



FACULTY

For the first time in the history of the School our Headmaster, Father Leeming was not on deck to open a term. From December 30th, to January 18th, he was ill at the Roosevelt Hospital. However, he was able to resume his duties about the first of February. During this year Father has been able to devote more time to the administrative work of the School. His only classes are those in Sacred Studies. Under his leadership a strong faculty has been drawn to the School.

The Rev. Charles Flint Kellogg came to St. Peter's last year at the beginning of the Easter term. He took an Honor's degree in History at Bard College and his Master's degree in History at Harvard. He is also a graduate of the General Theological Seminary. Father Kellogg teaches History, Biology, and Sacred Studies and is in charge of Keble House.

Mr. Walter Millard Drake received his early training at the Poughkeepsie High School. From there he went to Rensselaer Polytechnic İnstitute and Columbia University from which he has the degrees E. E. and M. A. Mr. Drake teaches Mathematics and Physics and is in charge of Seabury House.

Mr. William John came to the School after serving in the United States Army with the commission of First Lieutenant. He is a graduate of Loomis School and received his B. A. from Rutgers. Mr. John teaches English and Sacred Studies and is faculty advisor for the Dragnet. He also coaches dramatics. Mr. and Mrs. John have one daughter and they live in the White House.

Mrs. Anna McHugh Altz is the teacher for the Junior School. She is a graduate of Normal School and holds a New York State Teacher's certificate. Mrs. Altz lives in Croton and comes up to the School every day for classes.

Mr. Louis Kapaloric comes to the School with a wide experience of tutoring. For seventeen years he taught at Cheshire Academy. He is a graduate of New York University. He teaches French, Latin and Spanish in which he is ably assisted by his wife, Ethel Kapaloric. Mrs. Kapaloric is also Father Leeming's secretary. The Kapalorics have one son, Marc, who attends Hessian Hills School.

Mr. Myron G. Stevenson received his education at the University of Wisconsin. He is in charge of the boys in the Main House and teaches first and second form boys. Mr. Stevenson is also our coach.

Mr. Claude Tuthill, Director of Laboratories of the Peekskill Branch of Standard Brands, Incorporated, is a gaduate of Port Jefferson High School. He was graduated from Hamilton College and has done further work at Pratt Institute and Columbia University. Mr. Tuthill teaches Chemistry. He holds the Bachelor of Arts degree.

Mr. Robert L. Weil is a graduate of the University of Illinois and has the Bachelor of Science degree. Because of the increasing number of boys taking Chemistry Mr. Weil, who is Supervising Chemist of the Peekskill Branch of Standard Brands Incorporated, is also teaching this subject.

THE YEAR IN RETROSPECT

We have come to the end of the eighth year at St. Peter's School and once again it has been a year of problems and opportunities. No two years in a School are ever alike and this one has seen many changes. Sixty-four boys have been in residence and each one has contributed something to the good of the School. Many of us have let opportunities for service pass by but our very failures have, we believe, made us stronger. When we arrived in September we found many changes. Father Leeming's study had been moved to the White House and his former quarters converted into a reading room and reference library. This has been of great value to all of us. The former secretary's office was completely rebuilt and turned out to be a table setter's pantry. The dish washer's pantry was redecorated and all of the shelves covered with black and white linoleum. The kitchen and storage porch were painted as were the ice boxes. The library had its face lifted and what a difference a coat of paint made. A new mirror had been installed over the fireplace and very good looking inlaid linoleum put on the floor. But by far the greatest improvement of all was the beginning of the new wing to the schoolhouse. This work had been started in July but had been held up for several weeks by the constant rains. However, it was well on the way and we were able to move into it early in February. The new study hall seats one hundred boys and is excellently lighted. Downstairs we have two new classrooms, a washroom, and a large laboratory. Already nearly \$1,000 has been spent for laboratory equipment. Those of us who live in the White House were greatly impressed with the work which had been done in the basement. Mr. Terbush supervised and indeed did most of this work. The entire lower floor had been painted. Many rooms in the house had been painted and we felt very much set up. We can honestly say that all of the fellows appreciated what had been done for them and they have shown their appreciation by taking better care of the buildings. In no year of the school's history has the schoolhouse been more orderly and clean. In the recess between the winter and spring terms Mr. Purdy, assisted by McDowell and Asplund put up partitions and divided the old study hall into two classrooms, so that we now have seven classrooms in addition to the laboratory. A further change in the schoolhouse was the converting of the old laboratory into the school book store.

Old boys will find some other changes when they come back, for the greenhouse has been taken down and one can now see the chapel from the Main House. The old garage next to the schoolhouse is also being demolished and the grounds around the schoolhouse planted.

The Glee Club has been quite active this year and is by far the best we have ever had. On Sunday, March 31st, they made the trip to Ossining where they sang a service at Trinity Church and made quite a hit. Their spring concert was a decided success as was the show they and several others



At this time he told them of his plans for the building of a new chapel and asked each parent to be responsible for raising one hundred dollars. Although we had no Thanksgiving holiday this year, we did have a grand time at the School. There was a corporate communion in the morning followed by breakfast. At twelve-thirty we sat down to tables which fairly groaned with the weight of the food—turkey and all the fixings! By two o'clock parents began to arrive. It was a warm day and the sun was shining brightly. For two or three days we had a great deal of rain and the football field was a sea of mud. However, this did not dampen the spirits of our team or those of our opponents from St. Joseph's. Parents organized a cheering section and we cheered our boys to victory. While we were getting ready for chapel Father Leeming met with the parents and then boys and parents, arm in arm, went up to the chapel. Although we were terribly crowded, it was a wonderful service. We then had supper together before going to the night club for a movie. Most parents left by ten o'clock and we went off to bed.






Top-THE DRAMATICS CLUB - Bottom-DRAGNET STAFF

But by far the most important event was the Annual School Show which was held this year at the Peekskill Military Academy, for the Revue was in fact built around the Glee Club. For this occasion an additional chorus of twelve boys was added. Following the Peekskill Show we gave a second performance, this time at Trinity Parish House in Ossining. FOOTBALL

The football season this year was one of the best in the School's history. With thirteen first string men to choose from, Mr. Stevenson, our new coach, instituted a new method of play using two teams instead of one. New plays and types of signal calling managed to baffle our opponents.

Our first game against Croton High School came after only a few days of practice. Being up against a larger, heavier and more experienced team we lost 20-7. One lone touch-down was the result of a pass by Schwader to McDowell.

The second game was probably our greatest victory as we stepped away out of our class to play Hendrick Hudson High School's second team. This school has about nine hundred students. In the first quarter we scored when Schwader passed to McDowell. Hendrick Hudson intercepted deep in our territory, however, to tie up the game. Perez put Saint Peter's in the lead when he carried the pig skin around the end in the third period and McDowell intercepted a pass and ran seventy yards to make the final tally. The game ended 20 - 6.

Our rivals from Scarborough School next fell under the weight of our team when McDowell scored three touch-downs and Diaz one to win the traditional All Saint's Day game 31 - 0. In a return game we again beat Scarborough to the tune of 32 - 0.

In a high scoring contest we lost to Saint John's 39 - 25, after a rather sloppy bit of playing on our part.

The final game of the season was on Thanksgiving Day when a large audience of parents witnessed the game. We beat St. Joseph's 32 - 13 on a muddy field—so muddy in fact that players were rendered unrecognizable after a few minutes of play.

Saint Peter's also turned out a Junior Varsity team which played two games, losing to St. Joseph's and beating Hendrick Hudson Juniors.


There was also a team of midgets, all Junior School boys. They played and defeated Hessian Hills School.


We are most grateful to Mr. Stevenson for his wonderful guidance and coaching. Under his direction Saint Peter's really came into its own this year.
