
James Crawford Su-Brown "Su"




PAUL HOWARD BURR "Rrub"


"Dewey" entered Saint Peter's in the fall of '46. He slid very easily into the social life of the school and has remained there throughout his four year stay.







Prospects are very hopeful for the remainder of the season, and everyone thus far has contributed no end to the success of the team.






