# Varsity Football

The 1954 football team started what is hoped to be a slow but fruitful ascent to the position of a well respected opponent in its class. Coaches Ennis and Carter being supplied with more potential power this year worked more on

precision of hand-offs and blocking.

In the opener at Oakwood, the Saints took the field at full strength led by co-captains Jim Dempsey and Bill Biggs. After being halted a number of times on long marches, the Crimson and Gold finally drove over in the second quarter to lead 6-0. Taking advantage of a fumble, the home aggregation fought for ten yards and a score to lead at the half, 7-6. Putting on a sustained drive of 40 yeards, the team became bottled up on the Oakwood 20 yard marker. Finally the winning touchdown was secured on a pass in the end zone.

We dropped our first contest to St. Luke's, 19-14. Coming from a 13-0 defeat at half-time, the Hilltoppers tore through the Lukemen to gain the lead, 14-13. With minutes remaining the blue tide began to chop off large chunks of real estate. With two minutes remaining, the fullback carried one through

right tackle for the score.

Minus the services of several valuable linemen, the team suffered its worst defeat of the season at the hands of Fieldston, in New York. The ground attack was bottled up all day and were it not for some nice pass catching, we wouldn't

have even threatened.

The homecoming of the hard fighting eleven was met in a slight downpour on the oozing mud flats. One of the more superior teams, Brunswick, went home with a dripping 30-14 victory. Unlike other years, however, the Crimson and Gold never sloughed off and kept pounding the hard-charging line for scores on a pitchout and pass.

For the final clash of the season, S. P. S. faced an experienced Storm King team. Running away to an early 13-0 half-time lead, the Saints were able to

use nearly its entire bench and walked away with a 26-14 triumph.

# Varsity Basketball

The 1954-55 season was one which proved that it was worthwhile to put a squad on the floor. We opened up with four ball games at home prior to the Holidays. Of these, three were lost to St. Christoper's, Storm King and Haldane by a total of ten points. In the remaining outing Oakwood was subduded 51-45.

At last a trouncing of St. Luke's, 53-36, saw the Crimson and Gold playing as a hard working unit producing the kind of play of which they were capable. St. Peter's went on to win six of their next seven with wins over such string quintets as Peekskill Military Academy, 68-65, and Storm King, 57-54.

The P. M. A. affair was one of the closest and most hardly fought during the season. The "Saints" came from a one point deficit of 26-25 at halftime to pull it out in the closing minutes.

Smarting from their previous defeat at the hands of Storm King, the Hill-toppers traveled across the Hudson hungry for revenge. After falling behind at the midpoint, 23-21, St. Peter's played aggressively and managed to subdue the hosts in the last few seconds.

After dropping one to Scarborough we went on to cop six consecutive encounters. These included two wins over Children's Village and single victories against Wooster, Brunswick, Hackley and Halsted.

Another touch and go event was the Hackley game. In the six years that Coach Doug Carter had been heading the Varsity, he had failed to defeat the school which he once attended. At long last this victory was handed to him. After running up an eleven point lead at the half we witnessed a fabulous display of comeback as Hackley tied the score at 41 all with three minutes left. The determination to win flared up in the St. Peter's five and they pulled the game by quickly regaining a small lead and holding the opponents off.

Victories against Halsted and Haldane with a narrow loss to P. M. A. rounded out the season with a 13-6 record.





# The Year In Retrospect

On Sunday, September 12, 1954, the seventeenth school year began with a faculty retreat held by Father Leeming. The following Tuesday the Seniors arrived to start their final year, and were on hand to greet the new boys the following day. Thursday we saw the old boys return to make the student body complete. As is always the case, the first things to be noticed were the various improvements and additions made during the summer — the newly-painted inside walls and outside trim of the Field House, the sprinkler system in Main House, Manning, and Annex, donated by Mr. McFadden, and an oil burner in the Annex, a welcome addition. On September 18, classes began, with schedules passed out, and shortened periods for the purpose of distributing books. Football practice began immediately with a great majority of the student body showing an interest in the sport. Rehearsals for the Glee Club and Octet began with no delay, with a large group of hopeful singers coming out.

The Football season opened on October 2, with a 12-7 defeat of Oakwood. On this same day the first appearance of the cheerleading squad, a new innovation, was made. The following Saturday the annual auction for the Scholarship Fund was held, with a great amount of enthusiasm shown and close to \$1000.00 made for the fund.

Along with Baseball the Spring activities of the Glee Club got under way. The first of these was a full concert at St. James-the-Less Church in Scarsdale, New York on April 29.
