





"Hoopsie" entered St. Peter's in the fall of 1943. In his Fourth Form year he was elected class president and retained that position during his Junior and Senior years.



## THE GLEE CLUB



### SPORTS REVIEW

Ever since the completion years ago, of our wonderful Athletic Field, Sports have been number one on the list of extracurricular activities at Saint Peter's.

This year, as in the past, the football season was started long before many of the boys were even unpacked. It looked forward to being an exceptionally bright season, with thirty-two boys on the squad at its opening. It was decided by coaches and players to start the first real eleven man team in school history. This was quite a decision and we went right to work to make this the most successful season in many years.

After almost three weeks of practice and attired in brand new uniforms, the first team with Captain Brent Olmstead '47 playing tackle, marched forth to receive their drubbing by a powerful Greer aggregation. Score, 22 - 0.

Forthwith we fell to Scarborough, (13 to 2) and Saint Luke's (20 to 2) before administering a beating to P.M.A. on November 6th, (20 to 6) and Scarborough in the traditional All Saint's Day game, (13 to 12). Although we lost more than half of our games, our spirit was higher than it has ever been before and will surely have its effect on next year's squad. All in all, we have made a good deal of progress in the field of athletics this year and we of the senior class want to express our appreciation to Mr. McDowell for his tireless giving of himself for us. We wish him lots of luck with next year's teams.

The Greer game was a victory for St. Peter's to the tune of 2 to 1. The entire game was marked by the brilliant playing of the team and of Bourke, who pitched the whole game, only giving up two hits.

In its next game, St. Peter's traveled to Danbury, Conn., to play Jesse Lee Academy. St. Peter's lost 18-1.

On Ascension Day St. Peter's played its traditional game with Scarborough and lost.

The return game with Greer was played Saturday, May 17th, and St. Peter's lost, the score being 15-2.

On Monday, May 19, the team went to St. Luke's School in New Canaan, Conn., and there Henry Bourke pitched a brilliant game. Well supported by the rest of the team he won a decisive 9 to 1 victory. The attack was led by Esclusa's three hits.

On Monday, May 26th the School played a return game at Scarborough and lost 3 to 2.
