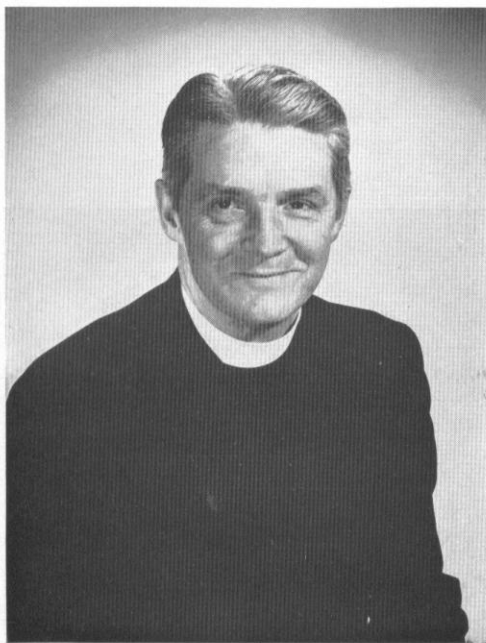

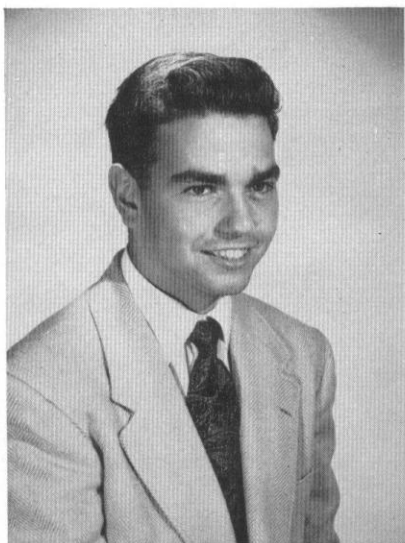

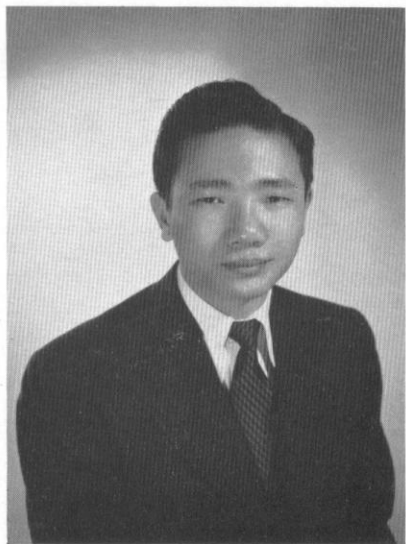
WALTER LUCIAN EDELMAN

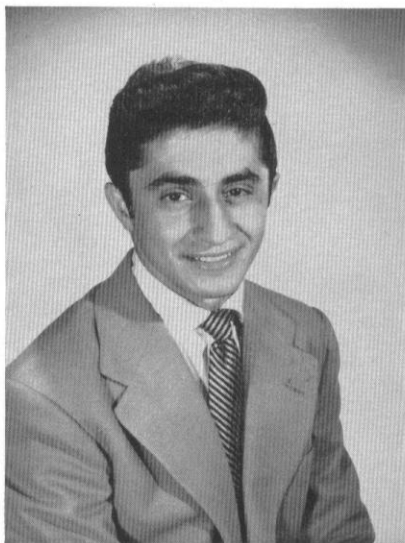

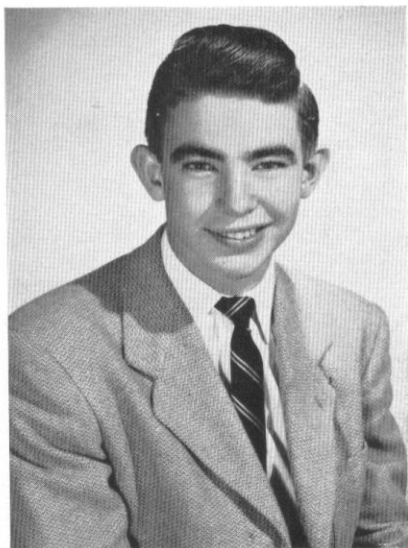


KHOSROW SADEGHIAN

The Athletic Council

Every member of the student body is a member of St. Peter's Athletic Association. The Athletic Council is the governing body of that organization. Working with the Athletic Director, Mr. McDowell, the Council is responsible for our sports policy — determining the number of games to be played in each sport during the year, the schools we compete against, and the qualifications for earning athletic awards. It is also responsible for the policing of training rules and attitudes of sportsmanship on the field of play, as well as determining the nature of the Crimson and Gold intramural competition. Membership on the Council goes automatically to all Captains and Managers of Varsity teams. Class representatives, selected by the Athletic Association at large, account for the the remaining positions.

Intra Mural Sports

The Crimson and Gold activities for 1954 commenced as usual by the elections of captains. The Gold chose "Red" Simpson and "Joe" Silver while the Crimson elected Jim Dempsey and Dave Leeming.

The annual Cross-Country Meet found the Gold victorious despite the fact that the Crimson took the first two positions in the race. Awards were presented to Frank Bennally, Dave Leeming, and Mike Bendfelt who came in first, second and third respectively. In the Junior Division the Gold took the first three places.

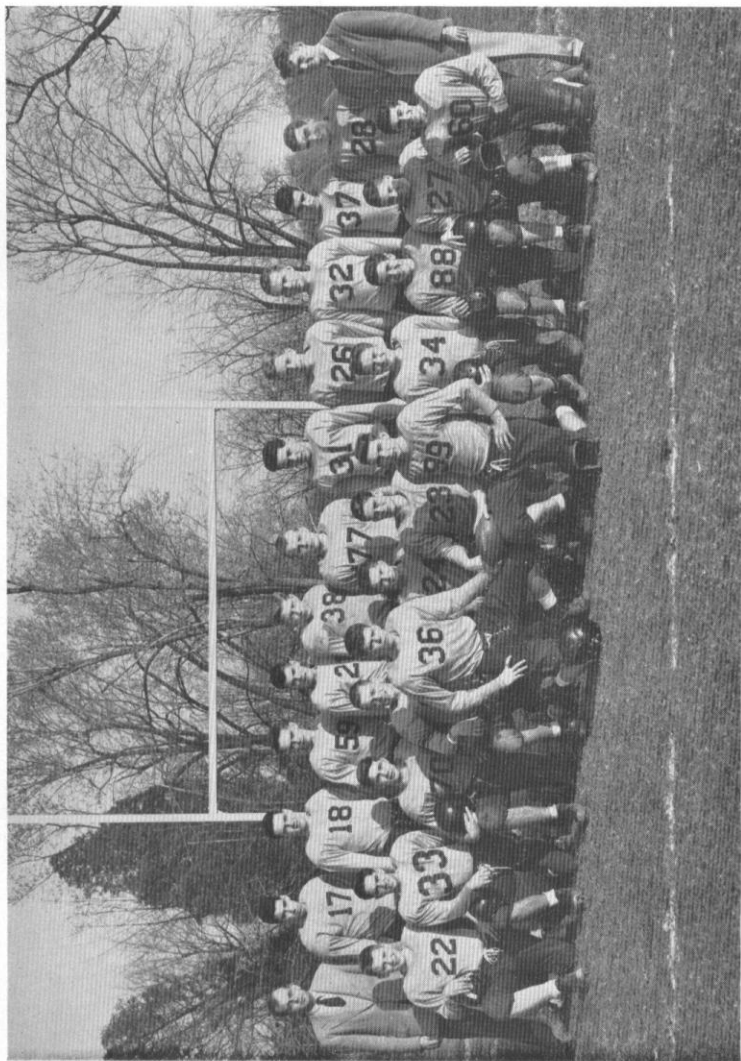
Soccer saw the Gold winning again by a score of 2 to 1.

Varsity Football

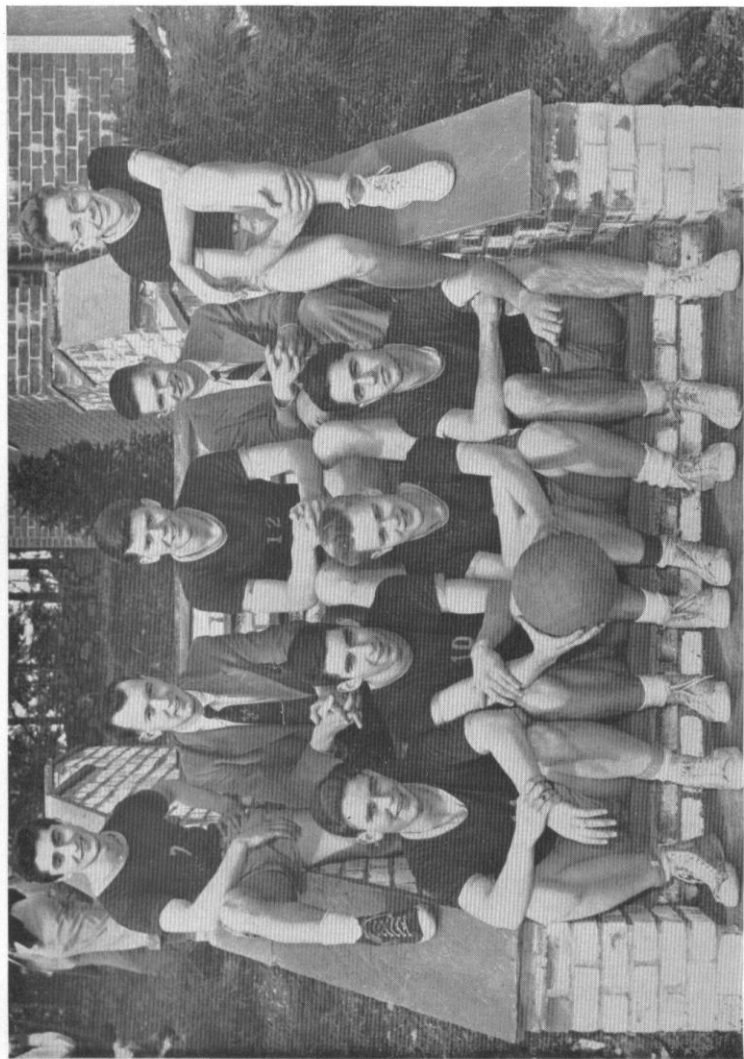
The season opener was played on the home field against a strong Oakwood contingency. The Crimson and Gold outrushed their opponents by some 100 yards. The game was lost, however, due to penalties and a few lapses in the pass defense.

The big day arrived on which we played our traditional rival, St. Luke's from New Canaan, Connecticut. The Lukemen drew first blood when the game was just a few minutes old. However the Saints bounced back to tie the score, and then to go ahead in the early minutes of the third quarter. At this point the Saint Luke's line began to outcharge our Saints, and, due to some excellent blocking, they were able to put 19 points across the goal. The final score was 25-13, a tough one for the Crimson and Gold to lose.

The Saints were not only outweighed but also outclassed in the last two games against Mahopac and Fieldston. Highpoints of these games being a fine second half comeback by the Saints in which we scored 20 points against Mahopac, and three long drives against Fieldston, which were sustained within the 10 yard stripe. This gave Fieldston a real scare since they entered the game undefeated, untied, and unscored upon.

Dave Silver and "Red" Simpson are to be highly commended for the fine job they turned in as co-Captains of the team. They proved to be of great assistance to Coach Ennis and a fine source of morale for the squad.

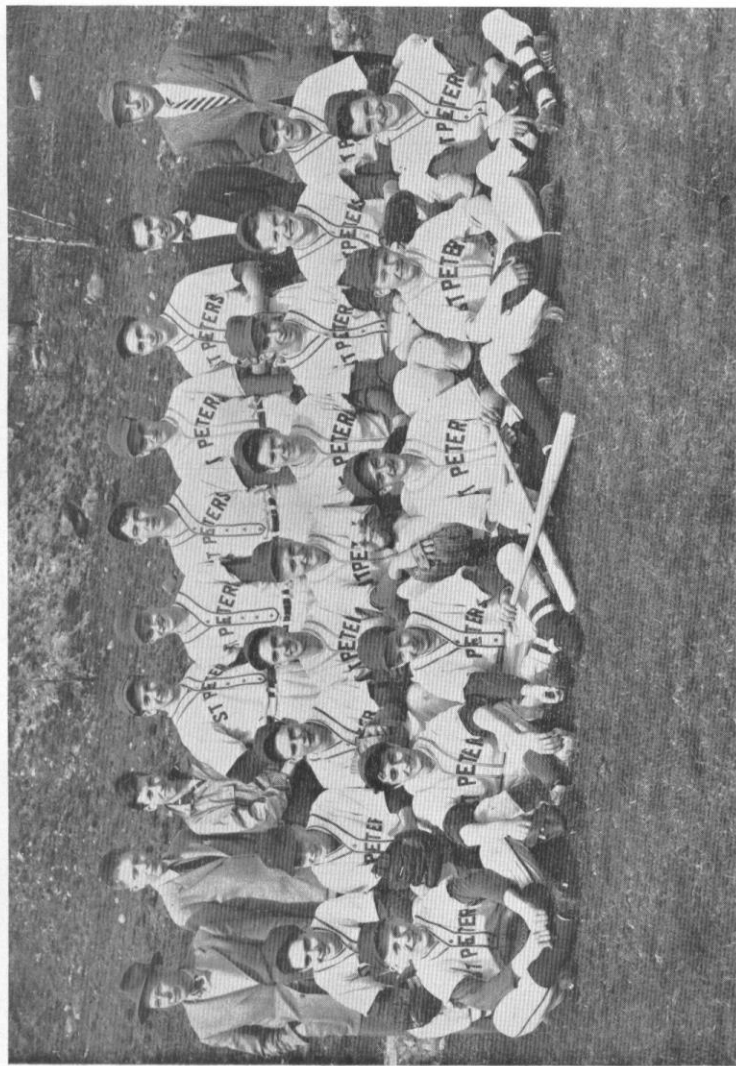
Varsity Basketball

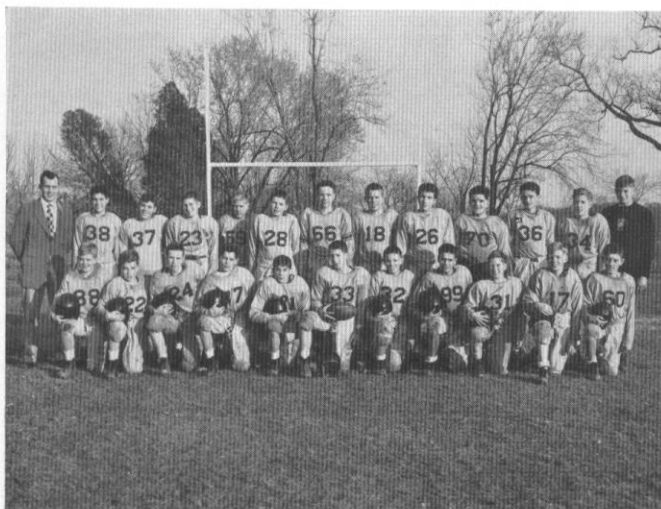
Varsity Baseball

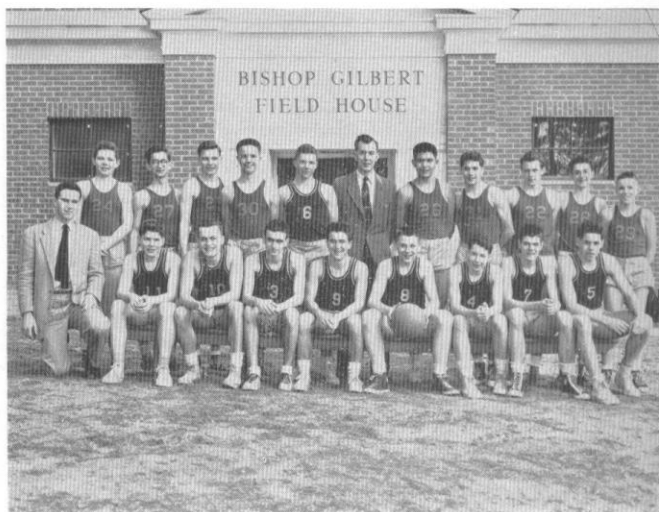

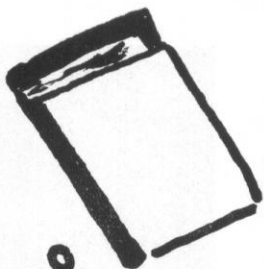
Junior Baseball

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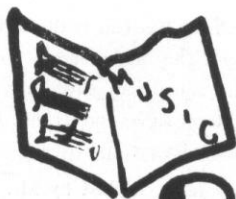

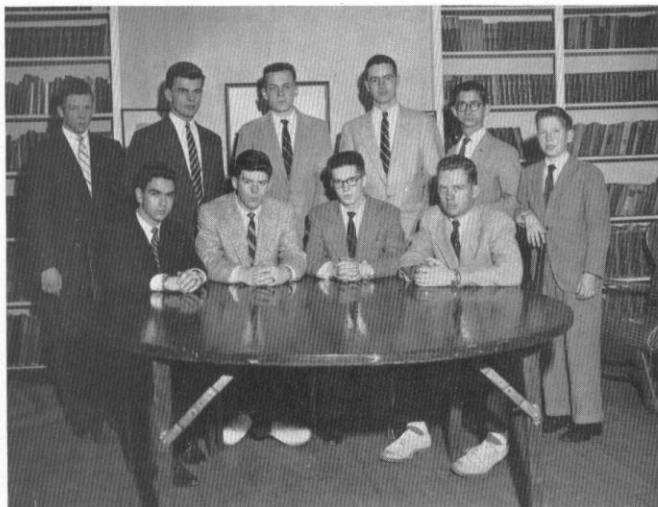

The Sacristans

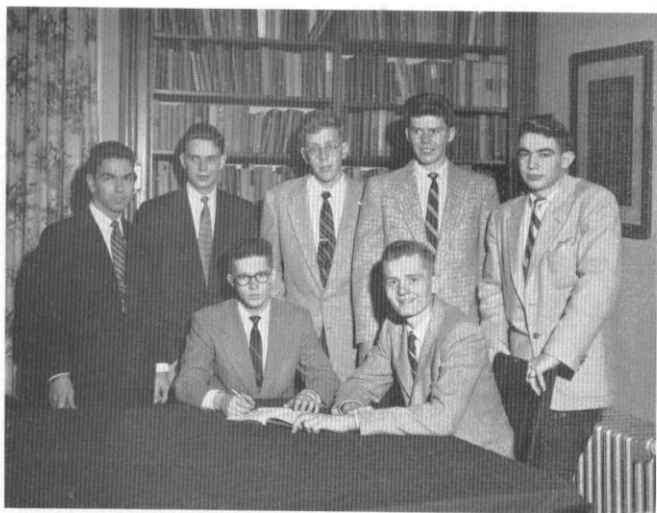

With the appearance of old boys on the 17th, we were prepared for classes to begin. Football practice started immediately, and although the season was not a winning one, the teams, consisting of almost all the school, got a lot of satisfaction out of playing. Glee Club rehearsals began at once and it soon became evident that we had a good group to work with.

During the year we have had excellent Saturday night entertainment with extremely successful movies, parties, and dances. Probably the highlight of the first term's entertainment was the Senior Hallowe'en party when, for the first time the faculty appeared in costume. The greatest event of the year, however, was the auction held at the school on the 31st of October by the Parent's Association under the chairmanship of Mr. and Mrs. Edelman. The net profits were well over \$1,000 for the scholarship fund.

The next event of note was the Golden Wedding anniversary of the Stabbs, just before we left for our Thanksgiving holiday. This vacation stands out in our memories because during it the Ryans were married and we could hardly wait to get back to find out whether married life would change this member of the faculty. On December 14th the Glee Club made its annual trek to the WOR Studios in New York to record the Martha Deane program. Those who listened to it on Christmas Day report it as being the best ever. Two days later we had our traditional Boar's Head Dinner and Yule Log Festival which was high-lighted by the fine acting of the seniors of the Mummies' Play. That same night we left for our extended Christmas vacation.

Just before the Christmas holidays Mr. Drake was taken ill and decided the time had come for him to retire from active teaching. This was a blow to all of us and we were sorry to see him leave.

On January 4 we all returned and plunged with renewed vigor into the basketball season and into final cramming before the midyear exams. After midyears came a long weekend to relieve the tension. On February 23rd Mr. and Mrs. Mason sponsored a most successful card party and realized \$342 for the scholarship fund. Basketball continued to claim our attention and our persistence paid off when we beat the Children's Village team in the Westchester County Championships. On March 13th

seniors took College Boards, and the next day the Glee Club started on its annual tour while the rest of the School left for home.

The tour took the Glee Club to New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Delaware, Washington, D. C., Maryland, and Virginia. In eight days time they made eleven appearances in concerts and church services, and appeared on radio and television five times.

School re-opened on April 5th. We were all saddened by the news of the sudden death of John Brinkman as the result of an automobile accident. Father Leeming and several of the boys attended the funeral and the school sent flowers.

On Sunday, May 9 the Memorial Studio in memory of Mrs. Mathilda Loewy was dedicated. This building, for the use of the Glee Club and other musical organizations of the community is a beautiful addition to the school.

On May 7th the Annual Concert and Dance took place at the Roosevelt Hotel in New York City. The Glee Club gave an outstanding performance and much fun was had by all. The Glee Club wound up its season with the banquet on May 20.

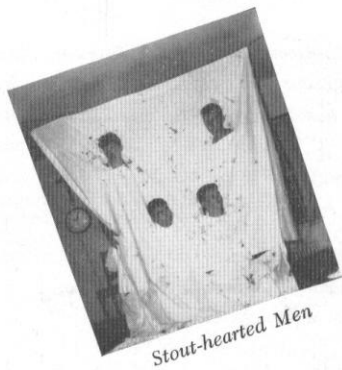
Saturday, May 15 marked another parents' association auction and the annual smorgasbord and parents' meeting. It was a gala occasion and one long to be remembered.

The next day was the Baccalaureate and we had an inspiring address and charge to the seniors by Father Ridgeway, Rector of St. Peter's Church, Peekskill.

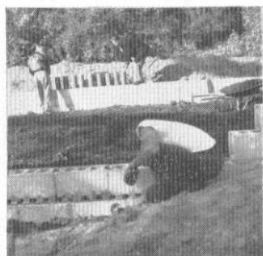

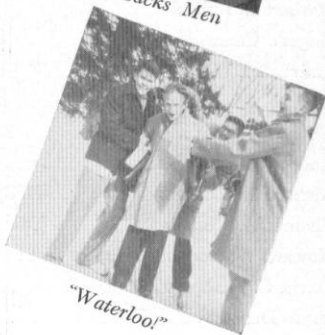
