

GORDON TURNER

Gordie, to those that know him, lived and worked in Schenectady, N.Y. Now residing in the Chicago area, Turner's love affair with the circus began as a child when his parents took him to the circus and he tells a great "tail" of a escaped lions in his first experience.

Now 87, Gordon was a patent illustrator for G.E. and is an avid circus fan and circus model builder. His collection is offered here and Gordon is excited to see his life's work be shared with those of similar passions.

Featured are one-inch scale circus models, lithographs, programs and paper.

KENNETH HARCK

Ken's passion for circus began as a child, collecting circus posters. A musician by trade, Ken has been a longtime procurement agent of circus artifacts for Howard Tibbals, the Tibbals Learning Center at the Ringling Museum, Sarasota, Florida. If it was good, you could bet that Ken could secure it.

Featured is a great selection of Harck's personal collection including Wild West lithographs, photographs and paper.





HUNT'S CIRCUS

1892 marked the year that Charles T. Hunt Sr., known as "Mr. Circus", started his show in Kingston, N.Y. Hunt later joined forces with sons, Charles Jr., Harry and Edward as Hunt Bros. Circus and Granddaughter, Marsha Hunt, later revived the show as Hunt's Super Circus in the 1970's.

The Hunt Circus was one of the best known and most beloved circus families and became one of the oldest shows owned and operated by the same family.

From the Hunt Family Collection comes rare sideshow banners that flew on the bannerline of the show, photographs, ephemera, business records, lithographs and more.

THOMAS ARNOLD SMITH (T.A. SMITH)

Tom Smith (Oct. 30, 1870-Dec. 24, 1944) was a supplier of horses and equipment to significant American circus shows. He was truly a man "behind-the-scenes", an associate of Ringling Bros., Buffalo Bill, partner to Pawnee Bill, Downie Bros., Welsh Bros. and others. For years he operated a stable and farm in Tullytown, PA.

A case law study revealed to us in research that we were in possession of Smith's trunk contents that were left abandoned in a room he boarded in 1930.

This amazing discovery has yielded a trove of documents from the Circus and Wild West shows at the turn of the century.





DUANE THORPE - "UNCLE SOAPY"

Duane Thorpe (1924-1995), known as Uncle Soapy, was long considered the last of the "old-school" clowns on the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus. Beginning in 1949, his career spanned over 40 years in the business and his work touched many lives.

One was once quoted, "He was the anchor of Clown Alley – a gentleman and a gentle man".


Featured is a very special collection, a massive archive, directly from the estate of Thorpe including photobooks, scrapbooks, contracts, clown gig sketches and more.

W.H. (Bill) RICE

Bill Rice W.H. Rice was one of the most widely known showmen in America at the turn of the century into the 1930's. With diverse amusement connections, he was best known for his Water Circus shows.

Rice once billed himself in endeavors of exploitation, publicity and raising funds for anything.

We will feature a host of Rice items including personal photos, show photos and ephemera



About Gordon Turner...

Gordon (Gordie) Turner, 87, is a lifelong circus fan and collector. He attended his first circus at age five with his parents, and he shared this tale about that experience. He and his folks arrived at the lot early as trucks were bringing wagons up from the railroad yard. A truck pulling animal wagons hit a bump, the door sprung open, and two lions jumped out. With the lions loose less than 50-feet away, Gordie and his father jumped to safety in an empty wagon. They watched from this vantage point as the lions rolled around in the grass, oblivious to the chaos. Workers soon lured the lions back into their cage, but the thrill of this experience was Gordie's first recollection of the circus, and from that point on he was hooked.

Gordie has a natural creative talent. As a boy of twelve, he began building model circus wagons out of small blocks of wood that he painted red. By the time he was in high school, he had constructed 20 quarterinch scale wagons. His first exhibition was in his high school gymnasium. What was supposed to be a oneday show was extended for several days due to high interest among teachers and students.

Gordie studied mechanical drawing in high school, and after graduation he landed a job with the General Electric Company in Schenectady, New York. He advanced from the mechanical drawing department to the patent division, and eventually ran the patent drawing room at GE's Research and Development Center in Niskayuna, New York. He saw the industry go from hand-drawn illustrations to computer-generated drawings, and he was successful in both mediums.

Throughout Gordie's forty years with GE, he kept on building circus wagons and displaying his works. He moved from quarter-inch scale to half-inch scale and finally one-inch scale. Gordie didn't just construct circus wagons; he built the railroad cars to carry the wagons and he created a miniature circus to give viewers the feel of a day at the circus. He enhanced his exhibitions with lithographs and photos from his extensive personal collection.



Gordie is considered a premier model circus builder among his peers. Over the years, Gordie displayed his wagons and circuses at schools, department stores, malls, and movie theaters. The pinnacle of his success was a year-long exhibition at the New York State Museum in Albany. Gordie's 50-footlong exhibit covered all aspects of life. This exhibit, including the half-inch scale model wagons, has found a home at the New York State Museum.

Gordie amassed a large collection of circus memorabilia during his lifetime, including lithographs, posters, photos, and other items. Components of his collection, including many of his one-inch scale models, will be offered at auction this summer. Circus fans will clammer to bid and buy elements of this fabulous collection.
