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Good news on the Yowani Road rocky beach access – Council received a NSW Recreational Fishing Trust grant of \$10,000 towards the project. Council will contribute additional funds but they need us to contribute too, so the project can get underway this financial year. We'll discuss this at the AGM. Council has surveyed and prepared a 3D site layout for Nuns Beach access and are drawing up the stairs for feedback then costing. We met with Council's GM and Executive in March and will meet with the Mayor in April, so there's lots to report at the AGM.

NSW Planning and Environment's assessment and approval of Council's contentious Rural Land Strategy (RLS) is delayed, in part due to the NSW state election. If approved, the land to the north of Rosedale will be zoned E4 and south of Tranquil Bay Close will be RU1. We have lodged objections, received Council's assurances and continue to follow developments.

Finally – no change to the approved developments for Rosedale Farm, but we hear a commencement date is close, so expect to see construction of access roads this year.

### BEACH SAFETY VICKI SMITH

Another successful rescue at Rosedale this January - a reminder that we can't learn too much about Rosedale rips and emergency responses.

A young woman was caught in a rip on the northern end of Main beach - towards the rocks going around to Boatshed beach. The rip was surprisingly strong for the relatively calm conditions. It was fortunate that locals noticed her, as she was so panicked that she could not raise her arm to alert anyone. Remember, if you see someone in trouble call 000 for a coordinated response.

Earlier in January, 20 people attended a highly successful beach safety session. A big thanks to Al Baxter, who talked to us about rips, CPR and how the defibrillator would help us in an emergency. We then practised CPR on manikins – many thanks to

Batemans Bay Surf Lifesaving Club for lending them to us!

## NEW RULES FOR DOGS

From 1 May to 31 October dogs will be allowed at any time on the full length of Rosedale Beach. Under the new rules, they can be leashed or unleashed but they must be under the control of a competent person at all times.

The new rules are a significant improvement on Council's original proposal and reflect strong submissions from the Association and the community and, crucially, several persuasive presentations to a Council meeting.

Until the end of April, the old timeshare rules apply – no dogs on Rosedale Beach between 9 am and 5 pm. Before 9 and after 5, you can walk your dog on leash from the carpark north and off leash from the carpark south. (See our December 2018 newsletter).





### BANDICOOTS ALANA LEGGE

This long-nosed bandicoot (Perameles nasuta) was photographed in Knowlman Road in January. You can see its pointed ears, long snout, large hind feet, humped back and grey-brown fur that is bristly and rough. They also have some white on their underbelly and a thin tail. They generally weigh up to 1.5 kg and are between 31 cm and 43 cm in size, which makes them one of the smaller Australian native animals. They are often confused with rodents but are actually nocturnal, omnivorous, ground dwelling marsupials. They are also territorial and typically solitary. The only interaction between males and females is during the mating season and their gestation period is only 12.5 days, which is the shortest of all mammals.

Bandicoots are great at adapting to different habitats. During the day they are in camouflaged nests – small holes dug under dense vegetation or debris and lined with leaf litter. They are well hidden from predators and protected from sun and rain. You may have seen small conical holes in your lawn or garden, made by a bandicoot with its pointed snout when foraging.



They look for a wide variety of surface and soil dwelling invertebrates, including earthworms, earwigs, cockroaches, crickets, grasshoppers, grubs, spiders, moths, ants, termites, beetles, as well as beetle larvae and pupae. They also eat tubers and fungi and some native fruits and berries. While foraging, they use their long, curved toes to dig and turn over the soil. This means they are doing us a favour by aerating the soil and removing pests. You might see their droppings nearby too – smooth pellets around 25 to 50 mm long and full of the indigestible parts of insects and bits of grass and dirt.

Bandicoots are protected in NSW, so we need to look after them in Rosedale – we don't want them ending up like their cousin, the Bilby, which is one of Australia's most endangered species.

#### BLUEBOTTLES – BEAUTIFUL BUT UNWELCOME VISITORS PETER WARD

Bluebottles are a common visitor to our shores in summer. They are true nomads, sailing the open ocean at the mercy of wind and currents, sweeping down to Rosedale from the Coral Sea off Queensland.

Rather than being a single animal with specialised cells, each bluebottle is actually a colony of semi-independent animals called 'polyps'.

Bluebottles can't see or smell, nor can they independently swim or vary their depth. They just float at the sea surface. Their iridescent blue, gasfilled sac or 'bell' is asymmetric – the bell of some bluebottles leans to the left, others to the right. During summer, the prevailing north-easterly wind tends to blow right-handed individuals towards south-eastern Australia. (Left-handed bluebottles are blown towards New Zealand.) Apart from summer, masses of jumbo-size bluebottles often wash up on our beaches in October.

THE DREADED STING
Extending up to three metres below the surface,

each bluebottle has a thread-like tentacle consisting of thousands of microscopic stinging polyps called 'nematocysts'. Each nematocyst consists of a barb attached to a spring-loaded filament in a capsule - triggered by touch.

Each of these thousands of nematocysts functions independently, retaining its ability to sting whether or not the entire tentacle is attached to the bell. After being churned in waves near the shore and washed up on the beach, many – but not all – of the nematocysts are discharged. Some may remain potent for days or weeks after being beached.

Nematocysts inject toxins to paralyse prey such as small fish. A bluebottle sting will cause you severe pain, usually lasting less than an hour. If you are stung, don't rub the affected area as this will activate any dormant nematocysts. Use seawater to wash the tentacles off your skin or carefully pick them off; immerse the wound in hot water or use ice packs to relieve pain.



Following up our February weed-spraying from Boatshed to Banksia Flat, we had a small working bee in early March. Our targets were turkey rhubarb, honeysuckle, asparagus fern, morning glory and bitou bush all persistent weeds! Thanks to all who lent a hand – we hope to have more working bees over the next 12 months, so please join us when you can.

Your own gardens can harbour these weeds and become seedbeds for future infestations. Over the next few months, the following weed species will be prevalent and susceptible to control. Here's how.

Cassia/Senna



Hand pull seedlings. Cut and paint larger plants with neat roundup/ glyposphate - cut the stump as close to the ground as possible then apply herbicide immediately. See weeds.brisbane.qld.gov.au/ weeds/easter-cassia. This is the same rate that you would use for asparagus fern so it's a nice easy and effective way to treat these common weeds in situ with very little off target and no ground disturbance.



#### **Turkey Rhubarb**

Hand remove isolated plants (taking care to remove the underground tuber). Spot spray larger infestations with a selective herbicide – Grazon (40ml/10 litres) or Brush Off (2g/10 litres), adding a surfactant at 10ml/ litre. This is the best way to treat emerging seedlings as manual removal over a large area causes unnecessary soil disturbance and can often be ineffective (segments or multiple tubers can be missed). #### **Morning Glory**

Hand pull small infestations. Spot spray larger infestations with 50ml Grazon per 10 litres of water. Do not spray in the canopy, pull to the ground and spray or leave in situ and scrape and paint stems. (Scrape with side of secateurs, apply herbicide to that scrape. The longer the scrape, the more surface area so try for at least 30cm.) See weeds. brisbane.qld.gov.au/weeds/mileminute

#### FIRE SAFETY MICHAEL SKIPPER

Again we have survived the summer season fire threat, but destructive bushfires in Tassie and Victoria – and a recent grass fire in Tomakin – remind us that there's a good probability our little patch of paradise will come under attack at some time.

We need to remain alert to any change to threat warnings, keep our Fire Protection Plans updated (and understood by all household members) and remove combustible material around buildings to protect our properties and our neighbours'.

Over the last year, the Rural Fire Service has been incredibly helpful with demonstrations and fire workshops to help us. Malua Bay Rural Fire Brigade are now arranging informal sessions so their members can get to know Rosedale and Guerilla Bay better we may see their trucks wandering around, as part of their familiarisation exercises. They would like to meet with Association members and the broader community soon to map our water tanks and pools for possible use as a fire fighting resource.
