COMMITTEE

Jane Enright continues as Landcare Coordinator, with Ian Holmes and David Mackenzie as committee members, and David as technical advisor and our link to the Rosedale Association. With only three committee members, we are very keen to hear from anyone else who may be able to join us.

OUR ROLE

Our role in Landcare is "a partnership between the community, government and business to carry out environmental protection in Australia". We have a deep appreciation for our natural environment and so we are constantly on the lookout for serious outbreaks of noxious weeds, diseased or damaged plants and soil erosion - particularly on Council land which is our main focus of work. A reminder that Council land belongs to us all so it can't be used for garden or household waste disposal or for personal private use. Breaches can result in unpleasant dealings with

We are here to help you. We are very ready to advise you how to remove noxious weeds and how to replace them with sustainable native plants – but not to dictate to you. For free garden advice and a plant swap offer, see the info on page 6 from Emma Patyus from Council.

ONGOING PROJECTS

Since our last AGM we have undertaken about the some number of activities as the year before, but the number of volunteers has dropped. We now have just six regulars and at times I have had to do the work on my own. This is not sustainable in the long run so I urge anyone who is able to help to let me know. Please keep an eye on the website - www.rosedale.org.au - for upcoming activities - I also send out emails notifying the date and time.

This year's activities primarily focused on:

- The main car park South Rosedale
- The Retreat off Cooks Crescent (a combined project between Landcare and the property owners, Marist Brothers)
- The small circular garden at the eastern end of Cooks Crescent.

Activities usually last about two hours. We target noxious weeds, water existing and newly planted native shrubs and grasses, and clean up litter (mainly empty bottles and cans). We work hard but also have lots of fun!

- In the last 12 months, grants from the Batemans Bay Local Aboriginal Land Council helped us with manual weeding, spreading mulch, clearing away the green waste and placing and securing the retaining logs at The Retreat Thanks to everyone for your compliments on how much better it looks!
- We have planted over 250 seedlings, some of them purchased but most provided by Council through Emma Patyus.
- We had the bitou bush sprayed in October and I am very
 pleased to report that Rosedale is virtually free of bitou at this
 stage but we must continue to monitor so please let us know
 if you spot any
- The blackberry will be sprayed as soon as we have suitable
 weather and the council contractor is available. I have mapped
 its occurrence over as much of Rosedale as I could, including
 the area behind the boatsheds..
- Crassula on the southern end of Rosedale Beach Banksia Flat, which Council successfully sprayed last year, is starting to make a comeback and will need further treatment.

If anyone has suggestions for Landcare activities please tell us. You might consider asking us to arrange volunteers to assist you with weed control at your place. If the job is large, Landcare might be able to hire contractors to do the job and supervise them for the cost of the contractors.

LANDCARE FUND JANE ENRIGHT

Nothing can be done without money. Grants and funding opportunities through Council and Eurobodalla Landcare are becoming fewer and harder to access. All our activities involve a cost and so we are very grateful for any donations that come our way.

We started the year with \$6,860 in hand. We received \$520 in donations and a co-payment from The Retreat for \$287. During the year we spent \$1035 on plants and works and we are left with \$6573 at the end of our accounting year (31 December 2012). Full details are reported in the Treasurer's report..

The Landcare Fund is in reasonable shape. It has always been our policy to keep a sizeable sum in reserve to be able to avail ourselves of opportunities that come our way. Sometimes it has been used to boost Council or other grant monies for contract work - for example on Banksia Flat. In the year ahead more money will need to be spent in that area.

However, donations have dropped and unless we see an increase the money may soon run out and Landcare activities

as we know them may have to cease. Rosedale has a well deserved reputation as the leafy, green nature suburb with native flora and fauna in abundance.

Council is unable to do much of what it takes to keep it that way – we're part of a huge shire. Rosedale's reputation comes about in part through Council's contributions but principally through the hard work of a small band of volunteers and the contract work we can hire with the Landcare Fund.

Landcare needs your time on the ground, whenever you can. It also needs your cash donation - if you are time poor, please give special thought to a cash donation. Help Landcare to help you.

DEVELOPMENT UPDATE DAVID BOARDMAN

Development Application (73/13) Rosedale Farm is still undetermined. Additional information has been requested but as yet the applicant has not provided an adequate response. The Committee will keep a close watch over any further progress.

The Marsim development on Bevian Park had their concept plan approved by NSW state planning in 2008. They are yet to submit a Development Application to council.

SAD OUTCOME FOR RESCUED TURTLE VICKI SMITH



A female green turtle rescued at Rosedale over the Christmas break has died, despite the best efforts of a rescue crew to save her. Green turtles are listed as vulnerable in Australia.

A family holidaying in Rosedale spotted the turtle in trouble around the rocks at the northern end of Boatshed beach. They phoned the Eurobodalla Wildlife Information Rescue Service (WIRES) and a representative rushed out to Rosedale and retrieved the turtle from the water (see photo).

The Bay Post reported that 1.8 kg of sand and seaweed were removed from inside and on her shell. She was thoroughly exhausted when she came in, and was given a drip, antibiotics, vitamin B injections to stimulate her appetite and treated in warm salt water to flush out toxins. But after eight days in care, she had still not eaten and was flushing huge amounts of toxins out of her system. Her kidneys failed.

WIRES had planned to move her to a large tub at the Merimbula Aquarium, which helped the rescue service save and release a Hawksbill turtle last year. While Rosedale's green turtle showed no sign of plastic ingestion, marine debris is one of the turtle's key threats – a reminder to us all to leave no trace of plastic bags or fishing line.

BRUSH-TAILED POSSUMS MAX TISCHLER

THERE IS NO MISTAKING A
BRUSHTAIL POSSUM RUNNING
ACROSS YOUR ROOFTOP - IT
SOUNDS NOT UNLIKE A SMALL
HERD OF ELEPHANTS. I'M NOT
SURE HOW AN ANIMAL THAT
WEIGHS MUCH THE SAME AS A
SMALL DOG CAN CAUSE SUCH A
COMMOTION BUT AT TIMES I'VE
WOKEN IN THE MIDDLE OF THE
NIGHT THINKING THE ROOF IS
ABOUT TO COLLAPSE.



Brushtail possums are solitary animals (mostly) and can be quite territorial. They mark their 'patch', which is usually about a hectare (100 m x 100 m) in size, by rubbing secretions (from glands on their chest) across tree trunks and branches. In situations where the density of possums is high - such as Rosedale - it is likely that territories overlap. Here encounters between unfriendly neighbours are common and inevitably lead to pursuits through trees and across rooftops, often accompanied by loud gutteral grunts and growls.

Like most possums brushtails are nocturnal. They spend their daylight hours resting in tree hollows and forked branches but often find the crawl spaces in houses inviting. At night they climb through vegetation eating mostly leaves (they are tolerant to many plant toxins that are poisonous to other animals), but will also consume fruits, flowers, seeds and at times insects, grubs and birds' eggs. They love going through compost heaps and are easily seduced by bread and honey - neither of which is good for the health of the possum (something I didn't realise as a kid).

Brushtail possums can breed all year round but reproduction is most common in autumn and spring. Males court females but the relationship is fleeting. After a gestation period of just two and a half weeks the female gives birth to a single young that is as small as 1.5 cm and weighs only 2 or 3 gm. Like most marsupials the newborn then has to find its way to the mother's pouch where it attaches to one of two teats. It will stay suckling in the pouch for

the first four or five months of its life. Once developed and old enough it can be left by the mother but often clings to her back until it's about nine months old.

Although brushtail possums have disappeared from much of central Australia and other regional areas, they seem well adapted to urban areas and settlements. Their population seems to be doing reasonably well along most of the east coast - in fact they're considered a pest in some areas due to the damage they can cause to agricultural crops such as fruit trees and plantations. They are routinely controlled in Tasmania for these reasons. Interestingly, in New Zealand where brushtail possums were introduced in the mid 1800s their numbers have thrived and are estimated to be around 60 million. In fact, a successful industry has been established in NZ where possums are harvested for their fur and pelts to be turned into fibre, and for their meat which has a high demand in countries such as Malaysia and Taiwan where it is marketed as 'Kiwi Bear'.

Brushtail possums at Rosedale are a comforting reminder that some mammal species are doing well whilst many others (like bandicoots and gliders) continue to struggle. They can cause a shock at night, and at times need to be evicted from your garage but *Trichosurus vulpecula* which translates as "furry-tailed little fox" are an important part of the natural ecosystem and deserve their place at Rosedale.

SUMMER SAND SCULPTURES VICKI SMITH

What a treat it was to have Sue Foster visiting from Canberra and practising her sand sculptures on our beaches over summer. Sue was refining her designs for the annual sandcastle competition at Broulee, which was held in early January. We know that many of you stopped and admired her beautiful work. Let's hope she returns again next year!



DIAMOND PYTHONS UPDATE MAX TISCHLER

Since our piece on diamond pythons in 2010, many people have shared recent sightings, encounters and anecdotes. This picture was snapped by Vicki Smith in Knowlman road – it may have made its way from Noel Egan's property (see March 2012 newsletter) to hers!

It is heartening to know that the population of diamond pythons at Rosedale is continuing to do well. Not surprisingly most of these sightings have occurred during the warmer months when the snakes are most active and there are more people roaming about Rosedale. Interestingly the snakes appear to be widespread across both North and South Rosedale. Some are continuing to find suitable lodgings around dwellings, whilst others have been spotted crossing roads and walking trails.

SURF LIFESAVERS ON ALERT VICKI SMITH

A big thanks to Batemans Bay Surf Life Savers who made ad hoc visits to Rosedale's beaches over the busy holiday period, both by road and sea. It was reassuring to know that they were keeping an eye on conditions at our beaches.

If you see them arrive in their Inflatable Rubber Boat (IRB), or parked on the dunes in their 4WD, please give them a wave to acknowledge their presence. The 4WD has a range of life saving equipment on board and is manned by trained lifeguards, who are in radio contact both with the IRB and their team at Malua Bay Surf Life Saving Club.

FREE GARDEN ADVICE AND NATIVE PLANTS EMMA PATYUS

You may not be aware that some plants in your garden have the potential to jump the garden fence and invade local bushland. These plants can spread by wind, birds and water. Other means of dispersal include cuttings that are dumped in bushland. These plants are known as environmental weeds.

To assist the work of Rosedale Landcare, and to benefit local bushland, Rosedale residents are being given the opportunity to receive free garden advice on how to make your gardens bushland friendly. This offer also includes the opportunity to exchange environmental weeds from your garden for five free native plants.

By replacing environmental weeds with native plants, you will be

gardening sustainably, reducing impacts on local bushland and providing an indigenous food source for native birds.

This offer extends to vacant land and new developments. We encourage absentee owners to notify your tenants/rental agencies to participate as well.

This project is being administered by Council with funding from the Australian Government Caring for our Country program and will be managed by a part-time project officer available on Mondays.
