






Song of Moses: See Exodus 15:1-18.

Note that the focus of verses 3-4 are rightfully stating worship of our Great God: HE alone should be the focus of worship!



Jesus IS the Truth:

"Jesus told him, 'I am the way, the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me. If you know me, you will also know my Father. From now on you do know him and have seen him'" (John 14:6-7).

God's WORD is True:

"Sanctify them by the truth; your word is truth" (John 17:17).

The Holy Spirit IS and CONFIRMS Truth:

"When the Spirit of truth comes, he will guide you into all the truth. For he will not speak on his own, but he will speak what he hears. He will also declare to you what is to come. He will glorify me, because he will take from what is mine and declare it to you. Everything the Father has is mine. This is why I told you that he takes from what is mine and will declare it to you" (John 16:13-15).

"But you have an anointing from the Holy One, and all of you know the truth..." (see 1 John 2:20-23). *All* truth points to Jesus as the Christ.

⁵After this I looked, and the heavenly temple—the tabernacle of testimony—was opened. ⁶Out of the temple came the seven angels with the seven plagues, dressed in pure, bright linen, with golden sashes wrapped around their chests. ⁷One of the four living creatures gave the seven angels seven golden bowls filled with the wrath of God who lives forever and ever. ⁸Then the temple was filled with smoke from the glory of God and from his power, and no one could enter the temple until the seven plagues of the seven angels were completed.

Yet another transition is introduced. It is daunting and ushers in thoughts of newness, and strangely, of completion. Thomas notes that this event is even more intimate than the previous vision, inviting the reader into the tabernacle. Here reside the tablets of the Law, which have been transgressed repeatedly by those who have refused the gift of grace in Christ Jesus the Lord.

The seven angels are dressed as priestly instruments, the agents of God the Father and the Son.

Note the innermost sanctity and proximity of the four living creatures, where one so close to God is designated to distribute God's rightful justice and wrath (Revelation 4:6-9, 5:6, 8,11, 14, 7:11-12, 14:3).


Note, too, the eternality of the One who lives forever and ever and the reference back to the earliest portions of the Revelation. The Shekinah Glory of God fills the Temple, ust as in Exodus 19:18; 40:34; 1 Kings 8:10-11; 2 Chronicles 5:11-14;;7:1-3. God never shanges – His glory is eternal, consistent, and all-powerful. The bowls of wrath stand is stark contrast to the bowls of the saints' prayers. Mounce contends this is final judgment; therefore, no one can enter the Temple until the times are complete.





Psalm 11 Refuge in the LORD For the choir director. Of David.


¹I have taken refuge in the LORD. How can you say to me,

⁷ For the LORD is righteous; he loves righteous deeds. The upright will see his face.




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The First Bowl 16 Then I heard a loud voice from the temple saying to the seven angels, "Go and pour out the seven bowls of God's wrath on the earth." ² The first went and poured out his bowl on the earth, and severely painful sores broke out on the people who had the mark of the beast and who worshiped its image.						
Bowl 1 Sores and Wounds on Humans with the Mark and/or	The voice going out from the temple seems to be personally that of the Lord, indicated by apparent divine authority; the fact that no one else has been able to enter the temple at this point; that the command to "go" is declarative; and the pouring out is reminiscent of Old Testament contexts (Thomas). Again, these seven angels appear to be reserved for their purpose in the end times. There is no doubt here – this is the very wrath of the righteous, holy, omnipotent God.

Isaiah 6:6 Jeremiah 7:20, 10:25, 14;16 Ezekiel 9:8, 14:19 Psalm 79:3-6 Lamentations 2:4	While the Trumpet Judgments were limited (Revelation 8:7-12), the Bowl Judgments are much less so. Again, it should be noted that if God did not limit the time of judgment, no one would survive the Great Tribulation.Anyone possessing the Mark of the Beast, and anyone who worshiped the image of the Beast, experiences this horrific plague of sores. Some compare the sores to that of biblical leprosy, an educated guess certainly within the realm of possibility.

The Third Bowl ⁴ The third poured	The Third Bowl ⁴ The third poured out his bowl into the rivers and the springs of water, and they became blood. ⁵ I heard the angel of the waters say, You are just, You are just, the Holy One, who is and who was, because you have passed judgment on these things. ⁶ Because they poured out the blood of the saints and the prophets, you have given them blood to drink; they deserve it! ⁷ I heard the altar say, Yes, Lord God, the Almighty, true and just are your judgments

The Fourth Bowl

⁸ The fourth poured out his bowl on the sun. It was allowed to scorch people with fire, ⁹ and people were scorched by the intense heat. So they blasphemed the name of God, who has the power over these plagues, and they did not repent and give him glory.

> Fire is often associated with judgment in Scripture, and here the people who have refused God will experience extreme temperatures and burns. Yet, still, they refuse to repent or give God the glory He deserves. Pride and rebellion yield horrible consequences.

Bowl 4

Scorching heat of the sun.

The Fifth Bowl ¹⁰ The fifth poured out his bowl on the throne of the beast, and its kingdom was plunged into darkness. People gnawed their tongues because of their pain ¹¹ and blasphemed the God of heaven because of their pains and their sores, but they did not repent of their works.

The Sixth Bowl ¹² The sixth poured out his bowl on the great river Euphrates, and its water was dried up to prepare the way for the kings from the east. ¹³ Then I saw three unclean spirits like frogs coming from the dragon's mouth, from the beast's mouth, and from the mouth of the false prophet. ¹⁴ For they are demonic spirits performing signs, who travel to the kings of the whole world to assemble them for the battle on the great day of God, the Almighty. ¹⁵ "Look, I am coming like a thief. Blessed is the one who is alert and remains clothed so that he may not go around naked and people see his shame." ¹⁶ So they assembled the kings at the place called in Hebrew, Armageddon.				
Bowl 6 Euphrates River dries up; Kings of the East rise; Valley of Megiddo.	Although portions of the Euphrates have dried up on occasion, this is the first time that the entire river would do so. The Euphrates, a border for God's people initially mentioned in Genesis in reference to the Garden of Eden, will become an open road for the forces of the antichrist.

Armageddon will be discussed in Chapter 19. However, note that preparations for war are well underway. Allegorists believe this section to be a symbolism of the battle of good and evil.			

Regarding verse 15, recall similar words from the LORD in Matthew 24:42-44: "Therefore be alert, since you don't know what day' your lord is coming. But know this: If the homeowner had known what time the thief was coming, he would have stayed alert and not let his house be broken into. This is why you are also to be ready, because the Son of Man is coming at an hour you do not expect."

The Seventh Bowl

¹⁷ Then the seventh poured out his bowl into the air, and a loud voice came out of the temple from the throne, saying, "It is done!" ¹⁸ There were flashes of lightning, rumblings, and peals of thunder. And a severe earthquake occurred like no other since people have been on the earth, so great was the quake. ¹⁹ The great city split into three parts, and the cities of the nations fell. Babylon the Great was remembered in God's presence; he gave her the cup

filled with the wine of his fierce anger. ²⁰ Every island fled, and the mountains disappeared. ²¹ Enormous hailstones, each weighing about a hundred pounds, fell from the sky on people, and they blasphemed God for the plague of hail because that plague was extremely severe.

Bowl 7 Earthquake and hail	The "loud voice" seems to be that of the Lord, given that it is from the temple and indicates completeness of the three-tiered judgments (Seals, Trumpets, and Bowls). "It is done" (<i>gegonen</i>) is contrasted with "It is finished" (<i>tetelestai</i> : John 19:30); that is the, "done" here indicates the end of the judgments; the "finished" of Jesus indicates the glorious atonement, the finished

The primary point seems that God's wrath has been poured out on the Antichrist's system of government, and on the people who continue to follow their chosen father-substitute, Satan (rather than The Father (Jehovah) who created them). Note again that God is Lord of His own creation, with the elements, skies, and the earth bending in obedience to His wrath and His will. Numerous theologians posit the "great city" noted here is Jerusalem (certainly a possibility given the centrality of Jerusalem, along with the Jewish emphasis in the Revelation).
