot for a small church which has also managed to keep the ship of faith afloat through generous giving and inspired fund-raising – and this is without even mentioning the necessary care for our church buildings.

It is good to <u>thank all of you</u> who have made me welcome here, all who have helped me in various tasks and especially who have helped me when I was in need, and all who have formed the body of Christ in this place."

All of this is quite a lot in only one year, moreover a year in which I have also managed to go on Pilgrimage in Izmir (where James Buxton is Chaplain), to visit the Seven Churches of the New Testament with our Bishop and other Chaplains too. Now we look to the future, with another prayer by Angela Ashwin in her 'Book of a Thousand Prayers'

Christ our Guide, stay with us on our pilgrimage through life: when we falter, encourage us, when we stumble, steady us, and when we have fallen, pick us up. Help us to become, step by step, more truly ourselves, and remind us that you have travelled this way before us.
