
Dedication


As a token of our appreciation for all you have done, Mr. Drake and Mr. Stabb, we take great pride in presenting to you this, the 1953 edition of the Mitre.





The Athletic Council

The four game season ended with two losses, one tie, and one win.

In the season's opening game against the Oakwood squad, the "Saints" showed great spirit and coordination. Although the Crimson and Gold played a much better brand of football than did their opponents, they were unable to break the first quarter tie and the game ended 6-6.

Mahopac represented our first real threat. They outplayed the "Saints" in many aspects. However, the "Rothrockers" fought on until the final whistle was sounded and we had lost by the score of 39-13.

On St. Luke's Day, the men from S. P. S. travelled up to New Canaan, Connecticut where they showed the supremacy of St. Peter's over St. Luke's. Both teams played fine ball but our Crimson squad showed greater spirit and ability to win the game 7-6.

Saint Peter's lost their final football game of the season to a very rough and experienced Brunswick School. Our opponents scored a touchdown in the second and fourth quarters but the rest of the game was just a see-saw type battle with the "Saints" coming out on the short side of a 13-0 count.

Basketball

As the 1952-'53 basketball season approached, Coach Carter was in a quandry as to who he'd field for this year's team. But counting on big captain Fred Rohe, the few varsity men he had returning from last year, and his former J. V. players, he started a team which, although it did not perform outstandingly during the season, still gained six victories against nine for its opponents.

Captain Fred Rohe led his team from the center pivot position while Cyrus Moazed and Ollie Hodgkiss teamed up at the forwards and Bob Schlett and Chan Young worked at the guard positions. The Saints packed a wallop with such reserves as Baker, Blyznak, Leighton, and Kuhhorn on the bench.

The first game of the year found the Saints taking Saint Christopher's, 53-45 but the team went on to lose a heartbreaker to Haldane by 2 points, 42-20 with the final and tieing shot rolling in, around, and out of the basket just as the buzzer rang.

After the Christmas vacation a spirited team came back and beat Scarborough, 60-50. The next game was one to be remembered. We lost to Oakwood but showed enough determination and staying power to overcome a 20 point deficit. Captain Rohe set a new personal high-scoring record with 27 points.

The Irving game recorded the Saint's worst defeat. Mahopac followed them by beating us in a poorly played but close game. We lost again 64-39 to Irving who played to an undefeated season in 1953.

After trouncing P. M. A. on our own court, 63-56, we lost to Halstead and Oakwood.

The next three games showed a change in the tide. We took Saint Luke's at home and then traveled to P.M.A. where we trimmed them for the first time on their own court, 43-28. After beating Shrub Oak 55-53, we lost our final game to Hackley.

For the first time in the school's history, St. Peter's took part in a county organization and as members entered into the class C playoffs. Our first opponent was the defending champions, St. Mary's, who defeated us at the Westchester County Center, 62-32.

The tide changed, however, when the Macmen traveled to Kent, where they played the best game of the season. Sparked by the hitting and no-hit pitching of captain Bob Schlett, the Saints played to a 4-3 defeat which in itself was a victory for S. P. S.



Immediately after this the Glee Club journeyed to Ravetto's for their annual banquet.

Undergraduate life at St. Peter's became past history for the Class of '53 at Commencement on Saturday, June 6. 1952-53 will always linger in our memories as a year full of hard work, good fellowship, and satisfaction in our accomplishments. We, the class of '53, wish to render to Father Leeming and each member of the faculty many thanks for having borne with us and helped us on our way.


