Apokalupsis (unveil, disclose, reveal).

Three types of literature: 1)Apocalypse; 2) Prophecy; 3) Letter.

Must understand Old Testament prophecy to understand Revelation. At least 278 0f 404 verses are drawn from the Old Testament, although not one is directly quoted. Prophecy is abundant in Isaiah, Ezekiel, Daniel, Zechariah, Jeremiah, Joel, Malachi, Matthew & the Gospels, and 1 & 2 Thessalonians.



Revelation (no "s" on the end!) means to unveil, to disclose, to reveal.

Revelation is complex, but it is not impossible. Randall Price once observed, "To be a student of the prophetic scriptures is to be a student of the Scriptures in their entirety."

It is important that we get Revelation right. The consequences of missing the message in Revelation can even be severe, e.g., Jehovah's. Witnesses and Mormons have greatly erred in their understanding of Revelation. The Seventh Day Adventists have rather unique views of this great Book too.

Vernon Wayne Howell, born in 1959, took a special interest in the Book of Revelation, particularly the Seven Seals. His teaching on the subject eventually led to a following of at least 130 people, and Howell changed his name to David Koresh. David believed himself to be the incarnation of the sacrificed Lamb in Revelation and convinced many others to believe the same. 80 community people, including 21 children, in addition to six ATF agents, eventually died near Waco in 1993 in two separate raids at the Mount Carmel compound.



Although some later scholars may claim otherwise, the best evidence is that Revelation was recorded by the Apostle John in 95 A.D. Some people note differences in the style of Revelation and that of John's Gospel and Epistles, but I would liken that to John Grisham's writing of various genres.

Additionally, the similarities of John's writing are overwhelming, including his phrasing such as "True," "Lamb," "I signify," "Tribulation," "Out of," "Witness," "Thunder," "Life," and "the Word," among others.

John was also and known and recognizable Pastor to the churches in this area.

And the most convincing of all: Polycarp was a direct disciple of the Apostle John, and *he* told Irenaeus, his own disciple, that John was the author.

Think about John and all he had witnessed...

Timing of the Events

Preterists – believe the book is primarily for believers of the first century. Virtually ignore all futuristic aspects of Revelation, including judgment.

Historicists – believe Revelation is about the Church Age. Essentially replaces the Abrahamic Covenant and is highly metaphorical.

Idealists – believe Revelation is a metaphor for the battle between good and evil. Requires an allegorical interpretation of the book.

Futurists – believe Revelation is a literal revealing to the Seven Churches and the Ecumenical Church; the consummation of the Abrahamic Covenant to Israel (the Seventieth Week of Daniel); prophetic beginning in Chapter 4.



Preterists' views about judgment are problematic: Romans 3:5c-6 notes: "...Is God unrighteous to inflict wrath? Absolutely not! Otherwise, how will God judge the world?" But with that judgment comes a way of escape as we see in Romans 4:7-8: "Blessed are those whose lawlessness acts are forgiven and whose sins are covered. Blessed is the person the Lord will never charge with sin." In other words, all of us who have accepted the grace and forgiveness of – and only through! – Jesus Christ.

Historicists are notorious for attaching people throughout the Church Age with the various figures in the Revelation.

Idealists seemingly disagree with the views of the New Testament authors, including Jesus's emphatic statements found in Matthew 24-25.

Robert L. Thomas notes, "The futurist approach to the book is the only one that grants sufficient recognition to the prophetic style of the bool.



TWO KEY VERSES

"Therefore write what you have seen, what is, and what will take place after this" (1:19).


"After this I looked, and there in heaven was an open door. The first voice that I had heard speaking to me like a trumpet said, 'Come up here, and I will show you what must take place after this" (4:1).




The key phrasing, "after this," is integral to one's own understanding of the Book of Revelation. These words, to me, make it obvious that Revelation is generally prophetic: it is mostly about future events!

Remember when studying all Scripture, including Revelation:

- 1) When the plain sense of Scripture makes common sense, seek no other sense.
- 2) It is important in Revelation, specifically, to note where the action is taking place (on Earth, in Heaven, under the Earth, etc.).
- 3) Revelation is generally chronological (it goes in order) except for perhaps chapters 12 and 17 which are parenthetical chapters (they fill in what is going on).
- 4) Know what is literal and know what is symbolic. The entirety of Scripture, and the witness of the Holy Spirit, help us to do just that. Even symbolic images convey actual people, events, situations, items, etc. Some of these symbols are actually explained in the text itself including the identification of the "Alpha and Omega," the "seven lampstands," the "144,000," etc.





Daniel's Seventieth Week (9:24-27)

Seventy weeks are decreed about your people and your holy city—to bring the rebellion to an end, to put a stop to sin, to atone for iniquity, to bring in everlasting righteousness, to seal up vision and prophecy, and to anoint the most holy place. ²⁵ Know and understand this: From the issuing of the decree to restore and rebuild Jerusalem until an Anointed One, the ruler, will be seven weeks and sixty-two weeks. It will be rebuilt with a plaza and a moat, but in difficult times. ²⁶ After those sixty-two weeks the Anointed One will be cut off and will have nothing. The people of the coming ruler will destroy the city and the sanctuary. The end will come with a flood, and until the end there will be war; desolations are decreed. ²⁷ He will make a firm covenant with many for one week, but in the middle of the week he will put a stop to sacrifice and offering. And the abomination of desolation will be on a wing of the temple until the decreed destruction is poured out on the desolator."

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Timing of the Millennial Kingdom

Amillennial View – maintains there will be no future, literal, one-thousand-year reign of Jesus Christ; the Kingdom is spiritual in nature; and is presently fulfilled as Christ reigns in Heaven and His people. Symbolic of a long church age.

Postmillennial View – teaches that Christ will return after the Millennium, an undetermined time when Christians influence the earth's people as they become ready for Christ's return.

Premillennial View – concludes Christ will return during the second phase of the 2nd Coming (the Rapture and Daniel's 70th Week being the first phase).



Some of the more recent and well-known adherents include John Walvoord, Dwight Pentecost, Hal Lindsey, Tim LaHaye, Adrian Rogers, David Jeremiah, John Christopher Thomas, Frank Macchia, Chuck Swindoll, Ed Hindson, Elmer Towns, Danny Akin, Mark Hitchcock, and may others.



Key Numbers in Revelation/Scripture.

- 3 the Trinity
- 4 -often related to the earth/related to completion.
- 6 mankind.
- 7 perfection/fulfillment/completion.
- 12 elective purpose of God/perfection/authority.



Seven is a hugely important number in Revelation: There are seven spirits, churches, angels, lampstands, stars, seals, trumpets, bowls, lamps of fire, peals of thunder, horns, eyes, thousand people, heads, diadems, plagues, mountains, kings, beatitudes, triumphs, figures, and the "I Ams" of Christ.

Twelve is also a repetitive number in Revelation: there are the twelve tribes of Israel, types of fruit, gates guarded by twelve angels, precious stones and pearls, in addition to multiples of twelve including the twenty-four elders, the two multitudes of 144,000, and the walls (144 cubits).

There is an element of completion in most of the Revelation numbers.

Seven Themes:

Jesus is the Primary Theme
To the Church with hope
Empowered by the Holy Spirit
Fulfillment of Israel's Covenants
Worship of our Trinitarian God
Bridges Genesis to Revelation
Eternal restoration of God's people



"The revelation of Jesus Christ that God gave him to show his servants what must soon take place. He made it known by sending his angel to his servant John, who testified to the word of God and to the testimony of Jesus Christ, whatever he saw. Blessed is the one who reads aloud the words of this prophecy, and blessed are those who hear the words of this prophecy and keep what is written in it, because the time is near."




The purpose of the Book is plainly stated: to show Jesus's servants "what must soon take place.:


Note the special blessing for those who read aloud the book and keep its contents.

⁴ John: To the seven churches in Asia. Grace and peace to you from the one who is, who was, and who is to come, and from the seven spirits before his throne, ⁵ and from Jesus Christ, the faithful witness, the firstborn from the dead and the ruler of the kings of the earth. To him who loves us and has set us free from our sins by his blood, ⁶ and made us a kingdom, priests to his God and Father—to him be glory and dominion forever and ever. Amen.

"...the firstborn from the dead" is a statement that although Jesus was dead, He no longer is. He is risen indeed!







Some believe the "seven spirits before the throne" refer to the seven angels of the seven churches; others to the seven angels seen in the Book. Others believe it refers to the seven attributes of the Holy Spirit as found in Isaiah 11:2, and I believe this is the best view:

- 1) It is in line with the Trinitarian focus of the passage.
- 2) It is in line with the Branch, Jesus Christ, who would have the Holy Spirit's anointing and blessing in His earthly ministry.
- 3) It describes the fullness and completeness of the Holy Spirit.

It also refutes the thoughts of some that the Holy Spirit will not be present during the coming Tribulation Period.
